### **Trailwood Parents** To Address Board

A group of Trailwood parents which picketed Seminole County School Board offices Tuesday is scheduled to appear at tonight's board meeting to protest the condition of access routes to Spring Lake Elementary School and elimination of courtesy busing in the area.

And if the panel doesn't take action, a spokesman for the group says, the parents will be back on the picket line Thursday. Marie De Moor, a parent of two Spring Lake students and organizer of the demonstration, said her group will be on hand when the school board convenes at 7:30 p.m. at the Seminole County courthouse in Sanford.

"We had seven people out there with signs," Mrs. De Moor said of the Tuesday picket. "We were there from 10 (a.m.) to 12 (noon). We're on the agenda for the school board meeting tonight, and if they don't do something about this, we plan to picket again

The Trailwood parents are unhappy because school bus service has been removed from their neighborhood forcing Spring Lake students to walk to school along a dirt road which is used by cars and is too sandy to allow the children to ride bicycles, according to Kathryn Hix, president of the Spring Lake

PTA.

Mrs. Hix said that by eliminating the busing service when classes opened Aug. 30, school administrators had broken a promise recorded in the minutes of a December 1974 school board meeting.

1974, we went to the school board and protested and they agreed to restore the busing until certain things had been done in the area," Mrs. Hix said. "They agreed to repair the bridge (over the Little Wekiya River), cover the sewers, cut the grass, clean up debris and build a bicycle path.

"Well, they've done some of those things," she continued. "They repaired the bridge, covered the sewers and cut the grass. But the area's still not that clean and they haven't built a bicycle path. And now our school bus has been taken away." Seminole School Supt. William P. (Bud)

Layer said Tuesday the school board's safety committee had checked cut access routes to Spring Lake Elementary and had proclaimed them to be safe under a strict set of standards used by the board. Seminole County Commissioner Richard

Spring Lake Principal Ernest (Dick) Prater said he agreed that the dirt road should be closed to auto traffic.

### Campaign Debates Will Serve Nation

Both presidential candidates have moved into the details of a debate so quickly one wonders what the hitch was about having one in the first place. Now the problem has branched off in two directions. The Federal Election Commission is going through the motions of declaring the debate der the new federal laws relating t

And both President Ford, the challenger, and Jimmy Carter are cautiously negotiating the format because each realizes how critically important the face to face discussions will be to his olitical fortunes.

We aren't among those who are alarmed at the possibility that the debate may be illegal because minor candidates are not included. If the federal law will not permit two candidates who have emerged from the caucuses, primaries and conventions as the frontrunners to participate in a head to head confrontation, then the federal law is wrong. Congress could change it in time for the debate to proceed.

The question of format is stickier. Ideally, a debate should be a debate, with alternating individual presentations and rebuttals. The moderator would be a timekeeper who would not intrude his personality or opinions into the

However, the nation has not had much experience in having an incumbent president debate. In the last century, the famed Lincoln-Douglas debates on the meaning of the Dred-Scott decision occurred in an Illinois senatorial campaign. In this century the template was formed in 1960 when Vice President Richard Nixon and Sen. John F. Kennedy met four times with panels of newsmen as moderators or discussion leaders.

President Ford's suggestion of four debates of 90 minutes each, dealing with defense, domestic, foreign and economic policy, appears to be headed in that direction. He covers the range of subjects that appear to be concerning Americans. And since his position on most of these issues is on the record, Mr. Ford would give Mr. Carter an initial advantage because the challenger will have an opportunity to refute charges that he is fuzzy on the

A panel of carefully selected newsmen should elp to keep the discussion on the track without in any way impeding the ability of the candidates to exhibit their self assurance, articulateness, inisiveness and logic.

It's been said often that 1976 has been an nusual political year. If properly conducted, the face to face discussions between an incumbent President and a challenger who is far ahead in the polls will assure that it is true.



silent five years ago when given evidence suggesting that the two pilots were alive when captured during the war, says the Pentagon's op expert on prisoners of war.

But, said Dr. Roger Shields, "I don't want to accuse them of killing any of the POWs."

Victims of Zulu attacks in the Soweto township set fire to an eight-block hostel for Zulu migrant workers early today, and two charred bodies were found in the ruins. Eyewitnesses said blacks from areas in the

big ghetto south of Johannesburg that had been targets of Zulu attacks two weeks ago attacked the Mzimhlope hostel with gasoline bombs. It housed 11,000 Zulu bachelors.

Court Says Beatle George Infringed On Copyright

NEW YORK (AP) - Former Beatle George Harrison was not aware of it, but he infringed on a copyright when he wrote the melody for 'My Sweet Lord' in 1970, a federal judge

U.S. District Court Judge Richard Owen, a composer himself, convicted Harrison of copyright infringement Tuesday. Although Harrison did not deliberately plagiarize the melody of "He's So Fine," he did essentially use the work, the judge said.

"His subconsciousness knew that song had worked out but his conscious mind did not remember," Owen said. "This then under the law is infringement of a copyright .... "

# Straight answers to some of your questions about FPLs request for rate relief.

We know you're not happy about the thought of a higher electric bill. We're not happy about all the higher bills we get, either. And each of us at FPL pays an electric bill at home, just as you do. With no discounts. So we're right in the same

boat with you. But while we know you'll never welcome any price increase, we can at least try to help you understand this one. That's why we're answering some of the questions you may be asking today.

Q. How come FPL asks for so many rate increases? Didn't you just get one a little while ago?

A. This will be only the third general rate increase for FPL in our half-century of service. During the years from 1957 to 1967, FPL rates went down a total of over \$46 million. Our first general rate increase request came in late 1971. In 1973 we got our answer—\$20 million less than

Then we stated a need for \$165 million in rate relief based on 1974. Eight months after the initial filing we got final approval for \$58 million

Q. Why make such a point about the delays in

A. Because the time lag is one part of the problem. Our 1974 request was evaluated by the Florida Public Service Commission on 1974 figures. But 1975 was almost half over before we got a final decision. All that time, inflationary

pressures kept costs rising. Even then we received only about 65% of what we needed. We were playing a game of "catch-up," and we started so far behind that it was hopeless. Now we're paying 1976 bills with the income from 1974 rates. It's bad enough now...but it simply cannot go on through 1977

Q. All right, your last increase was \$58 million less than you needed. But you're asking for a lot more than \$58 million now, aren't you?

A. Yes, we need a substantial increase to cover our day to day costs...an increase in our gross revenue (that's income before taxes, expenses, interest, etc.).

Q. Why so much? My expenses haven't gone up that much since 1974.

A. That's because you don't buy the same things we buy. Since mid 1974 the Consumer Price Index—which measures your cost of living—has gone up 16%. That's bad enough. But at the same time, the quoted price for a common type (25 kva) transformer was rising 26%. A post insulator that was priced at \$45.95 jumped to \$71.64, a rise of almost 56%. And just from 1974 to 1975 our

taxes-paid to federal, state and local governments—went up almost 30%.

Q. Then you're asking for higher rates because

your costs and taxes have gone up...right? A. These are part of the reason, but there's more. We also face heavy expenditures for environ-mental protection. In 1975, we spent over \$100

Then too, we're in what is probably the most thoroughly regulated business in the country. We must deal with, testify before, prepare reports for and get approval from an absolute maze of boards, commissions and agencies at every level

This often leads to complications and delays that add to costs. One example: before we could get going on a new nuclear generator at St. Lucie, we had to go through a complete radiological survey for one level of government that almost exactly duplicated a survey we had gone through for another level of government. We estimate that the delay-more than four months-will end up costing our customers about \$10 million

Please understand that we're all in favor of protecting the environment and of exercising every reasonable precaution in building a power plant. We just want to point out that it all costs

Q. Okay, your costs and expenses are up. But I see you still pay dividends to your stockholders. Why not just cut back there?

A. First let's put the matter of dividends into perspective. Last year we paid our stockholders less than \$72 million in dividends. In one lump, it sounds like a lot of money. But right now you'd have to pay a bit more than \$24 for a share of FPL common stock. After a full year your dividends would come to \$1.56. That's a return of 6-1/2%-with no guarantees. You could buy a certificate of deposit and get a guaranteed 6-1/2% or more. Or, you could put your money in a regular savings account and get 5-1/4%, with both your money and your interest guaranteed. So we're not overpaying our stockholders for the

use of their money to serve you. But that's not the whole picture. If we didn't pay dividends, who would buy FPL stock? We need that stockholder money to build the power plants, transmission lines and other facilities that serve you so reliably.

Q. Why sell stock to raise money? Why not just borrow what you need? A. We do borrow a lot of it. But there's a legal limit on how much we can borrow. Also, the

#### Gerry vander Heuvel Define the role of first lady

Back when the Founding Fathers were struggling to lesign a new democratic government, they were walking a tightrope on the powers and responsibilities of the chief executive. The one position they found no need to define or give official status to - were the responsibilities of the President's wife. They simply assumed that she would oversee the President's house and household, entertain his guests, and take a position in society that would reflect well on him and the country. The role of First Lady evolved within this framework of wifely duties, expanding as the role of women, in general expanded. But from the beginning, the President's wife was established in the minds and hearts of the American people as a person to be set apart, to be accorded affection, respect and admiration. She is and was their substitute for the royal consort. Consequently, she was then and still is an anomaly in a democratic government. She has a high ranking, potentially powerful position, yet it is not an elective office or even an appointed one. It's not even a volunteer service, though that comes close. So does slave labor. Actually, a First Lady is rather like the vestal virgin in ancient Rome. She's exalted on one hand and flogged on the other. It is little wonder that First Ladies, at least some, have approached the role with ambivalent thoughts and emotions. One woman fainted — and not from joy - when informed of the prospect. One stayed upstairs in the family quarters and another simply did not come to Washington. On the other hand, there were those who were the moving forces behind their husband's quest for the presidency. As women became educated and their role outside the home expanded, public expectations changed and First Ladies became involved in activities completely apart from domestic duties. They have lobbied for legislation, supported social causes, taken political stands and campaigned on their own. At the same ime they have continued to carry out their domestic duties. Considering the fact that the role is arbitrarily assigned without regard to age, talent, experience or an FBI check, there have been few outright failures in the job

### **BONUS KILLERS** FOR EX-MILITARY?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate wants to kill a 1 per cent bonus on cost-of-living pension increases for retired federal civil service and military personnel. Under present law in effect since 1969, federal retirees

receive a 4 per cent pension increase whenever the cost of living goes up 3 per cent and remains at that level for three months. The extra 1 per cent was intended to compensate retirees for the time lag in computing cost-ofliving pension increases. But its operation led to a 72 per cent increase in federal

pensions since 1969, compared with a cost-of-living increase of 56 per cent. The elimination of the bonus was approved Wednesday by the Senate by voice vote and sent to a House-Senate conference that is deciding whether federal judges, the

president's Cabinet and top federal executives earning \$37,800 a year or more will get a pay raise of about 4.8 per cent Oct. 1 along with all other federal employes. Both the House and Senate have voted to deny the costof-living raise to legislators. But the House went further to cut off the adjustment this year to the judiciary and top executive branch officials.

Elimination of the 1 per cent kicker on federal employe pensions was proposed by Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C. who said it would save nearly \$200 million in the next fiscal year and \$3.8 billion by 1980. Hollings' proposal was adopted along with a modification by Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla., to replace the quarterly cost-of-living pension adjustments with semi-

The Associated Press revealed in Feburary 1975 that the formula, designed to keep federal pensions in step with inflation, actually propels them increasingly ahead.

The House last month voted 238 to 143 in favor of a bill to end the kicker for civil service retirees, but it failed to pass under a procedure requiring a two-thirds majority.

The board, responding to a heavy turnout of parents from both the Trailwood and Bel-Aire-Weathersfield areas, agreed to restore courtesy busing service for Trailwood children who attend Spring Lake Elementary "We will make every effort to have (the

children) bused by Monday morning," said School Supt. William P. (Bud) Layer. But School Transportation Director Fred Taylor told the board that the county presently is operating with 16 overloaded buses and that the situation must be resolved before another vehicle will be available for

Kathryn Hix, president of the Spring Lake PTA, read a statement to board members on behalf of both groups of parents. She said Trailwood parents were concerned because the school bus had been removed from their neighborhood at the start of the current school year, forcing children to walk to class along "a desolate, one-lane dirt road impassable by bicycles because of heavy sand"


