

They asked him about burial places for dogs-they didn't want the body carried out to the dump. The dog pound had been closed, and there was no other place they knew of.

A bystander checked around and found that the minister of a nearby church would allow the animal to be buried on the church grounds. The deputy, using the bystander's car, carried the dog out for the impromptu funeral and interment.

The dag was laid to rest in a rose garden, and the leputy returned to the sheriff's office to dry out the shoulder of his shirt where all the women had wept.
