


Neighborhood Evacuated After Chemicals Found

Officials were awaiting word today on what to do with a collection of hazardous chemicals found Wednesday in the garage of a Forest City home, a discovery which forced the evacuation of about 40 homes in the Lynwood subdivision.

The chemicals, which "had the

potential for destroying a lot of that neighborhood," have been moved to a "secure remote location" and are under guard, according to Seminole County sheriff's bomb expert Lt. Marty LaBrusciano.

The evacuation began about 4:30 p.m. and lasted for about two hours. Gary Brown, of the Seminole County Department of Public Safety, said most of the families took the opportunity to go out to dinner and seven families were temporarily housed at Bear Lake Elementary School.

The evacuation was ordered after fire department workers and LaBrusciano evaluated the chemicals and deemed them to be a "very serious hazard." LaBrusciano said.

The investigation was sparked by a

Wednesday morning telephone call to Fire Rescue Division workers from Jeanette Clark of 1229 Lynwood Ave., Brown said.

Mrs. Clark told fire department personnel she had been cleaning her garage and found a cache of chemicals which had belonged to her late

The U.S. Marshal's office has offered the county, in writing, the initial funds in exchange for a guarantee that space will be available for 30 federal prisoners at the facility, according to Jim Shoultz, former director of corrections in Seminole County and secretary of a study committee on jail needs here. To Forstall 'Crisis'

Lobbyist Seeks Sex Education, **Birth Control Devices For Teens**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Last summer it was child molestation in day care centers. This summer, it is the death of a baby in a state-licensed foster home.

A childrens' rights lobbyist predicts the next human services crisis to hit the heatities will start with the death of a pregnant teenager from want of prenatal medical care.

Jack Levine, executive director of the privately funded Florida Center for Children and Youth, wants to forestall that death by making sure Florida's public schools offer both sex education and campus-based clinics capable of prescribing birth control devices. He said 20 of Florida's 67 school districts currently offer some form of sex education.

In the Seminole County School District sex education includes human development instruction for fifth grade girls taught by a nurse. information on venereal diseases in seventh grade science, and human reproduction taught in high school biology, according to School Board spokesman Karen Coleman. There is no Instruction or distribution of birth control

in the development stage, but not yet approved by the Seminole County School Board, and is called TAPP (Teen Age Parent Program). In addition to the academic studies the girls would receive health care and training in nutrition and how to cope with problems inherent with pregnancy and being a teen age parent. The girls would receive hands-on training in child care as after the babies are six weeks old they can be brought to class. The girls would be given factual information on pregnancy, child birth, child development and family planning to clarify conflicting advice they may have received and reduce the chance of their becoming pregnant again, Mrs. Coleman said.

Los Angeles Passes **Anti-AIDS Discrimination Law**

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - The nation's second largest city, where an average of one person a day dies from AIDS, has outlawed discrimination against people with the deadly disease or those suspected of having it.

The City Council unanimously passed the sweeping law Wednesday, with some members charging that AIDS victims are being treated as "lepers."

Under the law, believed the first of its kind in the nation, victims of AIDS discrimination can sue in civil court. But the ordinance also allows the city attorney to step in and obtain temporary restraining orders - vital, supporters feel, because many AIDS sufferers are too weak to initiate court action themselves.

Employers, employment agencies and labor unions would be prevented from firing or refusing to hire people with AIDS. Segregation of AIDS sufferers in the work place would also be banned.

Restaurants could not refuse to serve victims and schools would not be allowed to deny admission to them. Medical professionals, including dentists, would be probibited from denying treatment to AIDS victims.

Insurance companies could not refuse to write health or life coverage or raise the premiums of victims or suspected

The original proposal included criminal penalties for offenders, but backers eliminated them because they felt going through civil courts would be quicker.

Union Carbide Faces Lawsuit

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (UPI) - Kanawha Valley residents plan to rally for and against Union Carbide, whose plants had two chemical accidents this week, and West Virginia's attorney general may sue the chemical giant for a spill that stekened 135 people.

State Attorney General Charlle Brown suggested Wednesday he might sue Union Carbide over the leaks, which a citizens group official says has exposed the region to a "catastrophie" disaster.

Brown said he was particularly concerned about Carbide's delay last Sunday in telling local officials the chemical cloud posed a danger to nearby communities.

Senate Democratic Leader Robert Byrd toured Carbide's plant at Institute with federal officials following a Sunday accident that sent a cloud of aldicarb oxime, a pesticide chemical, into the air and rolling over four nearby towns, sickening 135 people

Two nights later, Carbide's South Charleston plant accidentally discharged 1,000 gallons of Ucon brake fluid. the solvent isopropanol and sulfurle acid into the Kanawha River, sending one person to a hospital.

Building Official Fights 'Demotion'

Longwood Waiting On Attorney General's Opinion

The Longwood City Commission's plan to reshuffle the staff, particularly the replace. ment of Bud Bryant with City Engineer Charles Hassler as city building official, has been delayed pending a ruling by the state Attorney General on the legality of Hassler's holding both jobs.

Although he has headed the building department for six years, Bryant may never actually have been 'appointed by the city commission." according to Mayor Harvey

Even so, Bryant maintains he is the building official and according to the Standard Building Code, observed by the city, can't be removed without proper cause and a public hearing.

The matter was on Monday night's city commission agenda, but City Attorney Gerald Korman said he had not obtained a ruling from the Attorney General and does not know how much longer it will take to get

Under the state Constitution a city official can hold only one municipal position at a time and there is a question of whether the building official title comes under this regulation.

The rule may also affect Police Chief Greg Manning who is serving as City Administrator. Korman said he has also asked for a ruling on Manning's dual job holding.

The commission wants to put Hassler in charge of the building department and take the title away from Bryant and call him a building inspector." This is part of the commission's plan to consolidate authority in the hands of fewer people so that there

would only be three persons reporting directly to the city administrator - the engineer, the city clerk and the director of public safety (a position that has not been filled because there is a question of whether or not it is needed)

Smertlson questions whether Bryant was ever officially appointed building official by the commission or merely hired by former city administrator David Chacey as building inspector. But there is no question in the mind of Bryant, who has plaques from two former mayors stating he is the city's building official.

For almost five of his six years in the building department. Bryant was the entire department. "According to the Standard Building Code," he said, the head of the department is the building official. "I was appointed by Dave Chacey and he couldn't do anything without the approval (or disapproval) of the commission and they have been approving my salary and paying me. As soon as they did they acknowledged" he was the building official.

Bryant said he resents statements made by the commissioners Monday night to the effect that "I was 'never appointed' - it's not true - and I 'assumed the role on my own' - it's a big lie.

The job of Jerald Davis, a building inspector Bryant said was hired just a little over a year ago, is eliminated in the tentative budget for the 1985-86 fiscal year. The mayor said it was because the number of building permits is down and he isn't needed, but Bryant said the city is actually ahead of last year in the number of permits

In the tentative budget, Hassler's salary as director of engineering is divided equally between building, planning and zoning, and public works departments. Formerly city engineer in Winter Springs. Hassler was hired by the Longwood Commission on

June 3 at an annual salary of \$30,000. Bryant's salary is \$21,000 a year. His pay would not be cut if he loses the title of building official, according to City Clerk Don

If Bryant is indeed the city's building official. Korman said it may take more than a simple resolution to replace him and a

public hearing would be required. Bryant said under the Standard Building Code the city has to show cause before removing a building official from the office and a public hearing is required.

In a similar case. Hassler, shortly after assuming his post, demoted Tommy Jackson from public works director to deputy public works director and was put to work supervising city crews.

In that case. Bryant said Jackson didn't have the Standard Building Code behind

Bryant suspects his problems with the city commission may stem from his insistance that building department funds be kept separate as the law requires and not mixed with general funds because they come from building fees and not tax

The fees are supposed to cover the costs of operating the building department and making inspections and if there is too much of a surplus the fees are supposed to be lowered, "Bryant said.

Longwood Teen Escapes Rape Charge

Insufficient evidence prompted a circuit Judge Wednesday to acquit a 17-year-old Longwood youth of rape, robbery and

Seminole Circuit Judge Robert B. McGregor granted the acquittal for William R. Dukes Jr., of 1201 Homossa Court, stating there was insufficient evidence to prove Dukes either entered the victim's home or raped her. Dukes was arrested March 11 in connection with the 2-year-old

The arrest came on the heels of Dukes' acquittal on similar charges in a separate 1984 case. The acquittal prompted a discussion between two sheriff's deputies, one of whome remembered a similar unsolved case. After checking the old case and comparing fingerprints. deputies arrested Dukes.

Dukes, however, was sentenced April 3 in a third case to 21 months in Juvenile detention in connection with the attempted strangling of a Lake Mary woman in 1984.

At Wednesday's trial, Chris-Smith. Dukes' Longwood attorney, questioned the association of Dukes' fingerprints at the scene and the assault. Dukes knew at least one of the woman's four children and could have been there visiting. Smithsaid. McGregor, in granting the acquital, agreed, saying the fingerprints could have been left at the scene prior to the assault.

According to court records, a 35-year-old woman said she was attacked between 2 and 3 a.m. July 1, 1982. She said a man with a steak knife and a pillowease over his head put the knife to her throat and sexually assaulted her twice. He then took money from her and fled. She said she cooperated out of fear for her life and the safety of her four children.

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Red Threat In Philippines

Day by day, the situation in the Philippines becomes more critical.

The strength of the outlawed Communist New People's Army numbers from 15,000 to 20,000 armed guerillas. They conduct hit-and-run missions. They have demonstrated their influence in 59 of the country's 73 provinces.

Day by day the activities of the Communists become bolder. They attack military convoys. They stop buses and gun down occupants. These insurgent movements are sophisticated, and if the Philippine government cannot find some means to halt them, a full-scale revolution could soon develop. Some feel it already is too late for the Philippine government to stop a Communist takeover

If the Filipino people turn to communism, it will be in desperation. They have displayed true friendship for Americans over the years. They adopted our democratic form of government. We were comrades in World War II.

Unfortunately, U.S. ties with President Marcos are croding this friendship. The people of the Philippines are fed up with Marcos' dictatorial reign, his manipulating of elections and his financial deals with his cronies. He is driving his people toward communism in a pattern which follows that of Cuba and Nicaragua, countries once friendly toward the U.S. and now under the Communist yoke.

Marcos declared martial law in 1972, giving rlots and terrorism as the reason. He promised land reform and economic stability. When martial law was lifted in 1981, not much had changed.

Then came the assassination of Marcos' chief political opponent. Benigno Aquino Jr., at Manila Airport in August 1983. The people reacted en masse to the murder. More than 5 million Filipinos took part in Aquino's funeral

Twenty-five high-ranking military men, including Marcos' cousin, Gen. Fabian Ver, chief of the armed forces, are charged in the murder of Aoutno. The proceedings have dragged on for more than a year and the outcome is much in doubt.

Marcos becomes more ineffectual and isolated every day, and this bodes ill for the United States. Our presence in the Philippines is important because Clark Air Force Base and the Navy's Subtle Bay complex are situated there. They are extremely important to our Asian military presence. Subte is the world's largest naval base. If we were to lose it, the balance of power would shift to the

Two years ago President Reagan made a five year agreement to lease these bases for \$180 million a year — \$95 million in economic aid and \$85 million in military aid. Congress basically has held to this agreement. Last year it changed the percentages, giving \$40 million for military aid and \$140 million for economic assistance. The congressional authorization for fiscal 1985 is \$70 million in military aid and \$110 million for economic assistance.

Should the Communists succeed in taking over, the U.S. would have to make a decision on whether to withdraw from these strategic bases or to hang onto them, as we hold Guantanamo Bay in Cuba.

Thus we have a crisis. The Philippines has an isolated and ineffectual leader at the head of an autocratic regime. The people suffer poverty and the loss of their democratic system. The Communists are demonstrating a potent military challenge.

President Planning A 'Fall Offensive'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan plans to embark on a "fall offensive" after Labor Day to lobby for an overhaul of the tax code and other measures he views as key to his administration

But when Reagan hits the road, the first lady also will be very busy with a non-stop schedule, including social events at the White House and her crusade against drug abuse among the

Mrs. Reagan, who has had a heavy schedule and the worries at the White House when the president underwent surgery, plans to relax at their mountaintop Santa Barbara, Calif., ranch during the month of August.

Her press secretary, Jennefer Hirshberg. called it a "recuperative quiet time" for Mrs. Reagan.

The first lady has several engagements as soon as she returns to the White House, starting with an event at the National Zoo in the "Pennies for Pandas" campaign:

The Reagans will hold their first state dinner of the season on Sept. 10 when they entertain Danish Prime Minister Raul Schlueter in the Rose Garden, weather permitting.

But while she is in California, Mrs. Reagan will be able to catch up with the doings of her children who all live on the West Coast.

She also may take time out for house hunting. looking for the home that the Reagans will occupy when the president's second term is up in January 1989.

She has alerted friends to be on the lookout for a house in the Los Angeles area. The Reagans' old neighborhood is the Pacific Palisades and there are indications that they would like to return to that area;

White House chief of staff Donald Regan plans to spend a few days in Santa Barbara holding the fort in the White House offices at the plush Biltmore Hotel, then he will head for a vacation spot in Florida

It will be Regan's first vacation since he became the top presidential adviser at the White House. He has had a baptism of fire in dealing with one crisis after another, not to mention setbacks on Capitol Hill from a recalcitrant Con-

But Regan, former chairman of the board of Merrill Lynch investment firm, takes it all in stride and says philosophically, "It comes with

Still there is a question if he realized all the problems that would beset the center of power.

In reality, he has replaced three top advisers in the White House: James Baker, now treasury secretary. Edwin Meese, the attorney general, and Michael Deaver, who is in public relations.

Mrs. Reagan is reportedly on the telephone several times a day with Regan and tries to make sure that the president, who wants to be 'up and at 'em," does not overdo it during his recuperation from intestinal cancer surgery.

The first lady has said in several interviews that she does not interfere in policy, but she does keep a watch to make sure that the president is not being ill served.

A Most **Defective Product**

It's unlikely you've every heard of Rose Cipollone, but the tobacco industry certainly has

Mrs. Cipollone died last year of lung cancer. A year before her death, she filed suit in federal district court in Newark, N.J., against three tobacco companies, alleging that they were responsible for her fatal illness.

It is already a landmark case.

This is not the first time individuals claiming injury as a consequence of smoking have gone to court. But none to date have been successful.

A key defense for the tobacco companies has been the warning printed on every cigarette package, an required by federal law since 1966. In effect, the industry has argued, anyone who disregards the warning and lights up thereby knowingly takes responsibility for any resultant personal risk.

But the judge in the Cipollone case, refusing to dismiss the suit, questioned that argument. He upheld the right of the Cipoliones to try to prove that the warning was inadequate to the actual risk. Further, he suggested that the tobacco industry may have undermined its case with its own promotional hype:

"Efforts to convince the public that the risks do not exist or that they are minimal or unsupported by medical and scientific data may, in and of themselves, give rise to a cause of action."

The Cipolione complaint is not the only smoking injury case pending. There are some 30 across the nation. They can draw upon a wealth of supporting evidence more than 40,000 scientific studies alone - as to the deleterious effects of tobacco usage

Five U.S. surgeon generals have indicted tobacco as a national health hazard. The current occupant of the office, C. Everett Koop, estimates smoking-related deaths at 350,000 each and every year, roughly equivalent to the nation's total battlefield dead in the four years of the second world war.

Cigarette smoking is, Koop says, "the chief single avoidable cause of death in our society and the most important public health issue of our

Dr. William Pollin, director of the National Institute of Drug Abuse, has called smoking the nation's "most widespread example of drug dependence.

It's Economic Warfare

Congress is apparently declaring economic warfare against the government of South Africa, and the Reagan administration is said to be willing to go along with it. This legislation should be called the Genecide Promotion Act of 1985 The truth of the matter is that Congress has no realistic goal in mind, and may promote a disaster.

Does Senator Richard Lugar, the Republican taking the point position on these matters, really believe that the white minority is going to submit to one man one-vote? under which they would enjoy the fate of their white neighbors in Zimbabwe.

Does Senator Lugar realize that the South African whites are armed to the teeth and resolute? Some 275,000 South African males have had military training. There are 50,000 South Africans on active duty in the security forces. There is no military force between Cape Town and Catro that could oppose them for 24 hours. These people are not going to turn over political power and their property to Nelson. Mandela or anybody else. In the realworld, what the actions of Congress and the White House are likely to result in is not majority rule but a slaughter, and most of the bodies will be black.

The Reagan administration in its fatulty has demanded that South Africa lift the "state of emergency" it recently declared. You may not have noticed that it made no similar request that Robert Mugabe in Zimbabwe lift his state of emergency, declared at about the same time, with less justification. and more stringent

Just the other day, Joe Slovo, the white columnist who heads the military arm of the African National Congress, broadcast as follows, in English, from communist Ethiopia

"Ambushes must be prepared for policemen and soldiers ... with the aim of capturing weapons from them. Our people must also manufacture home-made bombs and petrol bombs with material that can be locally obtained. In addition. our people must also buy weapons where possible

"After arming themselves in this manner, our people must begin to identify collaborators and enemy agents and deal with them. Those collaborators who are serving in the community councils must be dealt with Informers, policemen, special branch police, and army personnel living and working among our people must be climinated.

Yes. And on our TV screens we see suspected black "collaborators" cowering before a mob while Bishop Tutu begs for their lives. There are reports that a black man was burned alive by black teen agers on the hood of a car. Indeed, Bishop Tutu was so shaken by these events that he threatened to leave the country "If that happens again, I am going to collect my family and leave this country that I love."

In point of fact, the South African government would have been remiss in its duty if it had not declared a "state of emergency," whatever Bud McFarlane thinks of it. The government there has a police responsibility for the safety of everyone living there, and is not going to submit to mob rule.

College Costs Lowdown

UPI Education Editor NEW YORK (UPI)- Parents and students may gulp over a new College Board report showing bills for the 1985-86 school year up 7 percent: The most expensive school, Bennington College in Vermont, will cost \$17,210, including tuition, room and board, books and transportation.

The cheapest bill among the ten most expensive private schools is Dartmouth, at \$16,120.

But there are educational bargains at public universities serving up programs equivalent to those at the more costly private colleges. The total cost is less than half at eight public universities selected by Richard Moll, admissions dean at the University of California, Santa Cruz.

Moll names them in a book, "The Public Ivys." (Viking, \$18.95) due out next month,

Among his public university picks are two other branches of the University of California, Berkeley, \$7,290 and Irvine, \$7,236. Also among Moll's picks: Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, \$4,800; Universit of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, \$4,300; the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, \$7,100.

Schools in between in price include the University of Vermont at Burlington, the College of William & Mary, Williamsburg, Va.; the University of Texas, Austin and the University of Virginia, Charlotteaville:

The extras a student may get at the 10 most expensive private schools depends on the school. Generally, the ratio of faculty to students is low. That means small classes instead of crowds in lecture halls Many of the privates also pride

themselves on getting students involved in research or projects with faculty, from the freshman year on. They also boast about super libraries, laboratories and renowned scholars. The ratio of students to faculty

here is 9 to 1," said Charles Yoder, spokesman for Bennington, a liberal arts school emphasizing fine and performing arts. Yoder said the ratio is exceptional,

even among private liberal arts schools. "A ratio of 12-to-14-to-16 is considered pretty good," he said.

At Yale University and other schools among the top 10 with annual fees of \$16,120 and more, the price of the liberal arts degree was defended with similar arguments.

Was Plane Crash Due To Human Error?

WASHINGTON - Federal investigators have painstakingly exammed the blackened hulk of the Delta Lockheed Tristar that went down short of the runway in Dallas on Aug. 2

It is undetermined at this point whether air-traffle-controller error contributed to the tragedy. If this was a factor it will come as no surprise to investigators for the House Public Works and Transportation Committee. They have been reviewing the safety of the air-traffic system since 16,250 controllers walked off the job four years ago and were fired en masse by President Reagan.

The House investigators have concluded, according to their draft report, that the "margin of safety" for air travelers has diminished substantially since 1981, because the Federal Aviation Administration has allowed traffic to increase at the

same time the "experience level" of controllers has dropped. This does not mean the sky is

falling, cautioned former Rep. Elliott Levitas, D.Ga., who began the investigation. "We know that the dire predicted consequences of the controller walkout failed to materialize," he said. "An economic disaster. and a potential safety hazard, to mention just two, did not occur,"

But safety experts believe, and the congressional investigators agree, that 'accidents are a poor way of measuring safety, since they represent the final results of an unsafe system ... The margin of safety should be determined and any safety problems resolved before, not after, accidents occur."

Put another way, this is one war in which the winner ought not be determined by body count.

The investigators draft report. entitled "Has Safety Taken a Back Seat to Expediency?" has been obtained by our associate Tony Capaccio. Here are its main con-

1. The air-traffic controller system is plagued with a "diminishing margin of safety ... stress, fatigue, staffing shortages, increasing traffic, lack of supervision and an unseasoned work force have all" contributed to the problem:

2. At the same time, the FAA has made the risk-fraught decision to ease traffic restrictions and "return to 100 percent of pre-strike (air traffic) capacity as quickly as possible." The growth of air traffic has "outpaced increases in controller numbers and experience levels."

3. "The number of experienced controllers has declined by about one-half (of the pre-strike level) and that experience loss will not likely be replaced for years to come."

Prior to the strike, the report notes, 82 percent (13,311) of the controllers in the federal system were operating at the "full performance level." As of January 1984. only 47 percent (6,331) of the controllers qualified as fullperformance employees.

The drop in experience level, according to the draft report, has had the worst effect on the New York Air Route Traffic Control Center, located at Islip airport on Long Island Like its five sister facilities around the country, the Islip center monitors the flight patterns of aircraft after they have climbed above 18,000 feet and are roaring along the nation's air corri-

Before the 1981 walkout, 78 percent (337) of Islip's controllers were considered fully experienced. and each handled an average of 383 aircraft per month. Since the strike. only 45 percent (126) of the Islip controllers are rated as experienced, and each of them is handling 1,167 aircraft per month.

Footnote: One barometer of the low level of experience of controllers is the great increase in mid-air 'near misses." The number of these close-calls shot up from 359 in

1981, to 478 in 1983, to 592 last

MIAMI (UPI) - As the holdouts of Dan Marino and Jim Jensen stretch into the pre-season, the Miami Dolphins moved to add stability to their quarterback corps by claiming former University

of Florida star Wayne Peace off waivers. Peace, waived by the Cincinnati Bengals Monday, worked out with the Dolphins Wednesday. He said he was surprised to be claimed by

"I'm shocked," he said. "I figured I'd just have to go the free agent route. But now that I'm here, I'll have to make the most of this opportunity."

Peace enjoyed a fine career with the Gators. moving in as the starting quarterback in the fourth game of his freshman year in 1980. In his career, he completed 610 of 991 passes for 7,206 yards, 34 touchdowns and 40 interceptions, and was highly regarded coming out of college.

He signed with the Tampa Bay Bandits of the U.S. Football League, and played sparingly in 1984 before the Bandits tried to trade him to Portland at the beginning of last season, Peace vetoed the trade and sat out the season.

In the USFL, Peace completed 18 of 43 passes for 215 yards, one touchdown and four interceptions. He had a rating of 26.8, compared to Mlami quarterback Dan Marino's 1984 rating of 108.9.

With Marino and third-string quarterback Jensen out of camp, the Dolphins are left with Don Strock as the only experienced quarterback.

Miami also has free agent quarterbacks Bryan Clark and Lou Pagley, neither of whom have thrown a regular season pass in the NFL



Graham Vetoes Weapons Legislation

On June 25, 1985, Governor Bob Graham took a giant step into the anti-firearms camp when he vetoed legislation that would have set standards for issuing concealed weapons

The legislation, S.B. 661, would have required the state to issue concealed weapons permits to applicants who are over 21, have no felony record, no alcohol or drug addiction, and no history of mental

Finger prints of applicants would have been checked with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

Although the legislation would have abolished local control over concealed weapons permits, local sheriffs would have been informed of an application and given the option to provide a background check within 60 days.



The bill also stated that applicants sign a statement saying the permit was needed for self-defense purposes and they would have been required to provide proof that they had competency in the handling of firearms. through military training, organized shooting experience, a sanctioned firearms training course given by the National Rifle

Association, or a previously issued weapons permit.

Under the existing system, each of the state's 67 counties sets its own concealed weapons permit policies, allowing them to adopt a variety of restrictive procedures that often deny law-abiding citizens the right to keep and bear arms for self-defense.

Marion Hammer, executive director of the Unified Sportsmen of Florida, said that given the current system for issuing concealed weapons permits, Gov. Graham showed a total disregard for the lives and safety of law-abiding citizens when he vetoed S.B. 661.

She said Graham denied the basic right of Floridians to keep and bear arms for self-protection, adding that each and citizens who believes in the right to self-defense should be appalled by the veto.

MONTREAL (UPI) - All the top seeds except defending champion John McEnroe are about to undergo their first real tests at the \$375,000 Player's International tennis tournament.

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



How Far Will Botha Go In Reforming Apartheid?

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - Police killed a black youth and a teenager was killed in a grenade attack on the home of a "colored" lawmaker today as the nation awaited a speech by President Pieter Botha outlining reforms in apartheid.

U.S. officials who met with South Africa's foreign minister in Vienna last week said they expected Botha's speech to his ruling National Party in Durban today to focus on changing South Africa's policy of racial discrimination.

But ultra-rightlat Conservative Party leader Andries Treurnicht warned Wednesday any move toward integration would "awaken the tiger in the whites." He said Botha underestimated the extent of white backlash that would occur if he moved away from total segregation.

Nobel Peace Prize-winner Bishop Desmond Tutu sald blacks would reject any changes imposed without consultation with black leaders.

Clues Sought In Car Bombing

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) Christian and Moslem militiamen exchanged fire along their Green Line battlefront today as investigators sought to determine who planted a powerful car bomb that killed 15 people in Christian east Beirut.

There are clues from such a bomb that will allow us to know who did it." Joseph Hashem, posts and telecommunications minister, said Wednesday

Hashem, a Christian, oversaw the rescue operation in the low-income Sad al Bawshrieh neighborhood where the car bomb exploded Wednesday, killing 15 people and injuring

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

DEAR READER - This is a fascinating question, and I have been unable to track down an answer. The connection between AIDS and mosquitoes certainly makes sense. DEAR DR. GOTT - I have a hiatal hernia. What are the causes, symptoms and treat-

DEAR READER - The esophagus empties into the stomach, just below the diaphragm, through a small hole which is surrounded by a ring of muscles. When food enters the stomach, the ring tends to close and prevent trritating stomach acid from being discharged backstream into the esophagus.



Young & Rubicam, the world's largest advertising agency in terms of revenue and the No. 1 buyer of broadcast time in the United States, has issued an analysis of second quarter (April, May and June) prime time viewing.

"Second quarter prime underscored NBC's resiliency," said Paul Isacsson, Y&R's executive vice president and director of broadcast programming and purchasing. "In addition to maintaining a stranglehold on most key demographic targets. now for the first time in the 1980s NBC has led during a full quarter among household rat-

There are two key elements in NBC's success during the April-May-June period.

One is Bill Cosby, whose show was the top-rated network program among households, among women 25-54 and women 18-49 and among adults 18:49

The second factor is the network's lack of a nighttime soap opera, because prime time serials don't do well in repeats. CBS doesn't even run repeats of its high-rated "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest," and ABC's "Dynasty" posts dismal ratings in rerums.

"The ratings figures aftest to the volatility of the second quarter," Isaesson said, "Beyond the NBC success story, CBS-TV remains the season-to-date household ratings leader, but in the second quarter it has now experienced a fall-off in viewership among key target groups. However, the network has gained among affluent (\$40,000) households.
