Tension In Auto Strike Eases As Conference Nears

210,000 Workers Now Idle; 17 General Motors Plants Unable To Operate

Guardsmen Will Remain On Duty

Factions To Begin Settlement Negotiations Monday

A more conciliatory attitude on the part of both management and workers eased the tension today in the nation's major strikes although the number of persons, made idle by reason of labor disputes, stood at upwards of 210,000.

Officials of General Motors Corporation with 17 plants strike-bound and 115,000 persons jobless as a result, faced leaders of the United Automobile Workers of America across a Detroit conference table to work out rules for negotiations beginning Monday.

Unionists began evacuation of factories which they had closed by means of sit-down strikes. An representatives of General Motors and the auto workers agreed on a procedure to follow in negotiations for permanent peace.

Spanish Government Aviators Attempt To Bomb Headquarters Of de Llano

BAYONNE, France, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Thousands of demonstrators were reported parading the streets in the Spanish City of Pamplona today, threatening to storm the City's prisons and exact "eye for eye" vengeance on more than 2,000 Socialist prisoners.

Spanish Government aviators attempted to bomb today the headquarters of General Gonzalo Quiroga de Llano, commander of the insurgent southern offensive. The damage, however, was believed to have been slight.

Chief Williams Says Department Will Collect License

The power of the City Commission to adjust taxes delinquent for 1937 and prior will expire on Jan. 27, City Clerk Frank Lamson announced this morning.

He advised prompt action on the part of property owners in Sanford who wished to settle their back taxes, as provided by the State statute, and return their holdings to the current tax books.

Mr. Lamson pointed out that an act of the 1935 Legislature granted authority to City commissioners throughout the State to use their own discretion for a period of one year in settling delinquent taxes of 1933 or previous.

Continuing, he said that the Sanford Commission passed a resolution to assume that power on Jan. 21, 1937, emphasizing that this authority will be vested with the current governing body for eight more business days only.

Nazi Foreign Office Willing To Take Steps To Ban Volunteers In Spain

Trip Of Goering Takes New Light

25,000 Hitlerites Admittedly Participating In War

BERLIN, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The German Foreign Office indicated plainly today that the Nazi Reich was ready to join Great Britain's newest effort to keep foreign funds out of Spain—if also could be assured the neutrality agreement could not be subverted.

Simultaneously, military and financial experts, stressing the high cost of keeping German "volunteers" with insurgent armies in Spain, said the outside limit of German aid to Spanish Fascists was 25,000 men.

Auto Tags

Fred Cone, Florida's new Governor, granted an extension on Thursday to automobile owners who otherwise would be delinquent if they have not yet purchased their 1937 auto license tags.

The extra time granted for the purchase of tags this year was a considerable move on the part of the Governor. Most of those who could afford to do so have already bought their license tags.

The first of the year is a mighty bad time to have to buy license tags anyway. There are always the extra expenses of the Christmas shopping which have just taken the last spare you around the house.

However, auto owners should not put off buying their tags this year any longer than necessary. It is doubtful if any further extension will be granted by Gov. Cone, and after the first of February every car must have a new tag or its owner will be subject to arrest.

Second And Third Marriages

"In selecting a second mate the average widowed or divorced man has a stronger tendency to marry a spinster than the widowed or divorced woman has to marry a bachelor," say the statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

An analysis of the marital data of New York State, excluding New York City, for the three years, 1932-1934, revealed these facts, according to the insurance company's statisticians who called attention to the fact that the conditions influencing a second or later marriage are different from those governing individuals embarking on their enterprise for the first time.

Some of the percentages compiled by the statisticians are: 45.5 percent of the widowers who remarried took spinsters for wives, while only 39.8 percent of the remarried widows took bachelors for their grooms.

The much-married tend to mate with the much-married. "Among the widowed who had been married twice or more, 14.0 percent of the grooms and 13.2 percent of the brides took as consorts persons who also had been widowed twice or more."

It is further shown that when a divorced man remarries he is more likely to choose a divorced woman than a widow for his second partner but that the reverse is the case when a divorced woman remarries.

The husband had countercharged that the wife had always been a radical herself; that he had until now sympathized with her political views, but that he was now nearly objecting just because he knew "which side his bread was buttered."

Evidence having been brought of the wife's active sympathies with communism, the court granted the husband a decree on the ground that "it was desirable to dissolve a marriage when an anti-social wife ruined her husband's career; even though he had been a radical before Hitler took power."

The Vienna, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Austria is suffering from a bicycle epidemic which is causing the government to issue a law to restrict the use of bicycles in the city.

Another by-product is thievery, which has grown so rapidly that the Vienna police department has established a special department to look after bike stealers. Insurance against theft has become expensive—30 per cent of the bicycle's worth.

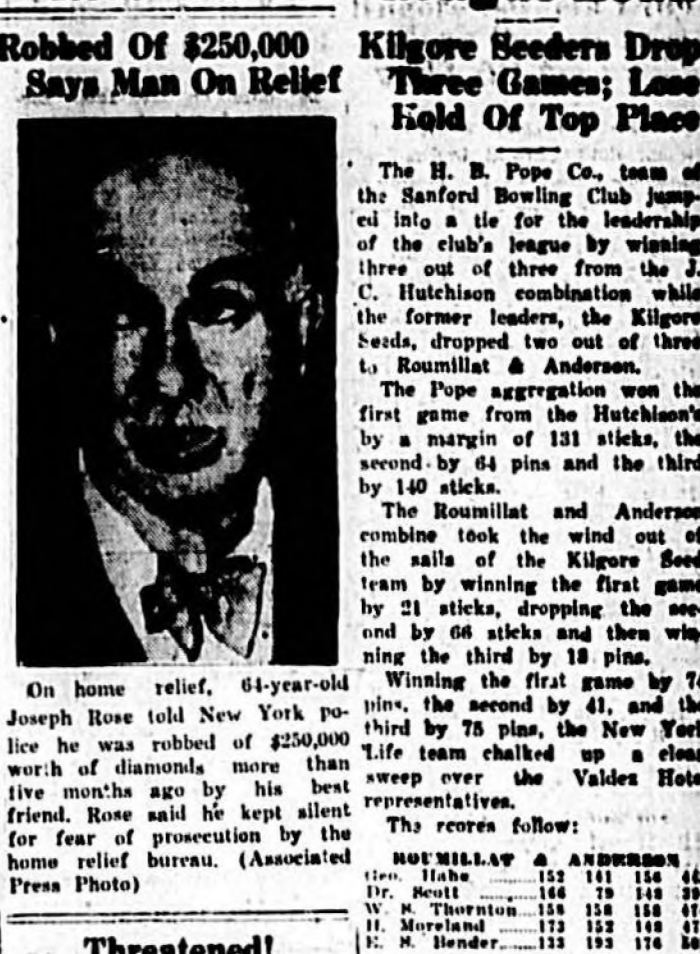

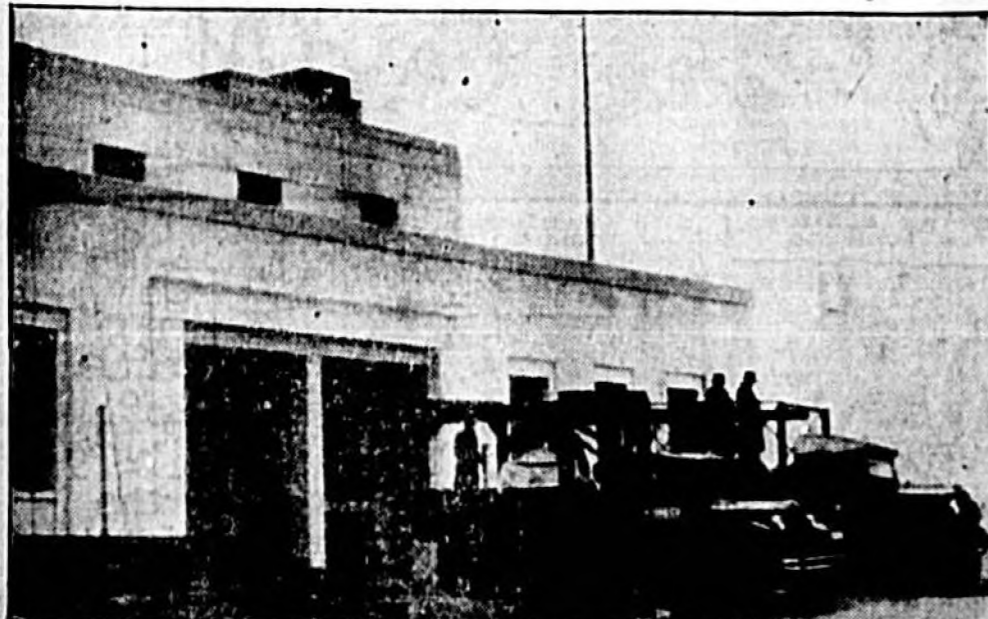

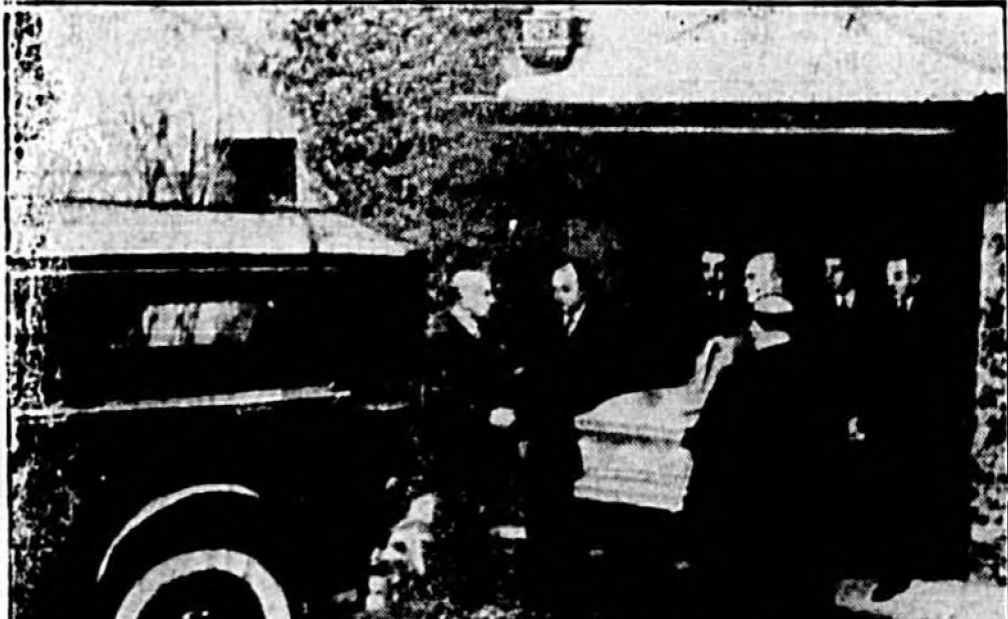
