Nixon Joust With Inflation

By RAY CROMLEY Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA)—It would be easy for President Nixon to throw up his hands on inflation.

Most controls Nixon has at hand—such as higher interest rates and the surtax—will penalize industries which have added little to inflation. These controls will have marginal effect in those fields where inflation has grown out of all reason.

The world will add to Nixon's problems. In Europe, Latin America and Asia the outlook is for continued political and economic cranking. Private and government economic forecasters here see 1969 as unsetting as 1968.

Trade and investment, vital to prosperity these past 30 years are being restricted to meet short-term problems. The United States itself now controls foreign investment and imports by law, regulation or "voluntary" agreements. Demands grow for added import quotas.

Britain's attempts to solve the sterling crisis have been disappointing. The late-1967 devaluation failed. Continued inflation keeps import demands high. London finds it difficult to hold wage increases in line with productivity.

1970s: Negro Opportunities

By BRUCE BERRY Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA)—Manpower goals projected as reasonable for the 1970s by the National Planning Association suggest that hundreds of thousands of technical and professional jobs beckon young black Americans.

In a study drawn together by NPA specialist Leonard Lecht, it is estimated that 300,000 non-white engineers and scientists would be required by 1975 if their representation in these fields is to match their expected 21 per cent proportion of total civilian employment.

Since blacks presently are badly underrepresented in these fields, Lecht figures that the gain between now and 1975 would have to be in the range of 200,000 in 1968, nowrites made up just three per cent of total employment in engineering and science.

NPA projections suggest further that by 1975 there will be needed for 140,000 more secondary school teachers, 60,000 professional nurses, 25,000 practical nurses, 10,000 health service occupations—including 200,000 black attendants.

The worst black and other service occupations are in plain sight in these areas, including medicine, where long and costly higher education is a condition of entry.

Obviously, poor early schooling condition, lack of financing, and discrimination both in professional schools and in professional practices have all played a part in this under-representation.

In the book, "This U.S.A." by Ben Watersberg and former census director Richard Scammon, the authors estimate that if Negroes today had the same proportion of the total U.S. population as whites in the 1970s and thereafter, they are a dangerous deception and a frightful waste of emotional and mental energies.

The cry for "black studies," coupled with demands that only black teachers instruct in this field and students themselves choose their teachers, fit indeed into a gravely unreal notion of black apartheid.

The logical end of the black separatism loosely preached in this country by black nationalists and others is a wholesale physical separation which would make South Africa's massive segregation and the Nazis' huge shuffling of Jews look like Boy Scout troop movements.
