

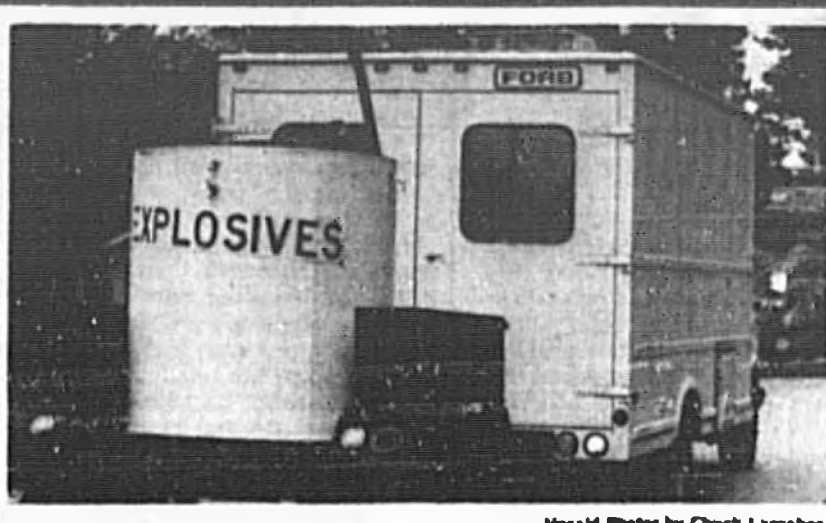
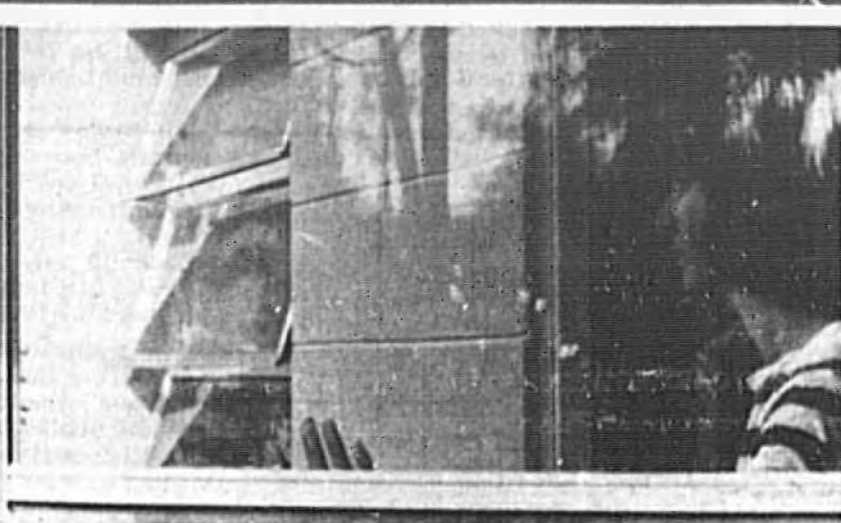

Detective Improves Following Surgery

A Casselberry detective was in serious condition in an intensive care unit today following surgery to remove a bullet lodged near his spine. Meanwhile, at the Seminole County Courthouse a burglary-grand theft trial was postponed Wednesday because the wounded detective was the investigating officer.

The case must be tried by Oct. 16 or the charges could be dropped because Florida law mandates that such a case go to trial within 175 days after a person is arrested and charged. It cannot proceed without the detective's testimony, prosecutor Bill Cato said.

However, he said if Cambre is not well enough to testify by mid-September he will ask for an allowed waiver of the speedy trial rule because of "exceptional circumstances."

Stafford Lynn Cambre, 37, was listed in serious but stable condition today at Orlando Regional Medical Center, according to hospital spokesman Joe Brown. Three neurosurgeons removed the bullet during a three-hour surgery that began at 7 p.m. Wednesday. Brown said Cambre is alert, talking and shows no signs of paralysis. Cambre's right lung, damaged when the .25-caliber bullet ripped through his chest, was repaired when he arrived at the hospital Tuesday. Brown said.

Cambre was shot as he confronted an armed robbery suspect during a manhunt minutes after a one-man heist at Service Merchandise, formerly O.G. Wilson's in Seminole Plaza, Casselberry. Cambre, a plainclothes detective, was not wearing a bullet-proof vest though he did so as a uniformed officer, according to Sharon Cambre, the officer's wife. Brown said. She said because the incident occurred so near the police department that her husband did not think of the vest as he responded to the scene.

The suspect, booked under the name of Dennis Michael King, 28, reportedly of Dallas, was being held without bond in the

Neighborhood Evacuated After Chemicals Found

Officials were awaiting word today on what to do with a collection of hazardous chemicals found Wednesday in the garage of a Forest City home, a discovery which forced the evacuation of about 40 homes in the Lynnwood subdivision.

The chemicals, which "had the

potential for destroying a lot of that neighborhood," have been moved to a "secure remote location" and are under guard, according to Seminole County sheriff's bomb expert Lt. Marty LaBrusciano.

The evacuation began about 4:30 p.m. and lasted for about two hours. Gary Brown, of the Seminole County Department of Public Safety, said most

of the families took the opportunity to go out to dinner and seven families were temporarily housed at Bear Lake Elementary School.

The evacuation was ordered after fire department workers and LaBrusciano evaluated the chemicals and deemed them to be a "very serious hazard," LaBrusciano said.

The investigation was sparked by a

Wednesday morning telephone call to Fire Rescue Division workers from Jeanette Clark of 1229 Lynnwood Ave., Brown said.

Mrs. Clark told fire department personnel she had been cleaning her garage and found a cache of chemicals which had belonged to her late

No More Time For Hattaway

School Board Holds Him To Original Closing Date For Lot Sale

Seminole County School Board members denied 3-1 Wednesday Altamonte Springs developer Bob Hattaway's request to extend the closing date on his contract to buy an 11-acre lot across from Sanford Middle School where he wants to build a shopping center and homes.

But Hattaway left the board members with the impression he still intends to purchase the land by the Aug. 21 closing date the contract specifies.

Board members Pat Telson, Bill Kroll and Jean Bryant voted to deny the extension; Chairman Nancy Warren voted for it. Board member Joe Williams was absent.

Hattaway told the board his attorney would "be in touch with" the board's legal counsel, Ned Julian, Jr., about the closing date.

Hattaway was forced to request the extension when the Sanford City Commission refused to grant the property commercial zoning status and instead sent the matter back to the city's Planning and Zoning board. Kroll told Hattaway before the vote he could buy the land by the date specified in the contract or the board may again accept bids on the land.

Mrs. Warren said she agreed with Superintendent of Schools Robert Hughes that the board should grant Hattaway the extension.

Hattaway had put \$20,000 in down payment on the property and in a letter to the board had offered to put an additional \$10,000 down payment in an escrow account plus 12 percent of \$600,000, the total appraised value of the land and the purchase price, to accrue from the original closing date of Aug. 21 until the actual closing date to make up for interest the board would lose by not selling the land sooner.

"I have met every term and condition of the city of Sanford timely," said Hattaway in defending his request. "I'm asking for your continuing cooperation."

Margaret Warden, an attorney and representative for Stanley

Sandefur of Sandefur Properties, Inc., Sanford, asked the board to deny Hattaway's request on the grounds that Hattaway was not offering to work with the area residents to develop commercial property that the residents feel is compatible with the area. Sandefur, whose attempt to up his offer on the property to \$610,000 was not considered at an earlier meeting, said he would build a bank and professional offices on the property, according to Warden.

Sylvia Smith, owner of a West 18th St. home near the lot, said she had "a petition of 700 signatures" against the proposed shopping center.

"We have pledges to raise money to buy the property," she

said. "I've talked to Mr. Sandefur about working together to develop the property."

If Hattaway does not purchase the property by Aug. 21 and the school board still wishes to sell it, it will have to readvertise for bids, said Julian. He also said the property would have to be reappraised. It was brought out that the board paid \$1,500 each for three appraisals on the property.

In other business, the board approved 3-1 a recommendation by Carey Ferrell, assistant superintendent of business and finance, to retain Arch Roberts and Company as fiscal agent for the issuance of a proposed \$100

To Forstall 'Crisis'

Lobbyist Seeks Sex Education, Birth Control Devices For Teens

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Last summer it was child molestation in day care centers. This summer, it is the death of a baby in a state-licensed foster home.

A children's rights lobbyist predicts the next human services crisis to hit the headlines will start with the death of a pregnant teenager from want of prenatal medical care.

Jack Levine, executive director of the privately funded Florida Center for Children and Youth, wants to forestall that death by making sure Florida's public schools offer both sex education and campus-based clinics capable of prescribing birth control devices. He said 20 of Florida's 67 school districts currently offer some form of sex education.

In the Seminole County School District sex education includes human development instruction for fifth grade girls taught by a nurse, information on venereal diseases in seventh grade science, and human reproduction taught in high school biology, according to School Board spokesman Karen Coleman. There is no instruction or distribution of birth control devices.

A new program for pregnant students is now

In the development stage, but not yet approved by the Seminole County School Board, and is called TAPP (Teen Age Parent Program). In addition to the academic studies the girls would receive health care and training in nutrition and how to cope with problems inherent with pregnancy and being a teen-age parent. The girls would receive hands-on training in child care as after the babies are six weeks old they can be brought to class. The girls would be given factual information on pregnancy, child birth, child development and family planning to clarify conflicting advice they may have received and reduce the chance of their becoming pregnant again. Mrs. Coleman said.

Jail Work Funding Near

A \$300,000 federal grant, the first installment of an expected \$1 million contribution toward financing expansion of the Seminole County jail, is expected to be approved any day now.

The U.S. Marshal's office has offered the county, in writing, the initial funds in exchange for a guarantee that space will be available for 30 federal prisoners at the facility, according to Jim Shultz, former director of corrections in Seminole County and secretary of a study committee on jail needs here. An additional \$700,000 has been included in the marshal's 1986 budget to guarantee space for another 66 prisoners, he said. The \$1 million total will pay most of the construction cost of a 96-bed pod. Cost of a pod is estimated at \$1.2 million.

The county commission applied for the money five weeks ago and Commission Vice Chairman Fred Streetman signed documents guaranteeing the space requested will be available for a five-year period. At the time Commission

If Seminole Agrees

Orange County May Step In For SCA

The Orange County Department of Community Affairs may be operating social programs in Seminole County if an agreement can be negotiated between the two counties.

Earlier this week, the Seminole County Commission met with representatives of community action agencies in neighboring counties to discuss how Seminole would obtain social services once performed by now defunct Seminole Community Action. The groups were looking for one agency to fill the void.

The agency finally chosen among those in Orange, Volusia and Lake counties would receive a \$125,000 community devel-

opment block grant. The funding comes from the federal government but is disbursed by the state Department of Community Affairs.

Attending the meeting was an officer of the Community Affairs Department.

The officer told Seminole County to determine whether an existing agency in a nearby county wanted to provide community services to Seminole. Only if one could not be found could the county select a local agency to get the money.

However, representatives of community action agencies in the three surrounding counties of Orange, Lake and Volusia showed up for the workshop and

all said they were willing to provide Seminole with community services.

The commission voted Tuesday night to offer the opportunity to Orange.

The agencies in Lake and Volusia are non-profit private organizations while the Orange County community action group is part of the county government's department of community affairs.

Deputy County Administrator Richard George said Orange County has been invited to make a specific proposal to Seminole on what programs it will offer for the \$125,000 grant.

Longwood Teen Escapes Rape Charge

Insufficient evidence prompted a circuit judge Wednesday to acquit a 17-year-old Longwood youth of rape, robbery and burglary.

Seminole Circuit Judge Robert B. McGregor granted the acquittal for William R. Dukes Jr., of 1201 Homossa Court, stating there was insufficient evidence to prove Dukes either entered the victim's home or raped her. Dukes was arrested March 11 in connection with the 2-year-old case.

The arrest came on the heels of Dukes' acquittal on similar charges in a separate 1984 case. The acquittal prompted a discussion between two sheriff's deputies, one of whom remembered a similar unsolved case. After checking the old case and comparing fingerprints, deputies arrested Dukes.

Dukes, however, was sentenced April 3 in a third case to 21 months in juvenile detention in connection with the attempted strangling of a Lake Mary woman in 1984.

At Wednesday's trial, Chris Smith, Dukes' Longwood attorney, questioned the association of Dukes' fingerprints at the scene and the assault. Dukes knew at least one of the woman's four children and could have been there visiting, Smith said. McGregor, in granting the acquittal, agreed, saying the fingerprints could have been left at the scene prior to the assault.

According to court records, a 35-year-old woman said she was attacked between 2 and 3 a.m. July 1, 1982. She said a man with a steak knife and a pillowcase over his head put the knife to her throat and sexually assaulted her twice. He then took money from her and fled. She said she cooperated out of fear for her life and the safety of her four children.

NABBED WITH TRUCK
A 28-year-old Orlando man who was being issued a trespass warning ran into more trouble when a police computer check showed the truck he was driving had been reported stolen in Tennessee on July 30.

Casselberry police charged the man with grand theft and possession of a stolen vehicle at Season's Restaurant, State Road 436, Casselberry.

Barry Allen White was being held in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

SHOPPED BUT DIDN'T PAY

A Maitland woman who allegedly went on a shoplifting spree through the Altamonte Mall was nabbed in Burdines and charged with grand theft.

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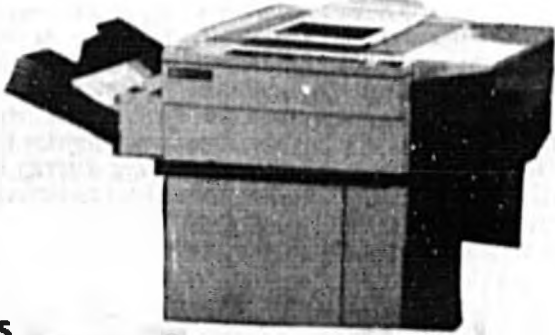
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WORLD IN BRIEF

How Far Will Botha Go In Reforming Apartheid?

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) — Police killed a black youth and a teenager was killed in a grenade attack on the home of a "colored" lawmaker today as the nation awaited a speech by President Pieter Botha outlining reforms in apartheid.

U.S. officials who met with South Africa's foreign minister in Vienna last week said they expected Botha's speech to his ruling National Party in Durban today to focus on changing South Africa's policy of racial discrimination.

But ultra-rightist Conservative Party leader Andries Treurnicht warned Wednesday any move toward integration would "awaken the tiger in the whites." He said Botha underestimated the extent of white backlash that would occur if he moved away from total segregation.

Nobel Peace Prize-winner Bishop Desmond Tutu said blacks would reject any changes imposed without consultation with black leaders.

Clues Sought In Car Bombing

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) Christian and Moslem militiamen exchanged fire along their Green Line battlefield today as investigators sought to determine who planted a powerful car bomb that killed 15 people in Christian east Beirut.

"There are clues from such a bomb that will allow us to know who did it," Joseph Hashem, posts and telecommunications minister, said Wednesday.

Hashem, a Christian, oversaw the rescue operation in the low-income Sad al Bawabirh neighborhood where the car bomb exploded Wednesday, killing 15 people and injuring 120.

The bombing was the bloodiest in east Beirut since May 22, when 55 people were killed and 176 injured in an explosion in the Sin El Fil neighborhood.

No one immediately claimed responsibility for either blast.

Mostly Moslem west Beirut was the target of several car bombings between the fall of 1984 and last spring. No arrests were reported.

Levine said his prescription will likely provoke moral outrage among some Floridians — outrage he said state leaders would do well to ignore.

"Our moral outrage has not stemmed the pregnancy epidemic," Levine said during a news conference Wednesday. "This moral indignation is really putting our heads in the sand on this issue."

Levine said half of all teens are sexually active, but that more than half of all sexually active teens practice no manner of birth control.

The result in Florida has been 30,000 teen pregnancies each year, Levine said. Of that number, 10 percent are miscarried. Forty percent are aborted. And of the 15,000 babies carried

to term, 90 percent will be raised in poverty — some by mothers who had to drop out of school; others in state foster shelters.

"One need not travel to other continents to observe poverty's devastating effect upon the young," Levine said. "The teenage pregnancy, infant mortality and poverty rates within a 50 mile radius of our state capital are among the highest in the developed world."

Much of the problem could be avoided through better sex education and more easily available contraception, Levine said, adding, "We should put our family planning clinics where our adolescents are, and our adolescents are in school."

"Reproductive information does not promote irresponsible sexual behavior," Levine said. "Ignoring the reality of teen sexuality is the greatest responsibility."

Seminole County jail on two charges of attempted murder and one count of armed robbery. King was initially identified as Kenneth Douglas King because he had a birth certificate with him listing that name. Assistant Casselberry Police Chief W. A. Gates said police are still not sure of the suspect's exact name. Gates confirmed that King has maintained he is a diabetic and that he was being affected by the condition when he was arrested.

The money, \$624, and a .25-caliber weapon was confiscated by police.

The postponed trial was for Joseph Carl Crawford, 20, of 140 Stefanie Road, Winter Park. Crawford and a codefendant, 17-year-old Robyn Anthony Downes, of 2516 Leeward Way, Casselberry, were charged with grand theft and burglary following the Feb. 28 burglary of a Casselberry home.

million in tax exempt bonds. Kroll voted against the measure without comment.

Although the fiscal agent structures the bond issue to see that it meets with federal requirements, it is the bond attorney who helps set the ratings, according to Farrell. Julian recommended the board retain the law firm of Freeman, Richards, Watson and Kelly of Jacksonville as bond attorney and the board accepted his recommendation 3-1. Kroll again dissenting.

In recommending Arch Roberts and Company, Farrell said he felt that firm would give the Board "more personal attention and more personalized service" than the other firms he interviewed. "It is important that the fiscal agent understand the economics of your county," he said.

The maximum fee that the fiscal agent could receive is

\$95,000 and that is "totally contingent on the passage of the bond issue," Farrell said. That means the fiscal agent would be paid from proceeds of the bonds.

The board approved a motion to put the issue before the voters. Proceeds from the bonds will be used to build one new school and to update existing schools.

The board also agreed to allow a committee to study from September to January middle school rezoning. The committee will devise one to three plans with input from school administrators and allow Superintendent Hughes to make a recommendation to the board by its March 12 meeting. At a previous meeting the board members approved the construction of 50 portable buildings for use on school grounds and at Wednesday's meeting the board was told that 48 of those buildings are in place and ready for use during the coming school year. The remaining two buildings are awaiting transportation to school sites.

delegation looking into the light rail system there.

Shoultz said today he has no doubt the federal funding will be approved. "It's only a matter of paper work getting the approval through federal channels. I am assuming the federal marshal's office will live up to its commitment."

Federal prisoners at the county jail are now averaging 30 to 40 daily. The county is paid \$34 for room and board for each federal prisoner daily. And even though the federal government is expected to approve the funding to aid in construction of part of the new \$12 million facility, it will continue to pay the \$34 per diem.

Shoultz said the U.S. Marshal's office has no other jail in the area where its prisoners can be housed.

Sheriff John Polk assured county commissioners in early July that the \$300,000 would be available to Seminole County for the asking. The county commission then voted to approve an application for the funding.

Expansion of the jail from a 212-bed to a 692-bed facility is expected to begin later this month and be completed by August, 1987.

A contract for \$12 million with the low bidder, Great Southwest Corp. of Tampa, for construction of the expansion and renovations of the existing facility was approved by the county commission on July 9. Watson & Co

of Winter Park are architects for the project.

Renovations will provide an enlarged intake area, administrative offices, medical facilities and court spaces. The new construction will include five housing pods, a control-visiting center and a service building with an enlarged kitchen and laundry.

The pods are to be constructed with precast concrete modular cells. The precast cells will arrive at the job site with the floor, walls and detention components installed.

The floor of the second level cell creates the ceiling of the lower level cell. A two level control station will be located within the hexagon pod, providing direct vision to all cells at both levels.

In addition to the \$12 million construction and renovation, it is expected to cost another \$1.6 million to furnish the facility, build a new road into the complex from U.S. Highway 17-92, pay architect fees, provide a contingency fund of more than \$500,000 and pay other expenses.

The jail renovations and additions are being paid for with the proceeds from a special 1-cent sales tax approved by the county's voters last November. The levy of the special tax began Jan. 1 and will end Dec. 31.

Proceeds from the special tax are expected to total \$13.7 million by Dec. 31. With the money invested, the county is expected to realize interest earnings of \$1.2 million. The interest money is to be used for courthouse renovations, now underway.

Phil Brown, Orange County assistant county administrator, said the agency in his county offers a whole range of services from distribution of surplus food commodities and emergency assistance payments to farm workers hurt by the freezes to working with the fire department in setting up emergency evacuation programs in private homes and organizing recreation programs. Surplus food distribution is administered in Seminole County by the American Red Cross.

"An interlocal agreement must be negotiated between the two counties," Brown said, but first the Orange County Commission must authorize the negotiations.

Brown said if he receives the letter from Seminole County requesting a proposal in the mail today the Orange County Commission can decide early next week on whether it wants to provide the services and authorize negotiations.

"If negotiations are authorized

we will work with the Seminole County staff and conduct an assessment of the types of programs Seminole's citizens need and then ask concurrence of both commissions," Brown said.

"It's anyone's guess how long it will take to negotiate an agreement," he said. Seminole will have to match the state grant with county money of as little as \$2,500 or as much as \$20,000. Brown said.

The amount of the match will be determined, he said, by whether the county offers some type of services to the program, such as secretarial assistance or space for programs.

Seminole Community Action, which operated anti-poverty programs in the county for 17 years, will officially go out of business Aug. 31 after being denied state funding to administer its programs. It was also denied federal funds to operate its Head Start program on the recommendation of the state Department of Community Affairs. The state recommended denial of money because of what it termed "bookkeeping problems" in accounting for the use of federal funds over the years.

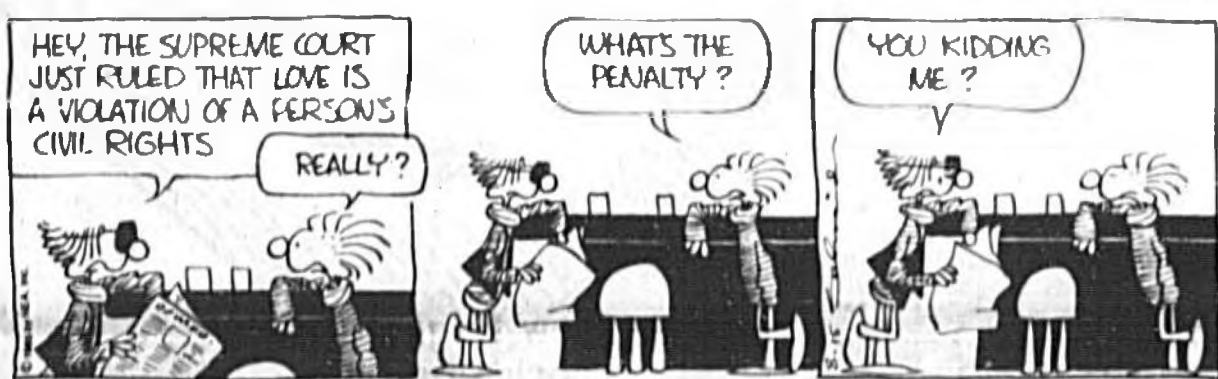

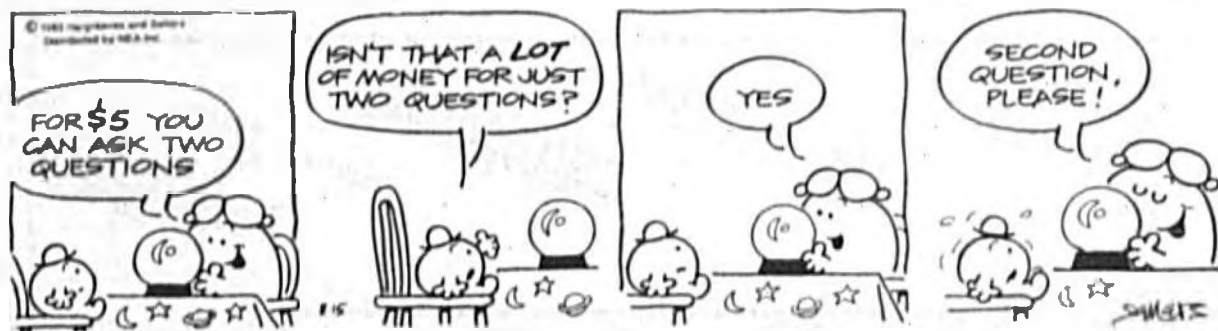

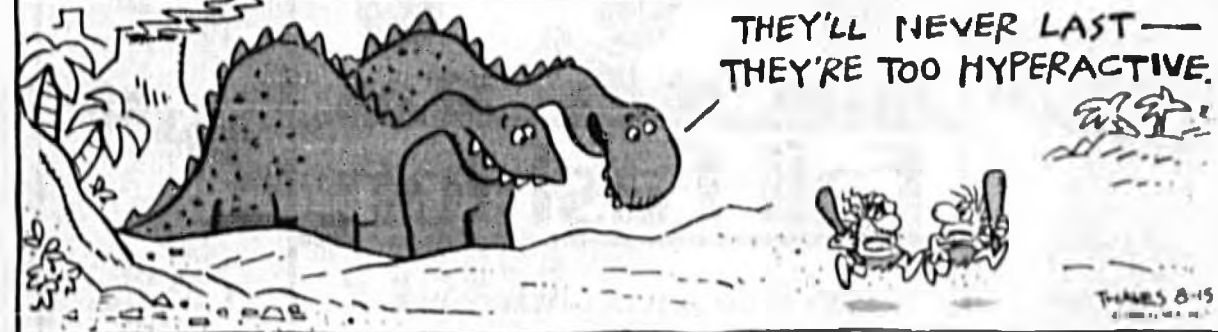

AIDS-Mosquito Link Not Yet Been Explored



DEAR DR. GOTT — I know that some cases of AIDS have been traced to contaminated blood transfusions. Given this, is there any evidence that a mosquito can act as a carrier?

DEAR READER — This is a fascinating question, and I have been unable to track down an answer. The connection between AIDS and mosquitoes certainly makes sense. It really raises some important issues, inasmuch as the disease seems to have made its original appearance in residents of tropical countries where mosquitoes are endemic. Perhaps an enterprising AIDS researcher will skim this column, zero in on the question and provide an answer.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I have severe advanced emphysema. I read recently in the *Globe* about some sort of gland operation which helps people like me. Do you know anything about this?

DEAR READER — There is no legitimate surgery, especially involving "glands," which can help patients with emphysema. I wish the "sensational press" would stop cruelly raising patients' hopes by publishing bizarre reports which make unscientific and unjustifiable claims. They won't stop publishing this trash, however, because desperate people are constantly looking for miracles and will buy newspapers which seem to promise that dreams can come true.

If I were you, I'd disdain buying sensational publications and use the money to purchase responsible and factual newspapers, like the kind you're reading now.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I have a hiatal hernia. What are the causes, symptoms and treatment?

DEAR READER — The esophagus empties into the stomach, just below the diaphragm, through a small hole which is surrounded by a ring of muscles. When food enters the stomach, the ring tends to close and prevent irritating stomach acid from being discharged backstream into the esophagus. As people age, this muscular ring becomes progressively more

lax, and this permits backflow of stomach contents which can inflame the lining of the lower esophagus. Doctors call this hiatal (or hiatus) hernia.

The symptoms resemble those of peptic ulcer: heartburn, gas, poor digestion and a feeling of chest heaviness. If you have a hiatal hernia, you can help control the discomfort by avoiding lying down after meals.

eating frequent small meals and using antacids. Medicine to reduce gastric acidity may be useful. In rare cases, surgery is necessary to correct the defect.

WIN AT BRIDGE

By James Jacoby
"Do I need trump entries so that I can take finesses in a side suit?" That's a question declarer must ask himself. If the answer is yes, declarer must maintain trump control in the play of the hand.

South was not sure he wanted to be in game after his partner's raise. Still, any time you have a two-suited hand and partner has given your major suit a raise, there may be a game.

Thus the try of three diamonds was fully warranted. That game try was enough for North. Although he had only eight high-card points, the K-Q of spades were gold and the heart king had a chance of winning a trick, so he went right to game.

Three rounds of clubs were played and declarer ruffed. If he now plays three rounds of trumps before attacking diamonds, he must go set. Instead, a spade to the queen followed by a diamond finesse and a spade to the king followed by another diamond finesse will bring home the bacon.

It is also right to keep the little spade in dummy as you take the diamond finesse the second time. If East has four diamonds along with three spades, you will be able to establish your diamonds by ruffing the third round of diamonds with dummy's small spade.

Notice also that game would be made even without the king of hearts in the North hand. See what I mean about two-suiters?

A First: Successful NBC Wins Second Quarter Ratings Race

NEW YORK (UPI) — NBC scored another "first" in its continuing success saga — for the first time in the 1980s the network won the ratings race for a full quarter.

Young & Rubicam, the world's largest advertising agency in terms of revenue and the No. 1 buyer of broadcast time in the United States, has issued an analysis of second quarter (April, May and June) prime time viewing.

"ABC-TV continues to have difficulties, second quarter data documents ABC's double-digit losses in most key demographic groups."

"Another continuing story among the networks is the steady decline in the television usage among younger men."

The CBS popularity among upscale viewers was given a big

boost by "Space." The 12-hour miniseries averaged a 17 rating among all TV homes, but hit a 27 rating in households with incomes of \$40,000 and more.

Y&R reported that network viewing has dropped three percent over the same period last year, and is seven percent lower than in 1983, while independent station viewing is up five percent over 1984.

"Second quarter prime underscored NBC's resiliency," said Paul Isaacson, Y&R's executive vice president and director of broadcast programming and purchasing. "In addition to maintaining a stranglehold on most key demographic targets, now for the first time in the 1980s NBC has led during a full quarter among household ratings."

There are two key elements in NBC's success during the April-May-June period.

One is Bill Cosby, whose show was the top-rated network program among households, among women 25-54 and women 18-49 and among adults 18-49.

The second factor is the network's lack of a nighttime soap opera, because prime time serials don't do well in repeats. CBS doesn't even run repeats of its high-rated "Dallas" and "Dynasty" posts dismal ratings in reruns.

"The ratings figures attest to the volatility of the second quarter," Isaacson said. "Beyond the NBC success story, CBS-TV remains the season-to-date household ratings leader, but in the second quarter it has now experienced a fall-off in viewership among key target groups. However, the network has gained among affluent (\$40,000) households."

Woman Suing Jane Fonda Over Workout

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (UPI) — Jane Fonda has been ordered to testify in federal court, where a woman has sued the actress claiming she suffered serious injuries while using Fonda's workout video, court officials said.

But the actress will not appear personally in U.S. District Court in San Juan. Instead, U.S. Magistrate Justo Arenas ordered that Fonda give a videotaped deposition.

The magistrate also specified that "the deponent will be required only to testify, will not be required to perform physically in any manner at all."

"The videotape once taken will be sealed in the file of this court," magistrate Arenas said.

Magistrate Arenas issued the order Monday, but it was not announced until Tuesday.

Fonda, her husband Tom Hayden, and her business associates were sued in July 1984 by Patricia Beckerleg, who claimed she suffered severe injuries when using Fonda's video workout the previous year.

While doing the exercises, she developed an excruciating pain in the lower back, the complaint said.

"This pain developed immediately after an exercise required in the program, which consisted of the splitting of the lower extremities and lumbosacral flexion."

The woman claims that since then she has been partially handicapped and developed a temporary addiction to the drugs used for her treatment. The complaint says that "the withdrawal symptoms caused her marked chills and trembling, which caused her and her husband great pain and suffering."

Along with Fonda and Hayden, the suit also names The Workout Inc., Karl Video Corporation and RCA Selectavision Disc as defendants.

The plaintiffs also are asking that Fonda's workout be required to carry a label stating the program "may be hazardous to your health" and that medical advice and moderation is recommended.
