Airport master plan waits for approval

The master plan outlining projected improvements and expansions to the Orlando Sanford International Airport is now in the hands of the Federal Aviation Authority (FAA) and Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

The plan has already been presented to the city of Sanford, and was outlined to the Seminole County Commission this past week by airport President/CEO Larry Dale, and Jim McGraff, who helped prepare the document.

"The FAA and FDOT now have 60 days

Federal Aviation Administration has 60 days to approve the document

from our submittal of the plan to approve the document," Dale said. "Once they do, it officially becomes the airport plan for the next 20 years."

Dale explained that for the past two years, the Orlando Sanford International Airport has been listed as the fastest growing airport in the nation, and the 23rd busiest airport in the entire world. But he added that the expectations for the

future growth will require a great deal of change at the airport, which is the purpose of the 20 year plan.

The following are some of the many findings and recommendations outlined in the Master Plan:

Terminals

The existing domestic and international terminals will not meet the forecast

demand for commercial aviation activity. The Domestic Terminal building in the year 2000 had 186,000 square feet of space. By the year 2020, requirements call for over 1.4 million square feet. For the international terminal, there were 220,400 square feet of space. By 2020, International will also require over 1.4 million square feet.

Three alternative plans for terminal expansions were presented in the Master Plan. Alternatives #1 and #2 indicated the terminals would be enlarged, but remain in the same general location. Alternative

Deputies solve comic book caper

Vintage collection valued at \$55,000

A case involving the theft of thousands of dollars worth of collectors' comic books has been solved, most of the property recovered, and the suspect arrested.

Saturday, July 13, the Seminole County Sheriff's office received a report of the theft of comic books that were in public storage. The victim estimated the loss at \$55,000.



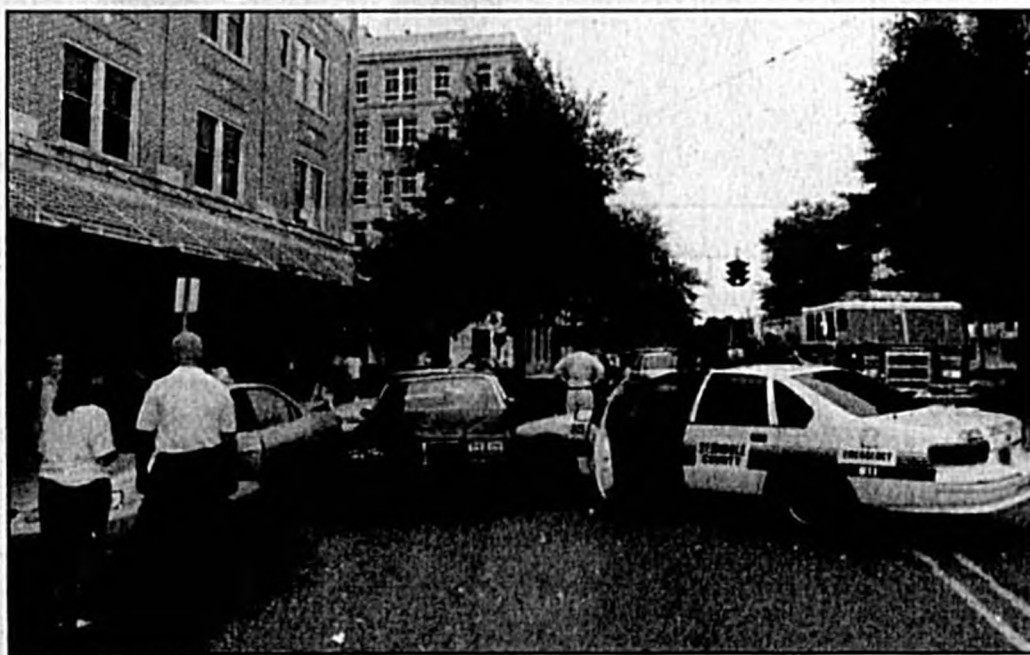

The theft occurred at the Public Storage facility, 2431 S. Orange Blossom Trail near Apopka. The victim, Douglas Korinke, 49, of Moore Haven, was contacted by an employee at the storage site and notified of the theft. Korinke then notified the sheriff's office. He said he had been collecting comic books since the 1960s, and that they were kept in protective plastic and placed in boxes.

Through an investigation some of the books were found at a local comic book store, where the suspect allegedly exchanged them for money and other collectibles. The store operator turned the books over to investigator, which led to the arrest Wednesday, of Shannon Bickel, 22, listed as homeless, from Orlando.

Suspect arrives at court with marijuana

A Seminole County Deputy, who is assigned to the Seminole County Courthouse, was injured today during a scuffle with a suspect, who brought drugs into the courthouse. The suspect also got into a car crash with another deputy and then tried to run away.

The suspect, 19-year-old Octavius Wilson (dob 2-5-83), was at the courthouse for a court date regarding possession of marijuana. While going through security at the courthouse, Wilson was asked to empty his pockets. When he did, he placed a small baggie of marijuana in the tray, among his other personal effects. Deputy Oscar Soto

saw the marijuana and ordered Wilson to stay where he was. When Soto reached for Wilson's arm, Wilson bolted and ran out of the courthouse to the car, in which he arrived. It was parked on Park Avenue and the engine was running.

Paulucci blasts CEOs in scandals

Investing public is being 'screwed'

SANFORD — The recent financial scandals that have rocked some of the nation's largest corporations are drawing sharp criticism from a man who knows a thing or two about big business.

Jeno Paulucci, the outspoken entrepreneur whose Sanford-based frozen food companies

have earned billions, purchased a full-page ad in the Sunday, July 21, Washington Times newspaper demanding President George W. Bush direct his Justice Department indict top executives involved in crooked business practices.

"You can call it 'cooking the books,' or you can call it 'improper accounting' but there are really no other words except 'stealing' and 'larceny,'" Paulucci wrote in an open letter to Bush. "We beseech you to have your Attorney General (John) Ashcroft call grand juries for each and every one of those crooked companies and put the convicted bastards in prison now and forever, and thus return the confidence to all of us in our capitalist system."

In a telephone interview from his offices in Duluth, Minn., Paulucci said his is lobbying Washington to implement tougher standards for public corporations. Failure to hold top executives accountable for questionable business practices could destroy American business, Paulucci said.

"The CEOs have got to sign off that their companies are being run properly," Paulucci said. "The board of directors should,

County Commission approves millage rate

The Seminole County Commission approved the proposed millage rate for the county during Tuesday morning's commission meeting. Florida Statutes require the board to set a proposed millage rate to be used by the Property Appraiser in the Notice of Proposed Property Taxes (TRIM notice) which is to be mailed to property owners in August.

The proposed millage rates may be increased at the first public hearing (in September), but may not be increased at the second public hearing.

The total proposed millage rate is 7.9637. The total includes countywide millage at 4.9989, Unincorporated Roads at .1228, Fire protection at 2.6334, Natural lands debt at .0986, and trails development debt at .1100.

With the millage rate of 7.9637, with the \$25,000 homestead tax exemption, the owner of a home valued at \$100,000 would be pay-

ing \$597.28 in county taxes.

The owner of a home valued at \$50,000 with the homestead exemption would have a county tax bill of \$199.09. This will be in addition to other taxes such as municipal taxes, etc.

The proposed millage rate represents a 4.55 percent increase over the aggregate roll-back millage rate of 6.0904, which would have generated the same income as the millage rate from last year. The rate is constant with the fiscal year 2001-02 levels.

Sanford bicycle officers provide life saving lessons

In addition to being regular uniformed Sanford Police officers, Ed Morales, Bill Wixson and Brian Welch are members of the Special Operations Division Patrol Bike Unit. As such, they perform most of their duties on specially equipped bikes, patrolling the city, often in places where regular squad cars are unable to go. In inclement weather or during special situations, the three also have regular police vehicles in which to perform their duties.

But the main focus of the Patrol Bike Unit is to meet with youngsters for bicycle safety

courses. Recently such an event was held at Page School in Sanford.

"When we meet with these youngsters, we stress many points," Morales said. "Based on uniform laws of the State of Florida, which are designed to help bicyclists as well as motorists near bicyclists, we focus on understanding the rules to promote better safety, which in turn, saves lives."

"We emphasize wearing of helmets, which are required by all bicycle riders under the age of 16," he continued. "And the fact that on streets, bikes are to be ridden on the right side, in line with the traffic, which has been determined to be much

safer than the old rule of facing traffic."

Wixson continued that there are other requirements for riders, including how many may be on a bike. "Bikes are designed to carry one person, so that's all there can be. The only exception is for adults on a bike who have child carriers or back-packs," he said.

"There are also restrictions on wearing head sets while riding a bike," Wixson said. "If you

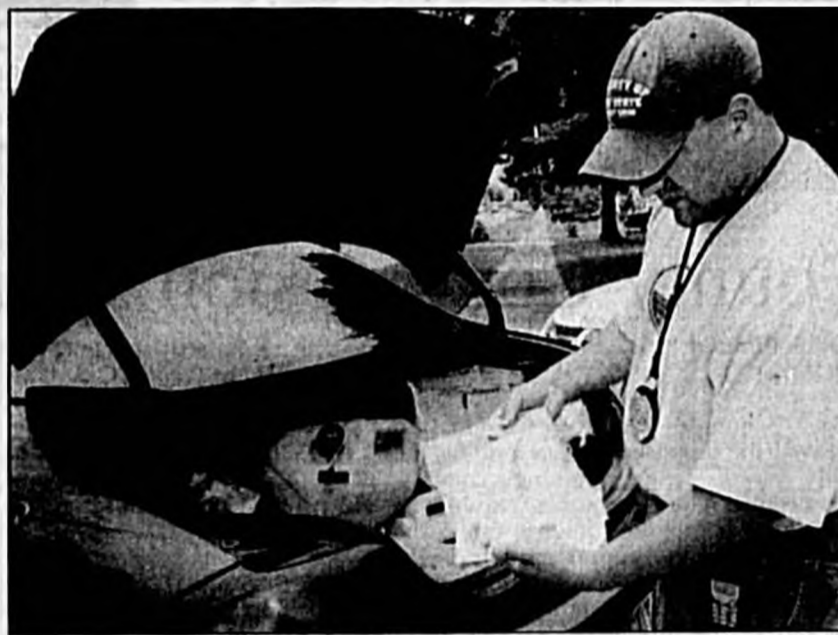
Drug raid

Our View

A new exit: Learn to live with it

If you are motoring eastbound on Interstate-4 from the Orlando, Longwood or Lake Mary area, and plan to go to the Seminole Towne Center mall, don't wait to exit the interstate until you actually see the mall on your right. The exit ramp is officially closed, and will not be reopened.

People coming from the south, heading for the mall, will be required to exit at 101-BC. (Exit 101-A is for SR-46A west 25th Street).

For awhile, this is going to be confusing to regular users of the interstate, especially those coming home from work and using that exit on a daily basis.

Eventually, getting off at 101-BC will lead one to two collector roads - one going to the Greenway, and the other, which is now open, leading to SR-46. (The Greenway collector road is expected to open in September).

With the extremely heavy home-bound traffic during rush hour, in the past, the exit ramp at SR-46 has often produced a line up of cars a mile or two long on I-4 in the right lane. This has caused numerous accidents, and many hot tempers to flair.

Now, closing the exit ramp directly onto SR-46, no doubt is going to cause more anger. Until motorists get used to it, many are going to miss the 101-BC exit, and end up having to pass the mall area and get off at the 17-92 exit, then circle around and head back north to SR-46.

Some of us may not like this new concept, but the Highway Department says it's for our own good - to help avoid lengthy traffic jams waiting to exit, as has been the case in the past. The collector roads are designed to move traffic more smoothly.

But just like any other change in traffic we may encounter, we're going to have to live with it - and get used to it. Getting angry because they moved your favorite exit ramp won't help anyone - you, or nearby vehicles which you may encounter.

Exercise common road savvy and drive safely. If you miss the exit - consider it a minor goof, and try to remember what exit you are to use next time.

And just to cheer you up - Department of Transportation Spokesman Steve Homan has assured us that this is the ONLY I-4 ramp change being made.

Remember our veterans

This weekend marks the beginning of one war and the end of another. One month after Archduke Ferdinand of Austria-Hungary and his wife were assassinated by a Serbian Nationalist, Hungary declared war on Serbia on July 28, 1914. It is considered the official beginning of World War I.

While Germany, Russia, France and Great Britain entered the war within a week, the United States didn't become involved until April 6, 1917. (We had 53,513 casualties in that war).

The war that ended was the Korean War, with the end observed on July 27, 1953. While the war lasted three years and 32 days, truce negotiations were underway for two years and 17 days.

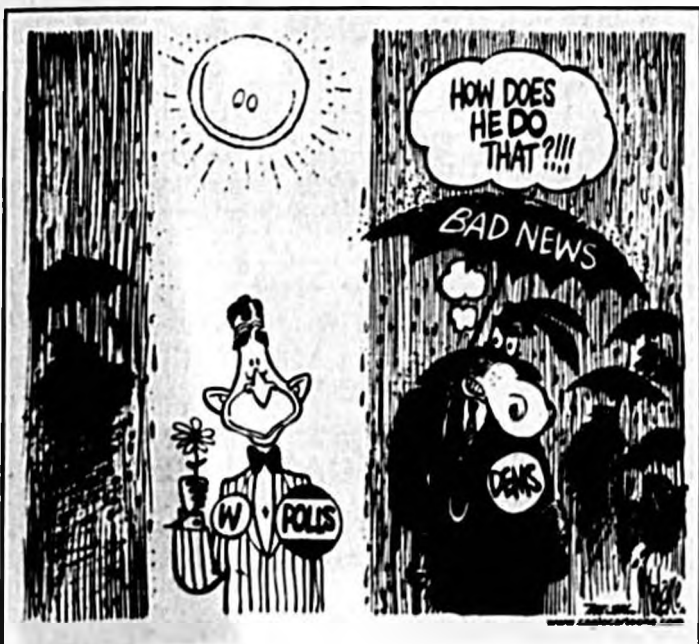
When the final agreements were reached by the U.S. and North Korea, both sides claimed victory. National Korean War Veterans Armistice Day is a holiday by Presidential Proclamation in the United States, but not observed with any fanfare. Vets of all wars are honored together in Veterans Day and Armed Forces Day.

Not actually winning the Korean War has left a bad taste in the hearts of many Korean War veterans. The U.S. simply doesn't lose wars, and while they didn't exactly lose this one, they didn't win either. Veterans who do choose to discuss it often say, "If we'd have only....", and say that the U.S. should have hit harder and with more heavy artillery and made more air attacks. Many believe we could have won the war.

Others recognized the futility of the war, and believe peace talks should have been finalized sooner, due to the heavy casualties reported, 33,687 combat deaths and 103,284 wounded out of the 5.7 million servicemen and women involved.

Veterans of World War I have mostly left us now. Veterans of the Korean War are mostly in their 70s. Nonetheless, we shouldn't forget them and the sacrifices they made for our freedom. The Korean (and Viet Nam) war survivors don't talk much about what it was like, but they were there, they saw the horrors of war, and rejoined society.

We all remember December 7th, we all remember September 11, and the end of the Civil War, but let's also remember these Korean and World War vets. They deserve a day of honor.



Here's some cool history

SAG HARBOR, N.Y. — In the year 1902, 100 years ago, a great many interesting things happened. The U.S. Congress appropriated \$40 million for President Theodore Roosevelt to begin buying up land in Panama for a canal that would reach from the Atlantic to the Pacific oceans. An American named King Gillette patented a design for a razor that looked more like a hoe than a knife. The Boer War ended in South Africa, and ex-slaves in the American South demanded pensions for their unpaid work.

Interesting. But none of those things compared with the world-changing work of an engineer for the Buffalo Forge Co. named Willis Carrier. In that year, Carrier designed and installed something called an "Apparatus for Treating Air" in a printing plant in Brooklyn. The Sackett-Wilhelms Lithographing and Publishing Co. had ordered a machine to stabilize lithographs, which changed size and image with fluctuations in heat and humidity in the summertime.

Air conditioning was invented. The world and its work changed forever. A city called Houston could be built in the unbreathable air of southern Texas. Computer chips could one day be made in India. The productivity of the world practically doubled as whole new areas of the globe became more comfortably inhabited.

The only place I saw this centennial mentioned was in Newsday, the newspaper that covers Long Island, which has been a pretty hot place these last few days. The paper noted that people of a certain age in New York City remembered sleeping through summer nights on the stoops of their houses or on the fire escapes. Central Park was

filled with New Yorkers sleeping on the grass, content with small breezes now and then. In 1917, in Chicago, a movie theater put in Carrier equipment and hung out a banner decorated with painted icicles, saying "Air Cooled." Folks there went to the theater all day and didn't much care that they saw the same film over and over again.

The first window units were put in homes in 1951. Fourteen years later, the ballpark in — where else? — Houston was covered by a dome and air-conditioned. As Newsday also noted, the New York Yankees would still have been the world champions of baseball last year if it were not for air conditioning, because there could not be a team called the Diamondbacks playing in the summer heat of Arizona.

It has always amazed me that more history is not written around advances in technology,

science and medicine rather than as the story of great politicians and generals. In fact, a quick check revealed that the first apparatus that might be called an air conditioner was actually a device that, in 1851, blew air over trays of ice in a malaria hospital in Apalachicola, Fla.

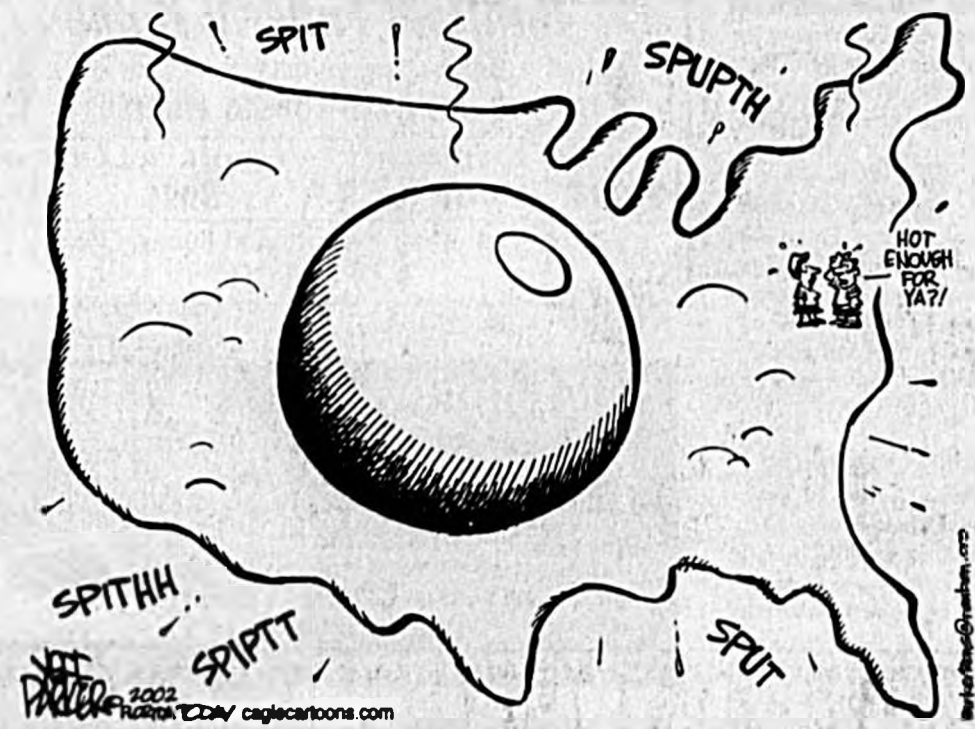
The history of the world, told as a chronicle of technological advance, is certainly more compelling than looking at statues of men on horses. Actually, the horses were no longer necessary after the invention of the automobile and the riders are mostly long forgotten. Electric lighting practically doubled the productivity of men and women and certainly changed the world more than World War I, which happened about the same time. My father-in-law, who grew up in Harlem when it was a Cefman neighborhood, told me that when the first buildings in the area were electrified — a single bulb was typically installed on the first floor — neighbors would gather after

sun-down, bring chairs and sit at the bottom of the stairs, just staring at the glowing bulb.

Actually, come to think of it, I remember doing the same thing when television reached stores and homes in the 1950s. We stood on the street and stared at the thing for hours, not just at the programming, but at the test patterns that filled the little back-and-white screens most of the day.

How important, then, was the invention of air conditioning? Richard Nathan, director of the Rockefeller Institute of Government at the State University of New York, was asked that question by Newsday. He answered: "Air conditioning had a fundamental demographic and economic impact on the country, contributing along with the civil rights movement. If I had to make an estimate, it's about 50-50 in terms of the importance of the two of them."

Yes, I am excited. It will be nice to have the kids back. I look forward to the new year with all the changes and new faces.

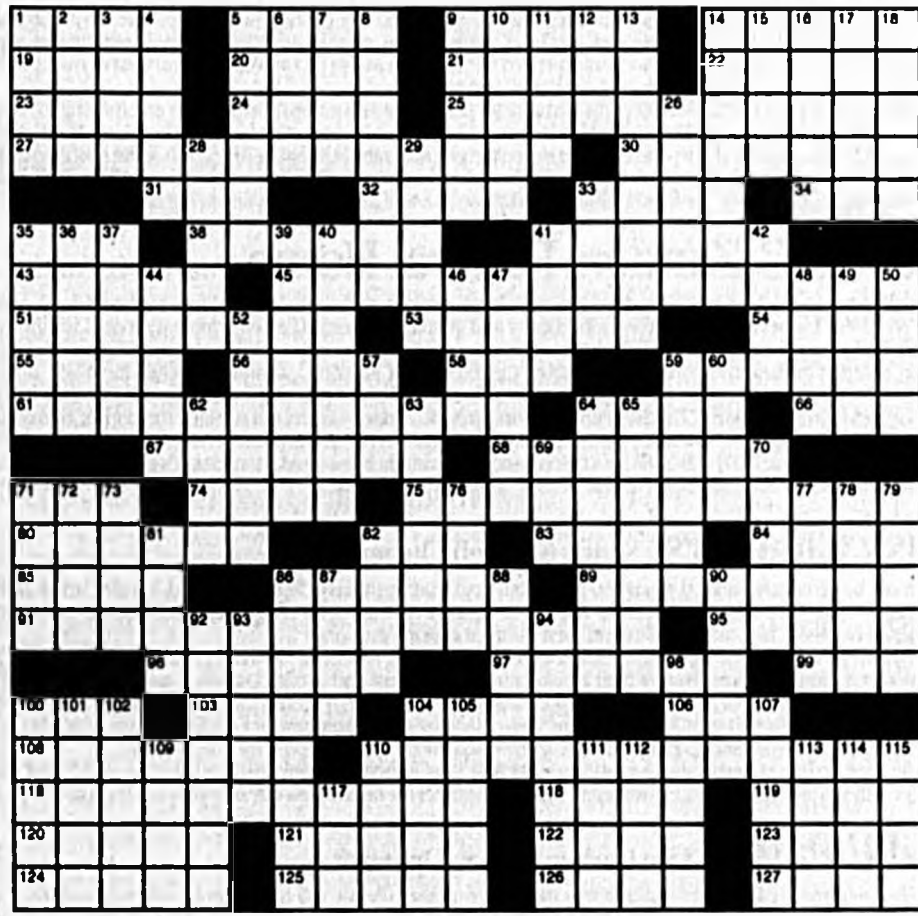

The Way We Were: Items of interest in the society's newsletter

The following two items were in the July-August issue of the Sanford Historical Society newsletter of which I am editor.

The first article refers to the Second Seminole War and was found by researcher Jim Cara. The second article on Sanford schools was contributed by Virgie Himan Cone of Greenville, S.C., age 93, who lived in Sanford 1913-22 while her father, Rev. George Hyman was pastor of First Baptist Church. It was during his pastorate that the brick sanctuary was built.

Forces Move South from Fort Mellon

The following is a direct quote from the December 29, 1837 edition of Niles' National Register which was published in Washington City every Saturday:

"FROM FLORIDA. We have more than once resolved not to publish any accounts from Florida unless of an official character - for in three cases out of four, statements which seem authentic are not to be relied on, and thus perplex both readers and editor.

"It now seems that there is no prospect of a speedy termination of the war, unless hostilities are actively prosecuted by the American commanding general, for Sam Jones, instead of being willing to surrender, is concentrating troops at his town. Gen.

Jesup is also making great preparations for the campaign, and was moving upon Sam Jones' town with a large and well appointed force.

"Major McLean, one of Gen. Jesup's staff, who has been reputed to procure steamboats of a very light draft, so as to establish depots on Indian River, which is expected to be the seat of war, arrived at Savannah, on the 22d inst. from Gary's Ferry, and has communicated the following to the editor of the 'Georgian.'

"The regular forces under Gen. Jesup composed of about 1,500 men, (all regulars) have moved from Fort Mellon under the immediate command of Gen. Eustis.

"The depot at Fort Mellon is secured inside of a large picket, garrisoned by 140 men under the command of Major Stanfonder.

"Gen. Hernandez, with the Tennessee volunteers, moved at the same time along the St. John, on the eastern side toward the south, while General Eustis marched on the western side.

"All of the Florida volunteers had been discharged, with the exception of one or two companies. Previous thereto they had scoured the whole country from St. Augustine to Mosquito, and thence down the St. Johns to opposite Fort Mellon on Lake Monroe.

"A depot is to be established under the command of Major Dearborn, in or above Lake Harney, which is about 30 or 35 miles southeast of Fort Mellon."

Further information on the War

After the above was published in the newsletter, I received a note from Michelle Mena with information on the

Second Seminole War during 1837 taken from "A History of the United States in Chronological Order - 432 AD - 1886". I then checked "The Encyclopedia of American Facts and Dates" and have used both sources for the following brief infiruation on this war.

The federal government was committed to a policy of removing all eastern Indians to reservations west of the Mississippi River and a treaty had been signed in 1832 with the Seminole Indians of Florida.

When the time came in 1835 to begin the move, many Seminoles refused to go; the resistance was led by Indian Chief Osceola. In November the Second Seminole War erupted. Federal troops were sent to Florida but had little success against the Indians whose raiding parties struck quickly then vanished.

In 1837, a number of chiefs called on General Jesup at Fort Dade (March 6) and signed a treaty which guaranteed a speedy peace and prompt transport of the Indians during the summer. However, Osceola reappeared and urged the violation of the treaty and renewed the war.

On Oct. 2, 1837, Osceola, with several chiefs and warriors, a gain appeared at Jesup's camp under a flag of truce. Exasperated by his former treachery, Jesup captured all the Indians and placed them in confinement. Osceola was sent to Fort Moultrie, S.C., where he died of a fever in 1838.

Nearly 9,000 troops remained in the state, engaging with the Indians until the end of the year. The American forces did not overcome the Seminoles

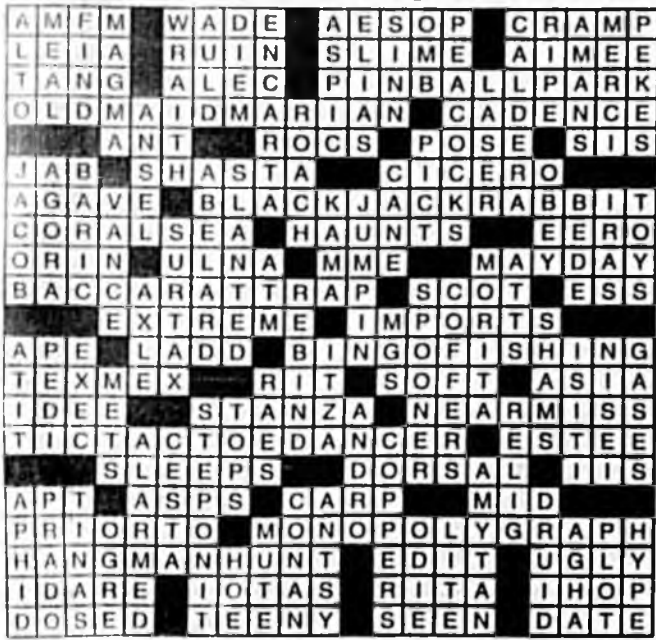

 The following two items were in the July-August issue of the Sanford Historical Society newsletter of which I am editor. The first article refers to the Second Seminole War and was found by researcher Jim Cara. The second article on Sanford schools was contributed by Virgie Himan Cone of Greenville, S.C., age 93, who lived in Sanford 1913-22 while her father, Rev. George Hyman was pastor of First Baptist Church. It was during his pastorate that the brick sanctuary was built.

Forces Move South from Fort Mellon

The following is a direct quote from the December 29, 1837 edition of Niles' National Register which was published

in Washington City every Saturday:
 "FROM FLORIDA. We have more than once resolved not to publish any accounts from Florida unless of an official character - for in three cases out of four, statements which seem authentic are not to be relied on, and thus perplex both readers and editor.
 "It now seems that there is no prospect of a speedy termination of the war, unless hostilities are actively prosecuted by the American commanding general, for Sam Jones, instead of being willing to surrender, is concentrating troops at his town. Gen. Jesup is also making great preparations for the campaign, and was moving upon Sam Jones' town with a large and well appointed force.
 "Major McLean, one of Gen. Jesup's staff, who has been

reputed to procure steamboats of a very light draft, so as to establish depots on Indian River, which is expected to be the seat of war, arrived at Savannah, on the 22d inst. from Gary's Ferry, and has communicated the following to the editor of the 'Georgian.'
 "The regular forces under Gen. Jesup composed of about 1,500 men, (all regulars) have moved from Fort Mellon under the immediate command of Gen. Eustis.
 "The depot at Fort Mellon is secured inside of a large picket, garrisoned by 140 men under the command of Major Stanfoner.
 "Gen. Hernandez, with the Tennessee volunteers, moved at the same time along the St. John, on the eastern side toward the south, while General Eustis marched on the western side.

"All of the Florida volunteers had been discharged, with the exception of one or two companies. Previous thereto they had scoured the whole country from St. Augustine to Mosquito, and thence down the St. Johns to opposite Fort Mellon on Lake Monroe.
 "A depot is to be established under the command of Major Dearborn, in or above Lake Harney, which is about 30 or 35 miles southeast of Fort Mellon."
 Further information on the War After the above was published in the newsletter, I received a note from Michelle Mena with information on the Second Seminole War during 1837 taken from "A History of the United States in Chronological Order - 432 AD - 1886". I then checked "The Encyclopedia of American Facts

too. These companies have to put confidence into the little man. He's the one getting screwed."

Paulucci, who labels himself a political independent, said his criticism is not partisan. His letter to Bush reminds the president that he has been "a friend of your mother and a hell of a dollar contributor to your Republican administration."

Paulucci said his motivation in writing the letter was to stand up for the for "the working man and woman — that's where home security lies for the investor and retiree with very little left of their savings."

"I will not take a dishonest dollar," Paulucci said. "It's not worth it. You will get it in the end. If you do right, you receive right. If you do wrong, you receive wrong."

Officials from the Securities Exchange Commission and congressional committees continue to investigate further corporate wrongdoing, but Paulucci is optimistic that the biggest offenders have been identified.

"I think we've seen the worst of it," Paulucci said. "I sure hope we have."

Paulucci's name is known to millions for his "Jeno's Pizza Rolls," but he began his business career modestly. His father was an iron miner and his mother ran a small grocery store in Aurora, Minn., during the Great Depression.

As a fruitstand barker in the 1940s, Paulucci borrowed \$2,500 to start a Chinese foods company in largely Scandinavian populated Minnesota. Taking advantage

are wearing a head set, you can't hear oncoming vehicles."

Both men stressed that bikes are covered by the same laws for motor vehicles. Stop lights, stop signs and yield signs must be obeyed. When turning, hand signals must be given. For bikes

at night, there must be lights on the front and a lit red tail light on the back. This is in addition to reflectors that should be on every bike.

"What it all amounts to," Morales said, "is that bicyclists should exercise common courtesy when riding."

If a biker is found to be in violation of one of the laws, "Generally we will give them a verbal warning," Wixon said. "But if we find they are continuing to violate the law, they will be given an official situation."

Through the cooperation of School Resource Officers, the

Patrol Bike Unit will be making visits to public and private schools and other organizations which have young bike riders. "We'll go anywhere upon a request," Morales said.

The Bike Unit has been in existence for just under two years. Normally it has been a

four officer unit but one left recently.

"Within the next two years," Wixon said, "we hope to have possibly a six to eight person unit."

#3 however, requires the terminals be moved to a location to the east north-east of where they are presently located.

We agree that we prefer Alternative #1," Dale told the commission.

Runways

In order to meet the demand of expected air carrier and domestic flight expansions, runway lengthening is proposed in the document.

Requirements include extending runway 9L-27L from 3,500 feet to 7,400 feet, and widening it from 75 to 150 feet. Extending runway 18-36 from 6,002 feet to 8,500 feet. Extending runway 9L-27R from 9,600 to 12,000 feet, and widening it from 150 to 200 feet. Extending runway 9C-27C from 3,575 feet to 5,000 feet and widening it from 75 to 100 feet.

Also included is the recommendation of constructing a 4,000 foot 4th east-west parallel runway.

Taxiways

In order to meet the increased

length of the runways, taxiways will also have to be lengthened. They include extending taxiway B, constructing a full length parallel taxiway A, north of runway 9L-27R,

extending the parallel taxiway to runway 27L, and constructing a new parallel north of runway 9R-27L.

Access Roadways

The plan stresses that improvements to the primary airport access and terminal roads will be necessary to ensure adequate capacity for vehicular traffic. Dale said the plans for improvements on the roadways leading to the airport from the south were moving ahead, and access will improve with each improvement. Commission Chairman Daryl McLain opined that the proposed four-laning of SR-46, east of Sanford, will help in handling traffic into and out of the airport.

Parking

Additional automobile parking capacity and facilities are required to meet forecast

demands for public, employee and rental car parking. For short term parking, the year 2000 saw 90 spaces. By 2020, 2,327 spaces are expected to be needed. For all four categories, long and short term parking, employee parking and rental cars, the number of spaces in 2000 were 1,598. By the year 2005, they expect a need for 5,166, and by 2020, 17,838 spaces will be needed.

Other

Additional matters taken under consideration in the Master Plan include constant consideration of airport noise, the need for expanded hangars and hangar stalls, general aviation aprons, fuel storage locations, areas of environmental impact.

Once the Master Plan is approved and returned to the airport with appropriate comments and possible suggestions, the airport has until October 15 to submit final documents and plans. Upon final submission, implementation of the 20 year plan will officially begin Oct. 16.

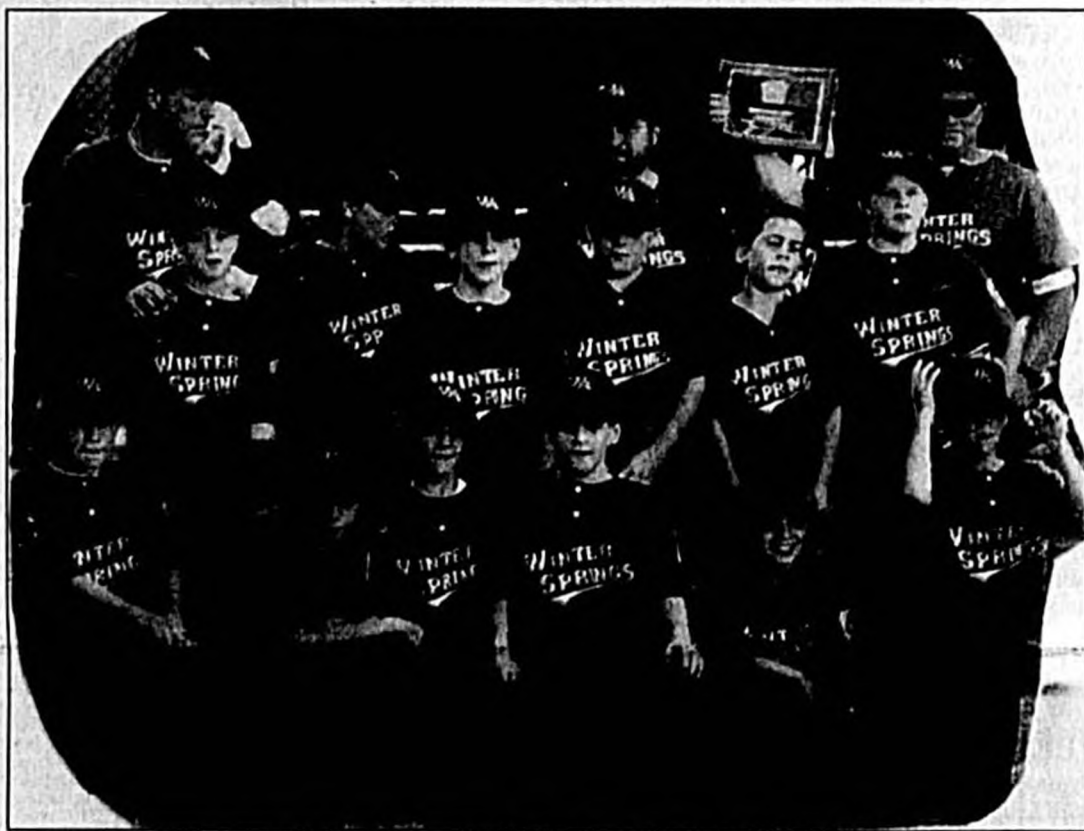
The Little League Baseball Minors State Tournament will be held today (Saturday) through July 31st in Haines City.

One last try for Church League

SANFORD — Deadlines are meant to be kept, but sometimes there is a little wiggle room.

The City of Sanford Recreation and Parks Department Spring Adult Slow Pitch Softball League was supposed to have come to a close last Monday, July 22nd, no matter what.

Heavy rains that night looked like the final games of the Church Softball League would not be played, not a situation that made League Director Jim Schaefer very happy.

"I want the championships to be decided on the field," said Schaefer.

"Unfortunately, without a place to play we will probably have to declare a champion."

The reason for the problem was that work was supposed to have begun on both Pinehurst Park and Zinn Beck Field this week turning over the playing surfaces and adding new clay, with

Pinehurst getting a crown to help with drainage. Work was also to have begun on installing scoreboards at both complexes.

After the work is completed the fields were to be closed for a month to let them rest and then opened in mid-August to give teams three weeks to practice before the beginning of the Fall season in early September.

But the scheduling of the work fell into place for Schaefer.

"We're just lucky, I guess," said Schaefer. "The groundscrew will not begin to tear up the fields until sometime next week and the electrician doing the scoreboards is supposed to be done on Friday (yesterday)."

The league did get in three games last Thursday at Pinehurst Park, and the two leaders are still within a game of each other.

This Monday, July 29th, at Pinehurst Park there will be a potential championship game between league-leading Sanford Central Baptist Church and the

second place Saints (Church of the Latter Day Saints) at 6:30 p.m.

Central Baptist won the first matchup between the two teams, way back in March, 10-6, and a Central Baptist victory would give the many-time champions yet another trophy for the mantelpiece.

But if the Saints win the game there would be a winner-take-all game at 8:30 p.m. following a game between defending Polar Bear Champion Team No. 2 from Seminole Community Church and the Knights of Columbus (All Souls Catholic Church) at 7:30 p.m. that will decide third place in the final standings.

The most recent standings released for the Church League were as follows: Central Baptist (8-0), the Saints (6-1), Seminole Community Church 2 (5-3), the Knights of Columbus (4-3), Seminole Community Church 3 (2-6) and Seminole Church of Christ (both 1-7).

Schaefer has also announced that the Organizational Meeting for the Adult Fall Slowpitch Softball League would be on Monday, August 19th at 6:30 p.m. at the See Softball, Page 2B

Culpepper tops list of UCF Hall hopefuls

ORLANDO — Daunte Culpepper headlines a list of 12 finalists being considered for inclusion in the University of Central Florida Athletics Hall of Fame. The 2002 class, which will come from that list, will be announced Aug. 1.

Culpepper, a Pro Bowl quarterback for the Minnesota Vikings, is one of six former All-Americans and one of five current professional athletes on the list. Other nominees include PGA Tour golfer Robert Damron, who won the 2001 Verizon Byron Nelson Classic, Shawn Jefferson, a veteran of two Super Bowls, and two-time WNBA All-Star Tari Phillips.

The 16 current members of the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame and the seven members of the selection committee will vote to determine this year's inductees. Each person will cast five votes based on a weighted scale. The selection committee will then review the votes and determine who will be included in the 2002 class, which will be comprised of a minimum of two and a maximum of five inductees.

2002 will mark the fifth class of inductees in the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1998.

2002 UCF Athletics Hall of Fame Finalists (in alphabetical order):

* Kristy Burns - Played basketball from 1984-86.

Even though she played only two years after transferring from South Florida, she is fifth in career scoring (1,154), despite having played before the three-point line was introduced.

She holds the school record for points in a season (691), field goals in a season (293), and career scoring average See UCF, Page 2B

Continued from page 1B (20.2). She is also the school's all-time leader in field goal percentage (.524), and is third in career free throw percentage (.801).

She is one of only seven players to score more than 1,000 points in a career and is the only one to do so in only two years. She was second on the team in scoring and helped the team to a 20-10 record in its first season at the Division I level in 1984-85. She led the team in scoring and earned first-team All New South Women's Athletic Conference honors in 1986.

Daunte Culpepper - Played football from 1995-98.

Set more than 30 school records during his career as well as three NCAA records. One of only three players in NCAA history to rush for more than 1,000 yards and pass for more than 10,000 yards during his career.

He earned All-America honors as a senior by several publications. He won the Sammy Baugh Trophy as the passer of the year in college football. He was chosen national Co-Player of the Year by the Sports Network along with Ricky Williams from Texas. He finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting.

He was drafted by the Minnesota Vikings in the first round in 1999 and was the starting quarterback in the Pro Bowl in only his second year in the NFL.

Robert Damron - Played golf from 1991-94 before leaving to play professionally.

He was a three-time honorable mention All-American. He is tied for the most wins in school history with five. He won the Sun Belt Conference Tournament as a freshman. He won the prestigious invitation-only John Hancock All-American Tournament. He helped the team to two NCAA Regional berths and competed at the Regional as an individual the third year.

He holds the school 54-hole scoring record and is second to Andrew Rice in career scoring average. He is the first from UCF to make it to the PGA Tour and the first to win a tournament there. He won the 2001 Byron Nelson Classic.

Tim Foskett - Played baseball from 1980-83. He became UCF's first All-American in baseball, doing so at the Division II level in 1983.

He earned All-South honors in 1980 and also earned All Sunshine State Conference honors in 1983. He is the school's all-time hits leader (289), is second only to UCF Athletics Hall of Fame member Tim Barker in career stolen bases (92), is second in career sacrifices (28), and is fifth in career batting average (.363).

Max "Rony" Francois - Played soccer from 1980-83.

He was a three-time All-South performer and earned All-America honors in 1982. He led the team to an NCAA Tournament appearance in 1982 and 1983. He is currently third in career scoring (101), fourth in career goals (39), and fifth in career assists (23). He was named Sunshine State Conference Offensive MVP in 1980 and '81.

Former UCF Soccer Coach and current UCF Athletics Hall of Fame nominee Jim Rudy said of Rony, "He is/was Bigtime!!! I recommend him highly."

He is currently a doctor in Tampa.

Shawn Jefferson - Played football from 1988-90.

He caught seven touchdown passes helped UCF reach the semifinals of the Division I-AA playoffs in 1990. He was drafted by the Houston Oilers in the 9th round in 1991. Has played in two Super Bowls. Currently plays for the Atlanta Falcons. Has played in the NFL longer than any former UCF player. His UCF statistics are not that impressive since he played only three seasons.

Amy Jones - Played soccer from 1993-96.

She was an All-American in 1995 and All-Southeast Region in 1995 and 1996. A three-time all-conference honoree, she was the 1995 TAAC Player-of-the-Year, UCF's only TAAC Player-of-the-Year for women's soccer. She holds the single-season record for goals with 20 and total points with 46 in 1995. She is fourth in career goals (38) and assists (28), third in total points (104) and tied for fifth in game-winning goals.

She recorded two hat-tricks during her career and holds the record for consecutive games scoring with nine and consecutive starts with 76. She helped the Golden Knights win four consecutive TAAC Titles during her career.

Ken Leeks - Played basketball from 1988-92. Leeks led the team in scoring

and rebounding for four consecutive years and finished his career as the third-leading scorer (1,763) in school history and the school's all-time leading rebounder (942) as well as the leader in blocked shots (141).

He trails only UCF Athletics Hall of Fame member Bo Clark (2,886) and his brother Mike (2,085) on the school's all-time scoring list. He is one of only three players in school history to score more than 1,500 points and pull down more than 500 rebounds. He earned All-Conference honors in the American South Conference as a junior.

Renata Menchikova - Played volleyball for UCF from 1995-97. She was a talented offensive player who led UCF in kills and aces all three seasons along with leading the team in digs in 1996 and '97. She is the career leader in kills (2,151), kills per game (5.85), and digs per game (3.24). She also ranks among UCF's all-time leaders in aces (154, 3rd), and aces per game (.42, 2nd).

She is also the single-game record holder at UCF in kills (holds the top five kill totals) along with the top two records for single-season kills. She was a three-time first-team all-conference honoree and was named to the conference all-tournament team three times in addition to being named 1995 tournament MVP in 1995.

Sam Nattile - Played baseball from 1980-82.

He was recently named to the Sunshine State Conference Silver Anniversary Team. He was named to the All-South team in 1980. Nattile owns several records on the career leaders list at UCF including home runs (24, 7th), batting average (.352/8th), total bases (143, 7th), slugging percentage (.569, 5th) and total bases (333, 8th).

He is the first player from the school to be drafted. He was drafted in the sixth round by the Boston Red Sox.

Tari Phillips - Played basketball during the 1990-91 season.

She played 21 games after transferring from the University of Georgia. She owns the UCF record for best scoring average (25.3) and best rebound average (12.4) in a season. She also boasts UCF's top three single-game point performances as well as the top rebounding effort. She scored 45 points against Lamar and grabbed 23 rebounds vs. Texas Pan-American in February of 1991.

She started her post-UCF career in the American Basketball League, where she was named the Most Valuable Player of the All-Star Game. She was drafted by the Orlando Miracle in the first round (eighth overall) in the WNBA Draft. She was traded to New York Liberty in 2000, the same year she was named the

WNBA's Most Improved Player. She has twice been selected to play in the WNBA All-Star Game.

Scott Ryerson - Played football from 1980-83.

He earned All-America honors in 1981 after setting a school record with four field goals of 50 yards or longer that year. He holds the school record for field

goals in a game (4) and season (18), as well as 50-yard field goals in a game (2), season (4), and career (6). He is fourth on the list of career field goals (32). He holds the school record for points kicking in a game (17) and is fourth in career points kicking (149). He led the team in scoring in 1981 with 62 points and 1982 with 31 points.

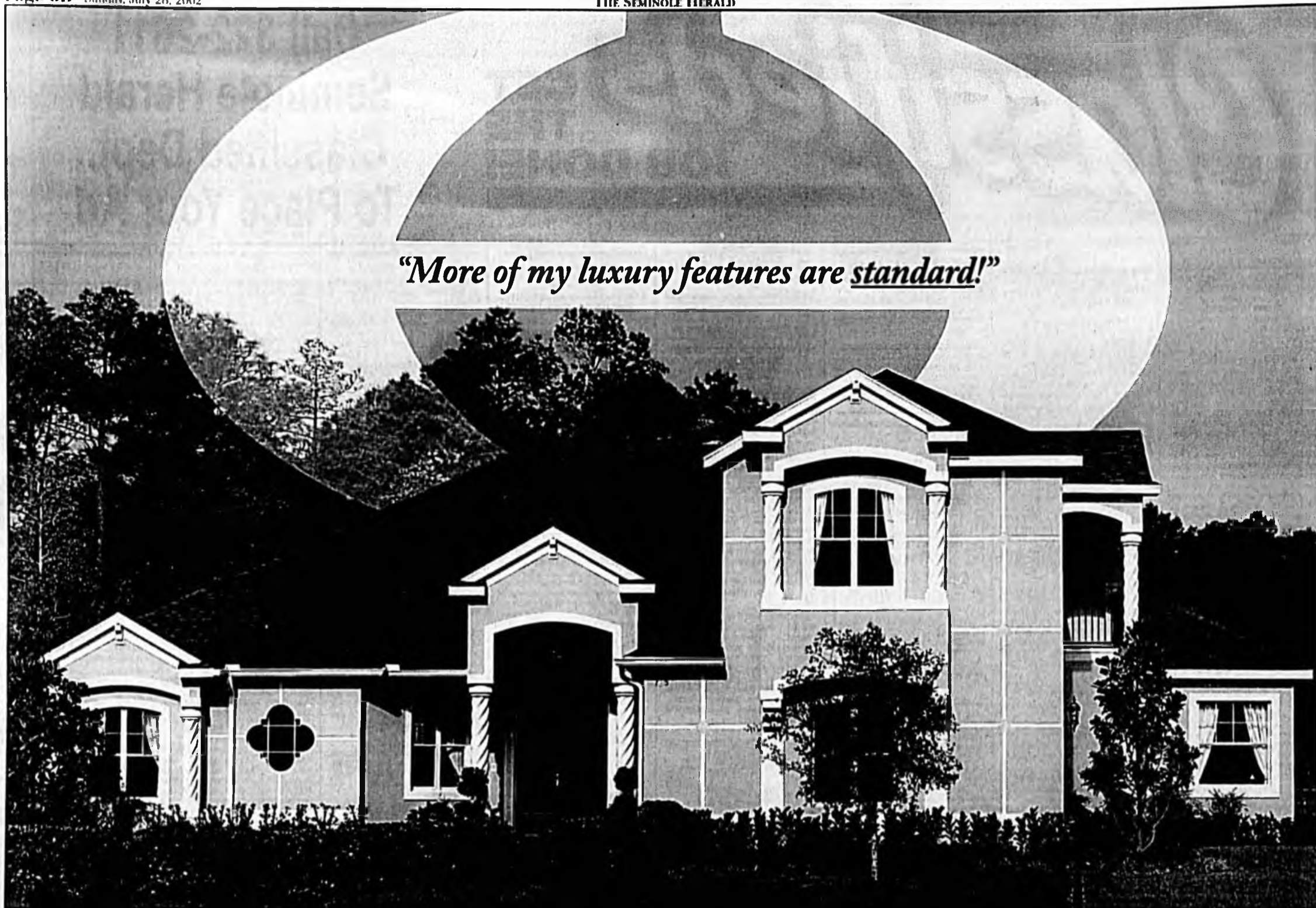

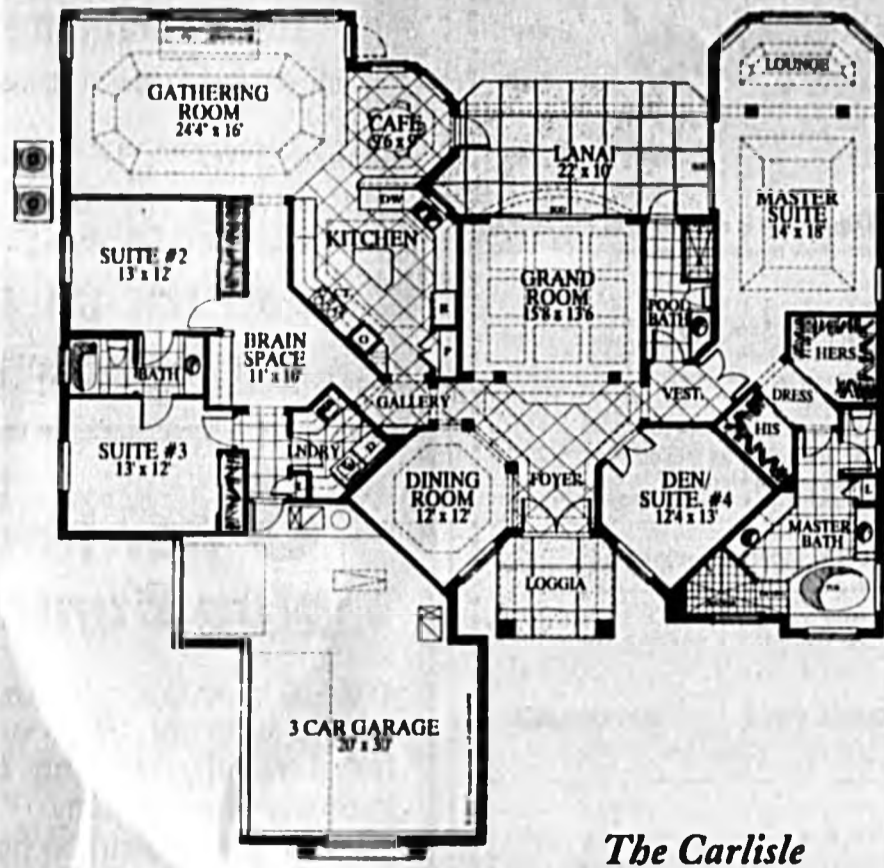

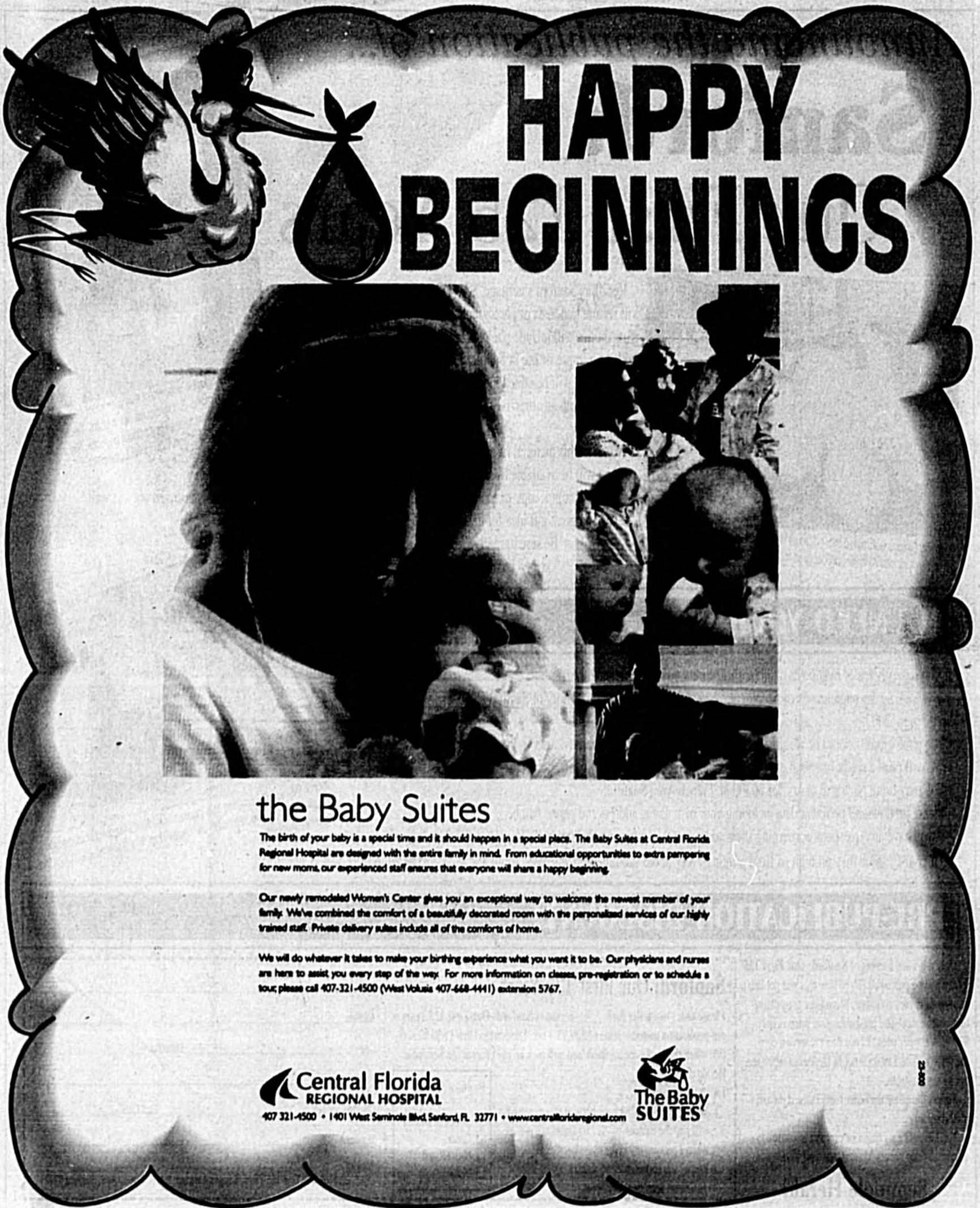

City tax rate lowest in Seminole

LAKE MARY — The proposed FY 2003 budget is complete, and Lake Mary residents will still pay the lowest tax levy in Seminole County.

City Manager John Litton presented Thursday his annual budget message to City Commission, which included a mill-

age rate of 3.7648, which has stayed the same for the past 10 years. It is also the 15th straight year the ad valorem tax rate in the city has not increased.

A mill is 1/1,000 of a dollar and is defined, as the millage needed to raise the same total dollars of ad valorem taxes as in FY 2002. As property values increase, a mill is worth more.

"I am very happy with the proposed

budget," Lake Mary Mayor Thom Greene said. "To keep the millage rate the same in this economy is a plus."

According to Litton, one of the biggest challenges facing the city is the future of the fire department. Although Lake Mary is part of the county's First Response Team, county officials have asked the city

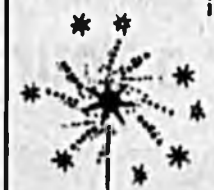

Lake Mary Historical Society hosts workshop

When you say Florida natives, most people think Seminoles. Sadly, most of the real Florida natives were dead before 1800. The Ais, the Timucuans, the Caloosa and all other Florida Native Americans were killed off or died from disease brought by the Spaniards and other Europeans. The Seminoles were not Florida natives. They were originally the Lower Creek from Alabama. Visitors to the July workshop hosted by the Lake Mary Historical Society learned about the original Floridians from speaker David White Wolfe. David talked to the audience about the original inhabitants of Florida. People have been living in Florida for 10,000 years.

Of course, 10,000 years ago, Florida was a little different.

It was a much larger state because more of the earth's water was in the ice caps. It was about twice the width it is now. The people living in Florida then didn't really use bow and arrows. The game they hunted was much larger than that hunted by later Indians. They hunted with the atalatal. The atalatal is a spear that is propelled with the assistance of a large stick.

As the large game in Florida became extinct, smaller game took its place. But the atalatal was not as efficient for hunting smaller game. That's when the bow and arrow came into being. Geologically, Florida is a very young state. Two major types of useful rock are found in Florida. Florida chert and Florida agatized coral. Both are found on the west coast.

East coast Indians used shell and bone to make their tools, although occasionally, they

would travel across the state to trade with the west coast Indians for the materials to make their arrowheads. (Very rarely, petrified palm would be found and used to make arrowheads.)

Making stone tools is called flint knapping. There are only about 200 people in the United States who flint knap. David is one of those. After his history lesson on Florida's first people, he asked the audience a few questions

about them. The people who could answer the questions correctly got an arrowhead David had made himself.

After his talk, the audience divided into groups. One group, mostly adults, watched as David demonstrated the ancient art of flint knapping. The three other stations were making dreamcatchers, making handkerchief dolls and making shell

to increase its level of participation.

"We are not providing equal resources to that program as we are receiving from both the county and other agencies," Litton said. "I know our stated focus is on building a new station on Rinehart Road, but that does nothing except provide a safer and more user-friendly structure for existing personnel and equipment."

The city has considered several options in response to the county's request, including the construction of a substation at City Hall or even possible department consolidation between the city and county.

Funds for construction of the proposed substation are included in the FY 2003 budget and will be drawn

from the city's reserves. However, the funds for additional personnel will not be needed until the following year. Depending if and what option Commission decides regarding the substation, an additional four to 13 personnel will be needed.

"Depending on which way the city decides to go, if the department adds personnel, the city will probably have to increase taxes," Litton said. "We will need additional revenue."

Commission currently is discussing the possible bond options for the new station on Rinehart Road, which will appear on the ballot for voter consideration in November. The estimated 17,000-square foot facility will cost about \$4 million, which includes demolition of the existing structure and temporary

quarters for both personnel and equipment during construction.

As for additional personnel in the FY 2003 budget, the city manager recommended five new positions, including a canine unit for the police department.

"Right now, the city has a need for a canine unit three or four times a week," Litton said. "We're just stepping up to the plate on this."

In the capital projects General Fund, the city anticipates \$461,740 in carry-forward dollars related to downtown land acquisition, beautification and fire station design. Total capital recommended for FY 2003 is \$979,300.

City commissioners will have their opportunity to address the proposed budget during a work session, 5 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 1, in City Hall's Commission Chambers. The first public hearing is scheduled for 7 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 5, in the same location.

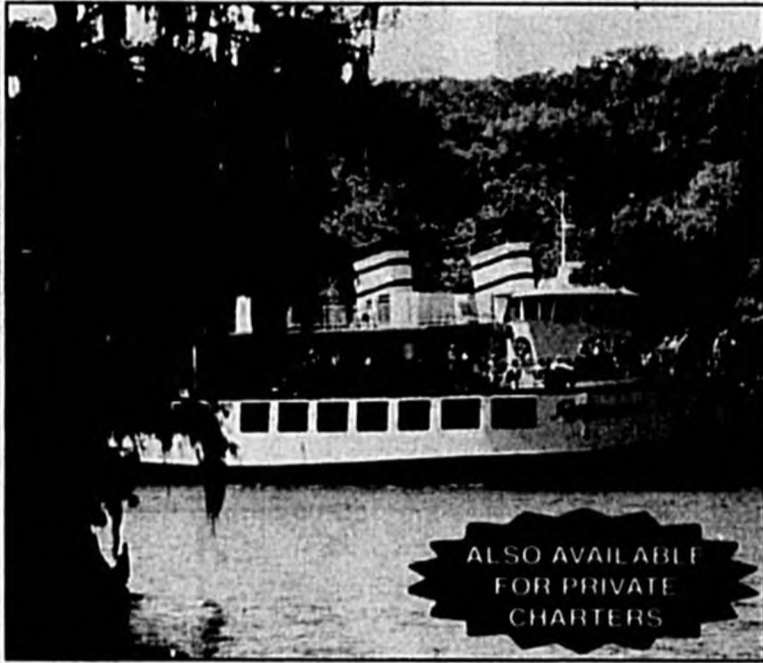

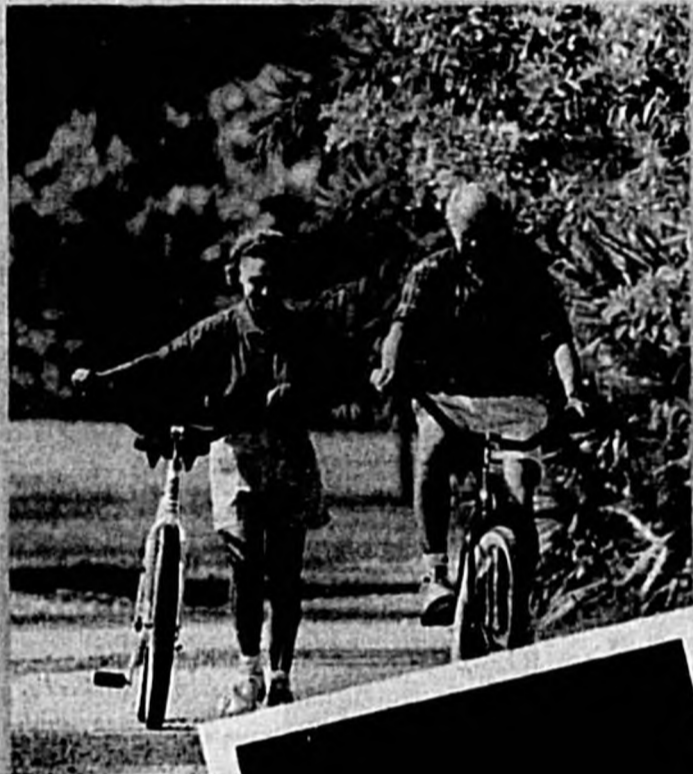

Continued from Page 6 and bead jewelry. Society President Peggy Wolfe taught visitors how to make dream-catchers.

Society Vice President Lois Jackson taught visitors how to make the shell and bead jewelry. (Coastal Native Americans have made jewelry out of shells for centuries, but they began adding beads to the mix when Europeans came into America.) Society member Paulee Stevens taught visitors how to make handkerchief dolls. Handkerchief dolls were born out of long sermons! In the 1800's, a Sunday service might last for 2 or more hours. There was no Sunday school for the children. To keep their children quiet, mothers would often take their handkerchiefs and make dolls out of them for the chil-

dren to play with. (The handkerchiefs the mothers took to church on Sundays were their prettiest!)

If you have any old handkerchiefs that you aren't using any more, in addition to being a member of the Lake Mary Historical Society, Paulee Stevens is Lake Mary's Senior Coordinator. The Seniors use donated handkerchiefs to make dolls to sell at their fundraisers. Donations can be dropped off at the Lake Mary Community Building on Country Club between 9AM and 5PM Monday through Friday.



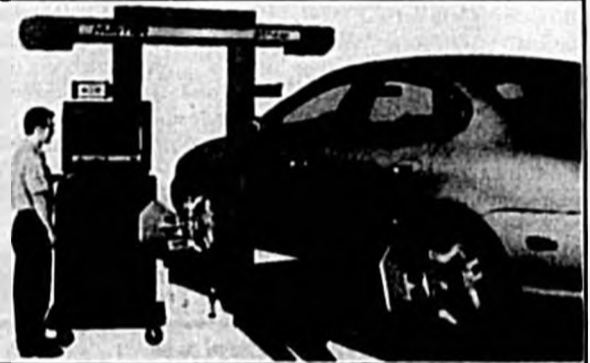

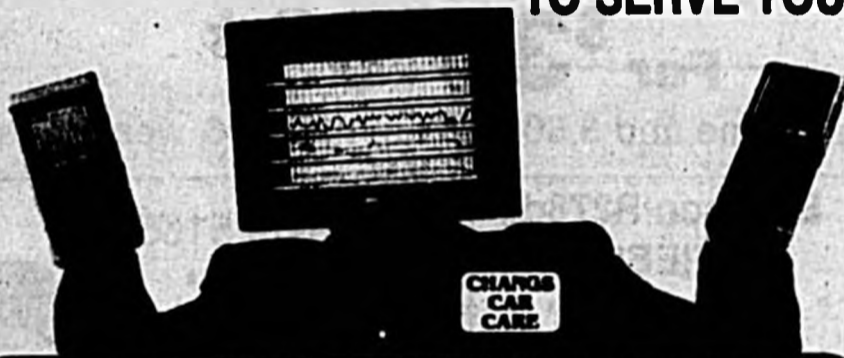

christen the new meeting space. The chamber's Developer's Luncheon was held June 20 at the Marriott. Future chamber events at the hotel also include the politically juiced Hob Nob in August. Traditionally, the event designed to allow local candidates to meet the business community in a formal setting was held outside of the county.

"It's got plenty of room and space," said Linda Reynolds of the chamber noting the hotel can accommodate up to 900 guests in the ballroom. "We're delighted to have them in the area. A lot of people call here wanting to know about hotels, it's good to be able to tell them about another good one."

Other features of the hotel include contemporary American dining at Bistro 1501, the dreamy atmosphere from

Cobalt's martini lounge, gift shop, swimming pool and fitness and business centers. A popular amenity for corporate travelers will be the concierge floor, said General Manager Bruce Skwarlo. The special floor offers free breakfast and an honor bar in the afternoon.

The Orlando Marriott - Lake Mary Hotel, however, will not dominate business on the corner of International Parkway and H. E Thomas for long. The hotel will be the key piece in a larger development called Park Place at Heathrow. Construction is in its beginning stages for an Applebee's restaurant due to open in August. Other restaurants slated to follow include former Miami Dolphins' quarterback Dan Marino's restaurant, Fish Bones and a Boston Market.

"It's all going to be in a park-like setting," Skwarlo said.

"Guest will have the opportunity to walk out (of the hotel) and have a range of dining choices."

Besides providing a spectrum of cuisine for guests, the Lake Mary hotel is also very much different from its competitors because of its "youthful design," Skwarlo said. The hotel's 304 rooms were designed with the technically advanced traveler in mind, as the full-service, up-scale development is expected to attract hordes of visitors from the quickly growing Interstate 4 high-tech corridor.

Guest rooms include either two double beds or a king size bed, ergonomic work stations, complimentary high-speed Internet access, a 25" color television offering popular over-the-air and cable channels, including HBO and in-room movies, and an in-room coffee brewer.

Calm before the Storm

Hurricane preparations should take place before the first storm pops up on the radar screen

The 2002 Hurricane Season started June 1. Since that time, many reports have been issued and meetings held regarding the need for hurricane preparedness. Many long-time Florida residents already knew these words of advice and while they didn't need to be warned, words of caution are always necessary.

The people who really need to absorb as much information regarding hurricane preparedness are the newcomers, those who have not been through a large-scale hurricane. You may have lived here for a few years, but have no idea of the destruction which is possible. We have all heard of folks who simply ignore warnings and believe they can outlast anything mother nature can throw at them. No doubt these

aren't Central Florida folks who went through Hurricane Donna and Dora years ago when Sanford was blasted with winds and rain. Most of the city was out of electricity for three days, and there was flooding all the way from Lake Monroe to First Street in the downtown area.

The Institute for Business and Home Safety has already stressed the need for hurricane-proofing a home being built or repaired. The time to act is before there is a threat.

The Institute has made suggestions of what to do when we have a threat - which could come at almost any day. Become familiar with the community's disaster preparedness plans and create your own family plan. Identify escape routes from your home and neighborhood and designate an emergency meeting place for your family to reunite if you become separated. Also establish a contact point to communicate with concerned relatives.

Put together an emergency kit that includes a three-day supply of drinking water and food which doesn't require refrigeration or heat to cook. Add first aid supplies, a portable NOAA weather radio, wrench and other basic tools, flashlight, work gloves, emergency cooking equipment and portable lanterns, fresh batteries for each piece of equipment, clothing, blankets, baby items, prescription medications, extra car and house keys, extra eyeglasses, credit cards and cash, important documents including insurance policies. If this sounds

Disaster Supply kits should include:

- * First aid kit and essential medications.
- * Canned food and manual can opener.
- * At least three gallons of water per person.
- * Protective clothing, rainwear, and bedding or sleeping bags.
- * Battery-powered radio, flashlight, and extra batteries.
- * Special items for infants, elderly, or disabled family members.
- * Written instructions on how to turn off electricity, gas and water if author-

Watch vs. Warning: What's the difference?

A "hurricane watch" means a hurricane could land in 24-36 hours. You should:

- * Check emergency supplies.
- * Fuel car.
- * Bring in outdoor objects such as lawn furniture, toys and garden tools; anchor objects that cannot be brought inside.
- * Secure buildings by closing and boarding up windows. Remove outside antennas.
- * Adjust refrigerator and freezer to coldest settings. Open only when absolutely necessary and close quickly.
- * Store drinking water in clean bathtubs, jugs, bottles and cooking utensils.
- * Review evacuation plan.
- * Moor boats securely or move to designated safe place. Use tie-downs to anchor trailers to the ground or house.

A "hurricane warning" means people in the area should expect a hurricane in 24 hours or less. You should:

- * Check tie-downs and evacuate immediately if in a mobile home.
- * Store valuables and personal papers in a waterproof container on the highest level of your home.
- * Avoid elevators.
- * Stay inside, away from windows, skylights and glass doors.
- * Keep a supply of flashlights and extra batteries handy. Avoid open flames, such as candles and kerosene lamps, as a source of light.

ities advise you to do so. (Remember, you'll need a professional to turn them back on.)

- * Install hurricane shutters or purchase pre-cut 1/2" outdoor plywood boards for each window of your home. Install anchors for the plywood and pre-drill holes in the plywood so that you can put it up quickly.
- * Make trees more wind resistant by removing diseased and damaged limbs, then strategically removing branches so that wind can blow through.

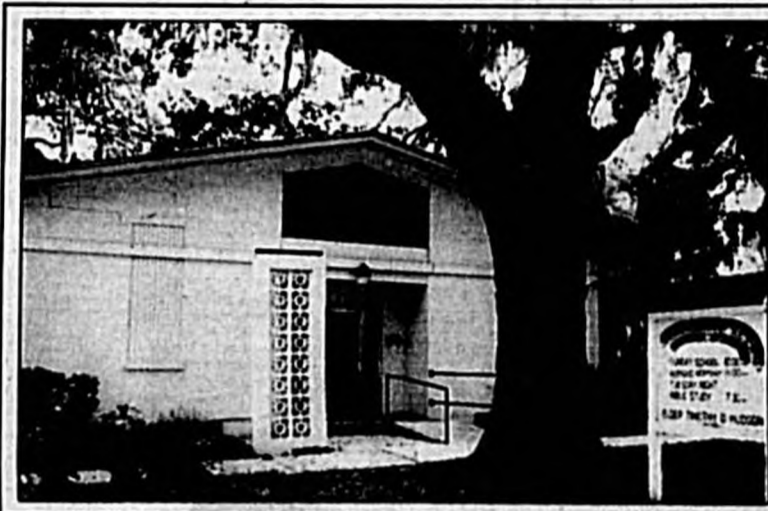

The Pink Hibiscus Mealybug: A new pest for Florida

The pink hibiscus mealybug, is a serious pest of many plants in tropical and subtropical regions, including Africa, southeast Asia, and northern Australia. It was found in the Caribbean in 1994 for the first time and recently reported in south Florida.

Hosts

This insect attacks many Florida crops including citrus, avocado, carambola, fig, guava, mango, soursop, and sugarcane; vegetable crops including asparagus, beans, beets, cabbage, peanuts, pigeon pea, cucumber, lettuce, pepper, pumpkin, and tomato; forest trees, and many species of ornamental plants including Allamanda, Angelica, Anthurium, Bougainvillea, Croton, ginger lily, Heliconia, Ixora, hibiscus, palm, and oleander.

The Insect

Adult mealybugs are small (about 3 mm long) and pink in body color but covered with a waxy secretion. The waxy filaments are short and females are usually obscured by this white mealy wax. When adults are crushed their body fluids are also pink. Adult males are smaller than females, reddish brown and have one pair of wings.

Males have two long waxy "tails." Females die shortly after depositing eggs. Freshly-laid eggs are orange, becoming pink before they hatch. Eggs are found in egg sacs. After hatching, pink hibiscus mealybug nymphs disperse by walking and by wind. Nymphs also can walk considerable distances to find suitable host plants.

The life cycle takes about 23 to 30 days. The pink hibiscus mealybug has a

high reproductive rate (females can deposit up to 600 eggs) and produces up to 15 generations per year, so pest populations can become very large. Pink hibiscus mealybug eggs overwinter in bark crevices, leaf scars, under bark, in the soil, tree boles, inside fruit clusters, and inside crumpled leaf clusters.

Damage

Pink hibiscus mealybug feeds on the soft tissues of many plant species and injects a toxic saliva that causes curling of leaves. The entire plant may be stunted and the shoot tips develop a bushy appearance. Buds may not flower and stems may twist.

Fruit may also be deformed. The mealybug excretes honeydew which encourages the development of black sooty mold. Very high mealybug populations can kill plants.

Control

There is no known chemical control for this pest, but there are well documented success stories of biological control. A ladybug known to feed on all stages of the mealybug and already established in Florida and also available commercially provides a good degree of control. Two parasitic insect species, both very small, wasp-like parasites of this pest insect are currently being reared in USDA laboratories in Puerto Rico and California. As shown in biocontrol programs in the Caribbean and in California during the 1990s, the pest problem should be noticeably reduced by about 60% within six months of a parasite release, and 95%-98% within one year.

Furthermore, if a biocontrol program is launched early enough during an infestation, which is thought to be the case in South Florida, most affected plants

are expected to recover fully. Homeowners and lawn/landscape maintenance companies operating in infested areas are asked to please NOT cut or remove suspect plants at this time. The pink hibiscus mealybug spreads most easily by the wind and the movement of infested plants. However, if plants have been or must be cut, please double bag all plant parts (leaves, branches, flowers, etc.) in plastic and put the bags out with regular household garbage, not with other yard trash.

Lawn/landscape companies are asked to bag or cover all cuttings while transporting, but to reduce the likely spread of this pest, it is best to not cut or move any suspect plant.

like a lot of work - wait until you need these items and see how thankful you are that you prepared in advance.

Move anything in the yard that could become flying debris inside the house or garage before a storm strikes.

When a hurricane threatens, follow weather and news reports so you know how much danger you are facing. Obey evacuation orders from local authorities.

One problem which has been generally occurring every time a hurricane strikes, is people throwing hurricane parties. Most often, the parties include alcoholic beverages, which they believe will help alleviate stress. To the contrary, the booze may result in poor decisions, or even illness. Emergency vehicles will have more to concern themselves with than rescuing someone who got drunk at a hurricane party.

The Institute for Business and Home Safety has also stressed the need to get sufficient home owners insurance to protect property in case of a hurricane.

The time to act however, is now. When someone takes out insurance of this type, there is generally a 30-day waiting period before the insurance takes effect.

Trying to buy hurricane insurance or additional coverage when a hurricane is bearing down on us won't do you any good.

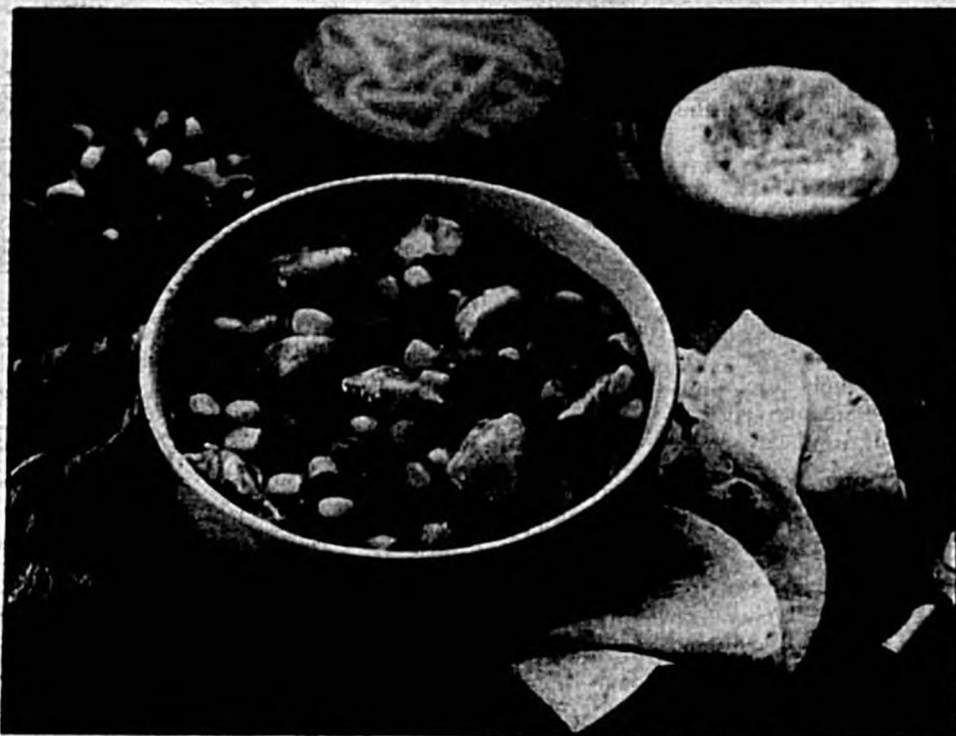

Roasted Garlic Herb Marinated Chicken

Recipe offers healthy option for summer

Eating is one of life's pleasures. But staying healthy requires a sensible eating plan that includes a varied diet low in saturated fat and cholesterol and moderate in total fat. Luckily, there is lots of room for choice and personal preference in a healthy eating plan.

Marinades make grilling fun and healthy

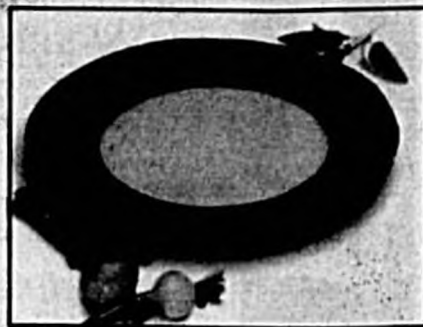

- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly grated allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 large sweet potatoes (about 11/3 pounds), peeled and finely grated, to make 4 cups
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

1. Preheat the oven to 350 F. Butter or oil a tin to hold twelve muffins.

2. In a small bowl, whisk together the brown sugar, oil, vanilla and eggs.

3. In a large bowl, mix together the flour, baking powder, spices, salt and grated sweet potatoes. Make a well in the center, and pour in the egg mixture. Stir in the egg mixture, gradually incorporating it with the flour mixture. Stir in the raisins and walnuts. Spoon the batter into the tins. Fill each tin to the rim to make a large cap. Bake the muffins for 25 to 30 minutes or until a knife inserted into a muffin comes out clean.

4. Take the muffin tin out of the oven. Run a paring knife carefully around each muffin, then invert the pan, and knock one edge against your work surface to release the muffins. Serve the muffins right away.
