"Its weakness may be largely by the fact that the injunction is for a definite period, that permitting the parties to gauge the 'profit and loss' involved if agreement is not reached within the 80-day period," he said. Mosher also called on the committee to keep the Taft-Hartley Law's ban on the closed shop, under which employers can hire only union members.

He was shot twice in the back, and his car was wrecked against a lamppost. The American-licensed newspaper Tagesspiegel denounced the shooting as murder, and Charles C. Bond, American public safety official said "it comes close to being murder."

Ervin Proposes State Construction Fund

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 12 (AP)—A special state construction is suggested by Attorney General Dick Ervin. He believes Florida should have a guaranteed income to meet building needs as they arise and finance big once-in-lifetime projects like the South and Central Florida water control system. He suggested it could be used for down payments to reduce loans and interest rates on self-liquidating projects, and also for construction of buildings which must be outright purchases because they can't earn revenue. The Attorney General said such a fund would stabilize the state construction program and prevent a repetition of past experience, which shows the state has failed to put on needed buildings during long periods of lean years, then spent abnormal amounts at high prices during good years.

(Continued From Page One) most desirable features" of each—whether introduced by Democrats or Republicans. He said he hoped that Sparkman's committee would take a similarly "non-partisan approach." And the possibility of dispatching U. S. troops to Greece was also a hearing on the new \$5,500,000,000 Marshall Plan authorization. Sen. Labor of New Jersey, ranking Republican on the House Foreign Affairs Committee which is considering the aid program, said bluntly: "Why don't we send our soldiers into Greece and clean up the germs?" He said he was not actually recommending this, but added: "Sometime or later we're going to have to do something. The way it is now, we're just building up the economy so the guerrillas will have something to take over." Richard M. Bissell, Jr., deputy director of the Economic Cooperation Administration, to whom Ervin addressed his question, disagreed with the Congressman's conclusion that the United States was "treating the real trouble in Greece, but only the symptoms." Bissell said that U. S. officials on the ground feel that military measures alone won't get Greece back on her feet; the Greek people must be given some hope for economic recovery, too. Meanwhile Secretary of State Acheson made a date with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to seek prompt and substantial agreement on the final critical issues of the North Atlantic Security Treaty. Diplomatic authorities said Acheson had ready for the afternoon session a proposal that amounts to a tentative treaty text. This means a showdown over the wording of the defense clause of the treaty.



NEW YORK—Are major league baseball contracts fair to the player?

This question will be argued a lot on the street and even in the courts between now and next year. It is the result of Danny Gardella's \$300,000 suit against the New York Giants for whom he played two years during the war.

The Court of Appeals reversed a district court decision in the case of **TRITTING** Court for trial on Gardella's two principal charges:

1. That baseball is a "monopoly" because the "reserve clause" in contracts of all players under the jurisdiction of organized ball binds him to one club and prevents him from bargaining with another club.
2. That baseball should come under the jurisdiction of the Clayton anti-trust law because teams in organized ball, with the large fees received for broadcasts and telecasts of games, are now engaging in interstate commerce when accounts of games are transmitted across state lines.

"The case will take six months to a year to go to trial," says Frederic A. Johnson, Gardella's lawyer. Gardella, 29, is a \$100-a-week hospital orderly in Mount Vernon, N. Y. He hit .272 for the 1945 Giants, driving in 71 runs in 121 games, was subsequently suspended by the Giants and "jumped" to the Mexican League. This led to a five-year suspension from organized play even semi-pro ball.

Here are two paragraphs taken from the major league rules:

"Rule 3. Uniform Contract—(a) To preserve morals and to produce the similarity of conditions necessary to keep competition, the contracts between all clubs and their players in the Major League shall be a single form which shall be prescribed by the Major League Executive Council. No club shall make a contract containing a non-reserve clause, except with the written approval of the Major League Executive Council. All contracts shall be in duplicate and the player shall retain a counter-copy. The making of any agreement between a club and a player of embodied in the contract shall subject both parties to discipline; and no such agreement, whether written or verbal, shall be recognized or enforced.

"Rule 4. Reserve Lists: Filing—(a) On or before November 1 in each year Major League clubs shall transmit to the Commission and to its League President a list of not exceeding forty (40) active and eligible players, also list of coaches, scouts and trainer, excluding non-playing manager, which players and personnel the club desires to reserve for the ensuing season and also a list of all its players who have been promulgated or played on the National Defense Service, Government, voluntarily retired, suspended or ineligible list. On or before November 15 the League President shall transmit all of said lists to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Executive Council, who shall thereupon promulgate same, and thereafter no player on any list shall be eligible to play for or negotiate with any other club until his contract has been assigned or he has been released.

When a baseball player signs a one-year contract he actually is signing for the duration of his playing career. This item is covered in baseball contracts under a marginal heading (paragraph 10) termed "Renewal." Below is this clause.

In other words, if a player does not sign a contract by March 1 following his previous season of employment, he is obligated to accept his previous year's salary. If the club wishes to do so, it can cut his salary 25 per cent on his new contract.

On all baseball contracts there is a termination clause. Players are well acquainted with this clause. It is in paragraph 7 under parentheses (b) and reads:

"(1) Fail, refuse or neglect to conform his personal conduct to the standards of good citizenship and good sportsmanship or to keep himself in first class physical condition or to obey the Club's training rules; or

"(2) Fail, in the opinion of the Club's management, to exhibit sufficient skill or competitive ability to qualify or continue as a member of the Club's team; or

"(3) Fail, refuse or neglect to render his services hereunder in any other manner materially breach this contract."

Sub paragraph (e) of paragraph 7 is a longwinded clause. In part, it says, "If this contract is terminated under sub-paragraph (b) (2) of this paragraph 7 for failure to exhibit sufficient skill or competitive ability, the player shall be entitled to an additional amount equal to thirty (30) days payment at the rate stipulated in paragraph 2 hereof and the reasonable traveling expenses of the player to his home."

In other words a club can drop a player and the club's only obligation is to pay the player 30 days' salary and reasonable traveling expenses.

In the same paragraph 7 under parentheses (f) the contract says: "If the Club proposes to terminate this contract in accordance with sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph 7, the procedure shall be as follows:

"(1) The Club shall request waivers from all other Major League clubs. Such waiver request must state that it is for purpose of terminating this contract and it may not be withdrawn.

"(2) Upon receipt of the waiver request, any other Major League club may claim assignment of this contract at a waiver price of \$1,000, the priority of claims to be determined in accordance with the Major League Rules."

Some baseball men are surprised that baseball itself failed to alter drastically the wording of the reserve or renewal clause after 1940 when a dozen or more players






The anti-bookie drive is just getting under way in this area. A "drive" was made yesterday but in the late afternoon, after the morning business was over. By the time law enforcement men got around, the bookies had only things off for the day. Only three arrests were made all on Miami Beach.

Ten State Beverage Commission agents started out at 8:00 A. M. today, however, to begin a drive in Dade, Broward and Monroe counties. The push will be extended to Palm Beach County later.


The agents, ordinarily assigned to check illegal saloons, were instructed to confine their search to bookies.
