She testified that on that day the Sergeant brought some friends home to lunch. Although I was not feeling well and (he) complained that I hadn't been nice to them. "After they left me, he started an argument. He said it was my fault he didn't have any family left. He said I had alienated the child, Jimmy, against him and that we were incompatible sexually. "He was drunk and angry and I was afraid to say anything then. I knew from experience my best course was to just keep quiet. But he kept talking. He said he should kill himself. "But before he killed himself, he said he would get me first. He put his right arm around my neck and started to choke. "See how easily I can kill," he said.

Mrs. Ybarbo took the stand wearing the same dress she had on the night of the shooting—a grey woolen jumper with white silk blouse.

(Continued from Page One Sec. 2) one or two other things," he said. "But I don't think the provisions on jurisdictional strikes or secondary boycotts are going to be killed. The President himself asked for them a year ago." Johnson, who said he favors repeal of the act, told reporters that the present law has many "objectionable" features. He didn't go into details about his complaint. Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said he plans to fight the repeal move and will offer the Taft-Hartley Act provisions as amendments to any Administration substitute. That would force a senate vote on each issue. Senator Ball (R-Minn), meanwhile, called a meeting tomorrow of the Senate House watchdog committee to consider its report

to Congress on the labor law's operations. Ball was defeated for re-election and the recommendations of the GOP-controlled group are expected to attract little attention from the new Congress.

Negro Convicted

(Continued from Page One Sec. 2) between white persons and those with at least one-eighth negro or Mongolian blood.

Knight, whose marriage was performed in April, 1946, by the mayor of this south Mississippi town of 3,000, filed notice of appeal.

The maximum penalty under the law is ten years. Miscegenation has been a crime in Mississippi since reconstruction days. Under the present law, a conviction involving miscegenation automatically voids the marriage and any children resulting from the union are illegitimate. The Knights had no children.

Knight was arrested when "people started talking" and told his employer in Laurel that he was a negro. Defense Attorney Quitman Ross explained.

The main issue in the trial was the ancestry of Knight's great-grandmother, who was known as Rachel and who lived on the plantation of Captain Newt Knight, a picturesque character in Mississippi history.

Rachel, the state contended, was a negro, and witnesses were introduced who testified that she and her children were known as negroes. Among these witnesses was Tom Knight, 80-year-old son of Captain Newt, who said that the young Navy veteran's grandfather was a son of Rachel.

Defense witnesses testified that they believed Rachel was a Cherokee Indian. The state's law places no ban on marriages of white persons with members of any colored race except negro and mongoloid. Swartzfager said no charges were planned against the white woman who married Knight under the impression that he was of all white blood.

Knight was drafted as a white man at Camp Shelby in 1943 and his discharge papers, Swartzfager said, listed him as white.

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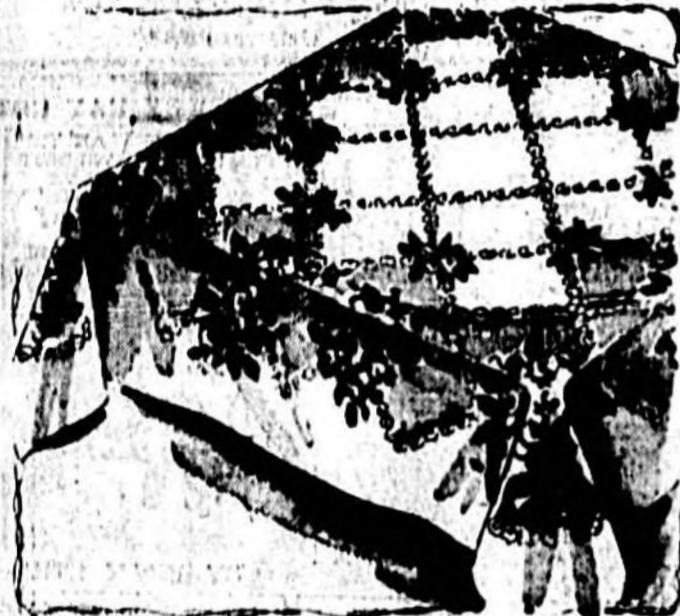
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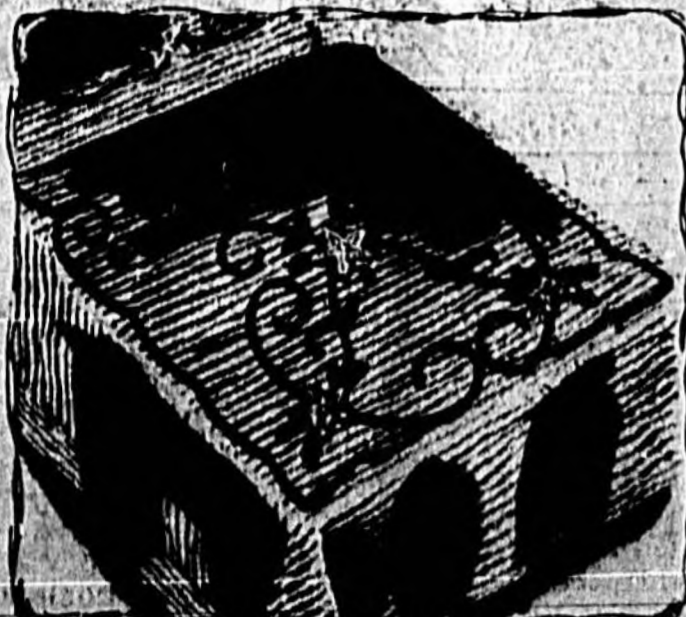


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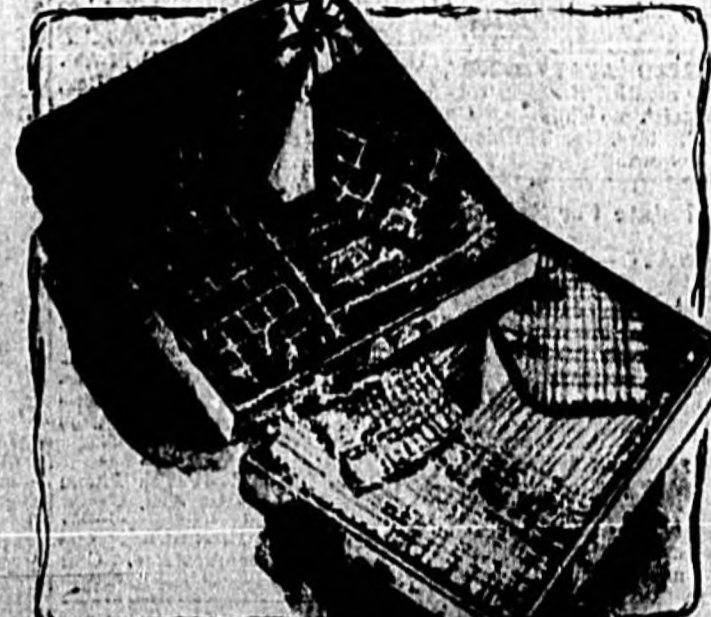
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Billy Kinard Wins 2 Round Knockout Over J. Fernandez

Kinard dazed the Tampa fighter with a hard right to the jaw in the second round. Fernandez then went into a clinch, but Kinard landed a short left jab to the heart to floor him. Fernandez got up on the count of nine. The two men sparred in the center of the ring for a few seconds, but Fernandez clinched again. That was his mistake. Kinard belted him again with a right to the chin and a left cross below the heart to end the feature event.

Candy McDaniel, local negro middleweight, won a seven round

technical knockout over Billy Lancaster of Orlando. Lancaster took a merciless beating from McDaniel, who had trimmed the Orlando fighter on three previous occasions. Everything went to a string post, but the invader would not go down. With his nose and mouth bleeding steadily in the seventh, Lancaster was sent to his corner by Referee Joe Moss, who awarded the battle to McDaniel.

Big Nine-Pacific Coast War Nears Freezing Mark

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 21. (AP)—The cool war between the Big Nine and Pacific Coast conferences got a little chillier today.

There was no serious declaration of hostilities but a simple announcement by head Coach Bob Voigts of Northwestern University, newly arrived on the Rose Bowl front, did nothing to add to the warmth of the Big Nine east conference domestic relations.

Briefly, Voigts said that from today on, all Northwestern practices will be closed to the public and to football writers, all writers, that is, except "our midwest writers, who can go and come as they please."

This brought a reply from Norrie West, director of athletic news of the University of California.

West said: "Without even talking to Pappy Waldorf, I will say that all of the California practices are open to all football writers, including the midwestern contingent who are with the Northwestern team. This goes when California comes down to Riverside next Monday and resumes practices there."

Voigt's statement of policy follows a pattern set up in general fashion by previous visiting Rose Bowl coaches. Fritz Crisler of Michigan last year did much the same thing, and Ray Eliot of Illinois the year before was on the sectional-secretive side.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21. (AP)—Eastern and Western college football stars, who will meet here New Year's Day in the annual "Shriners" Gauntlet game, had another light practice session scheduled today before moving tonight to their permanent training quarters.

Parl-Mutuels

Florida racetracks experienced a 20 per cent drop in pari-mutuel betting during the first ten days of the current horse racing season. Bettors wagered only \$3,568,265 through the betting windows at Tropical Park from Dec. 1 through Dec. 11, compared with \$5,018,116 bet during the first ten days of the season at Gulfstream Park in 1947. Gulfstream opened the horse racing year in Miami last year.

The State's share of this money goes to the old age pension fund which during the ten days suffered a loss of \$72,500. Should the same drop in betting continue at all tracks during the 1948-'49 season the state will drop nearly \$900,000.

With money decreasing from the pari-mutuels the state faces a terrific problem. Not only does the State lose the pari-mutuel "take," but it also loses money from the U.S. government to be applied to the old age benefits. The federal government will reduce its contribution to Florida's aged old for dollar by which the State's contribution is reduced.

We are not advocates of betting, but since betting is legal and heavily taxed we are concerned over the decrease in revenue to the state. We realize that the drop may mean that people are getting better, and are giving their extra money to their churches and to welfare organizations, but on the other hand we are not inclined to put too much faith in that angle. People are human. That's what's wrong with the world today.

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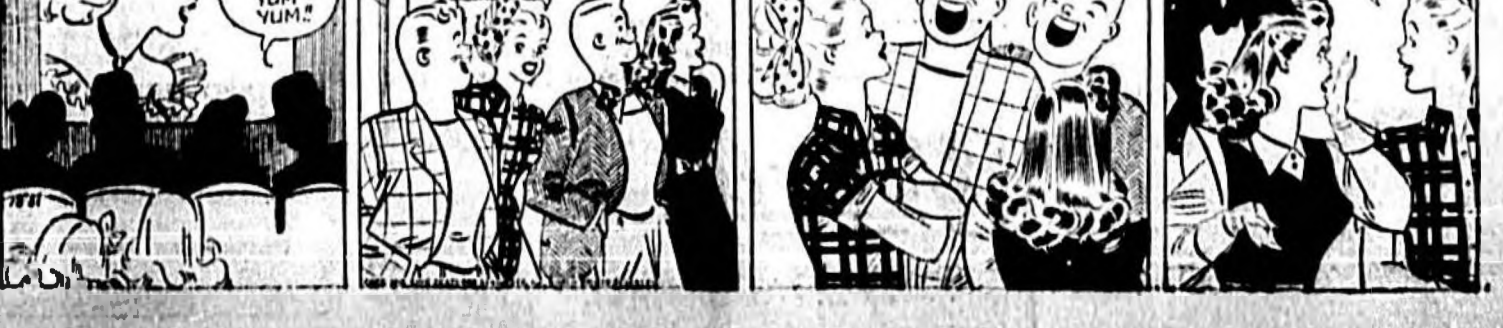

when he denied before a federal grand jury that he passed out government secrets to ex-Communist courier Whittaker Chambers.

Mundt said Duggan, who was an adviser to former Secretary of State Cordell Hull, was named by Isaac Don Levine, editor of the anti-Communist magazine Plain Talk in testimony on Dec. 8.

In a partial transcript of Levine's testimony, released by Mundt, the witness said Chambers had told former Assistant Secretary of State Adolf A. Berle, Jr., that Duggan was one of six persons in the State Department who allegedly had funneled out confidential information at various times.

Mundt, who revealed the transcript a few hours after Duggan's death, said "The testimony should speak for itself."

The Congressional committee had planned to question Duggan, Mundt said, but had refrained from calling him because it believed the federal grand jury in New York planned to call him in its twin investigation of espionage. Mundt did not mention the time of any

possible grand jury appearance by Duggan.

Duggan apparently was alone in the office of the Institute of International Education at 2 West 45th Street when he plunged to the sidewalk just off 5th Avenue at 7:30 P. M., police said. No witness to his fall could be found. No note was left, and there was no

sign of a struggle in the office, detectives reported.

Duggan's widow, Helen, was quoted by detective James Pritchard as saying her husband underwent an operation on his back last fall and apparently had recovered fully.

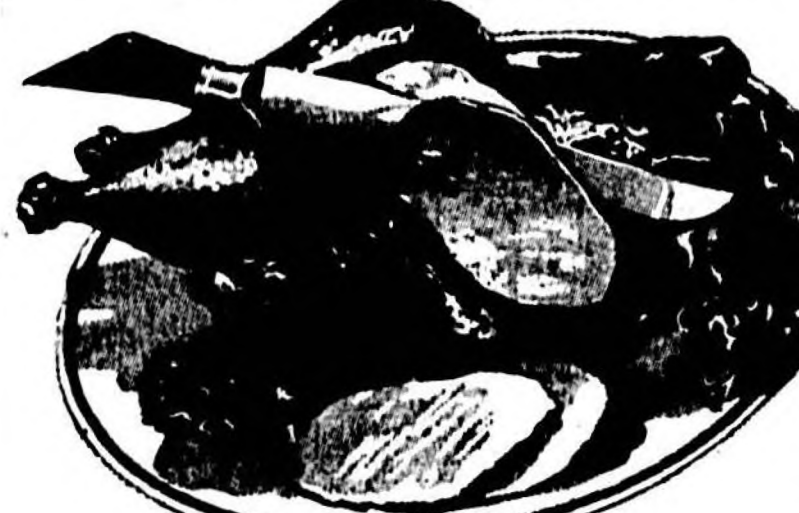
