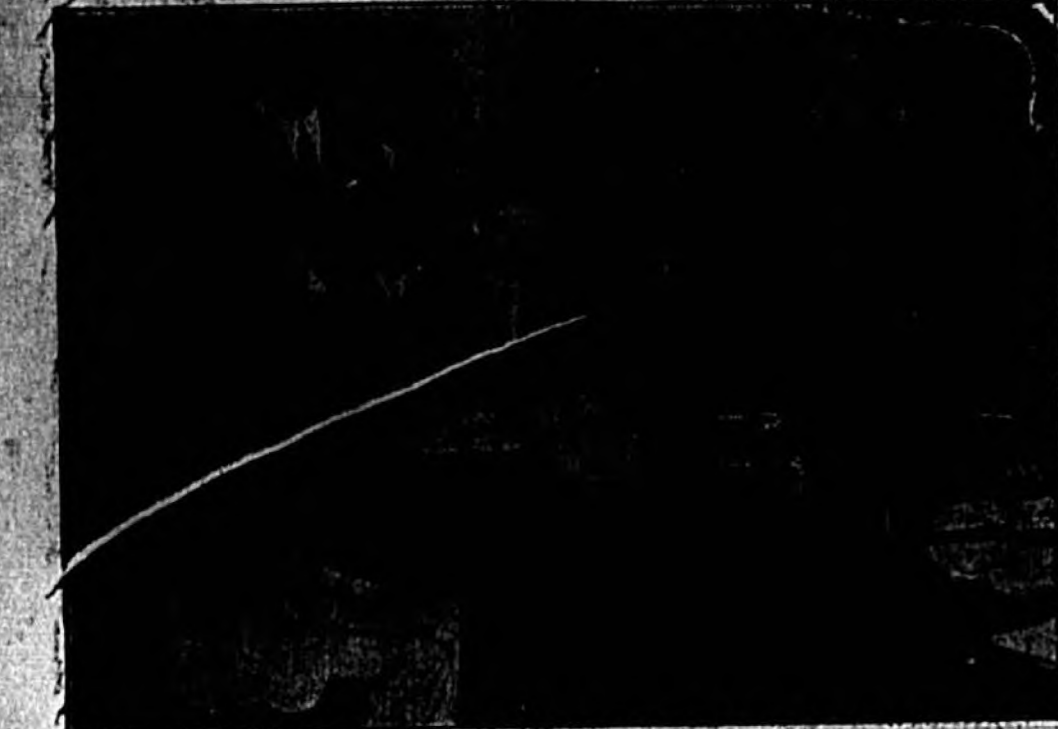
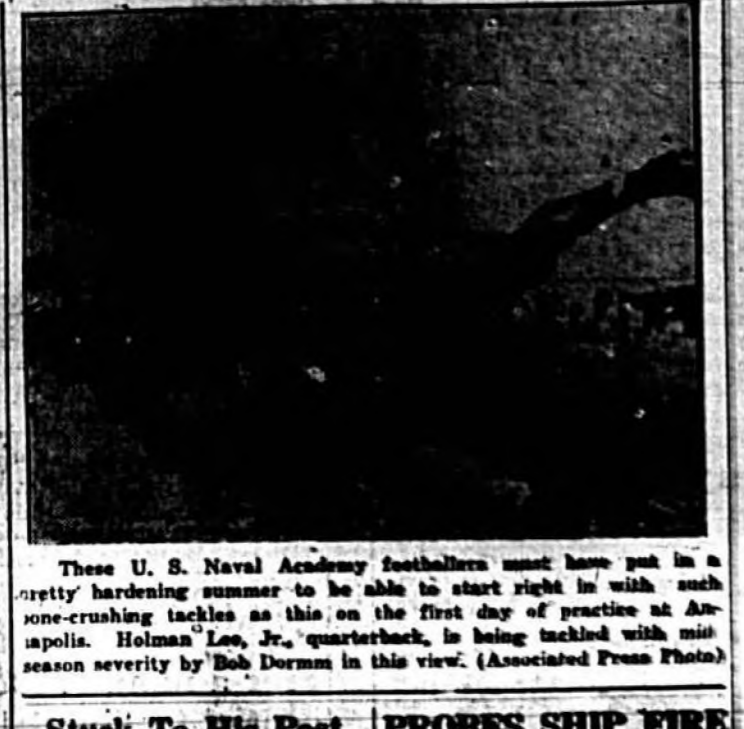

RIOT SCENE IS SHIFTED TO CAROLINA

(Continued From Page One)
A shouting, jeering mob swept everything before it until hard-pressed National Guardsmen and badly pummeled police, having exhausted their tear gas, fired upon the rioters. Killed one youth and wounded six others. Scores were roughly handled. Store windows were smashed by the hundreds, automobiles overturned and street lights extinguished.

The governor's message hit hard at Communist agitation. He likened the bloody riots which for four days have swept Saylesville and Woonsocket to the longshoremen's strike in San Francisco.

"We are face to face," the message said, "not with a textile strike, but with a Communist uprising."

"What started out as local conflicts between employers and striking workers over the question of picketing has grown and spread to other localities and includes a large number of persons with no interest whatever in the strike but seeking merely to create disorder, and some of them with the deliberate plan to upset our established government."

"The strike in this highly industrialized state gave an opportunity on the Atlantic coast, following that of the longshoremen's strike in San Francisco on the Pacific coast."

"In each case the Communists took advantage of the situation. We must put them down here as they were put down there. To save the property of our citizens, to save their very lives, we must take prompt, strong and drastic action."

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 14.—Plans for the Northeast Florida League's post-season series and re-organization of the circuit for next summer were effected at a loop meeting at the Carling Hotel Wednesday night. The many details peculiar to such a convocation held the representatives into the morning hours.

W. E. (Black) Weaver, president, who has guided the league through three seasons, was named leader for 1935. Earl Blue, of Gainesville, also was elected statistician once again.

The series, as had been decided previously, will start at Palatka Sunday. Succeeding games will be played on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday until one team wins four games, with the site being switched each playing date. However, if a seventh game is necessary, the site will be decided by lot. Sunday games are to start at 3 and weekday games at 4.

Sailors in the stern of the blazing Morro Castle "did their duty magnificently," Bishop Hulse, Protestant Episcopal bishop of Cuba, who is recuperating, with Mrs. Hulse, at a hospital from their experiences on the ship, said yesterday.

"There were very few sailors on that section of the ship, but those who were there did their duty magnificently," the statement read.

"One petty officer took his own lifebelt and gave it to my wife and showed her how to fasten it. There were no lifeboats on that side of the deck so the crew tried to throw lines so that passengers could slide down."

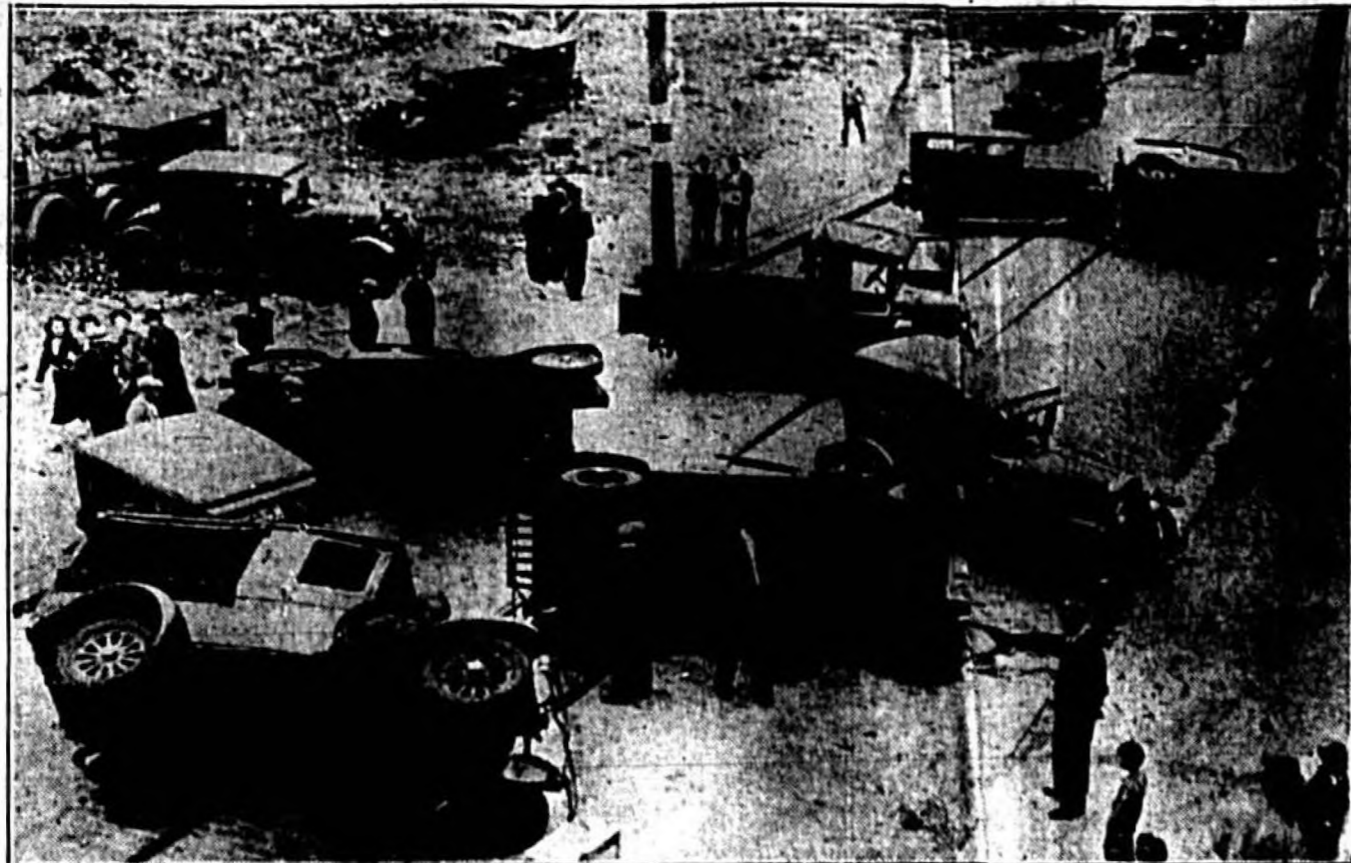
