 that the President would have halted the bombing of North Vietnam Friday "if he had expected the backlash from Saigon."
 "I think President Johnson thought expected the Saigon government would attend," the Republican said.
 Humphrey, also interviewed on a Sunday TV program, said he believes Saigon will ultimately take part in the peace negotiations.

"I think we must depend on the good sense of the government of South Vietnam to attend and participate," he said.
 "After all, the American people have paid a very heavy price in men and material and many other ways for the defense of South Vietnam and I think it's fair to expect that government will respond to the sacrifices we've made."
 Humphrey appeared on ABC's "Issues and Answers."

The former Alabama governor's running mate, retired Air Force Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, voiced doubts about the effects of the bombing halt.

 Nixon received a repeated challenge to Humphrey to join him in pledging presidential support to the candidate who receives the largest share of Tuesday's popular vote.
 Should the Electoral College deadlock with no 270 vote majority for any candidate, the race would go into the House.
 The Republican said that under no circumstances would he seek to negotiate for support with presidential electors back in the States.
 "The most important thing is not to make a deal with Wallace," he said.
 Both Humphrey and Wallace surmised the Nixon challenge.
 Humphrey said he believes the popular vote should decide the election.
 But he also said he believes that reform of the Electoral College system should come through constitutional amendment, not through the kind of pledge Nixon proposed.
 "I believe in supporting the Constitution," Humphrey said. And he said the Constitution designates the House as the tie-breaker.
 Furthermore, Humphrey said, "I think we're going to get the plurality."
 "I'll make no agreement to support any of them," said Wallace.

Female Rebel Joins Paris Peace Talks

PARIS (AP) — A woman revolutionary led a Viet Cong delegation into Paris today to join the peace talks. She pledged that the war in South Vietnam will continue as long as the United States "props up the puppet administration of Saigon."
 Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh, a member of National Liberation Front's central committee, said on her arrival from Moscow:

"The population of South Vietnam ardently wishes for peace, but this peace cannot be dissociated from independence and liberty."
 "As long as the American government has not renounced its aggressive aims and props up the puppet administration of Saigon... the Vietnamese people will continue their struggle until final victory."
 Mrs. Binh, the chairman of the Women's Liberation Association, heads a team of six members.
 The delegation was greeted by Viet Ambassador Valerian Zorin and Ambassador Xuan Thuy, who leads Hanoi's delegation to the peace talks which began on May 13.
 A spokesman said the NLF "will be present" at the first meeting of the expanded talks Wednesday. They are attending as a result of the agreement between Hanoi and Washington under which President Johnson halted the bombing of North Vietnam last week.
 South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu has announced that his government will not send a delegation to the talks because it will not negotiate with the NLF as a separate entity. He said the boycott would continue until Saigon is assured of direct, serious talks with Hanoi.
 U.S. officials privately feel Thieu's boycott will not wreck the peace discussion. Secretary of State Dean Rusk said he expects South Vietnam to join the talks sooner or later.

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Fighting Tapers Off

SAIGON (AP) — Ground fighting in Vietnam tapered off to its lowest level since last summer, but allied communists today reported at least 16 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese soldiers killed by planes, artillery, infantrymen and patrol boats in a number of small scattered actions.
 U.S. and allied forces reported only light contacts with North Vietnamese army and Viet Cong units throughout South Vietnam Sunday, the U.S. Command said.
 Two communications from the command today did not report a single major ground action. Military sources said all the enemy casualties reported occurred in small actions and none of them were initiated by the enemy.

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Explosion Years Ago Takes Toll

PORT CHICAGO, Calif. (AP) — The aftermath of a monster explosion that occurred in Port Chicago 24 years ago now is committing its final destruction of the entire town.
 Weeks are taking over everywhere. Rose bushes droop for lack of water. Lawns are parched brown. Old men sit forlornly at the bus depot.
 Nobody cares for anything around here anymore, for order of Chicago is dying by order of the U.S. Navy.
 On July 17, 1944, two ships loading ammunition at piers on the edge of Port Chicago vaporized in a horrendous blast of 2.5 million pounds of high explosives, killing 22 men. The town itself sustained heavy damage, but no one in its limits was killed.
 But the Navy feared that an other explosion at the piers would wipe out Port Chicago—25 miles from San Francisco on a northeast reach the bay—and kill everyone in it.
 So over the years, in six attempts rancorously resisted by many townspeople, the Navy tried to get Congress to let it buy up the town to create a two-mile buffer zone around loading facilities.
 The piers handle 70 per cent of the munitions used in Vietnam.
 The Navy's big argument was that today a single pier can handle nine million pounds of explosives rather than only 25 million—meaning, they said, the town could go up in a blast.
 Finally Got the Money
 This year, finally, the Navy got \$18 million to buy the 5,020-acre town and about its 3,000 inhabitants from their 600 homes and businesses. The goal: raise the town.
 "Freedom was born in the U.S.A. and died in Port Chicago," said the marquee of the Port Chicago Theater.
 A skill and crossbones Jolly Roger flies on a mast above a three-bedroom house on Humboldt St.
 "That's my husband's way of protesting what the Navy is doing," said Mrs. Nina Simon, whose husband, Bill, is in the Navy.
 The fight for this town—it was terrible," she said. "You don't know when it's going to happen. You go through so much of this uncertainty as to really you are relieved just to get out."
 Homes and other properties are first appraised, then residents are offered money. There are alternatives. They can settle with the Navy and move; they can move their houses out of Port Chicago, or sell out to private contractors who will move the houses themselves. Residents who refuse to move or parties can be forced out through condemnation proceedings.
 Navy Wants to Settle
 Leslie P. Springmeyer, director of the Navy's real estate section in Port Chicago, said he foresees few condemnations. He hopes to exhaust every other possibility first. But not everyone has been willing to take the Navy eviction broadside without challenge. About 10 property-owners have hired lawyers in an attempt to make a case of unconstitutional action against the Navy. One case already has been turned down by a U. S. District Court judge and an appeal has been taken to the U. S. District Court of Appeals.
 The final chapter in the story of Port Chicago will, officials say, be written this fall when the Navy expects to acquire all the property for good and for all.
