Florida Officials Begin Task Of Registering 8,000 Students For Classes Today

GAINESVILLE, Sept. 23. (Special)—With applications of admission for more than 8,000 students on file, officials of the University of Florida will begin today the task of registering and assigning sections and classes the largest student body in the history of the state university. Former students register today Tuesday and Wednesday and all first-time students will be registered beginning Thursday and continuing Friday and Saturday classes will meet Sept. 30. Although the majority of the problems of expansion for an unprecedented enrollment had been solved on the eve of the registration period, the housing shortage in Gainesville remained the biggest headache for University officials and students alike. Officials urged that students who have not definite assurance of a place to live defer their college entrance until the second semester. Even over-night rooming scarce, they pointed out. All available on-campus housing has been assigned. Lewis Slack, assistant registrar, emphasized, and the City of Gainesville is filled to capacity. Until additional temporary housing under construction is completed, there will be no more room space for

the first of the year, the school after, he said. Qualified former students, all of whom have been notified and registration permits, will report Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, according to their individual card assignment. They will report to Room 204, Language Hall, and must present their registration permit before they can proceed with registration. First-time students at the University will report Thursday morning, September 20, at 9:00 o'clock, at the University auditorium for orientation and registration. The registration period or them will continue Friday and Saturday morning. Meanwhile at Tallahassee officials at Florida State College for Women were making arrangements to temporarily take care of some of the University's overflow. Students will be assigned to the University of Florida ranch at Tallahassee on a voluntary basis, it was emphasized. More than 2,000 students, all of whom were enrolled in the summer session, registered for classes the latter part of August and the second summer session term ended. No other registrations or applications have been accepted since then.

Employment Service Begins Drive To Obtain Thousands Of Citrus Workers

With the largest and earliest hiring drive in recent years which will require several thousand citrus workers during the current season than last year, the United States Employment Service has started its recruitment drive to supply these workers. The Employment Service is requesting women interested in work in the citrus industry to register for employment at their nearest office. Some plants expect to open early in October and others will register under way as the season progresses. The local United States Employment Service offices who have orders in their files from citrus employers will supply all details concerning the location, types of jobs, wages, living accommodations, and other

desired employment information. While the majority of the increased demand for workers will be for women sectionizers, there will also be an increased demand for peelers and floor workers. Sectionizers remove sections of fruit from peeled oranges, tangerines, and grapefruit with a small knife. Skilled workers can start on a piece-work basis, while unskilled or less skilled personnel begin on an hourly scale and change to piece-work basis as they become skilled. Near Record Milk Supply Available For County Diets

Seminole County residents will consume more than 5,376,000 quarts of milk and milk products this year in maintaining the County's high nutritional standards, it was predicted today by the nation's leading distributor of dairy products. "With a near record supply of milk coming from the nation's dairy farms, consumption of dairy products this year is expected to equal that of 1945 when more than 60,000,000 quarts were consumed," said G. W. Diehl, head of A. & P. Food Stores national dairy department. "A 22 percent increase in per capita consumption of milk during the war years helped overcome the loss of nutrition caused by curtailed supplies of fats and oils and helped bring about the nation's high nutritional wartime levels." A greatly increased supply of most cheese products is now available in many sections of the country and other milk products are expected to continue plentiful during the fall and winter months, Diehl said. These products contain nearly 14 percent of the calories, 24 percent of the proteins, 19 percent of the fats, 74 percent of the calcium and 45 percent of the riboflavin consumed by the average individual. The pioneering efforts of food chains in developing a streamlined distribution system, Diehl said, have made possible the quick movement of milk and milk products from dairy centers of densely populated consumer areas. Modern refrigeration equipment and improved handling methods were also cited as instrumental in maintaining the high nutritional qualities of dairy products. Seminole County's 700 farms are expected to produce more than 1,000,000 quarts of milk this year.



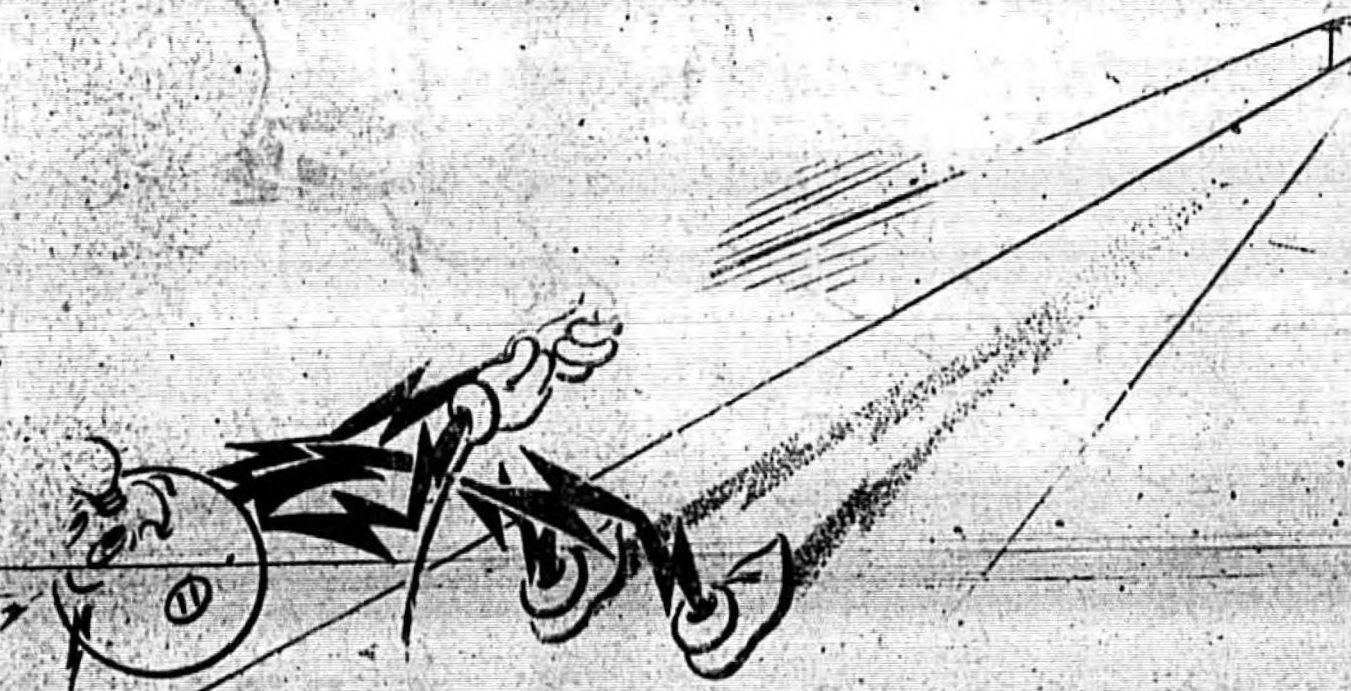

Cattlemen Are Unable To Supply Local Markets

Continued from page 5. The supply of beef from the large packers are extremely limited, and pork and bacon is conspicuous by its absence. One local downtown store today got a small shipment of beef and pork from Kentucky, which they stated, would be gone by noon. Supplies of chicken, turkey and fish remain adequate. Some local meat men pointed out that with cattle on the hoof bringing as high as 16 cents a pound on the hoof at Kissimmee auctions, it is cheaper to buy live weight, than to slaughter for local use to sell under ceiling prices. Also they stated that many cattle growers refrain from slaughtering because they cannot understand the many OPA rules and regulations. "If stock men in the state of Florida cannot dispose of their cattle by the time the waters come up and cover grasses in pastures, the cattle will get poor and there is danger that thousands of cattle will die during the cold winter months," said John Leonard, local attorney and former cattle raiser. "It is very essential for stock men to dispose of beef cattle from April to the middle of October, but quotas have bottlenecked outlets, and the result is a large surplus of cattle which should be disposed of," he added. R. T. Hunt, Sanford Avenue feed merchant, predicted that under OPA ceilings there would be the same shortage of feed as before, when ceilings were in effect. He added that feed men did not even now know what ceilings were in effect on feed, nor were they able to secure this information from OPA officials. During the last shortage of feed, when ceilings were in effect, there were the highest prices in feed in 20 years, he declared. "As soon as the ceiling went off, the supply of feed began to pour in at lower prices. If we continue to operate under a ceiling, we are headed for the same shortage of feed as before, which will make poultry and eggs almost impossible to get."
