## UMW Urges National Soft Coal Contract

**Convention Leaves Determination Of New Wage Scale To 170-Man Committee**

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 3.—Delegates to the United Mine Workers convention opened today to make any thing less than a nationwide contract with soft coal operators.

John L. Lewis, president of the UMW, had said earlier that the decision on whether to come to terms with part of the industry would be left to the convention.

The 2,500 delegates in Atlantic City authorized a policy committee to determine new wage demands. The miners' application, however, was approved by the 170-man committee.

Thomas Kennedy argued for the adoption of a report which would make the making of new wage demands a policy committee of 170.

After these matters were settled, the miners adjourned their convention.

The convention action precluded any change of a settlement of any kind and the soft coal operators in the near future because the miners' application to the operators is now pending government control.

This was the contract made by Lewis and the operators in 1945.

Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug said he would see the 20 day strike.



### Green Shirt Leader Who Started Fascist Movement In Brazil Has Returned From Exile In Portugal

By HOYT WARE, AP Newsfeatures

RIO DE JANEIRO—The frail, mystical man who developed a fascist movement in Brazil more than a decade ago, returned to his native land in a green shirt, returned from seven years of exile in Portugal.

The impression is that there is a "Green Shirt" movement in Brazil, the man, Salgado, predicted would on day rule Brazil, as he stepped from the plane that brought him home.

Salgado, which he fled in 1939, "Integralism as a doctrine is eternal. As a party, it does not exist. I consider it as a generator of parties," he declared in answer to a reporter's question. A small group including some former Integralists, welcomed him home.

Government Warns Him

At the same time, General Góes Monteiro, Brazil's bulky, loquacious War Minister, thundered to the press. "If Salgado takes up his arms again he will be considered outside of the democratic scene in this country."

The political party which most closely approaches Integralism, Salgado told the press, is the Popular Representation Party. This group had the 50,000 votes necessary to retain legality in the elections of last December.

The party, organized last year with speeches acknowledging the influence of "The Great Absent

On" gave its support to the Social Democratic Party which elected President Dutra and played the small party role congressman Underover Operations.

The organizer of the Popular Representation Party is Ramundo Padilha, cited as the U. S. State Department's "Blue Book" as effecting the Integralist movement in Brazil.

While some observers predict Salgado may become a political candidate, the former Integralist chief said he was not immediately interested in the "country's confused political scene."

Salgado added, "I have organized parties in the Congress. I have named only Godofredo Silva Teles, elected on the Social Democratic ticket for the small Popular Representation Party but claims to be an Integralist, as party leader."

His assertion that he favored legality for the Communist Party was widely noted because one of the first principles of Integralist organization was to combat Communism. Integralism stated that the Nationalist movement had later lost that objective.

Thousands of green-shirted enthusiasts, wearing armbands with the Greek Sigma symbol, joined their arms in the fascist salute in public parades and ceremonies, embraced a mystical creed

and in 1938, I tried to get the government.

Retonga, taught them President Getulio Vargas, who had never openly approved Integralism as he had Communism, a possibly defended his palace with a rifle until the army came. He had put down a Communist revolt only three short years before this uprising.

Salgado, who was in hiding in Sao Paulo fled to Portugal. Some Integralists were imprisoned. The central committee decided by Vargas last year pardoned all political criminals.

Integralism, which once claimed to have a million disciples, has few open adherents in Brazil today.

cluded the wildcats were planning to use Allen on the basis of an earlier decision, which said Allen could play.






