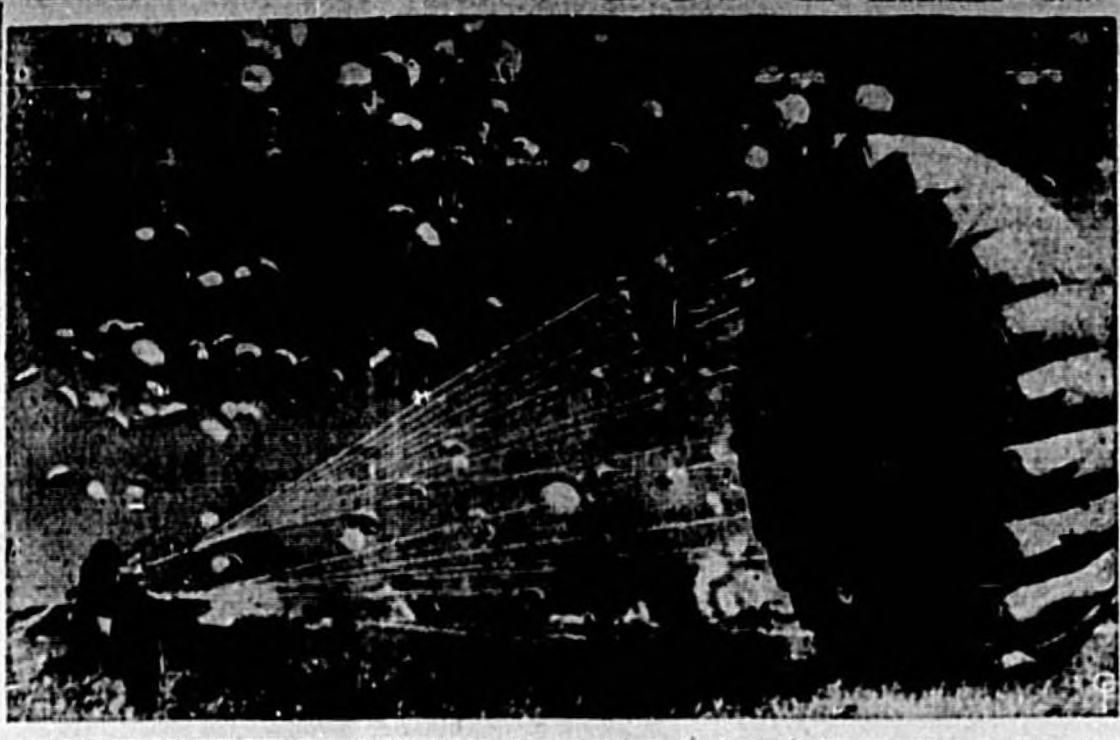

PORCH SUPPER FOR TWO
 Mixed Cold Cuts
 Dill Pickles
 Potatoes*
 Green Peas or Asparagus
 Thin Rye Bread, Buttered
 Beverages
 (Recipe for Starred Dish Follows)
 Peasant Potatoes
 2 tablespoons fat
 4 tablespoons finely diced onion (1 small onion)
 1 tablespoon finely chopped green pepper
 1 tablespoon finely chopped pimento
 1 1/2 cups diced leftover boiled new potatoes (about 8 small new potatoes or 1/2 pound)
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 Dash of freshly ground pepper
 Dash of paprika
 Melt the fat over low heat; add the onion, green pepper, pimento and cook until partly tender, about 3 to 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the potatoes and sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Cook over low to moderate heat, stirring frequently, until potatoes are thoroughly hot and

very lightly browned, about 10 to 20 minutes. Serve immediately. 2 to 3 servings—recipe may be doubled.
 Note: If new potatoes, used were boiled in their jackets they should be peeled before dicing.

 Deviled Tunafish
 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
 2 tablespoons flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon dry mustard
 1/2 teaspoon paprika
 1 cup milk
 One 7-ounce can (1 cup) tuna
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 1 tablespoon finely cut parsley
 1/4 to 1 cup (about 2 slices) soft bread crumbs
 4 short sprays parsley
 Melt 2 tablespoons butter or margarine in a saucepan over low heat; add the flour, salt, mustard

and paprika and blend quickly. Remove at once from heat. Add milk gradually, blending with whisk or back of wooden spoon until smooth, after each addition. Return to medium or high heat and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and bubbly. Reduce heat to low and allow to simmer 2 minutes longer to finish cooking flour. Remove from range, add tuna (including oil from can), lemon juice and finely cut parsley. Mix well, breaking tuna into flakes, but leaving some of it in larger pieces. Turn into 4 individual baking shells or dishes. Melt the remaining tablespoon of butter or margarine in clean saucepan or small skillet over low heat, add crumbs and stir until they are evenly coated. Sprinkle over tuna and place under low or moderate heat in broiler, about 4 inches from source of heat, so that crumbs do not get too brown before fish is hot. Watch closely. In about 7 to 10 minutes or so fish should be thoroughly heated and topping a beautiful golden brown. Garnish with parsley sprigs, tucking short stems into sauce. 4 servings.

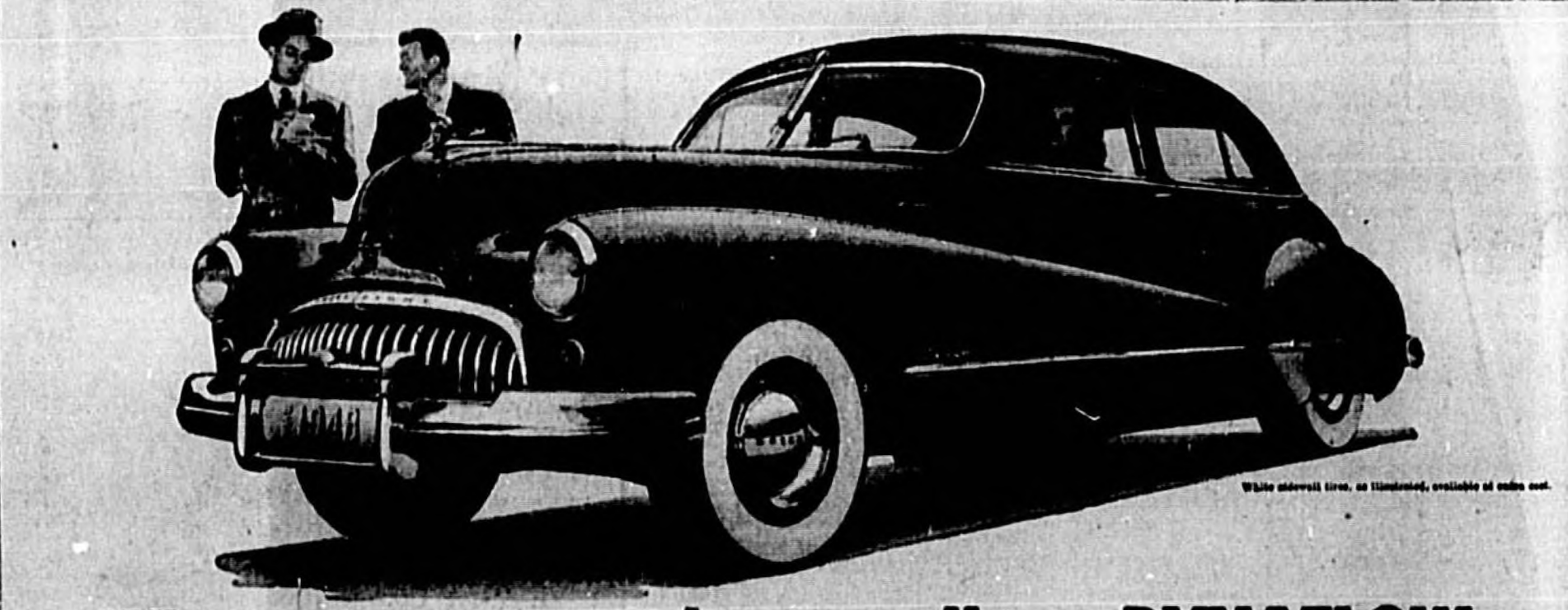

Giants Win 3 Games, While Dropping 2 Tilts, Over Weekend

Locals Trim Sens In One Affair, But Nip A's Twice As Orlando Takes 2 Contests

The Sanford Giants came through the past weekend with three victories and two defeats. The Giants remain in fourth place in the loop standing, but are being challenged by the St. Augustine Saints, who are riding on the crest of another victorious drive to reach the first division.

The locals copped a pair of contests from the Palatka Azaleas on Friday night in Palatka. The Sanfordites took the curtain raiser by a 3 to 2 margin, and scored a 6 to 4 victory in the nightcap.

The Orlando Senators invaded the Municipal Park on Saturday night and took an 11 to 4 decision from the Giants.

Yesterday's twin bill between the Giants and the Senators at Tinker field was divided. The Senators copped the opener by an 8 to 3 score, and the Sanfordites won the finale by a 5 to 4 count.

Art Dunham went the distance in the first game of the dual attraction with the Azaleas on Friday evening. He allowed the Azaleas four hits to rack up the victory. Sanford rapped eight hits from the offerings of Johnson.

Joe Schultz and Bill Spinks will toss the second game for the Sanford Giants. Len Matze, playing right field for the Sanfordites, rapped

two home runs in the second game, and hit a ball into the trees over the berm at the Palatka park, but was not given a round tripper for the blow.

Charlie Allen allowed the Celery City aggregation but six well scattered hits Saturday night at the local park, as the Orlando Senators waltzed to an 11 to 2 victory. Righthander Bill Mackel opened on the hill for the Giants, but was pulled before none were out in the first frame. He was replaced by Lonnie Worsham, who completed the game. Rudy Karson and Pat Romanello worked behind the plate.

Yesterday the Giants moved to Tinker Field for a twin bill, and divided the games with the Senators. Charlie Rose, Joe Schultz and Bill Mackel worked the first game, while Stan Zedalis racked up his 17th victory of the 1948 campaign. Orlando won by an 8 to 3 score.

Bill Spinks and Buddy Lake teamed up to turn in the 5 to 4 win in the nightcap.

Tonight the Giants move to De Land, and return to the local park tomorrow evening with the Red Hots.

Wednesday the Sanfordites move to Leesburg, and return here on Thursday with the Pirates. Friday Sanford moves to Daytona Beach, and Saturday night the Islets and the Giants play a twin bill at the Municipal Park. Sunday afternoon's attraction will be a dual affair at the Municipal Park between the Giants and the Gainesville G-Men.

Stetson Library Has Rare Copies of Early Boston Weekly Magazine

Forty nine of the earliest issues of "The Christian History", recognized as one of the best sources on church history, are on file in the Stetson University Library.

The magazine was published in Boston 200 years ago (only 24 American libraries have files of "The Christian History") and of these but 16 have complete files. Dates of publication are from March 5, 1743 to February 23, 1745.

Yellowed and with some of the pages slightly dog-eared from use, the letter "P" is used for "and many capitals are used. It was printed by Kirkland & Green, for Thomas Prince, Junr. A. H.

The editor assures his readers that the magazine "will continue to be printed in the same form with the same large Page as the present" (the page is 5" by 7 1/2") at the rate of two Shillings new Tenor per Quarter, delivered at any House in Town unexcused, and 6d new Tenor more per Quarter, in closed seal, & directed.

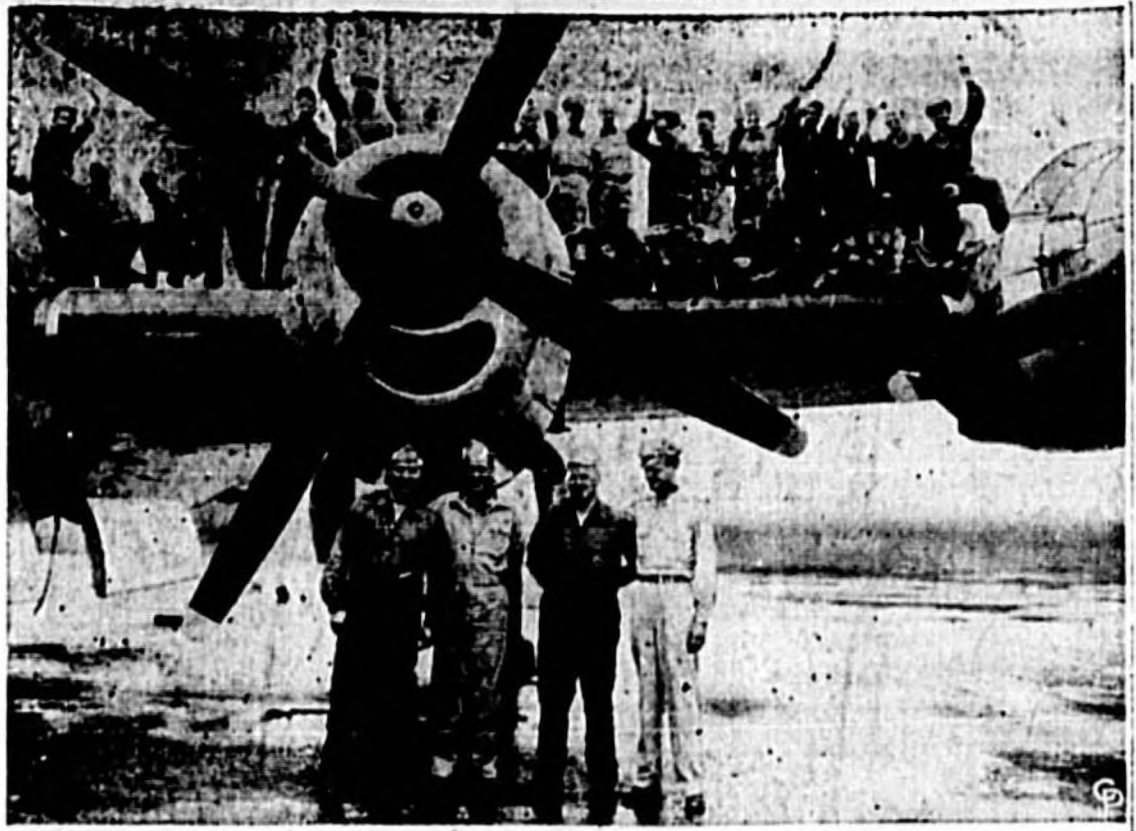
A modern magazine editor would scarcely expect his subscribers to wade through a statement of purpose like the following: "This at the earnest desire of many Persons of Piety and Judgment, Lovers of the peculiar Doctrine Power and Practice of the Christian Religion; as they were promoted by the power of the old Church of England from the Days of the Reformation and by the renowned bellows of NEW ENGLAND, who therefore heartily rejoice to see and read of their revival both in Great Britain & America, and for the Advancement of the Hebrews Kingdom and City that the PRESENT WORK is undertaken Which therefore will be wholly confined to Matters of Religion and in particular in sacred but of the Christian's Thoughts or other things of a religious importance."

The editor was also fully cautious when it came to anonymous writers, "Ministers and other Persons of

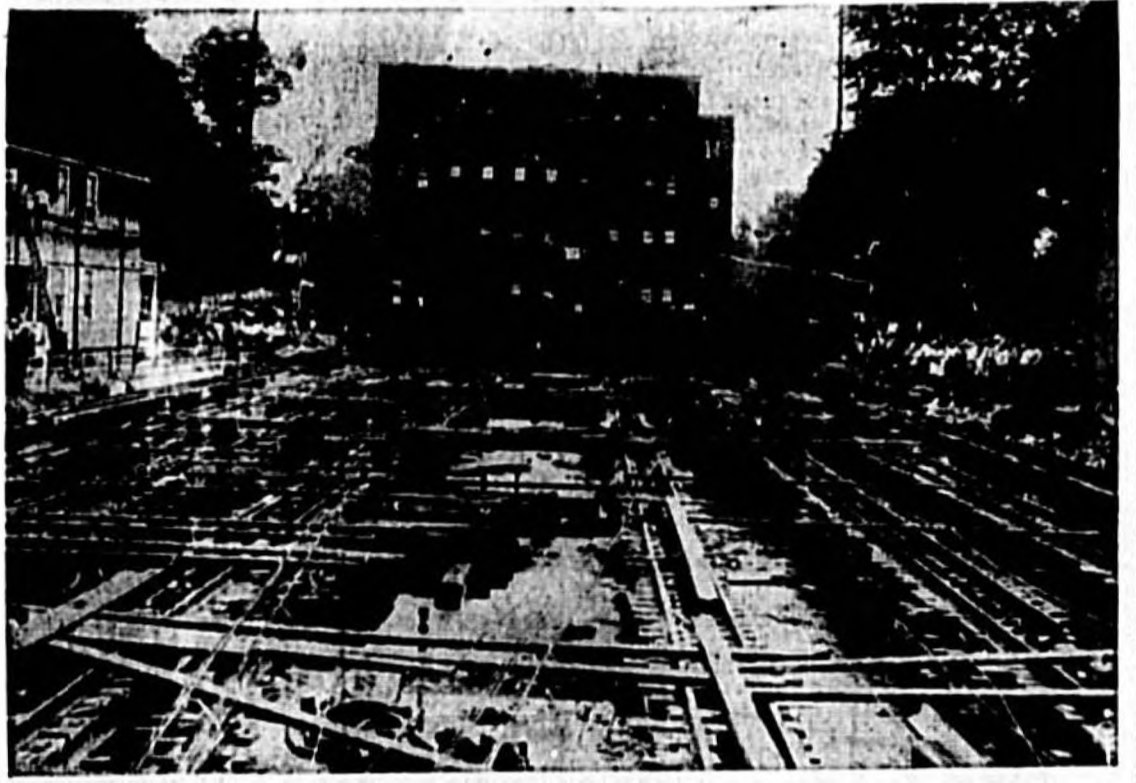

(Continued from Page One) special session President Truman had sufficient power to deal with inflation but "we found various situations where executive powers might be somewhat enlarged." Noting that Mr. Truman in his Philadelphia convention speech claimed credit for high farm prices and high wages, Taft said the President also will have to accept responsibility for high consumer prices. "The President's only complaint is that the Republicans will not give him power to fix wages, to fix prices and ration commodities," Taft said. "It is my view that the restoration of OPA, subsidies, price control, wage control and rationing—the police state methods derided by Truman himself—would only make the situation worse, create black markets and check the increase in production which will reduce prices."
