Rise Of Sid Hudson From Class D To Major Leagues Told In Article

Sidney Hudson's rise from class "D" baseball playing with Sanford, to top form major league pitching with the Washington Nationals in one year's time is rated one of the outstanding feats of the sport world during 1940 by Bob Raurk, sports writer for the Washington Daily News.

The Washington newsmen comments as follows:

Hudson's graduation from zero to the \$100,000 stage was almost a miracle in baseball. Think how many years are spent in the development of pitching talent; think how few of the hundreds ever achieve anything resembling consistent excellence; think how much time is wasted on hopeless cases, such as Joe Krakauskas... think of those things and then marvel at Hudson's case.

We would have bet any taker at least 100 to one when Hudson first began to command attention in Orlando last Spring, that he'd have been back in the minors by June 15. In this day, pitchers just don't leap from the abyssal depths to the big time in one sweeping spring.

We would have won our bet, too... on any other team but the Nats. Hudson, before he lightened up into some semblance of form, lost nine games and was laboring under the dubious honor of having granted more extra base hits than any other pitcher in the American League.

But Washington was short-handed, as usual, in a pitching way. Anything that owned two arms and could duck was a pitcher, in Bucky Harris' book. 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Aid To Britain

In his regular weekly news column to The Sanford Herald and other papers in his district, Representative Joe Hendricks again asks for advice from his constituents. Two weeks ago he asked whether the people wanted this country to lend financial aid to Great Britain in the present emergency. Today he is asking whether we should convoy ships to England.

"There has been a proposal made," he writes, "that we not only lend financial aid, but that we provide portions of our Merchant Marine to transport food and war materials to Great Britain and that we also provide a convoy for those ships. If I may be frank, I want to say that this means that without a declaration of war, we are actively participating in Great Britain's behalf. In fact the Axis powers would have every right to sink our ships. Again I want to ask what do you say?"

Up to the present time the United States has been extending aid to Britain short of war on the pro-war basis of cash and carry. Everything that England has gotten from the United States in her life and death struggle against the forces of evil which are threatening the entire civilized world, she has had to come and get in her own boats. Every airplane, every tank, every bullet she has gotten from this country, she has had to pay for cash on the barrel head.

This doesn't seem to us like much aid from the great and powerful United States in the present emergency which is confronting the entire world. At least it is no help which entails any sacrifice on our part. As a matter of fact, it is the sort of help which would render our worst enemy. It is purely a business proposition. We are making money out of it. England is spending billions of dollars with us. And she is coming and getting it and carrying it back in her own ships so as to entail no risk whatever for us.

It strikes us the time has come when we should be willing to give some aid in this struggle against dictatorship and world conquest which might not prove to be entirely on a profitable basis. We see where Italian newspapers are saying that the United States is willing to fight "up to the last Englishman." We believe the Italians are underestimating the fighting capacities of the American people. It strikes us, in the light of what is happening in Libya and Albania that it would be nearer the truth to say that the Italians are willing to fight "up to the last German."

However that may be, we believe the time has come when the United States can well afford to render more effective aid to Britain. If merely supplying her with ships is sufficient, we should do that. If it is necessary to convoy them with American warships, we should do that. If it is advisable to give them more of our destroyers and bombers, we should do that.

Whatever is necessary to keep England in this fighting against tyranny and aggression, we should do. It is largely a military and naval problem.

Beating The Flu

There no longer seems to be any doubt that an epidemic of colds, bordering on influenza, is circulating through Florida as almost everyone we know is either just getting up or has gone to bed with the sniffles. The epidemic seems to have originated in California and perhaps was brought here by someone trying to escape the unfavorable weather conditions out there.

A good many remedies have been published in the papers during the last few days, and almost everyone seems to have his own pet cure, some of which no doubt are good, while others seem to us a little short of suicide. In the final analysis the surest and quickest way to get rid of flu is to put it to bed, while the fellow who insists on toughing it through is the one who has it the worst, and contributes the most to the spread of the epidemic.

In this connection it would be a good idea for everyone to practice the Golden Rule and try as hard not to give the flu to someone else as he tries to avoid it himself. If everyone would do this, these epidemics would be short lived. As soon as you have a cold go home and go to bed. At least keep out of crowded places. Don't cough or sneeze in anyone's face. Cover your mouth and nose with a handkerchief. When you talk to people keep as far away from them as you can.

Many persons who are working hesitate to go home for fear of winning the disapproval of their employer. It might be well for all employers to let men and women in their organization know that they are at perfect liberty to stay home whenever they feel the first symptoms of the flu. By coming to work, they give it to other employees and in the long run cause greater loss of working hours than if they had dropped out in the beginning.

The best way to avoid catching the flu yourself is of course to avoid persons who have it, keep out of crowded places, and keep yourself always in good physical condition. Avoid constipation, over-exertion, or exposure to inclement weather. Eat a well balanced diet, particularly of fruits and vegetables and drink plenty of water. Avoid getting too hot or too cold. Don't get too tired and sleep at least eight hours every night.

Even if you do all these things whole-heartedly and conscientiously, you may nevertheless encounter a flu germ that has your number, but if you keep yourself in good condition the disease will not be so severe, danger will be reduced to a minimum and you should be out again in a few days.

WEEKLY NEWS COLUMN BY JOE HENDRICKS

A PLEASANT VISIT—I am now back in the Nation's Capitol where we will soon begin work in the first session of the seventy-seventh Congress, and believe me it is going to be real work. It was a pleasure for me to visit my constituents just before Christmas, after a continued absence of eight months. I would love to have been down more often but my constituents felt during the emergency, I should remain in the Capitol and that is what I did. I did not see all of my personal friends while I was in the State, and where thousands of my constituents I was unable to see. This I regret and hope some day that the world will return to normalcy and that we can meet for a few months each year and pass the necessary laws and return them to our constituents for a real visit. I trust the year 1941 will be prosperous for all of you and I offer my services to help you in anyway.

WHAT DO YOU SAY—Two weeks ago under the same title I had an item in the newspaper asking "What do you say?" to the question of lending financial aid to Great Britain. At that time, with reservations, I felt we should let them have financial aid. I ask for your opinion today. This is the question that I want to discuss with you, briefly. There has been a proposal made and is being agitated all over the Country that we not only lend financial aid, but that we provide portions of our Merchant Marine to transport food and war materials to Great Britain and that we also provide a convoy for those ships. If I may be frank, I want to say that this means that without a declaration of war, we are actively participating in Great Britain's behalf. In fact the Axis powers would have every right to sink our ships. Again I want to ask what do you say? I would like at all times to have the opinion of my constituents and remember that I have not expressed my opinion, but that I want to know what you think before I do so.

HEAD UP, BREVARD—I advise Brevard County to be on the lookout. The people of Brevard County will remember that sometime before the Air Base was located in Orlando, that I advised the citizens there, that something was coming their way. I did not attempt to tell them what, because, for one reason, I was not definitely sure that it would come, and for the second reason, I was not definitely sure of the exact nature of the project. I advise the people of Brevard that something bigger than the Air Base is coming to our County. I do not say what it is for the same reason that I could not definitely say what was going to Orlando. I have been doing some work in behalf of one of three different projects for Brevard and while I have no definite information, I am convinced that something is coming your way.

IF THE WORLD STANDS—You will recall before President Roosevelt left Warm Springs, Georgia, on December 16th, he had made a statement to the effect that if the world survives, he would return to Warm Springs next year. This statement caused a good deal of speculation at the time. Of course, the President meant that if the world as we know it still survives, that is, if England is not defeated and dictatorial ideologists are not successful, that he would return. In the minds of some, there was a feeling that the President knew much more about World Affairs, had a better advantage of seeing things, than we have. He could not see that civilization is not on the decline, as would be the case if the Axis powers won this war. I think that Democracy and Christianity is fighting for its very existence will emerge as a much more vigorous and virile reality than ever before. Let's all fight to the end.
