That's not all. The Tars have a flatful of minor league hurllink aces, several of whom helped the training station a year ago roll up an amazing record of 92 victories in 102 contests against all classes of competition.

Hutchinson led the Sailors in pitching last year with 23 wins and a single defeat. The minor leaguers include Maxie Wilson, who chalked up a record of 22-2 for the Sailors in 1942; Hank Palmater, owned by the Boston Red Sox; Ray Volpi, of Louisville and Kansas City last season; and Carl Ray, farm property of the New York Yankees.

The catching assignment goes to Vincent Smith, the former Pittsburgh Pirate, who handled Bob Feller's slants for the navy nine a campaign ago, when he battled 287 for one of the team's best averages.

Post-War Stabilization Even the Experts Disagree on Stabilization

HOW TO GUARANTEE stabilization is one of the most difficult problems to be solved, as insurance against a badly gummed-up state of international economics in post-war days.

It is a subject for experts to discuss. Ordinary folk haven't the remotest understanding of it. Well, why don't they get the experts to explain it to them? And that is as mean a puzzle to tackle as the other one. The experts' trouble is that they don't understand it either. Some of them pretend to, but they disagree among themselves to such an extent that their discussions don't mean anything.

The two outstanding sharks at the argument are Treasury Secretary Morgenthau and Lord Keynes, the British treasury chief counselor. The North and South Poles are no farther apart geographically than that pair are on post-war stabilization. They are polle about it, but that is ALL they are.

At Variance
Of course, the ignorant, unscientific theory is that stabilization consists of getting a balance into the keel of a boat or a plane, so that it will float right side up or get back to "stability" after winds and waves have jiggled it. This stuff, though, is international currency stabilization—keeping two or more countries' respective kinds of different money on a balance, so that one of them won't sky-shoot while the other is slumping if that happens, it is as if you go into a store to place an order of groceries—and the grocer won't recognize your dough except at a heavy discount and you won't recognize his prices.

Now, basically, countries swap goods with one another. If they are different kinds of stuff—goods that we want and do not have and that they want but do not have—why, it is a simple enough transaction.

The trouble is that such deals are not so straight-away.

This is illustrated in our transactions with Latin America.

The Latins have oodles of tropical or semi-tropical raw material that we require and we have industrial goods that they are anxious for. We generally get along with them pretty well on that basis. Argentina is an exception. That republic really is in competition with us. With the rest of them we are on a swap-even basis. But it is on a conspicuously unharmonious basis that we and the Argentine maintain our mutual relationship. The Argentine will have to get in line ultimately, but it will be reluctant. If it could get away with it, it might be pro-Axis—but for commercial reasons.

Look at them! The Latin America can make much more money out of us, and the rest of the world, than otherwise. In the long run Argentina will profit by acquiescing in the inevitable.

It doesn't so much matter as to a little country like the Argentine. Europe's small nations will be satisfied with what they can get out of the post-war settlement.

The situation for the great powers is not so easily solved.

How are monies going to be swapped?

Is it to be done between the United States and Britain alone? Well, then, how are they to be fixed between us and the others? It reaches international proportions. There is where we get to international economics.

Legal Fees Amount To Three Percent In Collecting Tax

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 23. (FNB)—It cost Florida's counties less than 3 percent in legal fees to collect \$2,449,034.06 delinquent railroad taxes running back to 1924 in some instances, according to tabulations submitted the Shanda committee by Comptroller J. M. Lee, who also attached to his report copies of court orders "finding" that the counties had employed the Tallahassee law firm of Keen & Allen to represent the counties and directing the comptroller to deduct from moneys collected in the litigation the amount of the fees contracted to be paid by the counties and which the comptroller's submission showed totaled \$64,874.

These were paid over a period of more than three years as the long contested items of delinquency were decided by the courts and paid by the railroads. The committee asked the comptroller to rework his report to show payments by counties and this is being done.

Legal Fees Amount To Three Percent In Collecting Tax

Railroads who paid the contested items and amounts collected were: Seaboard, \$1,555,000; Atlantic Coast Line, \$324,200; Florida East Coast, \$381,578.32; Louisville & Nashville, \$27,945.03; Atlanta & St. Andrews Bay, \$14,411.57; Atlantic & East Coast Terminal Co., \$7,850.34; Live Oak Ferry & Gulf, \$103.89.

The railroads' injunction suits had been hanging fire as far back as 1927, when the counties, through representatives meeting in Orlando in the summer of 1937 named a committee to employ counsel. The committee put their interests in the hands of the Tallahassee law firm and they had won their first decree by July, 1939. Judge J. B. Johnson's decision awarding them more than \$1,000,000. Subsequent litigation reached its climax in early summer of 1942 when Judge F. C. Lowe ruled with the counties on valuation theories that established a basis of assessment which maintains railroad assessments for future years at more than 50 percent above the level sought to be established by the railroads.

NEW YORK—An old-fashioned Greatest Show On Earth has triumphed this year over the new-fangled problems of transportation and getting enough to eat. And the chief beneficiaries will be Uncle Sam and the morale of Uncle Sam's nephews and nieces.

If early sales of war bonds in conjunction with circus tickets in New York is any indication, the season's total will run into nine figures. On opening night alone, New Yorkers poured \$3,000,000 into the Treasury's hungry coffers.

In every large city in which Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey runs for a week or more, the entire proceeds of the opening night go to the Treasury in the shape of bond purchases. In the smaller cities, where the run is of one, two or three nights, there will be an honor section for bond purchasers.

Old-time Features

and the clown troupe is further highlighted with another number, all its own.

Rival to the new "ape," which honors the United Nations, is another nostalgic bit—a condensed version of the old-time circus parade. It has a clown band, elephants, floats, spiced horses and plodding dapple-grays, and sure enough, a steaming calliope.

Single Fare
The circus met its transportation problems by rehashing its rolling stock, needing only 71 cars to last year's 90, and there were fewer locomotives. The managerie tent has been dispensed with, which means that the public can wander at the wild and make for free.

Circus help will be fed by the circus cook tent as before, and food rations will be received in the same manner as hotels and restaurants. Carnivorous animals will be fed horsemeat and cut of other meat unsuitable for humans. As one circus veteran put it, "That's all they get in the jungle, anyway."

Following its New York opening with a stay in Boston, the circus opens under canvas in Philadelphia May 21. The big top will be a six-pole affair, with three rings and two stages.

The circus this season has Robert Ringling, former Chicago opera baritone and for the past six years senior vice-president as president. His particular interests are costuming and staging. Last season the circus played to 4,200,000 persons in 108 cities. This season fewer cities will be visited, but runs will be longer. The new operators are highly encouraged by New York's reception. This year's attendance, they say, will be bigger and better than ever.

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VICTORY GARDEN

One of the biggest problems that the home gardener has to meet is the maintenance of the organic matter or humus content of his soil. There are several ways to replenish this all important soil constituent. The easiest way is to buy a load or two of muck and work it into the soil. In using muck one must bear in mind that mucks are not all alike. Some are very active while others are very sweet and the majority are somewhere between these two extremes. Then too they vary in the actual amount of organic matter they contain and its state of decomposition. If you use muck or peat have it tested for acidity and if it is too acid add enough lime with it to prevent your soil from becoming too acid or sour. The use of very fibrous muck just before planting a garden is to be avoided. Such muck will actually rob your soil of available nitrogen as the bacteria that are decomposing the muck need the nitrogen as food and they will get it before your plants can. If fibrous muck is used put it on a month or six weeks before you are ready to plant your garden. This will give it a chance to decompose to a point where it will not rob your plants. The addition of a little nitrogenous fertilizer with the fibrous muck will hasten the decomposition.

A second source of organic matter is manure. While well rotted manure is an ideal source of organic matter and plant food it is not very readily obtainable and if used in a garden near a dwelling the odor will prove objectionable.

The third and cheapest source of organic matter is home made compost. Now is a good time to start a compost pile as leaves are plentiful and if started now the resulting compost should be ready for use in the Fall vegetable garden. To many people the very word compost is synonymous with bad odor. However a compost pile need not give off an offensive odor if made the modern way. It is best to have the compost pile under at least partial cover.

In making compost any organic material such as leaves, grass cuttings, weed stalks, etc. can be cut in olden days manure was added to such materials to hasten decomposition. As your compost pile may be near a dwelling it would be wiser to omit the manure and to use fertilizer and lime instead.

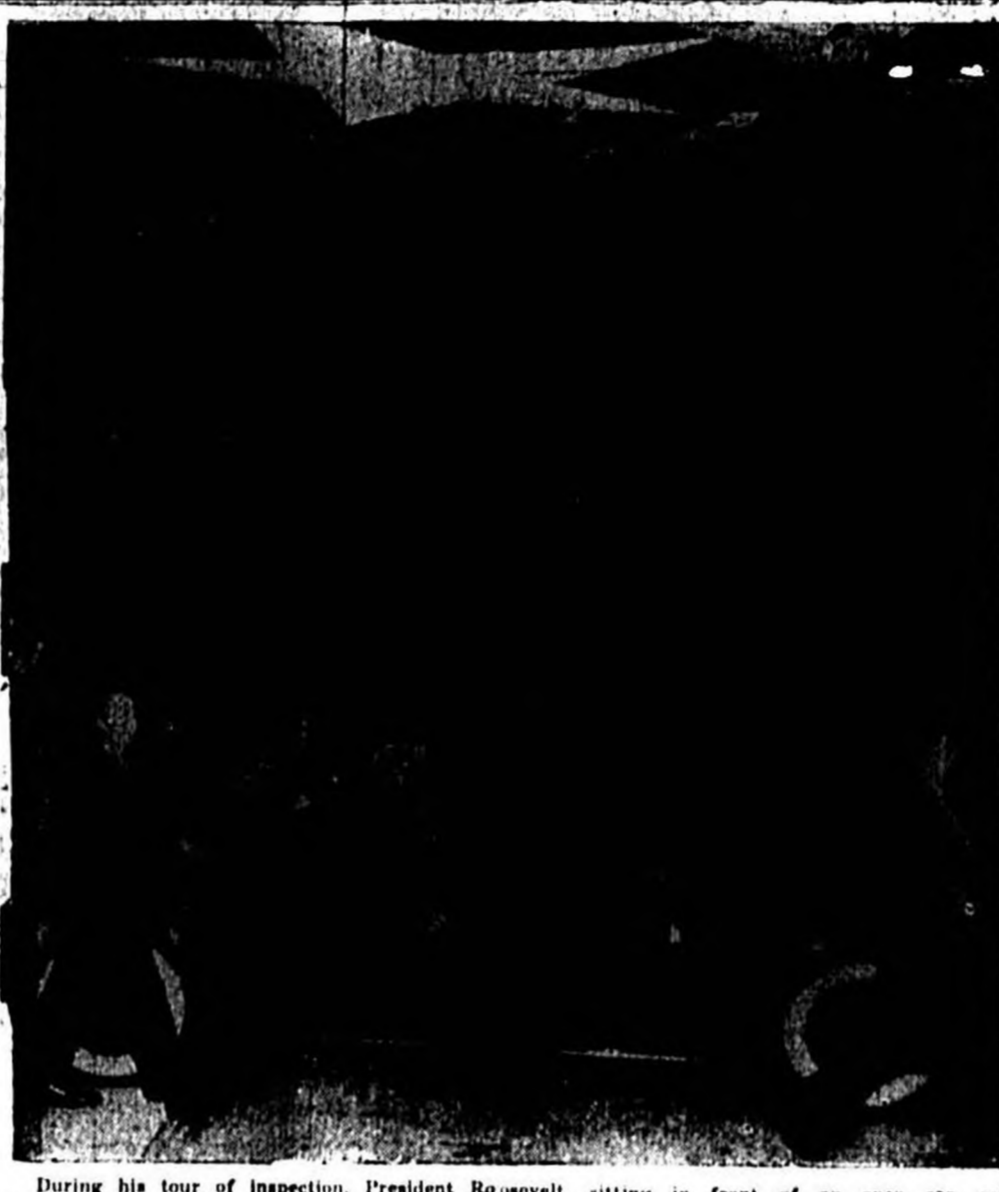
Several Experiment Stations have found that the addition of a mixture of sulfate of ammonia, superphosphate and lime to composting materials will hasten the decomposition and give a product very similar to well rotted manure. Due to the war you will not be able to get the sulfate of ammonia, instead you could use some of your victory fertilizer and lime.

While the results may not be quite as good as when sulfate of ammonia is used we believe that you will get a satisfactory product. About 15 pounds of fertilizer and 3 pounds of lime per 100 pounds of composting material should be used. If both succulent and dry materials are used such as grass cuttings and weeds, the dry materials will result in a better product if they are mixed together.

Make your compost pile compact and not more than five feet high. As you add material to the pile water the fertilizer and lime uniformly through it and add enough water to saturate the materials. From time to time if necessary to add additional water, as the pile should be kept wet but not water logged. For rapid decomposition, the pile should be thoroughly decomposed in about two or three months depending on the material used. For growth or to the pile can be worked over to limit the parts on the outside will be worked into the middle of the pile where the most rapid decomposition is taking place.

There is practically no limit to the amount of organic material that you can add to your pile provided that it is well decomposed. Twenty tons and over can be piled up. It is a good idea to well decomposed organic matter are added you can decrease the amount of fertilizer used, or use almost no fertilizer at all. Type this with fertilizer alone. As stated earlier do not add any amount of poorly decomposed material to your pile. It is better to suffer for nitrogen. Any soil organic matter added to the pile will be added to the pile. Avoid having any organic matter under your feet when building off the pile. If the pile is built on a soil, if this happens the soil will dry out and more soil will be added to the pile. 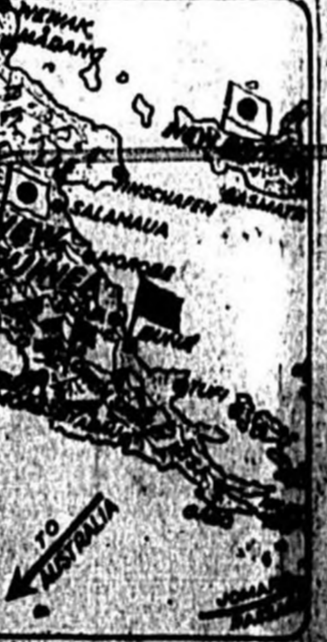

Blood Plasma Saves Lives

When Japanese bombers sneaked in on Pearl Harbor in December of 1941 and dropped their bombs on army and naval installations where American soldiers and sailors were stationed, it was the prompt injection of blood plasma into the veins of the cruelly injured and apparently dying victims that saved the lives of hundreds of them.

When fire suddenly broke out in the game room of a Boston night club spreading rapidly to the dance hall causing a stampede which blocked the nearest exits and resulting in hundreds of broken limbs, crushed bodies, seared lungs and frightful burns, 1,500 units of blood plasma were used to save the lives of scores of victims.

It might have been your son in place of Hugh Sheridan, Irish-American sailor, blown overboard when a bomb exploded on the deck of a destroyer. His shoulder was broken. He was frightfully burned. When he was taken from the water several hours later after much loss of blood his blood pressure was down to zero and he was apparently dead.

It might have been your wife who laid on an operating table in a Central Florida hospital suffering from a serious ailment. The operation consumed several hours and four different times during this ordeal her pulse had practically ceased and plasma injections were resorted to as a means of reviving it.

Hardly less convincing as to the value of modern science are the figures compiled by the Metropolitan among the civilian population which show that the average length of life has increased by 30 years since 1880 with more than half of this increase occurring since the close of the first World War.

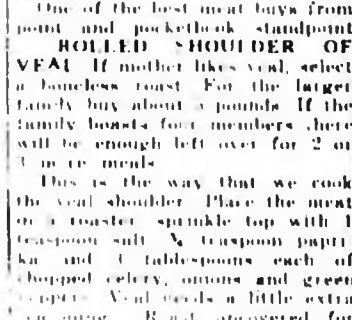

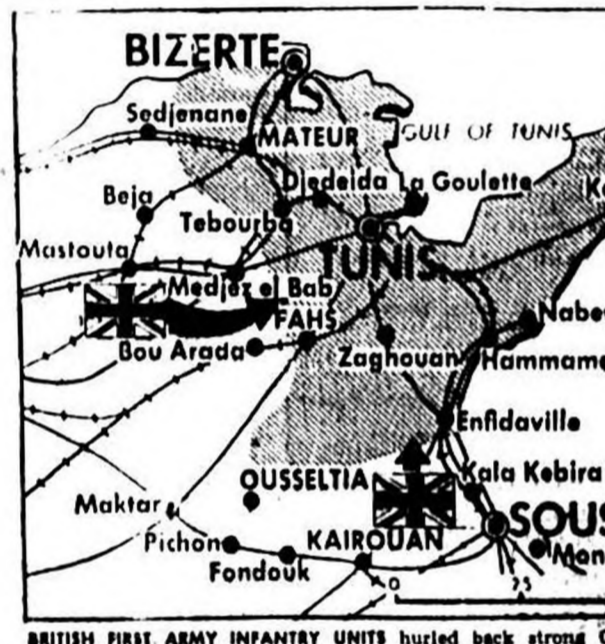

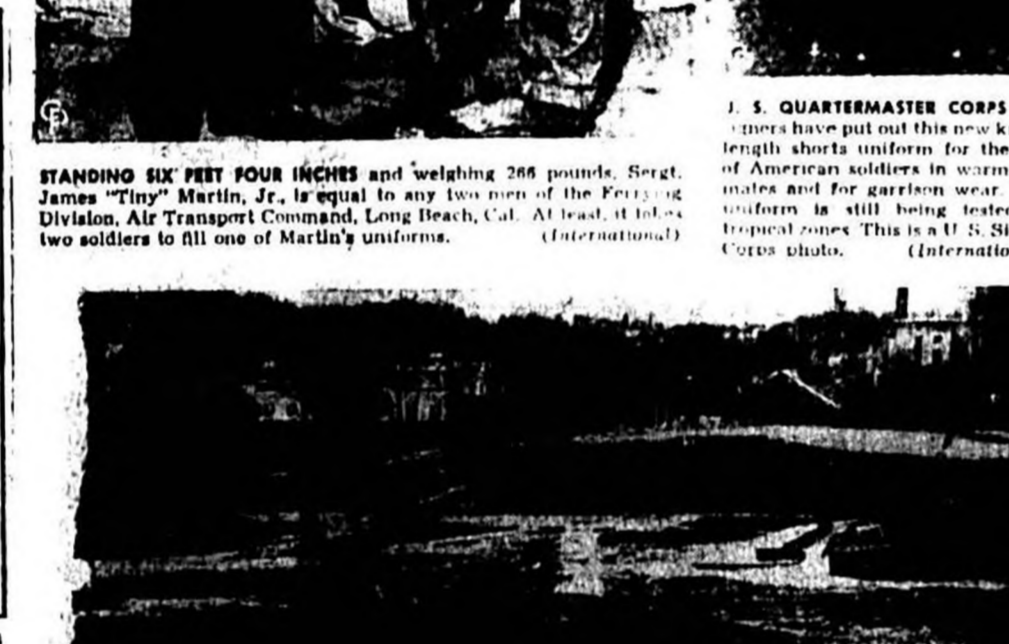

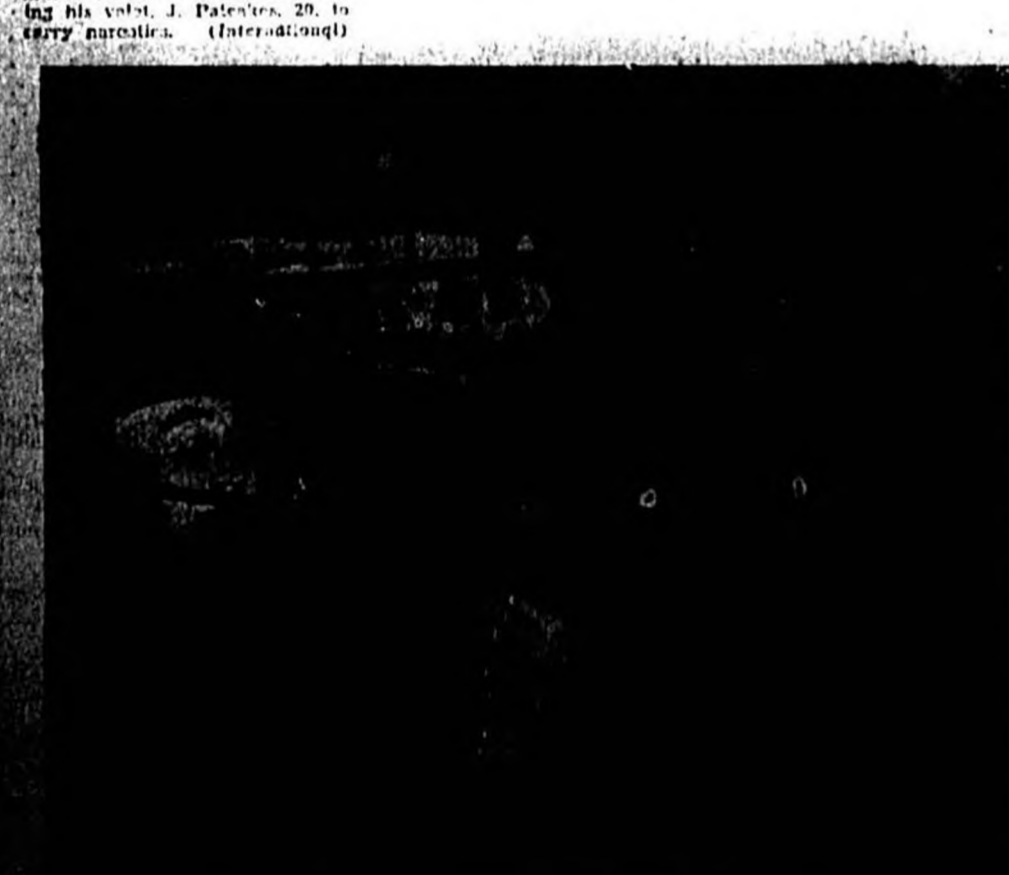

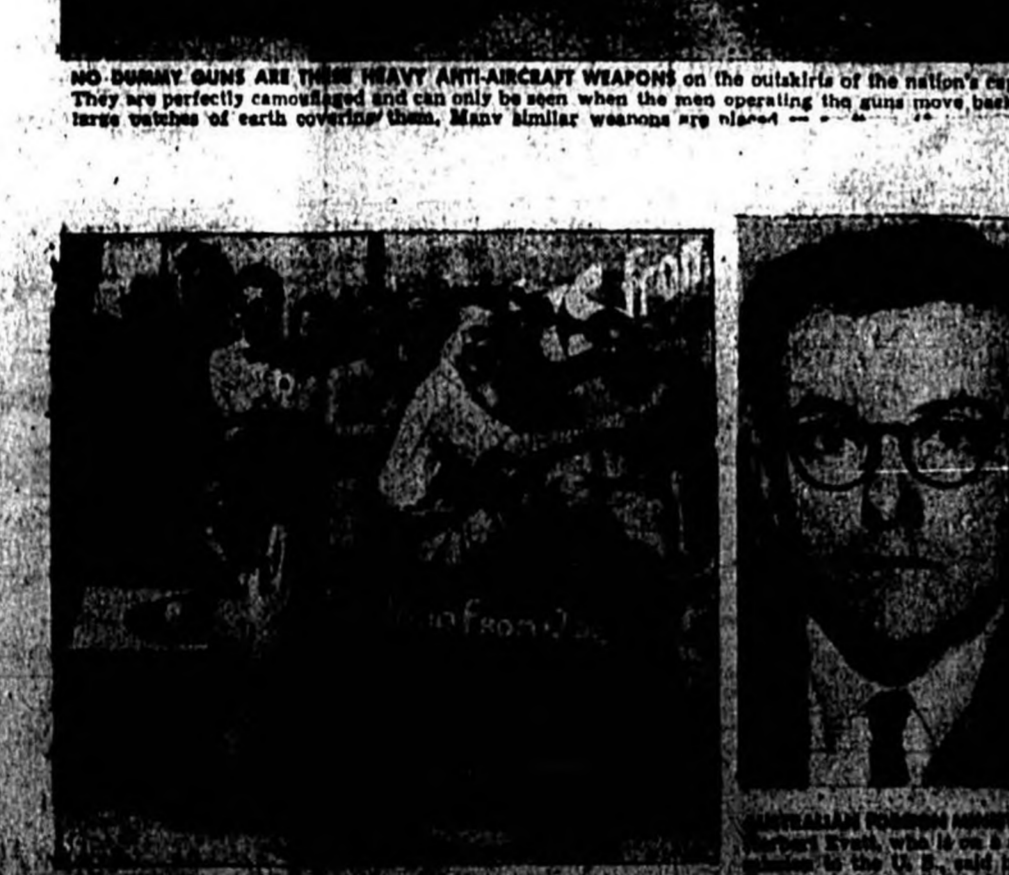

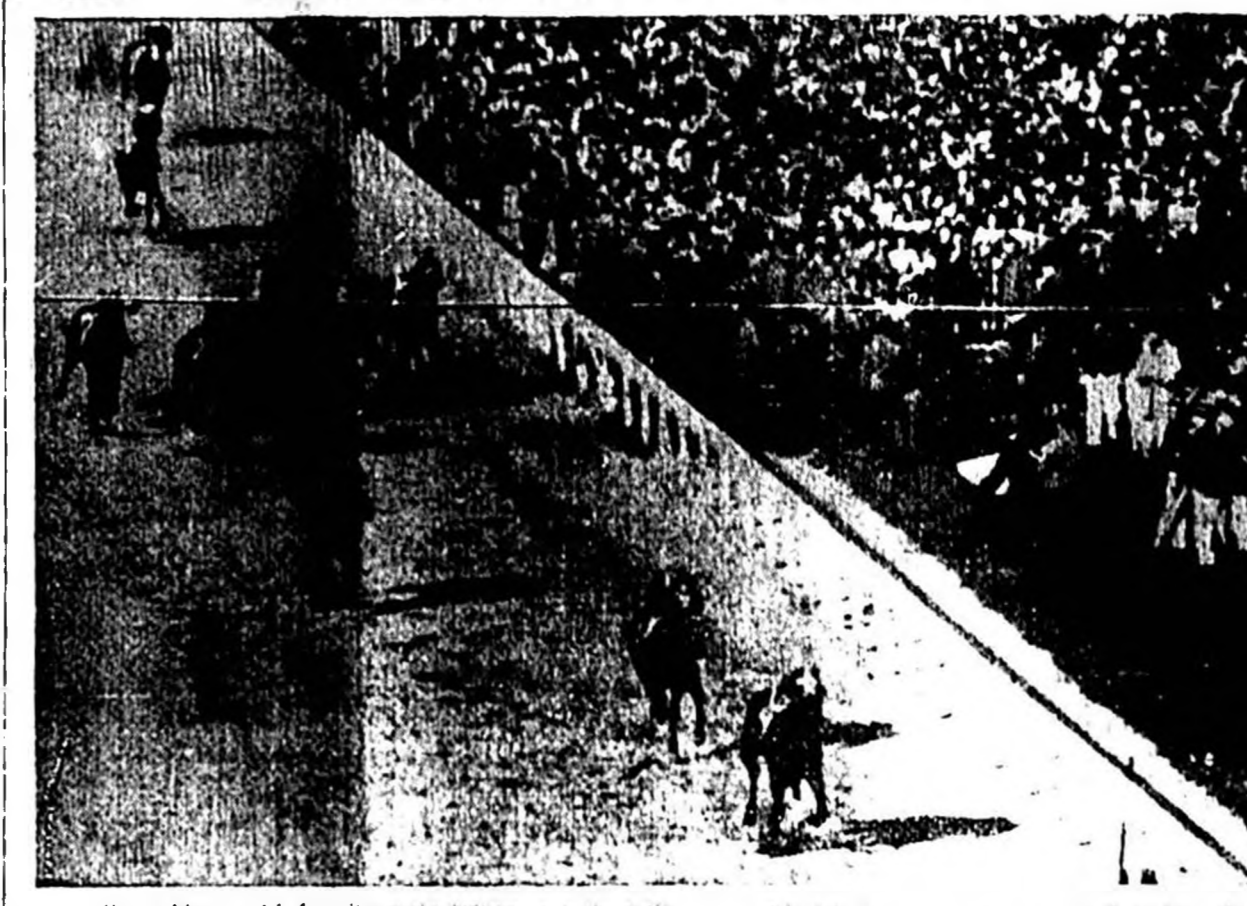
