U.N. Officials Hear Tennessee Valley Methods Praised By Head

LAKE SUCCESS, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Gordon R. Clapp, chairman of the Board of the Tennessee Valley Authority, said today the TVA goal is the full development of the resources and opportunities of the Tennessee Valley.

Clapp spoke to a general meeting of the United Nations Scientific Conference on the Conservation and Utilization of Resources.

"We believe," Clapp said, "that as the Tennessee Valley uses its natural resources more efficiently and by methods deliberately designed to increase the free choice of citizens having knowledge of the alternatives available to them, the benefits to mankind will run far beyond the Valley, far beyond the United States."

"The time may come when the value of the TVA as a helpful demonstration inspiring emulation in other river valleys of the world will be regarded as its most important contribution to human welfare."

Clapp gave details of the early days of the TVA, and how it has affected the Tennessee Valley. He said the integrated development of the Tennessee River and its tributaries has provided cheap flood control and more economical navigation than could have been achieved by single-purpose developments.

He said the Valley now enjoys a recreation-travel business estimated at \$175,000,000 annually.

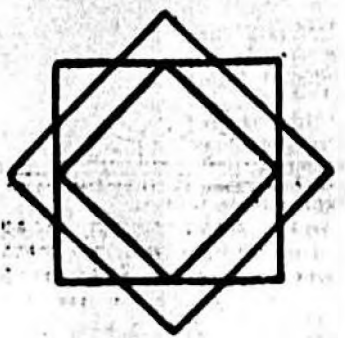
