



Sharing Profits

In the recent years of war production the firm of Jack and Heinz attracted wide attention with its ventures in the mass production of precision optical lenses and instruments and with its accompanying innovations in the field of labor-management relations. The employees got ten per cent of the profits in addition to an extraordinary assort ment of other benefits and comforts.

Now William S. Jack, one of the partners in that wartime enterprise, has dropped another surprise into the industrial scene. A new plant at Solana Beach, Calif., will cut its employees in for fifty per cent of the profits, he has announced. But just profit sharing is not the whole secret of his system of labor-management relations. He declares that an equally important element is the sharing of plans and problems. Only thus can fear be eliminated from the employee's attitude toward his employer.

His formula seems so simple that it is a wonder it has never spread beyond the occasional uses of it made by such entrepreneurs as William Jack. Give employees a share in the profits for incentive. Give them a share in making plans and meeting problem: for a sense of security and confidence in the future. Why wouldn't it work in other industries?

Pictures Of Smells

The detective of the future may study odors, but will not be a sniffer. He will photograph smells, and study their pictures. This is the prediction of inspector J. F. C. B. Vance just retired from the Vancouver, B. C., police force. He has worked out a device for taking pictures of odors through the aid of the spectroscope. These pictures he believes will ultimately be accepted in court as unquestioningly as fingerprint records.

Somewhat startling is Vance's statement that each person has an individual odor, distinguishable from that of others. That is the explanation, doubtless or the ability of dogs such as the bloodhound to follow and find a person never seen before with no clue but the scent of a garment.

Perhaps the sleuth of the future may track criminals and lost persons just as userringly by their individual odors, but without the baying of the hounds and the danger that the quarry may be torn to bits if unable to get beyond their reach when found.



WASHINGTON, Sept. 6-(/P)program already has listed 44 per cent of the nation's World War Il veterans on its rolls.

Only a handful, however, have exhausted the full four years of ducation and training benefits to which they are entitled.

The Veterans Administrations said today about 6,600,000 veterans have taken some sort of education or training under the G. 1. Bill or Public Law 16, which gave similar benefits for disabled vet-

Of the total, more than 2,500,000 have been enrolled in high schools, vocational and trade schools, business schools and other institution

below college level. More than 2,000,000 have, en-rolled in college and university? courses. More than 1,600,000 took on-the-

job training. And more than 600,000 enrolled

in institutional on-farm training, a program combining classroom training with actual farm experience.

By June 80, 112,000 veterana had used up their G. I. bill educa-tional benefits and 120,000 disabled trainees had been declared. rehabilitated.

The program for the disabled veterans started in March, 1948. and for other veterans in June, 1944.

Veterans may start their training up to July 28, 1981, or within four years of the date of dis-charge, whichever is the later date.

The program must be completed by July, 1950, for all but those who enlisted under the Voluntary i Recruitment Act of 1945. Enrollment in both programs on

July 31 was 1,8\$2,278. It has been declining standily since the peak of 2,703,311 in April, 1948.


