Strangely, the United States is the only nation labeled such a degree of enemy by Abu Dhabi, Algeria, Bahrain, Dubai, Egypt, Kuwait, Iraq, Libya, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and Syria.

These high-minded bandits find it just dandy that the Soviet Union flew a massive airlift of

guns, tanks and planes to Arabs fighting the Israelis, but they label U.S. help for Israel as something awful and unforgivable.

So, they exercise their expertise in blackmail, in bombings and in other acts of violence and insolence—all manner of dire threats in the name of oil for the lamps of Boston and points beyond. An Arab diplomat at the United Nations

OCA is less than a year old and is struggling to broaden its membership along the some 500,000 people in the United States today who are of Chinese descent. Up to now this has been the "silent minority."

According to K. L. Wang, the energetic and talented founder of OCA, the group wants to stress citizenship, combat prejudice and ignorance, and improve opportunities for all Chinese-Americans.

"The obstacles have been many," said Wang, who is a Rockville, Md., business executive. "First there is the generation gap—old vs. young. There are the regional Chinese dialect differences—we've tried to overcome that by making English the official language of the group."

"Then there are the established family societies and groups that are built mainly along business contact lines. In recent years, business contacts have meant Taiwan."

Wang said this is where the problem comes in. When OCA tries to recruit members in Chinese-American population centers like San Francisco and New York, the first question asked is usually, "Is OCA pro-Peking or pro-Taiwan?"

"Restaurant diplomacy" even enters the picture in this

group, acting upon the policy directives of President Nixon, set these goals: (1) to prevent the Middle East war from disrupting the Soviet-American detente; and (2) to seize upon the war as an opportunity to achieve a permanent Middle East settlement.

The President wasted no time communicating his objectives to Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev. This was followed by detailed, almost daily discussions between Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin. Out of these exchanges, a loose understanding was reached.

Both superpowers agreed to avoid a confrontation in the Middle East. But they also acknowledged that Russia had the right to help the Arabs regain their lost lands and that the U.S. had the right to help Israel repel an armed attack.

This permits the U. S. and Russia to ship arms to their Middle East clients without damaging their own relationship. The understanding could break down, of course, if either the Arabs or the Israelis should seek the military destruction of the other.

The President, therefore, is trying secretly to dissuade Israel from driving too deeply into Syria or Egypt. He has sent word to the Israelis that, while the war is hot, they should seize the opportunity to arrange an immediate, permanent settlement while they still hold the military advantage. He has counseled them, in effect, to settle while they're ahead and not wait until the Arabs tilt the balance of power against Israel. In the future, he has warned, the Arabs' strugglehold on oil will increase their leverage.

Although it may be a long shot, the President hopes to work a diplomatic miracle and turn the war into a permanent peace.

New Army Nerve Gas

WASHINGTON—The Army is considering open-air tests of a deadly new nerve gas, presumably at Utah's Dugway Proving Ground where 6,400 sheep were killed five years ago in similar field tests.

The Army is trying to develop a nerve gas that would be safe to handle. The gas is produced by mixing two chemicals, which can be stored separately with complete safety. They are loaded into a shell, which is exploded over the target. This creates a chemical reaction that causes the deadly gas.

This binary system, as it is called, requires research to simulated tests. But an Army report states that, if permission can be arranged, "a limited number of open-air tests will be performed."

Alarmed over the possibility that these tests may be conducted on the Utah range, Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, has fired off a private letter to Army Secretary Howard Callaway.

"How soon is open-air testing binaries to begin?" demands Owens. "When will Congressional and EPA approval be sought?"

The Army Secretary hasn't replied to Owens, but a Pentagon spokesman told us: "No decision has been made as to whether it will be necessary to do open-air testing. If the decision were made, we would request permission."

The experts agree, however, that final development of the binary system nerve gas would be difficult without open-air tests.

Footnote: President Nixon has outlawed the production of biological but not chemical weapons. Critics of the binary system fear that the terrible nerve formula would be easy for small nations to produce. The two elements in the gas are fairly simple to make.

'Viet' Chemicals Smother St. Johns

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Approximately 70 tons of a controversial chemical banned for use in Vietnam have been dumped in the St. Johns River to eradicate water hyacinths in apparent violation of federal guidelines, officials say.

"We have no qualms about using it," said James McGehee, assistant chief of the Corps aquatic weed control program. "Not to use 2-4-D would have an even more drastic effect on the environment."

The U.S. Corps of Engineers has used the chemical 2-4-D in a major operation to get rid of the weeds in the St. Johns but the Environmental Protection Agency has not approved 2-4-D for use in moving waters.

The agency okayed 2-4-D for use in lakes, ponds and reservoirs, but held off approval in moving waters because of officials' fear they did not know the effects of the chemical if transported downstream.

But Corps officials said they decided to go ahead with the use of 2-4-D in the river because of the effects of the chemical if transported downstream.

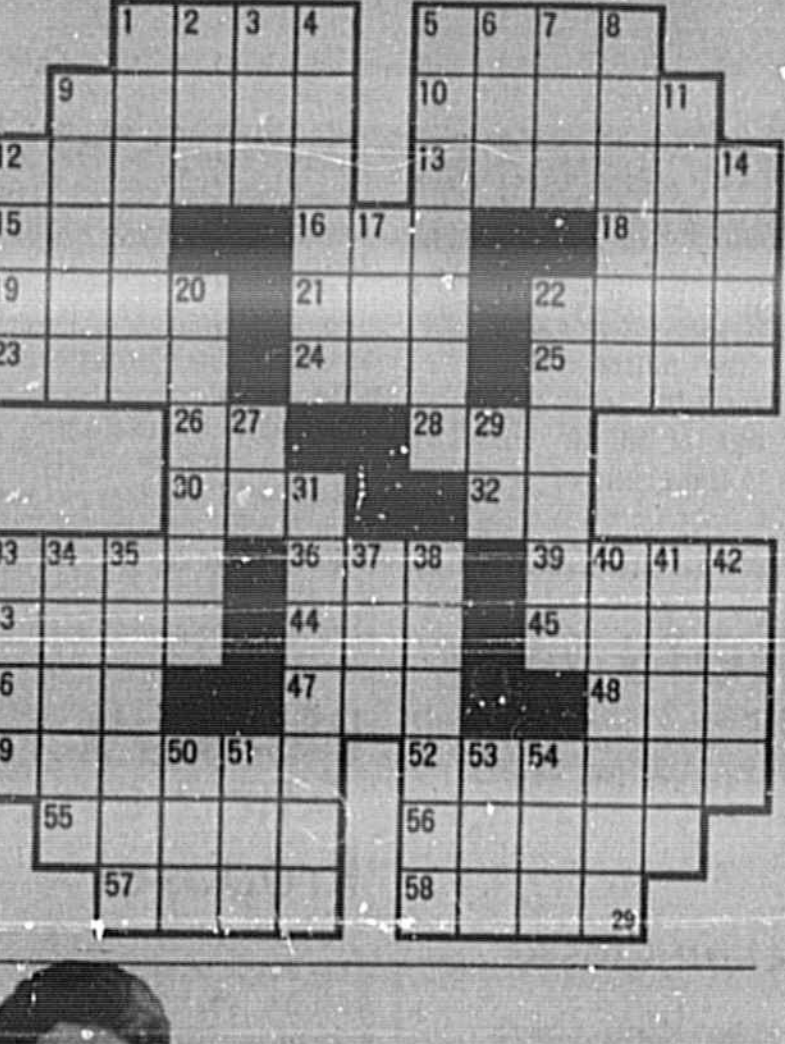

Wipe over awnings with a sponge, wait a few minutes and then hose them off. Living in Florida we have problems with mildew and bleach takes care of this. It is an economical remedy and I use what remains in my washing machine. — CARRIE

DEAR GIRLS — I was advised that the bleach should be diluted or else one runs the chance of "chalking" the paint on such awnings. A mild soap or detergent or even a solution with an electric dishwasher detergent was recommended. — POLLY

DEAR POLLY — Grace wanted to know how to clean her painted aluminum awnings. I had this trouble until I tried to remove some paint that had splattered on them. I applied kerosene with a small brush. It loosened it up, and then I washed them with a solution of a well-known liquid household cleaner and water to which I added a little liquid detergent. 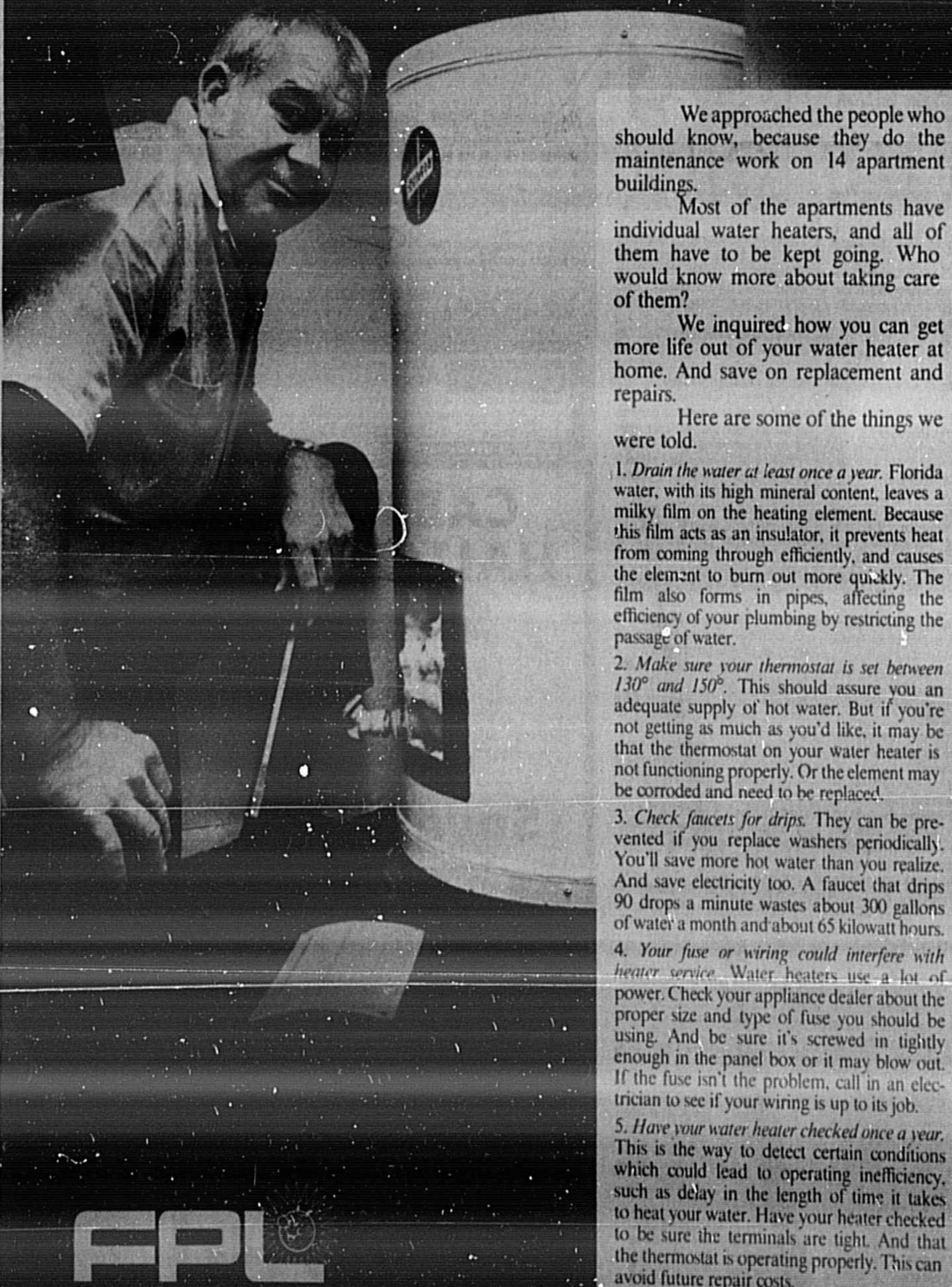

1. Drain the water at least once a year. Florida water, with its high mineral content, leaves a milky film on the heating element. 2. Make sure your thermostat is set between 130° and 150°. This should assure you an adequate supply of hot water. But if you're not getting as much as you'd like, it may be that the thermostat on your water heater is not functioning properly. Or the element may be corroded and need to be replaced.
3. Check faucets for drips. They can be prevented if you replace washers periodically. You'll save more hot water than you realize. And save electricity too. A faucet that drips 90 drops a minute wastes about 300 gallons of water a month and about 65 kilowatt hours.
4. Your fuse or wiring could interfere with heater service. Water heaters use a lot of power. Check your appliance dealer about the proper size and type of fuse you should be using. And be sure it's screwed in tightly enough in the panel box or it may blow out. If the fuse isn't the problem, call in an electrician to see if your wiring is up to its job.
5. Have your water heater checked once a year. This is the way to detect certain conditions which could lead to operating inefficiency, such as delay in the length of time it takes to heat your water. Have your heater checked to be sure the terminals are tight. And that the thermostat is operating properly. This can avoid future repair costs.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A trade surplus of as much as \$2 billion appears possible this year in American deals with Communist nations. Officials say the surplus is built mainly on agricultural items, particularly the massive wheat deal with the Soviet Union. According to some government spokesmen the dollar is getting a boost from the trade surplus, making it stronger than it might otherwise be.

In the poll, 50 per cent of the 1,576 adults questioned Oct. 6-8 picked Kennedy. Reagan was named by 43 per cent. Five per cent were undecided, and two per cent said they would choose neither candidate.

Israel Reports 3 Migs Downed

Israel reported that its air and ground forces shot down three Egyptian helicopters over the southwest coast of the Sinai peninsula early today.

Israel said the air battle did not interrupt the delivery of emergency supplies of food, water and medicine to Egyptian troops stranded on the Sinai side of the Suez Canal.

Egyptian trucks with U.N. drivers were delivering supplies for the Egyptian 3rd Army, an Israeli spokesman said, and they were being loaded on Egyptian barges and boats that were carrying them to the troops trapped on the east bank.

The spokesman said the supplies were being ferried from a part of the town of Suez, at the southern end of the canal, that is still controlled by the Egyptians.

"It is going slowly because they do not have enough boats, we believe," the spokesman said.

The International Red Cross Committee in Geneva and a Swedish U.N. trustee observer told Associated Press correspondent Edith M. Lederer that the Israeli command said the attack was repulsed, but it added that the sporadic fighting threatened to disrupt the supply convoys to the encircled Egyptians. This was taken in Tel Aviv as a threat to block future convoys if there were more Egyptian attacks.

"Every night there is firing — small arms firing — but it's not serious," a Swedish U.N. trustee observer told Associated Press correspondent Edith M. Lederer.

The Israelis had hinted earlier that Egyptian violations of the cease-fire could endanger U.N. supply convoys which began moving Sunday to Egyptian troops and civilians trapped behind the Israeli lines.

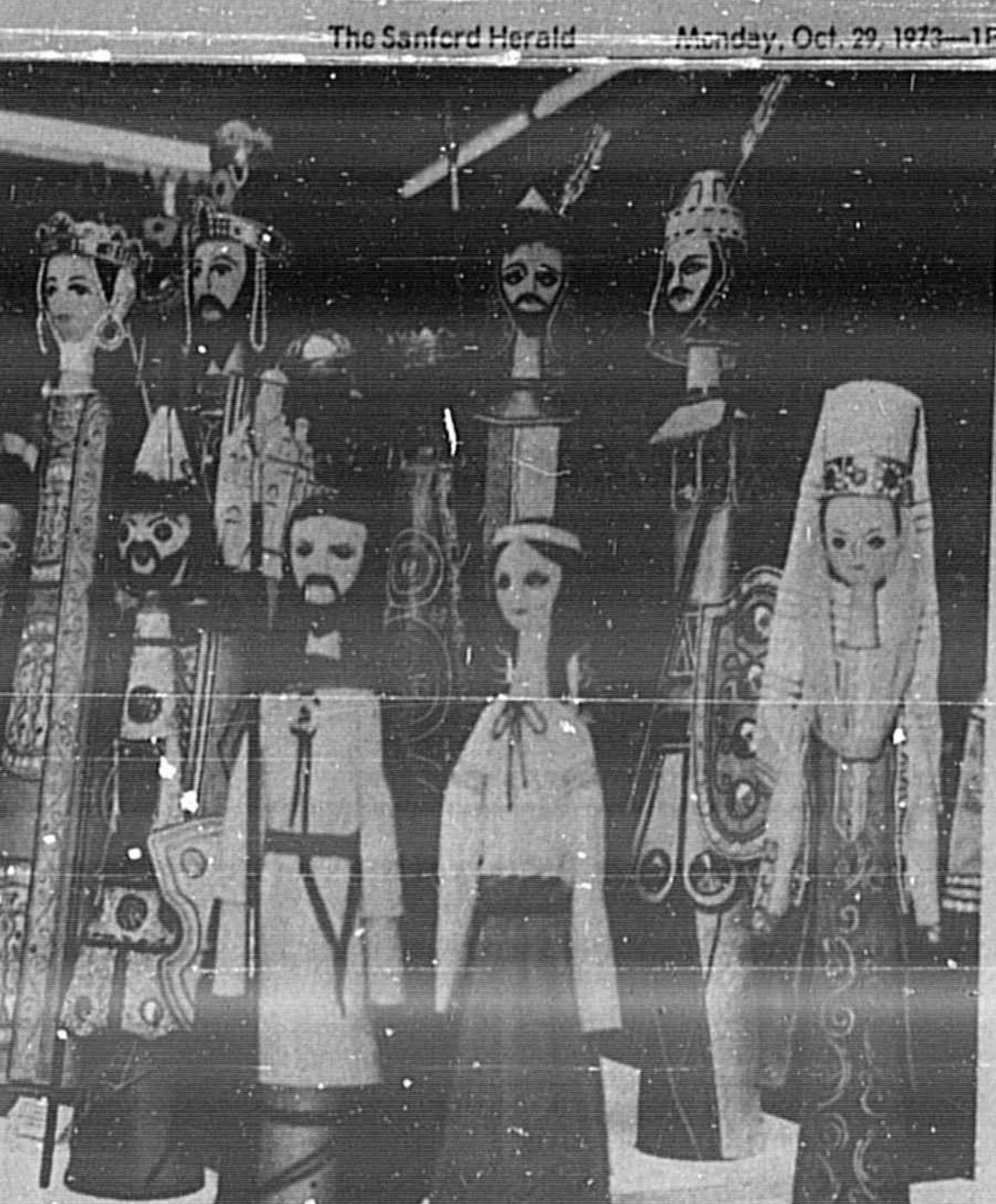

They became the 33rd and 34th men to climb the 29,248-foot peak, but never before has the mountain been conquered this time of year, when treacherous, icy winds sweep across the Himalayas.

More Adventures Of Charley Finley Fined \$7,000 For Series Conduct

NEW YORK (AP) — Charles O. Finley, controversial owner of the world champion Oakland Athletics, has been fined \$7,000 for his conduct during the World Series. Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn confirmed Monday what had become general knowledge the day before through leaks and verification by Finley himself. Kuhn formally announced the fines in a one-sentence statement which failed to cite the particular offenses or specify the exact penalty for each.

However, Finley, reached at his LaPorte, Ind., home by The Associated Press, said he was fined \$5,000 for the incident involving infielder Mike Andrews and \$1,000 each for

two other so-called infractions. One dealt with a public announcement made in Oakland after an Oakland request to add a 25th player had been refused. The other stemmed from turning on the lights at Oakland's Coliseum during the series—a prerogative of the umpires. Finley called the fines "unfair" and said he would appeal the Andrews and the public announcement fines, but that he would not contest the one concerning the lights.

The Andrews case created the greatest furor. If you recall the last episode, Finley forced Andrews to go on the disabled list following two costly errors in the A's loss

to the New York Mets in the second game of the Series. For that action, Finley was fined \$5,000, he said. Along with the Andrews case, which took some of the play away from baseball's fall spectacle, Finley also pulled Kuhn the wrong way in other instances. The controversial owner made a public address announcement to Oakland fans that the A's were playing with only 24 men instead of the legal 25. A front-office misunderstanding had cost the A's a player for the World Series. For that announcement, against Kuhn's wishes, Finley was fined \$1,000 more.

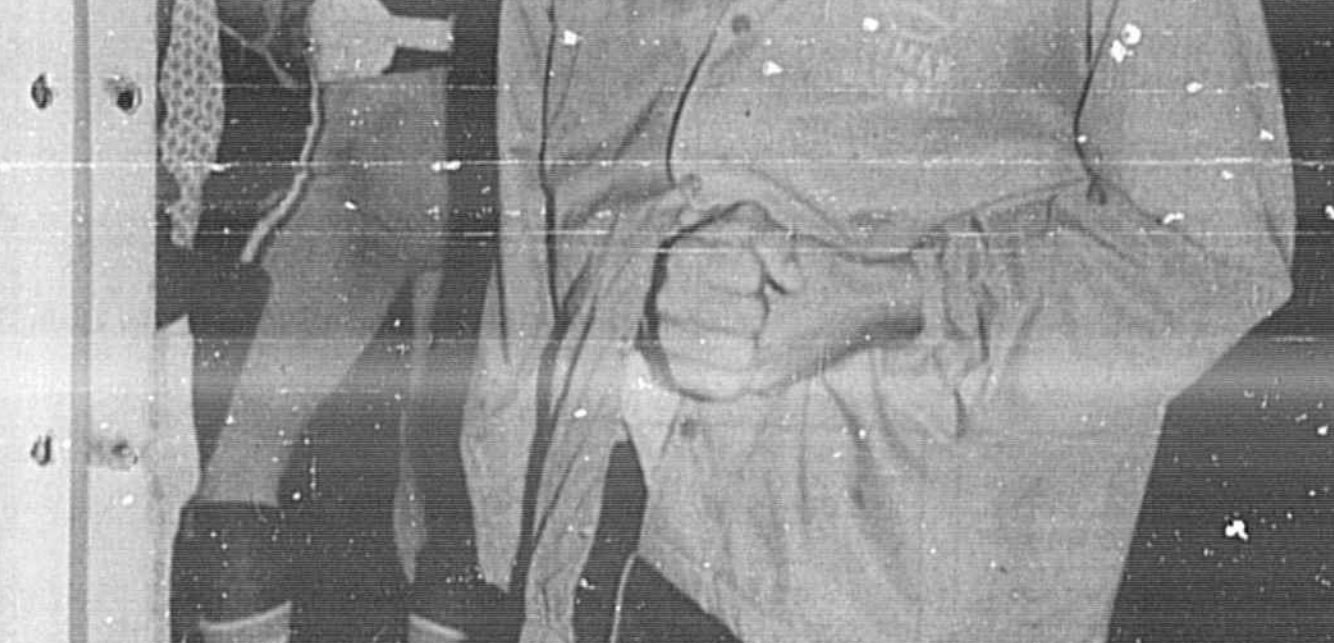
Lake Brantley Gals End Powder Puff Clash In Tie Again

Robbers Hit County

In separate incidents two out-of-county men were jumped by robbers who gun-whipped one man and left the other shy \$75, police said today.

Russell James, 28, Titusville, told police he was heading East on SR-46 when a man jumped from behind a car that was pulled off the road in front of the Mills bridge.

"The man flagged me down, indicating he had car trouble, but when I stopped another man stuck a .12-gauge shotgun against my head and told me to get out of the car," James said.

"All I have is some change," he replied. "They started beating me and I was trying to stay on my feet so they wouldn't stop me. They hit me in the head with the barrel of the shotgun and I was bruised. James told sheriff's investigators today.

The ousted special Watergate prosecutor said that if he indirectly had been the source of a story about the anti-trust case in today's New York Times, he was sorry and said it was an "error of carelessness."

Cox May Have Been ITT Appeal Source

WASHINGTON (AP) - Archibald Cox testified today he told the committee that each of these four had assured him that they had not given the information to the Times. He added he hoped the committee members would be "charitable enough" to believe that he had not intended that the information would be leaked to the press.

"This information comes from a highly confidential conversation between Archibald Cox and former Atty. Gen. Kleinfelder from documents furnished voluntarily and also furnished in absolute confidence by the White House to Mr. Cox," the White House said.

"The information furnished by the White House and Mr. Kleinfelder put the matter into fair and accurate perspective."

"The Times quoted sources close to the case as saying that after Kleinfelder's conversation with Ehrlichman, Nixon called Kleinfelder and, after calling him a "vulgar name," said, "Don't you understand the English language?" and ordered the appeal stopped.
