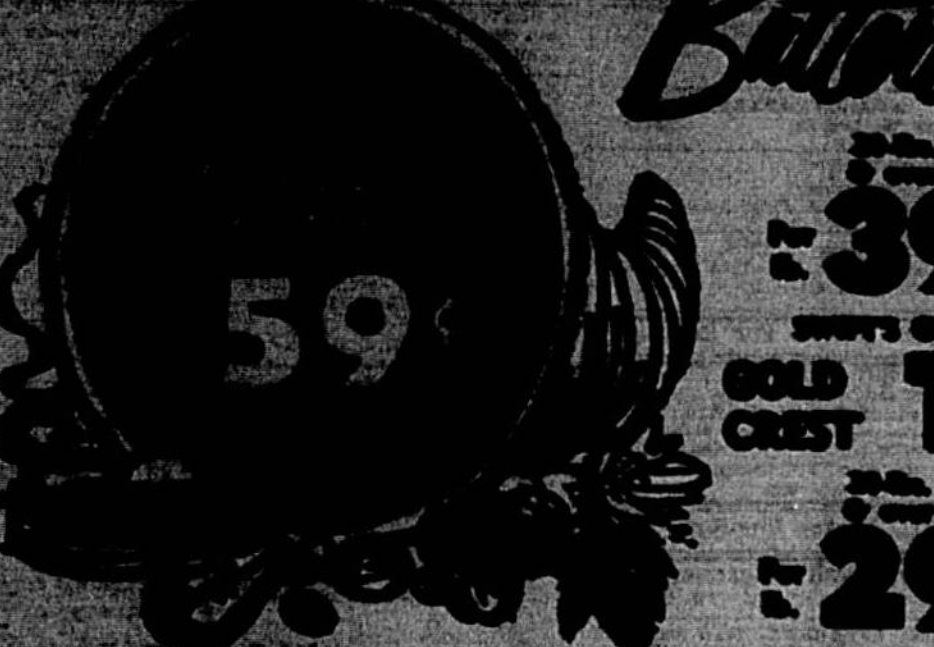

**Four More Arrested In Raids**

Four more persons were arrested in raids last night on eight warrants as the Sheriff's office continued to crackdown on illegal beverage and bottle operations in the county.

All four were from the Orlando area. Last Friday and Saturday some 14 warrants were issued on the same charges.

Again, Sheriff Peter Millott declined to disclose the names of those arrested.

Bonds for the four were set at from \$500 to \$2,500.

Millott did say that more arrests were expected this week. Altogether some 33 warrants for illegal beverage selling and bottle operations have been written, the Herald has learned. Thus far some 22 have been served.

**Appeal Due By Robbin On Court Job**

Norman Robbin of Lake Mary will file an appeal with either the 1st District Court of Appeals in Vero Beach or the Florida Supreme Court to gain the office of county reporter of the 18th Judicial Circuit before Dec. 3.

The Herald learned today that Robbin will not end up in the hands of either the 1st or the 2nd District Court of Appeals.

A two month battle between the five judges and the governor has ensued following Robbin's appointment on Oct. 3. At that time the judges declared the appointment "null, void, and of no effect" since it did not comply with the law which declares the governor must appoint the person as court reporter recommended by the judges.

**Fire Damages Rail Car Area Home Heavy Hit**

Fire damaged a neighborhood rail car loaded with fuel parked at William Chapman Packard's home in Orlando Monday afternoon when an explosion occurred at approximately the same time, another fire at the home of Bill Howard, 829 Wynn's Road, near Seminole, resulted in an estimated \$2,500 damages to a bedroom and interior of the house.

**Largen Gets Official Word As Hospital Trustee**

Formal appointment as a trustee of Seminole Memorial Hospital was needed today by Dr. Thomas L. Largen, Sanford surgeon, from Gov. Claude Kirk.

Dr. Largen, a Republican, will take his seat on the hospital board at its Dec. 12 meeting, succeeding A. B. Peterson Sr., a Democrat, who refused to switch party affiliation for reappointment.

Dr. Largen today issued the following statement: "It is with deep felt humility and responsibility that I accept the appointment as a member of the Board of Trustees of Seminole Memorial Hospital by Governor Kirk.

"We citizens of Seminole County have reason to be excited," he said.

**Port Land Hearing On**

Circuit Judge Tom Waddell this afternoon was hearing an application of the Seminole County Port Authority for approval of an "order of taking" to acquire use of needed land for the Port of Sanford prior to formal condemnation proceedings.

Port Attorney Gordon Frederick said earlier it was expected the court would approve the order, permitting the Authority to use the land for building purposes, pending acquisition of title through the condemnation suit.

Judge Waddell was expected to fix a date required of the Authority at 100 per cent of the appraisal of the needed land.

**Okay For Auto Inspections**

Seminole County will be going into the auto inspection business, a survey of the County Commissioners this afternoon by the Herald revealed.

It was agreed to provide emergency maintenance on Ponce de Leon Avenue, Woodland Avenue and five intersections in Seminole Heights.

No action was taken on the speed limit directive proposed by County Engineer William Delle stated his opinion that the county could do a better job of inspecting than most of the checkpoints in the business.

The Board in continued session later this afternoon is expected to approve the project to keep the control local. In the event the county had not taken over the inspections, they would be handled by the state.

It is expected the county will realize approximately \$65,000 the first year in profits through the inspections.

Hospital administrator Robert Bessner is meeting with the County Commission this afternoon on plans for the storage building and making space for the portable hospital.

"Wild, uncontrolled franchising" of utility companies was hit by County Commissioner Lawrence Swafford at the meeting.

The remarks were made when the Commission on the subject of utility companies was presented by County Commissioner Charles Woodruff.

"I'm not sure we're going to have a problem with utility companies," Swafford said. "In effect the county is 'protecting' developers and big shots with wild franchising without controls. It's time we did something to protect the people," he said while pointing out that he had nothing against this particular utility company.

It was agreed to place consideration of regulating utilities on the Dec. 5 agenda. The Board has discussed taking over regulating of utilities many times in the past and Florida Public Service Commission has determined it has no authority to regulate the utilities in Seminole County.

**Councilman Charged With Interest Conflict**

Charges of "conflict of interest" were again hurled at Casselberry Councilman Donald Wilton by Gerald Warren of the city's Planning Board at the meeting of the City Council Monday afternoon.

Following verbal opposition by Wilton to a lengthy subdivision ordinance being considered, Warren asked "the esteemed councilman to refrain from voting on the matter."

"Wilton works for a developer—Casselberry Land Company and wants to lobby the ordinance in the hopes of having another employee of Casselberry and Company on the Council to vote with him" after the election, Warren declared.

Wilton, however, described the proposed ordinance as voluminous and old-fashioned and that "it tends to help subdividers out" and "places a discriminatory tax on builders."

The councilman denied any conflict of interest in the matter. "My employer has not even discussed the ordinance with me," he said while pointing out that he presently does not own any property suitable for subdividing.

The ordinance which places particular restrictions on development in unincorporated areas was recommended by the Planning Board and adopted by the Council on its second reading with Wilton voting "no" (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 7)

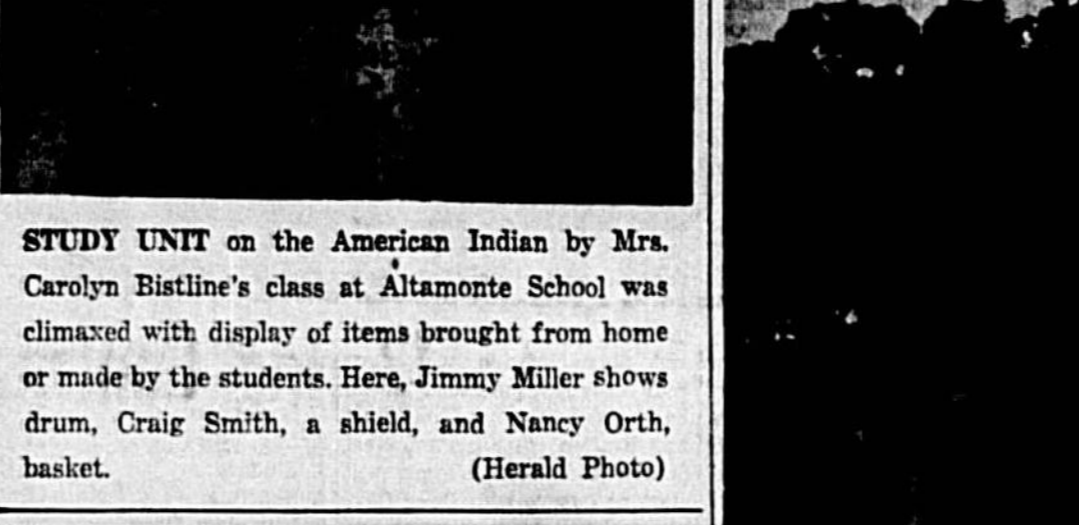
