

Yank's Vintage Auto Makes Europeans Blink

PARIS (UPI) — The long, low English sports car rumbled up alongside the towering, 54-year-old American roadster chuffing up the road towards Paris.

When the driver of the Jaguar had finished his amused inspection of the ancient auto he floored it and zoomed ahead.

Seconds later, glancing back in his rear view mirror, the sports car driver blinked with disbelief — not on his tail was a little man gunning the 1900 Chalmers Detroit with pedal to spare.

"Past 90 miles an hour I couldn't keep up with him," the Chalmers pilot admitted. For 65-year-old Fred Haller of (1132 Lohigh Rd.) Pittsburgh, Pa., the Chalmers is an international calling card. The retired auto dealer spent three years reconditioning his green roadster.

The Jaguar driver was just one of thousands of Europeans who were shaken with disbelief as the sturdy, but delicate-looking antique car, originally designed for a 35 mph top speed whizzed by. Haller was winding up his two-month, 5,000-mile tour of Europe here and getting ready to load his bizarre conversation piece aboard the liner "France." Everywhere he stopped, admiring and friendly crowds gathered. During his trip through Italy, England, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, The Netherlands and France, Haller has collected rally prizes and motor buff friends.

In Paris, Haller weaved the Chalmers gracefully through vicious rush hour traffic snarls at the Place de L'Étoile and Place de la Concorde. As a respect for age, cars everywhere gave him the right of way and policemen waved him through where other cars were halted.

Haller showed his rebuilt engine to a pair of French motorcycle cops, trying to tell them he could pass up most small and medium sized European models. They didn't believe him but, for a lark, they clocked him — at 88.9 miles per hour.

To any and all interested car fans Haller tells how he personally rebuilt the original engine and added goodies such as dual carburetors and hot ignition and reworked the suspension and all moving parts to make the awkward-looking, brass-trimmed roadster handle like a compact car.

For the Pittsburgh car-lover, the cities of Europe were secondary. Getting there was more than half the fun.

Nikita Reported Due In Havana Today

Work Rules Off Again

'Important' Visitor Expected

HAVANA (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev may arrive in Havana today to take part in Friday's mass observance of the 10th anniversary of the abortive Santiago revolt, it was reported here.

Rumors of Khrushchev's possible arrival have been circulating for weeks. Speculation was heightened when a number of cabinet ministers canceled today's appointments, saying "we must be at the airport to receive an important personage."

Some observers considered it significant that a fueling stop was arranged recently in Guinea for Soviet airliners plying between Russia and Cuba, possibly to decrease the risk of a Khrushchev trip. Planes flying non-stop often arrive with only 15 to 20 minutes' fuel remaining in their tanks.

Premier Fidel Castro arrived in Russia this year in time to take part in the annual Moscow May Day observance. His departure from Cuba was not announced until he had returned to Cuba and his return trip was equally secret, ostensibly because he feared a U. S. attack.

It was announced while Castro was in Russia that Khrushchev would visit Cuba this year.

The Castro regime is commandeering 7,500 taxis to help bring provincial residents into Havana for the mass demonstration commemorating the 1953 attack on Santiago's Moncada barracks.

Most of the taxis will operate in the greater Havana area, but 200 will shuttle between Havana and Pinar Del Rio to the west while 200 will run between Matanzas and the national capital.

Castro's revolutionary defense committees proclaimed a "72-hour general mobilization" Wednesday, dedicated to adorning buildings with flags and banners and staging street parades to promote the Friday rally.

The Santiago uprising is regarded as the start of Castro's revolution. The date of the uprising attack gave his "July 26 movement" its name.

A 7-stamp commemorative series issued by the communications ministry this week under the general title "A decade of revolution" includes stamps bearing important dates in Castro's rise to power.

In an atmosphere of utmost congeniality at the Navy reception for the visiting Australian airman last night, hosts "To The Queen," "To The President," "To The Australian Air Force," "To The Navy" added a more serious note to the occasion.

'Coexistence' Line' Is Trap, Nixon Warns

BERLIN (UPI) — Richard M. Nixon today warned against accepting Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's "coexistence line" which he said would perpetuate Communist domination of peoples who want to be free.

He told a news conference following visits to Red-run East Berlin that it is "the most woolly type of thinking" to believe that Soviet acceptance of a partial test ban means the Russians want to relax tension.

He said the Communists, instead of trying to end the cold war, have stepped it up in Latin America, Europe, Africa and Asia.

Nixon said in all negotiations with Khrushchev, the United States should insist on freedom for the peoples on whom Communist dictatorships have been imposed against their will.

"Some say Khrushchev is beginning to end the cold war. The contrary is true. The iron curtain in Berlin is tighter than ever before."

"In Budapest there is a little 'less' repression, but there is more now in Warsaw. The Communists are stepping up the cold war. They are expanding on all fronts. In Latin America now we have the greatest danger from communism that ever existed there."

Registration Urged By Health
Casselberry Mayor Fred Heath today strongly urged eligible voters in the municipality to fill out and return the voter registration cards now in the mails.

Some 1,200 cards have been sent out by Clerk Lillian Heath, who reports that to date only 200 cards have been returned.

Deadline, if the voter is to vote in the Sept. 6 special referendum on the new town charter, is Aug. 5.

In his statement, Heath stressed the need for bringing the registration books up to date and the responsibility each voter has in helping establish a modern form of government as well as assisting in "promoting the best methods for assuring future development of a growing community like ours."

Five Sentenced In Rights Case

NEW YORK (UPI) — Five civil rights demonstrators, recommended by a tough-talking judge for their lack of remorse, will spend 90 to 180 days in the city workhouse for taking "the law into their own hands."

Chief Court Judge T. Vincent Quinn ignored a lawyer's plea for suspended sentences Wednesday when, in response to the judge's question, the five white defendants refused to promise they could not repeat the actions that led to their arrest.

The sentences, on charges of disorderly conduct, were the first to be imposed in the current wave of arrests at city construction sites where civil rights groups have been demonstrating against alleged job discrimination.

Two of the defendants, Mrs. Rita Delaney, 21, a housewife, and Harold Keister, 37, a single worker, were sentenced to 90 days in the workhouse after they pleaded guilty to the charges.

The other three — Mrs. Delaney's husband, Michael, 2, public relations man Samuel H. Friedman, 66, and Lisa Henry, a 29-year-old actress, pleaded innocent and were shipped with 60-day sentences.

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Gov. Wallace Blasts 'Monster Central Rule'

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace Wednesday denounced the civil rights legislation now before Congress and charged that the Kennedy administration has established a "monster central government."

Speaking to a luncheon meeting of the Miami area Kiwanis Clubs in Miami, Wallace voiced particular concern over the public accommodations bill.

If it should become law, he said, no one engaged in public services will be able to operate "without fear that the police state which is now drastically rearing its head, will dictate his every move and tell him exactly how he can run his business."

Wallace, who took time out from the final day of the National Governors' Conference meeting in Miami Beach to make the address, said "the next logical step" will be land reform.

If the "social theorists" become empowered to decide how individuals may use their land, he said, "we will be but a step away from living in a land where the government controls the right to own land."

"Our forefathers didn't found the nation to make it a people servants of a monster central government," he said.

Wallace reiterated his charges, made at the Governors' Conference Tuesday, that President Kennedy's action in Federalizing National Guard troops in Alabama violated the U. S. Constitution.

"I see a trend toward military dictatorship," he said, "and if it continues, then this nation may have passed its peak as the world's greatest free nation and be on the way to oblivion and slavery."

He told Kiwanis members that this was the first Governors' Conference he has attended.

"I didn't realize it was, to a large extent, a social affair and a civil rights debating society," he remarked.

Increased State Budget In '65 Seen By Senator Ed Frazier

Senator Edwin G. Frazier, of McClenny, who calls himself "the father of the sales tax plans," warned Kiwanians Wednesday that in spite of the more than \$1 billion state budget for the next fiscal year, the 1965 Legislature would have to find \$2 million more for state needs.

"I remember when our state budget was \$3 million dollars," said Senator Frazier, who first went to the State Legislature when he was 21 years old as a representative from District 29 (Baker and Clay counties).

"But now the population of this great state has grown from a quarter million to over five million people. We have to yield to progress, the population is growing tremendously every week, every day," the Senator said.

He cited changes in the state's penal and mental institutions, in the increased excellence of the educational system, and in Florida's rise from "an infant state to a

place of prominence in the national scene."

Senator Frazier defended his support of the sales tax plan as being "a tax on all the people, fair and reasonable."

"We have already gone too far in ad valorem assessments," he declared.

"The sales tax is a tax, not on what you earn, nor on what you save, but only on what you spend," he said.

Senator Frazier is a veteran of 19 years in the Legislature and one of the youngest men ever to be elected to a state office.

Former Senator Douglas Stenstrom, in introducing Senator Frazier, noted that twice Frazier had offered to give up his seat in the Senate if it would solve the reapportionment problem.

Senator Frazier, who in private life is a nurseryman, is a past president of the Florida Nurserymen's Association and the Southern Nurserymen's Association. He is also

a member of the McClenny City Commission.

Twister Batters Boats, Camps In Pensacola Area

PENSACOLA (UPI) — A tornado roared along the intracoastal waterway Wednesday, tore up fishing camps and then shot out across the water to flip fishermen from a boat into the water.

The twister toppled one boatload of five fishermen into the churning water, authorities said, and two other fishermen leaped from another boat before the tornado struck. All were rescued.

The Escambia County sheriff's department said at least 14 boats were overturned by the winds. Many fishermen were not before the storm hit but all except the two boats made shore before the twister tore into the waterway area.

No serious injuries were reported and damage to property was reported as "minimal."

GOP Governors Effect Unity At Conference

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Republican governors have emerged from the national governors' conference with a new show of unity but braced for a party-riding contest over the 1964 presidential nomination.

From the start of the conference Sunday until adjournment Wednesday, the Republicans kept the sizable Democratic majority on the defense on the civil rights issue—an issue barred by gentlemen's agreement until two years ago from the annual meeting of state executives.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York led the GOP assault against the Democrats on that issue this week and convinced all Republicans and Democrats here that he is already an active candidate for the 1964 presidential nomination.

On all the key notes, the Republicans gave an unusual display of unity. Rockefeller and his allies were joined by GOP governors unfriendly toward him and leaning toward Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona for the presidential nomination.

The unity drive began Sunday when GOP National Chairman William E. Miller met with the Republicans present to organize a party caucus. The caucus then met daily with Gov. Mark Hatfield of Oregon as temporary chairman.

The more formal-sounding "Republican Governors' Association" was set up Wednesday with Gov. Robert E. Smylie of Idaho, now in his third four-year term, as chairman.

It was announced that the new association would meet periodically "for the purpose of establishing concerted action" with GOP congressional leaders and the Republican National Committee.

35-Foot Spit Wins Contest

RALEIGH, N. C. (UPI) — Wally Ausley, a local boy, spat a watermelon seed 35 feet and six inches Wednesday.

The unheralded Ausley's remarkable performance astounded the crowd, shamed his competitors, and broke the watermelon festival record.

The old champion, John Alexander, once spat a watermelon seed 34 feet. His best effort Wednesday was 29 feet, but it appeared that would do.

Then Ausley stepped to the foul line, bit off a hunk of watermelon and carefully selected a likely seed with his tongue. He held the seed between his teeth, waiting air around it to dry it off.

Then he lean his 200-pound frame forward, squinted and loosed a mighty spit that brought gasps of wonder from the crowd.

PARIS (UPI)—The House of Christian Dior's designer, Marc Bohan, promised "there will be no radical changes" today when Dior's fall-winter collection is presented.
Fashion reporters and buyers who have flooded Paris for fashion week were analyzing that statement in various ways. Some decided it meant some small changes were on tap, including a small downward slide of the hemline.
But the consensus among informed observers before the show began was that Dior would not drop skirt lengths. This would mean that ladies could still show their legs safely. By some curious law in the fashion world, store buyers around the world copy a major change only if it comes from Dior, Givenchy or Halston.

The tall boots showed up again Wednesday in the collection of Michel Guma, the first he has made for the House of Jean Patou. The model wore them with an unusual camel's hair coat with panels slit to the waist that swished when she walked.

Less Bug Poison Found On Foods

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Pesticide residue on Florida foods is on the decrease, according to Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner.
Conner said yesterday that checks had turned up only 86 violations this season, compared to 179 in 1961-62.
Most were found in leafy vegetables, such as collards, endives and celery, he said.
But he added: "We encountered several new problems which resulted in cancellation of pesticide registrations of adults for potatoes, peanuts and carrots."
The 1963 Legislature amended the state law to include pesticide residues and food additives in excessive or unauthorized quantities as adulterants of food products. Conner said he is compiling regulations to implement the law.

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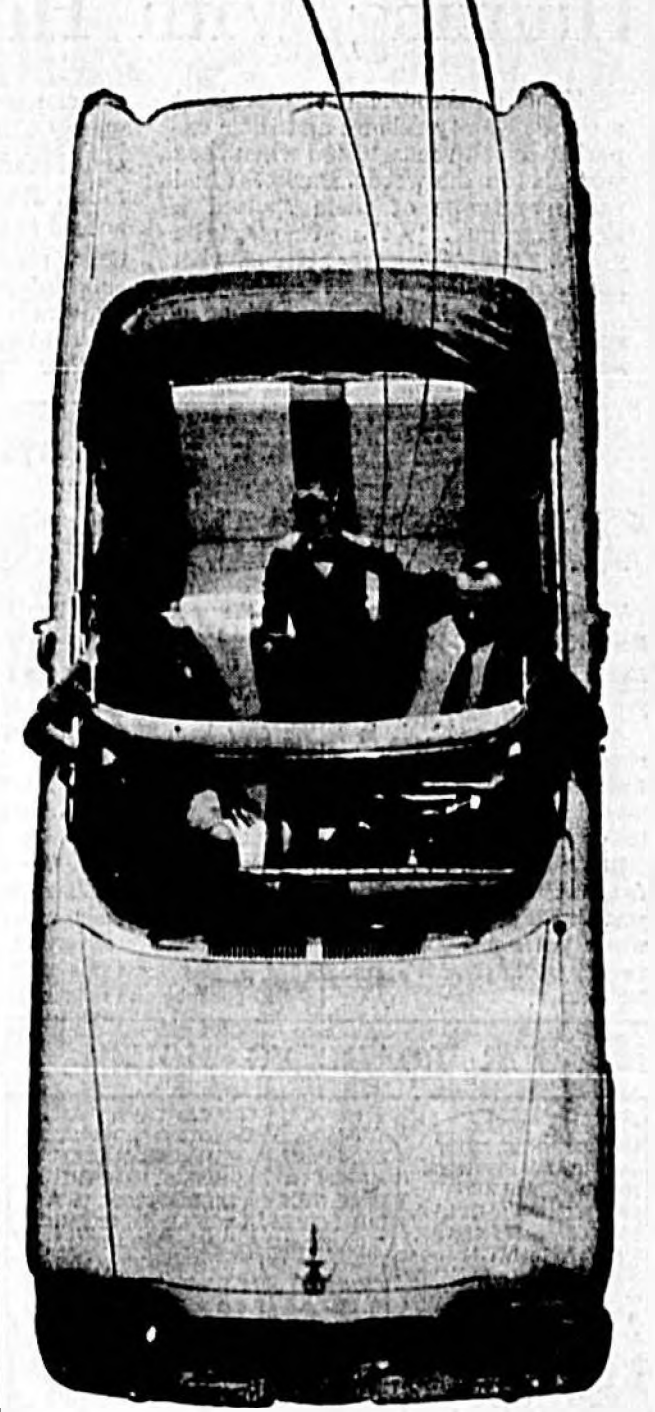
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Crime, FBI, And Courts

We have grown so accustomed to annual increases in crime rates that it comes as a mild surprise to learn from the FBI that in 1962 murders showed a 2 per cent decline in number from the previous year.

There seems to be no profound explanation other than the fact that police work in this field is extraordinarily good.

The FBI, in its annual report, says that over the nation the police cleared up 98 per cent of willful killings in 1962. These include both murder and so-called non-negligent manslaughter.

Unhappily, that does not indicate a 98 per cent rate of conviction. Of those cases disposed of by the courts last year, about half resulted in dismissal, acquittal or reduction of the charge.

Often it is complained that the courts themselves, through the action of either judges or jury, are guilty of incredible softness toward the perpetrators of crime—serious and minor.

The FBI makes no such complaint, whatever it may feel on this score. As a matter of fact, intelligent studies of court performance are sadly lacking. Judges and jury act from a wide variety of motives, only one of which may be an inclination to "make it easy" on the defendant.

The FBI does note that other factors, too, help explain why a big disparity may exist between the number of arrests and the number of convictions.

Sometimes the police discover they were wrong, and there is no formal charge. When young persons are involved, special local or state laws may dictate leniency. Sometimes, despite police "clearance" of a case, the evidence proves sufficient for an indictment. And though this could hardly apply in a murder case, the victim of a crime often refuses to co-operate in prosecution of the alleged offender.

So it is not a simple matter of the police doing a great job in some fields and the courts not doing so.

Nevertheless, it is most interesting to note that only half of the "willful killings" cases which reach the courts results in conviction on the original charges of murder or non-negligent manslaughter.

The FBI points out that not only in the matter of killing but in other crimes against the person such as rape and aggravated assault, dismissal, acquittal or charge reduction is more common than for crimes against property.

This seems to indicate a considerable reluctance on the part of the courts to act harshly or too swiftly in areas where the penalties may be severe — even unto capital punishment.

A tendency exists in some quarters to depict the courts as agencies of brutal retribution— eager to speed defendants toward death or a life term. The figures do not support them. Obviously much murder and mayhem is never penalized at all.

One day Hannah was found weeping, so her husband begged her to tell him what was wrong. He apparently knew the answer in advance for he added:

"Hannah, why weepest thou? And why eatest thou not? And why art thou grieved? Am I not better to thee than ten sons?"

But Hannah would not be consoled. So she went into the temple and vowed that if God would give her a son, then she would offer him to the church to become a priest just as soon as he was weaned.

These two classical cases of Rachel and Hannah are duplicated thousands of times every year right here in modern America.

For women are perverse creatures! When they think they can get pregnant, then they try desperately to avoid motherhood.

But let them suspect that they are sterile, and they just as vigorously try to have a baby.

And the longer they remain childless, the greater is their emotional desperation.

Many of them even go emotionally berserk, like Clara in yesterday's case, and thus lose all perspective regarding sexual matters.

Sterility is due to two main reasons. First, the timing is often in error, for there may be only six to 12 hours in the entire month when a wife can conceive.

'AU-H2O' Means 'Goldwater'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — At first glance, "AU-H2O" looks like the sales you make when you sneeze.

Actually, however, it is a chemical symbol, and by this time next year it may be almost as familiar to the American public as L.S.M.T.

In chemistry, AU-H2O stands for Goldwater. In politics, what it stands for depends on where you stand. And in the novelty business, it stands for money.

At the moment, AU-H2O is about the best selling item in the political campaign material line. In fact, it is about the only item that is selling at the moment.

Or so it was told by Earl Butler, a big button man from Chicago.

Butler's firm, the Green Duck Co., is one of the exhibitors showing their wares at a specialty advertising guild display here this week. I stopped by the exhibit at-

ter receiving a press release reporting that it would offer a preview of the buttons, badges and other political advertising novelties being created for the 1964 campaign.

I must say, however, that in some respects it was more like a review than a preview. Butler's booth, for instance, displayed a number of "Dick and Pat" buttons.

"Good Heavens!" I said. "Don't tell me they haven't given up yet."

Butler hastily assured me that he was not anticipating a heavy demand for Nixon buttons next year.

Except for the Goldwater crowd, he said, the supporters of prospective presidential candidates thus far have ordered very little campaign material.

Therefore, in order to display a complete line of the type of material he has available, he was obliged to borrow a few samples from the archives.

Most of the campaign gimmicks displayed at the exhibit would be familiar to the average voter, but for label pins and auto bumper stickers there is a shiny new material called "refraction grating" that is guaranteed to attract attention.

One booth featured shopping bags imprinted with advertising and political slogans, one of which read "Be Happy, Go Rocky." I am not certain, however, that it was intended for the '64 campaign.

Another company displayed neckties with political labels in the place where gray spots normally appear. The lettering on one tie read "A Solid Gold Dinosaur."

You can draw your own conclusions as to which candidate that is supposed to represent.

Peter Edson Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Planned enlargement of the U. S. Peace Corps from 7,000 to 12,000 volunteers overseas in the next year is probably going to be approved by Congress eventually.

But right now, the New Frontier's most successful two-year-old experiment is having more troubles in Washington than abroad.

If President Kennedy's request for an increase in the Peace Corps budget from \$69 million last year to \$108 million this year had gone to Congress as a separate bill, it would have sailed through with almost no opposition.

But the Peace Corps appropriation is part seven of the eight-part foreign aid bill which Congress wants to cut by \$200 million to \$400 million.

Psychologically, so a congressman find it inconsistent to cut the other seven items, then turn around and give the Peace Corps more funds.

The Peace Corps also has become confused in some people's minds with the proposal to create a Youth Conservation Corps, a National Service Corps which has been described as a domestic Peace Corps, and the Home Town Service Corps.

The three are parts of Kennedy's youth employment program, which has run into considerable congressional opposition.

The real Peace Corps suffers by association with these new proposals, although they're in no way related.

Finally, the U. S. Peace Corps has taken a beating in Washington because it had been accused of promoting an

International Peace Corps. They're two different things.

Richard N. Goodwin, former White House and State Department Latin American adviser, has been assigned to head up an International Peace Corps secretariat.

This unit rents space in the Peace Corps building in Washington. But its job is to pass along information about the U. S. Peace Corps to other countries which may be interested in setting up similar organizations of their own.

Thirteen countries expressed such interest at a Puerto Rico conference earlier this year. Seven European countries already have organized Peace Corps. And Israel Peace Corpsmen will take over a road-building program in Tanganyika, where 35 young American civil engineers have completed two years' service.

Bargent Shriver Jr., U. S. Peace Corps director, says the United States can't begin to fill the world-wide demand for this type of technical assistance.

Shriver estimates the total at 50,000.

There just aren't that many young Americans volunteering to serve.

The Peace Corps now has a file of 3,000 applications. Examinations for corpsmen were

Integration Speedup Gets Court's Assist

A concerted campaign by integration groups for faster public school desegregation has received a new boost from a significant federal court decision. U. S. District Judge Edwin M. Stanley ruled Wednesday that a "staircase" desegregation program in the schools of Durham, N. C., after just one year's trial, is too slow. He ordered elementary and junior high schools desegregated in September and high schools one year hence. Stanley's decision, if upheld in the higher federal courts, could provide the legal foundation for attacking similar plans in operation in a number of other Southern school systems. It was one of the rare cases since the Supreme Court school decision of 1954 in which a court has thrown out a gradual desegregation program already in operation. Durham, which began a grade-year integration program by school divisions in 1962, admitted to previously all-white schools 33 Negroes at the elementary level, 30 to junior high and 15 to high school. Stanley ordered almost 200 Negroes admitted to Durham white schools this fall, gave others the chance to transfer by Aug. 12 and directed the total desegregation of everything through high school by September of 1964. Until recently, federal courts have been inclined to accept "staircase" desegregation plans as moves in good faith by school boards. District Judge Frank A. Hooper refused to speed up the grade-year program of the Atlanta schools. Hooper ruled that the city school board was moving in good faith. At the pupil placement level, Alabama's law has been upheld by the Supreme Court which left its good faith application up to Alabama school authorities. A district judge has ordered Birmingham to prepare a September desegregation plan under the law.

Prison Denies Ilse Koch Freed
AUGSBURG, Germany (UPI) — A spokesman at the Altech Prison today denied reports published abroad that Ilse Koch, the infamous "bitch of Buchenwald," had been freed. The wife of the Buchenwald concentration camp's S. S. Commander Karl Koch, she was sentenced by a court in Augsburg in 1951 to life imprisonment in a war atrocity trial. The spokesman noted that Mrs. Koch must serve at least 15 years before she can even apply for parole.

He said he had received the photos only last night, and explained to his fellow chief executives that the distance from here to the Cuban prison island is "closer than my home in Tallahassee, an easier trip by plane than from here to Florida's state line."

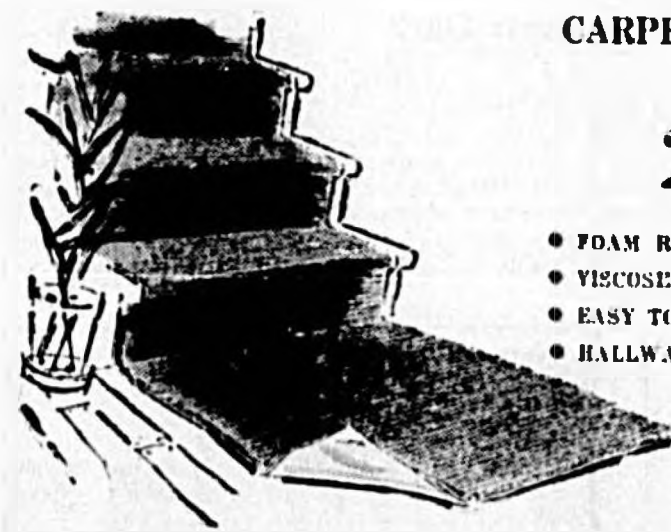

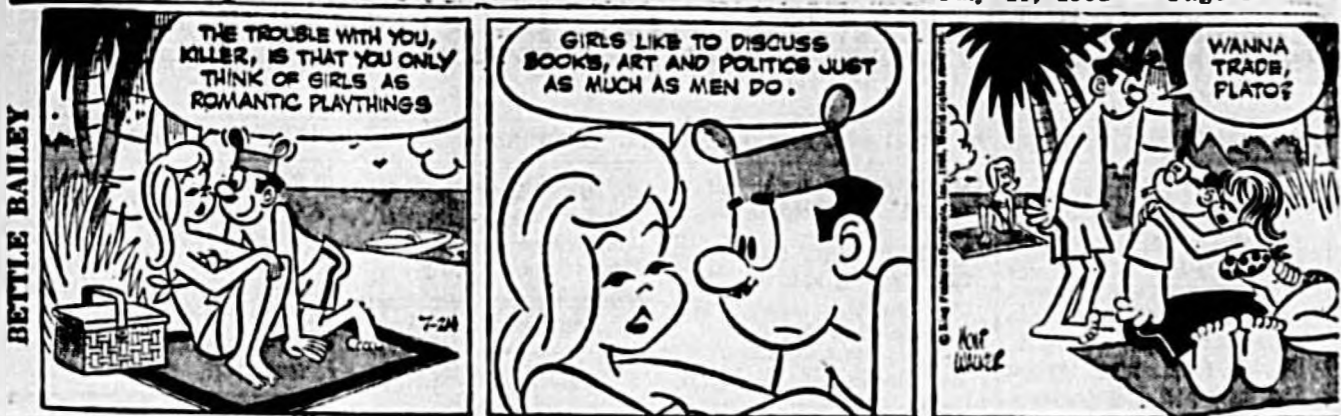

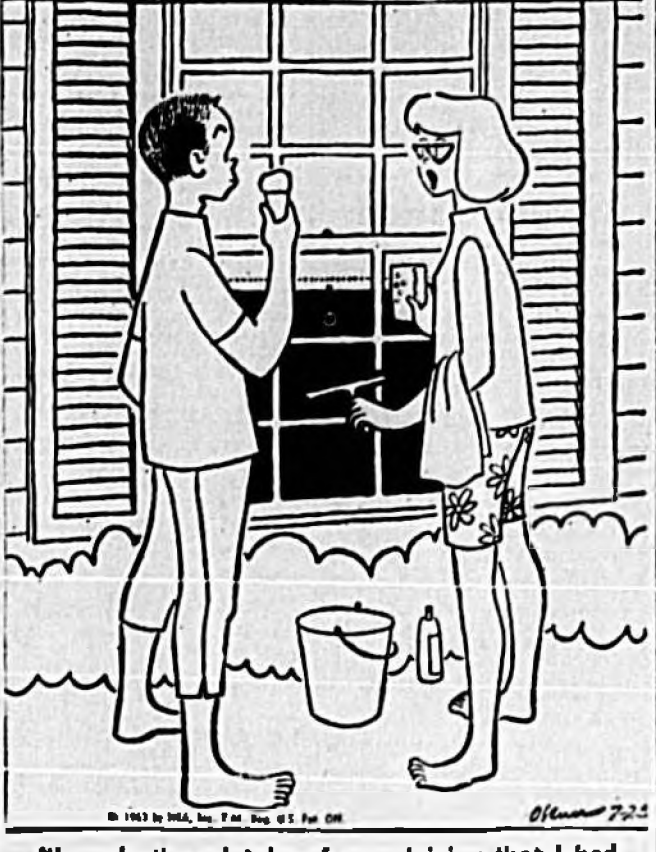

One of Seminole County's most outstanding teachers, Mrs. Lynn Sherlock, is embarking on the most challenging experience of her career when she leaves New York next Tuesday for Turkey.

A teacher for nine years and at the South Seminole Elementary School at Casselberry for the past two years, Mrs. Sherlock will be on professional leave of absence from the county school system for the next year.

She will assist Dr. Eleanor E. Green, University of Florida professor, who is on leave of absence, in establishing the first free primary school system in Turkey under U.S. A.I.D. (United States Aid for International Development).

Dr. Green needed an American familiar with the basic curriculum needs and concepts to work with her and since she has worked closely with Mrs. Sherlock on several important state committees the Seminole County teacher was a natural choice.

Dr. Green has already been in Turkey for a year and has found the children there to be alert and eager to learn. She feels that Mrs. Sherlock, who will be employed by the Turkish government, can make a worthwhile contribution in this endeavor.

Mrs. Sherlock will be working with Turkish men and women who are getting ready to come to this country to study in our colleges and universities to become teachers. She also expects to have the opportunity to work with 12 and 18 year old Turkish youngsters who have never had any schooling.

She will be working in Ankara and Istanbul and is buying heavy winter clothing for wear in Ankara, which is in the mountains at an altitude of 8,000 feet.

The last few weeks have proved very hectic with the many different shots required, many last minute arrangements getting her passport in order, as well as doing enough shopping to last for a whole year. She left Sunday for Charleston, S. C., where she will visit her mother, Mrs. E. Ralph Carter, before leaving for overseas.

After renting her home in English Estates and storing her furniture Mrs. Sherlock was a houseguest of Mrs. Nell Bruening, South Seminole music teacher, at her home in Casselberry prior to departure.

She was honored at a Bon Voyage Party given at the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Lunn on Crystal Bowl Circle, Casselberry, by members of the South Seminole Elementary Faculty. The theme of the luncheon was Turkish and the honoree was given a pair of Turkish shoes when she entered. She also received a gift of two lovely alips. A cold lunch of sliced ham and turkey, congealed salads and chocolate pie was served.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

A Real Problem

North Orlando's new council has been faced with a real problem this year concerning the maintenance of clay roads in the ranch area.

Until last year the roads were kept up by the North Orlando Co., however, after public election of the first Village Council, this problem was turned over to the new board which, at present, lacks sufficient capital to handle the road work. Consequently, residents of the ranch area are faced with thoroughfares which become almost impassable, especially in rainy weather.

At a special council meeting held last week, Vice Mayor Art Ferrin advised Councilman Irene Van Eeopel, herself a resident of the area, that he had contacted Frank Fasula, manager of the North Orlando Co., who offered to maintain the ranch roads for a fee of \$5 per hour until they are put in good shape and for a flat monthly rate of \$80 thereafter.

Included in this proposal would be Moss Rd., Morton Lane, Tradewinds Rd. and Shore Rd. These roads, in addition to serving residents of the area, also are used by many from Casselberry and Fern Park as a bypass of heavy traffic on Hwy. 17-92.

The big question now is who will pay the expense if Fasula's proposal is to be accepted. Costs would be prohibitive for the few homeowners in the area to assume and as an alternative it has been suggested that the village purchase a used grader which would be operated by the residents themselves.

A meeting to determine which proposal, if either, the property owners involved wish to accept, will be arranged by Mrs. Van Eeopel.

Mid-Florida To Build Multi-Million Dollar Golfers' Luxury Resort

Plans for the biggest single civilian building program in Seminole County—second only to Sanford Naval Air Station—were revealed this morning by the Mid-Florida County Club.

Charles A. Bloom, president, and Joseph R. Horenstein, executive director, announced a multi-million-dollar golfers' luxury resort will be constructed on a 30-acre knoll adjacent to the present clubhouse off Highway 431. The first building, on which construction will start shortly and to be completed by Jan. 1, will be a 72-unit residential structure costing an estimated \$1 million, Bloom said. It also will house a dining room and shops. Each residential unit will have facilities for three to four persons.

The next step in the extensive program will be construction of a new dining room and lounge, with the necessary allied facilities. This will be adjacent to the present clubhouse, which, in turn, will be converted to a men's lounge, locker room and pro shop for the private club members.

Next in the program will be two more 72-residential units, each with dining rooms and shops, adjacent to the first, with all three atop the knoll and facing the present golf course. The swimming pool will be enlarged and, possibly later, Horenstein said, a second swimming pool will be added at the residential units for those guests. The present pool then would be reserved for the private club members and their families. Bloom pointed out that the

new program will not conflict in any way with the privileges and facilities for the present private club members. Furthermore, he added that should golfing privileges conflict at some future date another golf course will be added. The present course would be reserved for club members and the new course for resort guests.

Ocala Prisoner Held Competent
OCALA (UPI)—A Daytona Beach psychiatrist has found a private internist held here for a mental competency hearing "highly intelligent and well educated."

Dr. James Mosco of the State Health Department said 25-year-old Zeb Acelyny of Minneapolis, Minn., is mentally competent, "understands right from wrong, does not suffer from mental illness or retardations."

His statements were in a report to County Judge Lewis Myers who had ordered Acelyny, an organizer for the Congress on Racial Equality, held for a mental competency hearing after his arrest last week in Dunnellon. Acelyny was charged with resisting arrest without violence, and vagrancy.

Budget Requests Reviewed By County Board

Seven department heads met with the Seminole County Commissioners today to review budget requests, with all but the Welfare Dept. and the Agricultural Agents office listing needed increases in their new budgets, mainly in the salary line.

The Sheriff's Department topped the list so far with a request for a \$18,000 increase, most of which would go into salaries of deputies and clerks.

The success of the Foster Care Program, which was started last year, after commissioners appropriated \$10,000 to establish a much-needed plan to care for dependent children, was outlined by Mrs. Carmita Ray, state welfare supervisor, who administers the program.

Mrs. Ray presented and commended to the commissioners Mrs. Jackie Sween, whom she said often works week-ends, Sundays, nights and holidays to carry out the Foster Care Program.

Mrs. Abby Boyd, head of the county welfare department, also commended the Foster Care Program and said that it had taken a burden off of her office, which had formerly had the problem of trying to find a place for children who have to be taken from their parents or have been abandoned.

Hearings were to be held beginning at 2 p. m. this afternoon for the other county departments.

Quake Destroys Half Of City; Toll Heavy

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia—(UPI)—A "catastrophic" earthquake today destroyed more than half the city of Skopje 200 miles south of Belgrade and was reported to have caused thousands of deaths and injuries.

The official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug quoted rescue teams in the stricken city of 200,000 as saying "over a thousand people have lost their lives" in the disaster.

"The number of injured exceeds several thousand," it added. In Geneva, a spokesman for the League of Red Cross Societies said Yugoslav Red Cross officials feared the death toll might reach 5,000. The spokesman said the Yugoslav Red Cross in Belgrade had put in an emergency call to the Geneva headquarters appealing for aid and supplies for the quake victims.

"Over 100,000 people were made homeless in a few seconds," Tanjug said, adding that "nearly three-quarters" of the city was destroyed.

Aleksandar Blagojevi, a Yugoslav airline pilot who flew to Belgrade from Skopje after the earthquake, said he saw "great numbers of dead and injured lying in the streets."

The earthquake, which was centered in downtown Skopje, struck about 5:15 a. m. (11:15 p. m. EST) EDT. "All the buildings" in the center of the city were "partially or completely destroyed," Tanjug said. "Entire settlements, including a large number of those built after the war, are completely destroyed," it reported. Authorities were in touch with the city by radio, but virtually all other communications were cut off.

JFK To Address Nation Tonight On Test Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy is expected to tell the nation and its allies tonight that the partial test ban treaty with Russia is a heartening first step toward slowing the nuclear arms race but by no means the end of the cold war.

The President scheduled a radio-television address at 7 p. m. EDT (6 p. m. Sanford time) to explain the details of the agreement initiated in Moscow Thursday by U. S., British and Russian representatives. The pact outlawed air, space and underwater blasts but permits continued underground testing.

One aim of the President's half hour talk undoubtedly is to rally public support for the agreement and bolster its chances in the Senate, where it requires approval by a two-thirds majority.

High officials said, however, that Kennedy's principal purpose was to put the agreement in perspective. He is reported anxious to head off runaway optimism which could lead to a fatal relaxation of western defense efforts.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk plans to fly to Moscow next week with a bipartisan congressional group to formally sign the pact.

Cuban Visitors Lose Passports
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The State Department has revoked the passports of 58 American students now visiting Cuba.

The State Department said Thursday it had notified the group by letters to their U. S. home addresses that their passports had been voided. Officials said the students would have to appeal to the government before their passports could be validated again.

All She Wanted Was 'Something To Love' Grieved Widow Arrested In Kidnaping Of Baby Kills Herself

CHICAGO (UPI)—A woman who was arrested a week ago for kidnaping a newborn baby shot and fatally wounded herself in a motel room Thursday.

Mrs. Mary Ann Dunlap, 39, was awaiting a hearing on a kidnaping charge. Her life had been a series of heartbreaks during the past five weeks.

Her husband, Lawrence, a Chicago traffic policeman, died Jan. 20. A few days later, her father died, and Mrs. Dunlap, 39, made the long trip to Southern Illinois for his funeral.

Then she had a miscarriage. That was especially hard for her because although her husband had four children by a previous marriage they did not have any of their own.

But doctors found that hers was a psychosomatic pregnancy. She really wasn't pregnant at all.

A week ago Wednesday, Mrs. Dunlap returned to her West Side apartment with a newborn baby. She invited the neighbors in to see the child and she told them it was hers.

The next day Federal Bureau of Investigation agents came to the apartment and arrested Mrs. Dunlap. They said she had kidnaped the 18-day-old daughter of Mrs. Rose Burnham, 19, in downtown Metropolis, Ill.

Mrs. Burnham, whose husband is stationed at Ft. Campbell, Ky., had told officers that a "well-dressed, well-spoken" stranger with long blonde hair, swept into a French twist, had come to the home of her parents in Metropolis.

Mrs. Burnham said the woman persuaded her to let her take the Burnhams' young daughter, Lori Ann, to be photographed for winning a "baby of the month" contest.

The young mother said she became slightly alarmed when the woman speeded off, and when she did not return, she called police.

FBI agents traced the woman to Paducah, Ky., and then to Chicago. They charged her with interstate transportation of a kidnap victim.

"I just wanted something to love," Mrs. Dunlap sobbed. Authorities released her on her own recognizance, pending a mental examination, and scheduled a hearing for next Thursday.

Thursday, Mrs. Dunlap went to a Southwest Side motel and occupied a room. She scribbled a note which said, "My name is Mary Ann Dunlap. Please get in touch with my lawyer, Mal Coglian."

Then she drew a .22 caliber revolver and shot herself in the abdomen.

A guest saw her arm through the partly-open door. She was rushed to Vel Soble Hospital. She was still conscious.

"It is all built up inside me," she said on the operating table. "I just don't want to live anymore." She died.

Her body still was not claimed hours later.
