None of them will ever run again.

"They ambushed us one afternoon about 3:00 plefock. They hit is with everything they had. We were fighting alongside the Turor got really tough the Turks left the hill they were supposed to be defending and took off running. The Chinese just awarmed like been. They were shooting mortar fire at us that was deadly accurate. We had to leave running right behind the Turks. I ran and crawled for eight miles over the mountains losing everything I had except my rifle and clothes I was wearing. Even lost my billfold with sixty dollars in

"My battalion lost all equipment except about five vehicles and we also lost about two-thirds of our men. After going through a six mile road block with Chinks on both sides of the road shooting machine guns and tifle fire at us. We really did lose the men during that ten days of hell.
"We are back near Secul now. Hope we keep on going south and that the United Nations soon get this thing peacefully settled.
"I went to Seoul trying to find Col. Runge, but could never find out where he worked. Was in such a hurry though that there



Russia To BeResumed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5—(A)—
Russia has agreed to resume negotiations Jan. 15 for settlement of the \$11 billion Soviet account for lend-lease the United States supplied her in World War II.

Casualties In Korea Number 40 Thousand

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5—(P)—Announced American casualties in Korea reached 40,176 today, an increase of 1,851 in a week.

The total, reported by the Defense Department, represents the number of notifications to next of kin through last Friday, It includes 6,031 killed in action, 27,997 wounded and 6,148 missing in action.

The wounded figure includes 716 who died of wounds. The missing includes 14 known dead, making total deaths 6,761.

Of those reported missing since the beginning of the Korean war, 720 have since returned to U. S. control, 107 are known prisoners of war, 14 have died, leaving 5,307 currently in the missing category.






