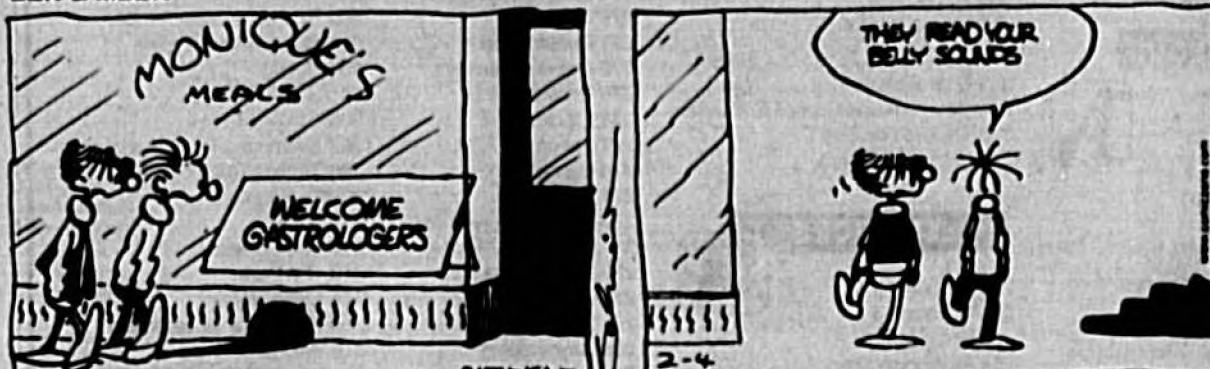

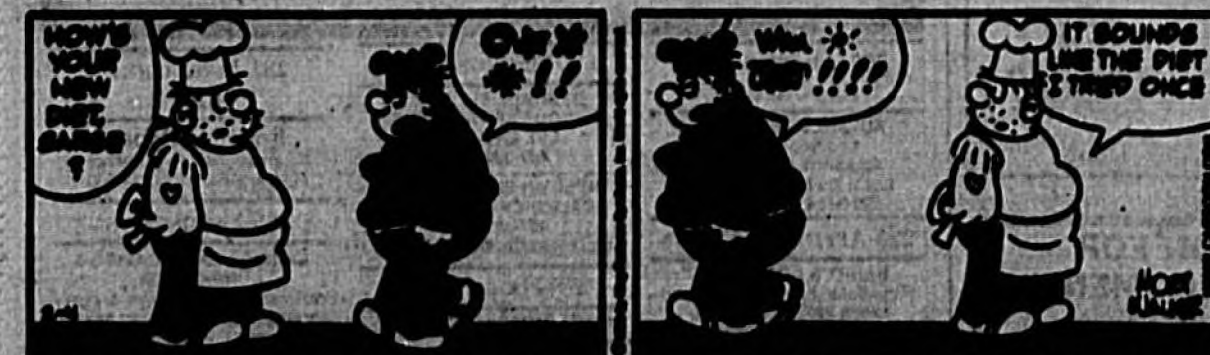

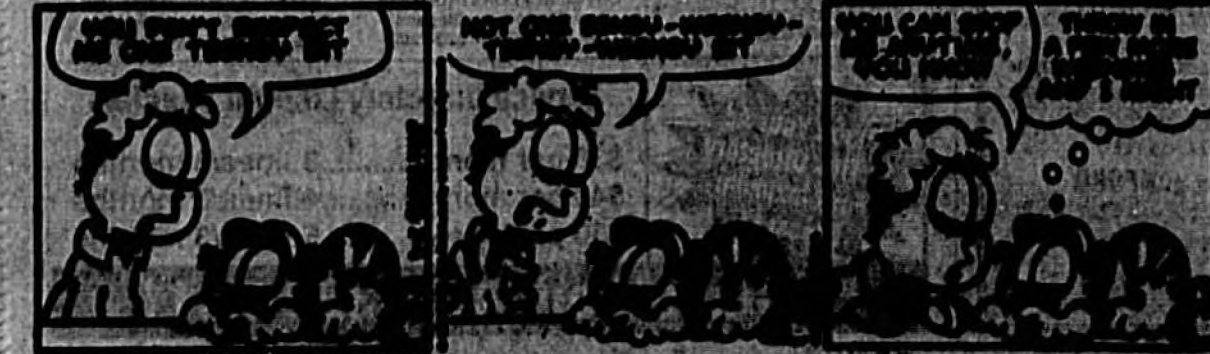

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WIN AT BRIDGE

In and out of the zone

The best tennis players often talk about the zone. When playing at their best, they see the ball as if it in the size of a basketball; they are in the zone. It is the same for top bridge players. There are days when they know where all the cards lie. They find the perfect play and discuss almost without apparent thought. At other times, though, errors abound. Why is this?

In today's deal, which occurred during the 1998 General Individual tournament, West was a former world champion, and declarer was one of the world's top-rated players.

South's three-club rebid was invitational. With a game-forcing hand, he would have rebid two diamonds, fourth-suit forcing.

Declarer's approach should be to

take two trump finesses, hoping to restrict his losses to one spade, one heart and one diamond. And if declarer had won trick one, crossed in hand with a club, and run the heart jack, that is how the deal would have passed out. However, South ducked at trick one, giving West a chance to defeat the contract by switching to a spade. Declarer will probably finesse, but East wins with the king and returns a spade. Then, when East wins with the heart king, a third spade allows West to score his heart queen to defeat the contract.

And that is clearly the best defense. Yet West wouldn't continue with a second diamond. (Even if South has three diamonds, West doesn't have an entry to cash his second trick in the suit.) Why? Tiredness? Thoughtlessness? Out of the zone? What do you think?

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ASK DR. GOTT

See urologist about high PSA

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a prostate specific antigen (PSA) of 25 and a digital rectal exam of 2/4. I am 75 years old. Please send me information on treatment.

DEAR READER: Forget the doctor's level — years is critical. I've made more concerned about your prostate test result, which is alarmingly high. The normal PSA value is 4.0.

In my opinion, you should be consulted by a urologist for probable prostate cancer. I am certain that the specialist will bless your good. Don't delay. Your condition may be in the treatable early stage.

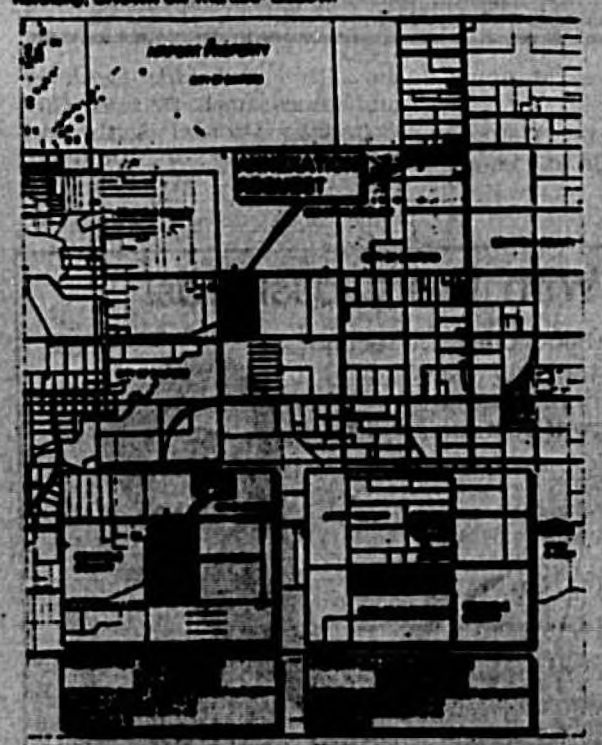

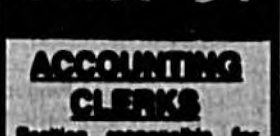

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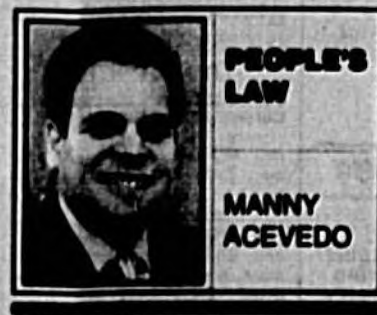
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Abuse, abandonment and neglect reviewed

Back in October we discussed the reporting of abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child to the central abuse registry. When a report is made, the counselor who takes the call will try to gather as much information as the person calling is able to provide. After a report is received, the counselor who took the report must determine whether the allegations constitute abuse, abandonment, or neglect.

Abuse exists if the child's physical or mental health or welfare is harmed, or threatened with harm, by the acts or omissions of the parent, adult household member, or other person responsible for the child's welfare. Abuse is not limited to the willful infliction of physical injury. In determining whether harm has been inflicted, the counselor must consider the following factors when applicable: 1) the age of the child; 2) any prior history of injuries to the child; 3) the location of the injury on the body of the child; 4) the multi-

licity of the injury; and 5) the type of trauma inflicted.

As noted above, abuse is not limited to the result of willful infliction of physical injury. Abuse includes leaving a child without adult supervision or arrangement appropriate for the child's age or mental or physical condition, so that the child is unable to care for the child's own needs or another's basic needs or is unable to exercise good judgment in responding to any kind of physical or emotional crisis. It also includes inappropriate or excessively harsh disciplinary action. Again, the significance of

any injury must be evaluated in light of: 1) the age of the child; 2) any prior history of injuries to the child; 3) the location of the injury on the body of the child; 4) the multiplicity of the injury; and 5) the type of trauma inflicted.

Abandonment exists when the parent or legal custodian of a child or, in the absence of a parent or legal custodian, the person responsible for the child's welfare, while being able, makes no provision for the child's support and makes no effort to communicate with the child, which situation is sufficient to evince a willful rejection of parental obligation. If the efforts of such a parent or legal custodian or person primarily responsible for the child's welfare to support and communicate with the child are only marginal efforts that do not evince a settled purpose to assume all parental duties, the child may be determined to have been abandoned.

Similarly, neglect exists when the parent or other per-

son responsible for the child's welfare fails to supply the child with adequate food, clothing, shelter, or health care, although financially able to do so or although offered financial or other means to do so.

What happens after a report of alleged abuse, abandonment, or neglect is made depends on the circumstances of the case. If the counselor determines that the allegations constitute abuse, abandonment, or neglect, the counselor must then determine whether a protective investigation must be instituted. In the coming weeks we will discuss how a counselor determines whether a protective investigation will be instituted and what alternatives exist as well as other aspects of dependency law.

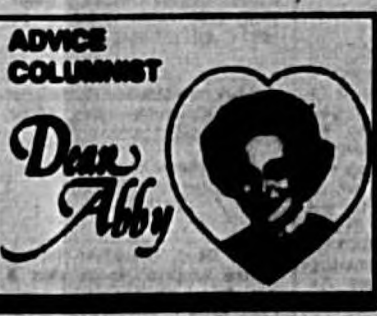

My son, on the other hand, kept in touch. He and his fiancée have visited my lover and me several times, and we have enjoyed a good relationship over the years. During that time, my lover and I have been very generous to my son with birthday and Christmas gifts, and even bought him a new car. When he and his fiancée visited us on several occasions, we all got along well. They met our gay friends and exchanged with us.

Last week, my son called to say they were sending out wedding invitations. I am welcome, but my lover is not. I explained to him that we are just as much a couple as my brother and his wife, or my sister and her husband. He told me that he did not want his friends to know



he had a gay father, and therefore, my lover would not be allowed to attend.

I told him that if my lover could not attend, then I would not attend. If he cannot accept us openly, and if he's ashamed of our relationship, then I really do not want any further contact with him.

We are very hurt. For the last eight years he appeared to accept our relationship, especially when it came to gifts and several nice trips for him and his fiancée to visit us. Abby, am I wrong? I'd be interested in your comments.

DEAR SAD: You are not wrong. Being gay (or straight) is not a matter of choice. People

who do not know this belong in the dark ages. I hate to see you break your last remaining tie with your family, but I respect your decision not to attend the wedding.

DEAR ABBY: I just moved to Los Angeles two months ago, but my boyfriend of five months will not be able to move from Houston to California for another four years.

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
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The way we were: More 1933 biographies

Again I offer you more biographies from the special edition of the Sanford Herald published April 29, 1933.

J.L. Marentette

J.L. Marentette, Sanford resident and manager of the Milane Theater since 1925, had been connected with the theater business practically all of his life beginning as a film operator in Chicago.

He had managed a theater in Chicago and later became connected with film distributing companies. One of the latter was located in Atlanta where he had lived for several years.

Mr. Marentette was born in Detroit, Michigan where he attended public schools.

He and his wife, Carolyn, lived in Mayfair; they had one daughter, Helen (Mrs. Andrew) Caraway.

Boating was listed as Mr. Marentette's favorite sport and his hobby was his interest in dogs. He belonged to the Kiwanis Club and Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. E.D. Brownlee

Dr. E.D. Brownlee came to First Presbyterian Church as its pastor on Jan. 1, 1913 and had continued in that position. In 1933 he had the distinction

of having been a minister of Sanford longer than any other then serving.

He was born in Plainville, Ga. and attended public schools there. He later attended the University of Georgia, S.P.U. and Princeton University. His honorary doctorates came from Rollins and Davidson Colleges.

Dr. Brownlee was a member of the Masonic Lodge and was a past president of the Sanford Kiwanis Club. With his family, he resided at 900 Palmetto Ave. His wife was the former Lillian Gibson and they had one son, Harry G.

He was active in state church work and was also a director of Palmer College, Agnes Scott and the Columbia Theological Seminary. He was a former moderator of both the St. Johns Presbytery and

the Synod of Florida.

His favorite sports were hunting and fishing and he was interested in birds.

(My parents attended First Presbyterian for a few years during Dr. Brownlee's ministry as my dad, Martin Stineciper, was a paid soloist there. This was before I was born; it would have been in the early 1930's. I remember going with my parents and Gertrude Gilbert and Ted Runge to a reception in Dr. Brownlee's honor in Inverness, probably in the 1950s. Possibly some long time Presbyterian can tell me the occasion!)

Lloyd F. Boyle

A World War I veteran, Lloyd F. Boyle saw front line action with the Rainbow Division and spent 18 months in France, Germany, Belgium and Italy.

A native of Peru, Indiana, he came to Sanford in 1924 to become associated with Fred R. Wilson in the practice of law. In 1933 he was serving as state attorney for the 23rd judicial circuit.

Besides being an American Legionnaire, Mr. Boyle was a Mason, Shriner, Elk, Lion and a member of First Presbyterian Church.

He was married to the former Rosa G. Gray; they had one daughter, Lillian. Their home was at 2404 Mellonville Avenue.

After graduating from high school in Oak Park, Ill., he studied at the University of Chicago, Rollins and Stetson.

This state attorney was fond of both football and baseball, but for recreation he chose golf, fishing and boating.

(Mr. Boyle later became a state senator and I believe he served several years in that

position. He and his wife later had two more daughters, Dial and Rosa Coke. I knew Dial quite well (SHS Class of 1951) as we were in Girl Scouts together for many years. Rosa Coke was a year ahead of me (SHS 1953). Dial presently resides in Lakeland and Rosa Coke is in San Jose, Calif.)

Fred T. Williams

While stationed in Georgia with a company of soldiers during the Spanish American War, Fred T. Williams, a native of Michigan, decided that if he had the opportunity he would move south as he liked the climate.

In 1899 he returned to Michigan where he attended Michigan State College, served as city engineer and as an assistant superintendent for a logging camp. The time then seemed right for a move to Florida and after a few weeks in Jacksonville, he came to Sanford via the St. Johns River. He liked the town so made it his home in 1908.

Mr. Williams had served as county and city engineer, had been a member of the Seminole County School board for 13 years and was one of the original members of the city planning board.

He was a member of the Modern Woodmen, a director of the Florida Engineering Society, a member of the American Society of Engineers and First Presbyterian church.

He and his wife, Elizabeth, resided at 320 Oak Ave. They had three children: Mrs. Feagan Kelly, Richland, Ga. and Fred H. of Sanford.

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Bush's budget is a 'vision' for Florida

TALLAHASSEE - Focusing on a renewed commitment to public education, helping our most vulnerable citizens, and giving money back to Florida families, Governor Jeb Bush on Tuesday released his proposed Fiscal Year 1999-2000 Executive Budget.

"Florida is poised with a great opportunity provided by the citizens of this state and a growing economy," Governor Bush said during a morning news conference at the state capitol. "This budget represents a shared vision for making the most of this opportunity. We are funding Florida's highest priorities, while restoring tax dollars to where they belong—in the wallets of working families, elders, and the payrolls of small businesses."

The Governor outlined five basic principles that guided the development of his proposed budget:

1. Government cannot grow any faster than our ability to pay for it.
2. In times of growth, tax dollars should be returned to Florida's working families and small businesses.
3. Government must fund its highest priorities first.
4. We must reserve funds for economic slowdowns.
5. Community-based problem solving is preferable to government-based problem solving.

The Governor's \$46.8 billion budget includes a 6.13 percent education funding increase and the largest tax cut in state history.

In addition, the budget returns fiscal responsibility to state government by limiting general revenue spending growth to just 1.2 percent, compared to an average of 6.1 percent the last eight years. Other Budget highlights include:

- *\$2.14 billion in reserved providing integrity, strength and stability to Florida's economy.
- *\$1.5 billion for construction and maintenance of educational facilities
- *\$18.5 million for reading programs to improve student performance
- *\$1.1 billion of tobacco settlement funds to establish an endowment to provide a perpetual funding source for the care of our children and elders
- *An additional \$101.3 million for our child welfare system
- *An additional \$204 million for Kidcare, a program to provide basic health insurance coverage to our most needy children
- *An additional \$204 million for Kidcare, a program to provide basic health insurance coverage to our most needy children
- *An additional \$210 million to serve our developmentally disabled citizens in our communities
- *An additional \$210 million to serve our developmentally disabled citizens in our communities
- *An additional \$25 million to provide aging in place services to the 14,100 waiting seniors in need
- *\$5.2 million to create three Front Porch Florida pilot communities
- *\$40.4 million to begin the implementation of the Four Fronts anti-drug strategy
- *\$300 million for Florida Forever, the continuation of the successful P2000 land acquisition program, to acquire, restore and manage our valuable natural resources.

As noted above, Governor Bush is providing \$210 million to serve our long neglected developmentally disabled citizens in their communities rather than institutions. These community placements will include residential and other services such as training to get and keep a job, transportation, and help with personal and medical care. Almost two-thirds of the current waiting list will be addressed immediately, and waiting lists will be updated to more accurately reflect the true need for developmental services. Services will be client driven and family oriented. Case review and quality assurance processes will be improved. Florida's developmentally disabled citizens will not have to go to court, as they have in the past, to receive the quality of life that they deserve.

Building on his A+ plan for K-12 public schools, the Governor's budget includes a 5.1 percent increase in funding for our state university system and a 4.5 percent increase for Florida's Community Colleges. The higher funding for our state university system provides increased management and budget flexibility by no longer earmarking most increases for specific programs.

Governor Bush pointed out that total spending per \$1,000 of personal income will be \$108.7 in fiscal year 1999-2000, the lowest level in eight years, falling more than 10 percent from its peak in 1994-95. "The citizens of Florida want a smarter and more effective state government," Governor Bush said. "This budget will give Floridians what they deserve by funding priorities, controlling overall government spending, and by returning money directly to the people through the largest tax cut in Florida history."

Deputy Mayor Thom Green told the Oviedo council that work between the city and the Sanford Airport Noise Abatement Committee had addressed many of the issues the city has with growth at the airport.

While the county, three chambers of commerce and the cities of Altamonte Springs and Casselberry have come out in support of the domestic air service that will allow for scheduled service Sanford Mayor Larry Dale calls "a critical ingredient in our efforts to attract new businesses," Lake Mary is withholding judgment.

Lake Mary has focused on four areas of concern, Greene said: installation of an instrument landing system, the need for a noise study, the hiring of a new director sensitive to noise issues, and representation on the airport board. Three out of our have been accomplished, said Greene.

"Progress has been made, but the overall picture is this: this airport needs input from all areas of the county," said Greene. "Until that is done, we have a problem."

"We've come a long way, but before we can go any farther, that issue of representation has to be addressed," he said.

The need for regional representation also concerned Councilman Bob Dallari.

"We're definitely playing catch up," said Dallari. "We need to jump in the game. We need to get more involved."

The nine-member board is comprised of two Sanford residents and seven regional members. Greene pushed for a Lake Mary resident to be appointed to a vacancy filled last fall.

Oviedo resident Valerie El-Jamil suggested the council seek citizen input on the issue.

"The citizens are not happy with the potential impacts," she said. She also suggested the city get input from regional air carriers, as to the impact they have witnessed at other airports.

The Oviedo Council decided to postpone a vote on a resolution of support, and discuss the airport matter in a work session, to be scheduled.

"Lake Mary and Sanford have done a lot of good work," said Dallari, "but there's more work to be done."

Commissioner Paul Lovestrang questioned VanDerworp about whether Longwood would find itself "in the middle of a fight between" the Orlando International Airport Authority and the Orlando Sanford Airport Authority.

VanDerworp said representatives from both airport authorities are communicating primarily through the Metropolitan Planning Organization. He said there is enough potential domestic business for the airport to be part of a regional transportation network.

Companies such as AAA,

CBIS, and Dixon have inquired about the future availability of scheduled domestic service out of the airport. The service could complement domestic service at the Orlando International Airport by servicing niche markets and smaller volume carriers, VanDerworp said.

The cities of Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, and Sanford have passed resolutions or letters of support. So have Seminole County, the Private Business Association of Seminole, Inc., the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, the Greater Oviedo Chamber of Commerce, the Seminole County Convention and Visitors Bureau, and the Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Lake Mary commissioners have concerns about noise at the airport that they shared with the Oviedo commission.

The Sanford Aviation Noise Abatement Committee has been meeting monthly for two years to address concerns such as stopping late night commercial repetitive training, balancing the traffic flow, having preferential runways and arrival/departure routing, and creating helicopter arrival/departure procedures.

The airport's second Instrument Landing System, commissioned for operation in the spring of 1999, will also ease noise concerns, VanDerworp said. The Instrument Landing System will provide navigational assistance for aircraft landing of the main runway during poor weather.

SANFORD - Making room
for improvements to Sanford

A road for Don Knight

SANFORD - As a child, Don Knight aspired to
be a pilot. The quest began when a cousin gave
him a model airplane.

At 66, aviator Knight is as respected in his
home town as the Wright Brothers are at Kitty
Hawk, N.C.

The city of Sanford and the Sanford Airport
Authority have named a road for him - Don
Knight Lane - for his many contributions to
aviation and service to the Civil Air Patrol and
to the Airport Authority.

Ken Wright, the chairman of the Airport
Authority, made the presentation during a
ceremony at the Orlando Sanford Airport.

"This is quite an honor - one of the most ex-
citing things that has happened to me," Knight
told Rep. John Mica, Mayor Larry Dale and oth-
ers who honored him.

Knight surprised everyone when he joked that
he might have been a good idea to name Knight
Lane a toll road.

A native of Sanford, Knight is a combination
of aviator and aviator. He's owned the Don
Knight Shee Shee on First Street since 1969.
He's been flying since 1946 and has instructed
more than 200 new pilots.

Appropriately, Knight has a shoe box filled
with clipped start tabs and home from dresses
from the flyers he has taught. Each has the
name and date of the pilot's first solo. "The
start tab thing is an aviation tradition," Knight
said.

Instructor Knight is proud that a number of
his students have become military and com-
mercial pilots.

Knight gave lessons to his daughter, Donalyn,
and Mayor Dale's daughter, Jennifer.

Knight said that he bought his first plane in
the late 1940's - a 1938 single-engine Taylor
Craft. He said it cost 35 cents a gallon for fuel
in those days. Knight immediately helped form
the South Seminole Flying Club.

His first solo flight from the airport in Sanford
was "a magnificent experience," he said. Being
up there in complete control of an airplane for
the first time is as good as it gets," he said. "My
landing was smooth. I kept waiting for a bounce
but it never came. Most flyers will tell you their
first flight is the best they've ever flown."

As a member of the Civil Air Patrol, Knight
participated in a number of search and rescue
missions in Central Florida.

Open heart surgery in 1980 has curtailed
Knight's air time but he still goes up for an oc-
casional trip in the friendly skies he helped
make safer.

LONGWOOD - Following a

allow that type of service."

Vandervort said the im-
portance of being able to provide
domestic service - as to the
commissioners - can be packaged
and presented to possible cus-
tomers, as a sign of regional ex-
