





County Eyes Own Suit On Courthouse Space

County Commission Chairman Dick Williams indicated today Seminole County will file a countersuit if the state attorney's office should decide to drop its lawsuit for additional space at the courthouse in Sanford.

Commissioners on Tuesday voted to give state attorney prosecutors an additional 1,300 square feet of office space to alleviate overcrawding at the

Chief Asst. State Atty. Jerrold Bross said morning the additional space is "going to help." Bross, however, said the commission's action did not solve the problem. "Right now I understand how a sardine feels." Bross said.

Williams' statement was in reply to an assistant state attorney who said the commission action might cause the state attorney's office to reconsider the lawsuit asking for twice the space the state attorney's office occupies.

Bross declined comment on pending litigation. legally obligated to provide the state attorney office legal staff.

"The question has been raised," Williams said. "We're ready to see it through to a conclusion." Williams said the Seminole ruling will be a landmark decision because it will affect state attorneys across Florida. The state attorney contends commissioners must provide office space in the cour-

Carter Persuades Panel

To Rescind SS Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) - At the urging of the Carter administration, the Senate Finance Committee abruptly reversed itself today and voted against raising Social Security taxes

"We have no business assuming we are going to raise Social Security taxes if the administration is advocating against it," Sen. Russell B. Long, chairman of the Finance Committee, told his colleagues.

He asked the committee to rescind action taken Tuesday that indicated support for higher payroll taxes. The committee agreed

Long said Joseph Califano, secretary of health, education and welfare, had called earlier today expressing concern that higher Social Security taxes would thwart the economic stimulus purposes of the income tax cut proposed by Carter and apparently supported by a majority of Congress.

Fail To Find 9 in Mine

TOWER CITY, Pa. (AP) - Rescuers dredged through splintered timbers and muddy debris today trying to reach nine miners trapped in a flooded-out mine and given little chance of survival.

One miner died and three were injured when a three-foot-high wall of water surged through a tunnel wall at midday Tuesday. Despite repeated attempts through the

night, rescuers working in teams of five could come no closer than a few hundred feet from where the miners were thought to be. There was no sign of life from within the flooded Porter Tunnel of the Kocher Coal Co. mine in Schuylkill County near here, rescuers said. The mile-long tunnel is under a 400-foot

Lamed By Golf, Ford In Vail

VAIL, Colo. (AP) - "I've been swinging the golf clubs too hard," said former President Gerald Ford as he arrived here for a spring ski vacation hampered by back problems. Ford and his wife, Betty, will stay at the same house they used when Ford was president, but the street leading to it will not be blocked by the Secret Service as it had been

The former president said he has been having back problems and has a slight cold. One member of the party said he doubted Ford would ski before Thursday.

Ford told reporters he expects to sign a contract to write a book and also plans to visit six college campuses each year for lectures.

Carter Pleases Governors

WASHINGTON (AP) - They're usually forgotten shortly after they leave town, but the nation's governors are convinced it will be different this time, now that President Carter and the leaders of Congress have assured them a hearing in advance of federal decisions that affect their states. Carter underscored his promise Tuesday night at a black tie dinner for the governors, saying he considers them his partners in government.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Two state scientists will be sent on a \$15,478, eight-week junket to Russia and six European countries to get a closer look at white amur fish. The trip, approved unanimously by the Cabinet, is to be taken this spring by Woodard Miley, a Department of Natural Resources (DNR) biologist, and David Sutton, a

University of Florida agronomist. They are to discuss the white amur with Russian and European scientists and observe use of the controverial fish in projects to control water weeds.

Anita To Keep Citrus Job

LAKELAND (AP) - Anita Bryant's stand against equal rights for gays may have cost her a television series, but citrus officials say it won't affect her \$100 000 a ser job promoting Florida orange juice.

"It's quite obvious we have no right to control her private life," says Dan Richardson of Vero Beach, chairman of the Florida Citrus

Miss Bryant is heading a fight against equal recognition under the law for homosexuals in Dade County. She contends that the law creates an unhealthy atmosphere in which to raise children.

Soon after he became President, Mr. Carter emphasized that he would concentrate on domestic problems as much as possible in his first year in office. True to his word, the President is staying close to his plan, but his administration's foreign policy activity is nevertheless astounding.

The President himself has met with President Lopez Portillo of Mexico. He has held discussions with Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau of Canada. His emissaries, Sol Linowitz and Ellsworth Bunker are negotiating a new Panama Canal treaty in Panama. Cyrus Vance visited Europe and the capitals of the Middle East. Clark Clifford went to Cyprus. Vice President Walter Londale has coverto the world, U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young is back from Africa, Strategic Arms Limitation Talks contacts are in progress and the President already is planning to open discussions with Vietnam and Cuba.

That's an ambitious spate of activity in a single month, and on the whole it seems to be serving Mr. Carter's purposes well. Sooner or later the information acquired by his diplomats will land on Mr. Carter's desk in the Oval Office. But in the meantime, he will have an opportunity to become better acquainted with the nuances of foreign policy even as he sets his domestic programs in

This all assumes that his representatives don't rock the boat. For the most part that does not seem to be the case. The diplomats are seasoned hands who understand the value of tact and the implications of diplomacy. And they are dealing with statesmen of equal experience who know that Mr. Carter is proceeding deliberately until he gains

The possible exception is Africa, which certainly is one of the most sensitive and combustible areas of the world. The expectations of black people who have been long deprived of civil rights and economic benefits can be raised quickly.

Whether expectations were elevated by the status given Young before his visit, or his words after he returned, remains to be seen. Before Young left, President Carter said that his status would be "equal to that of secretary of state . . On his return Young said that he had laid the foundation for "dynamic new initiatives."

Those initiatives might be hard to deliver, considering the intransigence of Rhodesia and South Africa and the general economic plight of the

And the base for a continuing U.S. initiative in Africa already exists, laid down by former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger last May during meetings in Dakar and Nairobi.

Testimony StoreRobber

An 18-year-old Sanford youth has been found guilty of robbery and attempted robbery by a circuit court jury who heard testimony from a juvenile co-defendant who said he and the defendant waited outside while two other juveniles committed the offenses using a shotgun. The jury returned verdicts of guilty for Johnny Lee Grubbs, 18.

Circuit Judge Robert B. McGregor ordered Grubbs held in jail during a pre-sentence investigation and set sentencing for April

ted Grubos and three juveniles, ages and 17, on Jan. 20 a short time after two youths tried to hold up a clerk at the 7-Eleven store at Park Avenue and 12th Street about 2 a.m. and robbed a customer at the store.

Police said they found Grubbs hiding under a building about six blocks from the robbery scene; the three juveniles were apprehended in a nearby wooded area. Officers, alerted to the robbery, said they saw a group of boys

run across U.S. 17-92 into the wooded area. The key state witness against Grubbs was the 13-year-old, who

The juvenile told the jury that the quartet had talked earlier in the evening "about a robbery" after one of the juveniles produced the double-barrel shotgun and two shells. The juvenile said Grubbs said he wanted some money "to get

him a car." The 14-year-old said the group sat in an auto drinking beer and started to rob an all-night cafe on West 13th Street, but decided against it - "because the folks there knew us." A second robbery attempt, at a drive-in food store at French Avenue and 20th Street, was called off when the youths spotted a

police car and decided to buy lollipops instead, the juvenile Then they walked in sub-freezing temperatures to the store at Park and 12th where the 15 and 17-year-olds went in with the shotgun. The woman clerk refused to open the cash drawer, so

they robbed customer Ralph Dukes of his wallet containing \$14. according to the juvenile. The 14-year-old said he and Grubbs were waiting outside and

Grubbs told him "to tell 'em to hurry up." The juvenile said he ran up to the store's door and shouted, "Hurry up!" and the other juveniles then joined in flight on foot.

In other circuit court actions, another jury in Judge McGregor's court this week acquitted Howard Lee Brooks, 21, of Sanford, on a burglary charge in connection with a break-in by several juveniles at the Williams Fish Market, 13th Street and Southwest

Thursday at Stetson University in DeLand. A quick straw vote of the eight coaches in the tourney gave Daly six first place votes, and accumulating 48 points on a 7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis with each coach not voting for his own team. Seminole, with the best record in the tournament, was

the No. 2 vote-getter, 38. Miami-Dade South was third with 34. followed by Dade North with 33, Gulf Coast with 28, Brevard with 22, Florida College with 11 and Florida JC

Gulf Coast and Dade South were the other first-place Daly has been favored before. In tournaments at

Palm Beach and Lake City he lost to Brevard each time in the first round. And in his only other tourney appearance, Polk wiped him out also in the first round. Noteworthy is that Pensacola is nationally ranked every

year and plays a national-type schedule. This year's team is ranked No. 6 nationally, went 25-4 losing only to Gulf Coast twice and Vincennes, Ind. twice. "This is the best club I have ever had," says Daly, "but don't know if we can win. My team really scares me,





Radio and television licenses must be renewed every three years and the court noted that the FCC "is to grant renewal only if it finds it is the public interest to do so." 

Sales Tax Hike, Record Budget

Reubin Askew called today for a \$330 million sales tax increase as he unveiled his record \$5.53 billion 1977-78 state budget. The proposed increase would boost the state sales tax by one cent on the dollar.

Askew outlined a sweeping tax increase and adjustment proposal which would hike state revenues by \$298.7 million. Included in the proposal was Askew's call for \$49.3 million in increased beer, wine and liquor taxes and \$7 million in new taxes on cigars, pipe tobacco and other non-cigarette tobacco products.

However, Askew called for \$82.7 million in tax relief. He recommended \$32.7 million in relief by exempting from the municipa hours of electricity consumed in a

Askew also recommended \$50 million in property tax relief for low income homeowners and renters by limiting property tax payments to a percentage of the individuals's in-"After much deliberation and a

careful weighing of the alternatives, I have concluded that the best way increase the sales tax rate from four net tax increase of \$298.7 million.

The governor reminded Floridians that tourists pay 15 to 20 per cent of all sales taxes collected in the state. He said Floridians currently have the third lowest state and local tax rate in the nation.
