NEW YORK, Aug. 3. (AP)—Jack Saltgaver, the ball player who made a fortune sitting on the Yankee bench, is having a good year as a handy man for the Kansas City Blues.

With the American association season little more than half finished, Jack has acquired quite a reputation as a pinch hitter. In 25 batting appearances he made 10 hits and drove in 15 runs. Most of his hits leading to victories for the Blues. Jack was a handy man with the Yankees, too. You remember Jack He could field like a flash. He was the chap who could step in to spell Tony Lazzari, Frankie Crosetti or Red Rolfe when they were ailing.

But most of the time he was sitting on the dugout bench, getting slivers in his pants. He was the first player to make a successful career of bench-sitting. He made more dough, in salary and the world series checks, on the seat of his pants than 90 percent of the league's infielders did for regular playing.

During his five years with the Yankees as utility infielder he drew \$55,747.64. Of that, \$37,500 was salary and \$18,247.64 was a two-year bonus. He didn't get into a single series game but his share of the melon was just as big as Ruth's or Gehrig's. His last year with the Yanks, in 1937, Jack got \$13,911.11 for appearing in 17 games and getting two hits.

During his stretch with the Yankees he made \$340 for every hit he made. Only one man ever made more—statisticians figure that Babe got \$341.98 for every hit during his career with the Yankees.

Jack was the first utility man or substitute to make a financial success of bench-sitting. But several others have done right well without quite equalling Saltgaver's record.

Two of them were Yankees. Arndt Jorgensen, the perennial third string catcher, was with the Yankees for 11 years, drew fair pay and got cuts of five world series. He hardly caught as many games during his entire stretch with the Yankees as Bill Dickey does in a single year. Another is the Yankee batting practice pitcher, a chap named Paul Schreiber. He isn't even on the roster, but he gets good pay and has been voted a slug of dough out of each of the world series pools shared by the Yankees.

Invaders Continue To Surge Ahead On Lower Don And In Caucasus

Soviets Report Nazi Forces Are Cut Off In Battle Of Bend Above Stalingrad

(By Associated Press) Soviet dispatches today declared Marshal Semyon Timoshenko's armies, sweeping around the German flanks, cut off Nazi forces in the battle of the Don bend, 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad, but the invaders continued to surge forward on the lower Don and in the Caucasus.

A Hitler bulletin asserted Nazi forces were "driving" toward the Kuban River deep in the Caucasus at several points and have captured Voroshilov, 180 miles southeast of Rostov. It also said the German army, already advanced nearly a third of the distance to the great Caucasus oil fields and far beyond sectors noted in Russian communications.

The Germans said Voroshilov fell after violent house-to-house fighting. It was disclosed that Mussolini, speaking in northeast Italy recently, sounded a warning against "idle dreams" about a second front. He said there will be none anywhere in this war.

Wild-riding Don and Kuban Cossacks are credited with beating off two regiments of tanked German infantry, but subsequently were forced to withdraw.

The Soviet newspaper, Izvestia, said the Germans are trying to fly ammunition and fuel to units trapped by the Red at Kletskaya, 90 miles above Stalingrad, but are failing. The Red army, however, is said to be cutting off the German forces.

German forces are continuing to pour across the river in the Tsimlyansk sector, 180 miles upstream from Rostov. In the western air war, Nazi daylight raiders bombed two English towns today after a night-long lull on both sides.

In the area of Kletskaya in the northwest of Stalingrad the Russian midnight communiqué said, "The Russian units killed more than 1,200 Germans and added that the Red peasant army still was dealing 'counter blows' against enemy tanks and motorized infantry."

Southwest of Kletskaya in the Tsimlyansk area of the curving Don, the Russians said the tanks still were throwing shells and mortar fire, but the communiqué indicated the Soviets were standing firm.

In the critical Salak-Kuchevskaya area, 75 and 80 miles respectively below the Don, the lines apparently were swaying back and forth. The communiqué said 400 Germans were killed in the Salak region, and another 800 in the Kuchevskaya sector.

"During the day one big popular point changed hands three times," the communiqué said. "This toll of 2,500 Nazi dead made a total of 9,500 announced by the Russians in the last 24 hours."

Hitler's Generals Consider Second Front Threat Serious

(By Associated Press) Neutral accounts of painstaking German defense maneuvers along the "invasion coast" of Norway emphasized yesterday that Adolf Hitler's generals are taking more and more seriously the threatened second front.

While the Nazi Government in tenacious its propaganda to build public faith in the strength of its western defenses, fire was added to second front talk by the announcement of the Netherlands Government Information Bureau that Prince Bernhard, husband of Queen Wilhelmina, is making preparations "for a return to the Netherlands."

Since Bernhard, recently made a Dutch major general and rear admiral and given "new duties" suggesting a Dutch command assignment, was said to have discussed his new work and his preparations with Queen Wilhelmina while in the United States, his return to England was announced yesterday.

The Stockholm correspondent of the Swiss newspaper Neue Zürcher Zeitung said the German exercises in Norway were carried out from Kristiansund and the west coast to Tromsø, in an area where the ill-fated British and French expedition of 1940 was to the relief of the Norwegians.

German newspapers were said to be showing for the first time the anti-invasion strongholds, into which hundreds of thousands of tons of concrete have been poured.

German military experts were estimated yesterday that there are now about 24 German divisions in France and the low countries.

Military quarters believed Russian reports were true that 16 German divisions, including two armored divisions, had been transferred to the eastern front. But they emphatically denied that only one division has been left to hold the coast.
