



Court Will Rule On Assistant State's Attorney's Signing

Court Indicates Decision But Withholds Ruling Until Thursday A. M. Effects Validity Of 4 Indictments Question Raised By Brady's Attorney Prior To Pleading

Can an assistant state's attorney sign an indictment for the state's attorney? That was the question that occupied much of the time of the court of the Ninth Judicial Circuit today, at both opening and afternoon sessions.

After prolonged argument by attorneys on both sides, Judge W. R. Smith said he would withhold his ruling until tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock on his questioning of Assistant State's Attorney E. F. Boyle after the attorney had concluded their argument he indicated what that ruling would be.

E. F. Haushalter, attorney for E. F. Boyle, member of the State Legislature and indicted by the Grand Jury last week on the charge of embezzlement, raised the question at issue here, and the state's attorney delegate attorney to the assistant state's attorney and the latter sign the name of the state's attorney by him as assistant state's attorney. He presented his motion to the court at the morning session, but part of the argument went over to the afternoon session.

In presenting his motion to the court that the indictment against E. F. Boyle be quashed, Attorney E. F. Haushalter for the defendant presented two arguments in support of his contention.

1. The assistant state's attorney should have signed the indictment as such in view of affixing the signature of the state's attorney by the assistant.

2. The office of assistant state's attorney does not exist at this time as created by the Legislature after the check was stopped.

Speaking on the first contention, Mr. Haushalter argued that the 1935 Legislature Act creating the office of assistant state's attorney in various districts gives such assistants authority like unto that of the state's attorney by the latter's absence and "the only power the assistant state's attorney has is that delegated to him by statute." Mr. Haushalter contended that the act, he declared, provides the manner in which he shall perform his duty and includes the prerogative of signing papers as assistant of attorney.

He argued that the assistant state's attorney should not act as such, and not as the agent of the state's attorney, and that the indictment should have been signed by E. F. Boyle, assistant state's attorney, and not by Murray W. O'Connell, state's attorney, by E. F. Boyle, assistant state's attorney.

"Had the indictment been signed by Mr. Boyle we would have no objection on that point," Mr. Haushalter told the court.

Discussing on the other objection, Mr. Haushalter moved that the state's attorney be appointed as such.

Exhibit To Be Of Fruit And Produce Only

Seminole Display To Be Utilitarian And Not Merely Decorative, Says Papworth

Seminole County's exhibit at the Central Florida Fair in Orlando next February is to be utilitarian, designed to impress visitors with the agricultural resources of this section, and money will not be spent on unnecessary decorations, President H. M. Papworth told the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce last night after Chairman A. G. Wagner of the exhibit committee had shown a model of the proposed display and explained its various features.

The trade body's leader declared that this year the county is going after prizes and will make such a display that judges cannot conscientiously pass up the Seminole exhibit. It will be only of fruits and vegetables, he said.

Mr. Wagner exhibited a model of the proposed exhibit which will have the stage in the Orlando auditorium. He suggested that the exhibit be built in sections, in such a manner that the entire structure can be changed after the fair, thus offering visitors in the future. His plan calls for a series of booths in which will be displayed citrus fruits, vegetables and, of course, celery, with several attractive displays to lend interest and color.

County Agent J. R. Dawson is working with Mr. Wagner on plans for Seminole County's entry at the Central Florida Fair and will be in a position soon to let producers know what they will need to make this exhibit the best in the opinion of the judges. Mr. Dawson explains that judges at exhibitions of the kind insist on certain groupings, but after the judges have been made then the display can be rearranged in what might be a more attractive form.

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Ethiopia Opposed To Peace By Giving Up Lands To Mussolini

Japan Demands Navy As Big As That Of Any Major Power

LONDON, Dec. 11. (AP)—Admiral Otsu Nagano placed Japan's demand for a navy as large as that of any major world power squarely before delegates to the International Naval Conference today. The admiral was the only speaker and the session adjourned until tomorrow when American and British delegates will reply to Japanese demands.

Tokyo is willing, it was said, to enter a drastic downscaling of tonnage on the principle of equality. But President Roosevelt's proposal to scale down proportionately the treaty tonnage on the present ratio basis would be wholly unacceptable, the Japanese said.

The Japanese, it was understood, will tell the conference that the limit of the tonnage dispute would permit them to agree to a special limitation of the size and armament of individual ships, even with a reduction of tonnage.

Selassie Would Lose Throne If He Accepted Proposal France Puts Forth

PARIS, Dec. 11. (AP)—The Ethiopian government, through its minister, Woldemar Mariam, announced today it was unalterably opposed to any proposal for settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian war which would "reward Italian aggression." The minister made the declaration in a statement following a conference with Premier Laval.

In Ethiopia it was stated that Emperor Haile Selassie would lose his throne if he dared to accept proposals which tentatively call for giving Italy control of Ethiopian provinces and rendering a report on the Red Sea to Ethiopia. In Addis Ababa government authorities said that the northern Tigray province must be kept by Ethiopia's last emperor, ordered to retreat, would rise in revolt on the grounds that they could have defended the province successfully.

These officials described the peace plan and its reported provision for exchange of hands between Italy and Ethiopia as a "ward for Italy for breaking the covenant and another device for further delaying tactics."

One of the factors in the proposed peace overtures is the withdrawal of all sanctions. Rome was silent. Whether Mussolini would discuss the proposal or drop an explosive "no" into European diplomatic ranks remained a question.

An offshoot of the Ethiopian crisis was the government crisis in Cairo today. Premier Tawfik Nasim Pasha offered the resignation of his cabinet, a high authority reported, and it was accepted by King Fouad. The government's government has been under the pressure of nationalist who demand an end to British influence in Egypt.

Rome Silent On Last Suggestion

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Labor Federation Says 11,650,000 Are Out Of Work

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)—The American Federation of Labor estimates an unemployment of 11,650,000 persons, it said today, compared with 11,700,000 in March, 1933.

William Green, president, said the 11,650,000 included 1,000,000 persons now employed by New Deal emergency agencies.

"Today," Green said, "with a half recovery of business we still have with us 24 percent of the depression unemployment."

"From March, 1933, to October, 1935, industry has created 5,657,000 jobs. In the same period, however, the number of persons seeking work has increased by 1,647,000.

"These figures are a clarion call to action. They show that unless industry, in cooperation with labor, is willing to face this problem and provide work for the unemployed, security will be found in taking some other means to give these millions their livelihood."

Clock Chimes May Ring In Sanford During Holidays

Senate May Learn Why America Was Drawn Into War

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)—The Senate committee probably will open an inquiry into "currents which drew America into the World War" Jan. 8 with J. P. Morgan as a witness.
