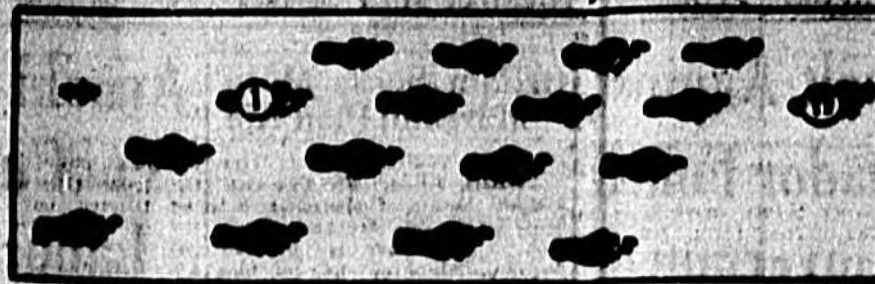

Sleight-of-Hand

AS a party allivener, prepare two pieces of cord each about 18 feet long. Tie the ends of one piece to the wrists of a woman. Pass the other through the loop and tie it to the wrists of a man. As a result there are two cords looped together securely; inform them that it is their task to get free without untying the knots or cutting the cord.

Probably, the couple will step over and under the cord and twist it in all sorts of ways in an endeavor to extricate themselves, until it is necessary for you to show them how to set themselves free. One of the couple must take the center of the cord with which he is tied and pass it through the part that is tied around one of the wrists of his partner. This should be done on the top of the hand and away from the fingers. Next draw this loop over the fingers and out at the underpart of the hand, and each one is free.

FUN TO PLAY

A PLEASURABLE pastime for two or more, when things are dull at the vacation spot or home, is "Beetle." It requires a pencil, sheets of paper and a die (that is, one half of a pair of dice).

The "Beetle" that is the basis of the game is to be drawn as illustrated below. Each part of it has a numerical "value," which is:

1. Body. 2. Head. 3. Tail. 4. Eye. 5. Feet. 6. Leg.

Players toss the die to see who starts, "low" being the winner. He rolls, and if he rolls a "1" he can begin draw-



ing his beetle—that is, he can draw the body. If he doesn't roll a "1," he passes the die to the next in turn, and so on. A player can use the rolls denoting head, leg and tail after he has rolled the body. (Legs, eyes and feet are rolled one at a time.) He can use the rolls denoting eye and feet after he has rolled the body. There are 17 parts of the beetle to be rolled. If he rolls something he cannot use, he loses his turn.

The goal of the players to complete his beetle is the winner.

It can be an amusing and exciting game, and persons of any age and temperament can enjoy it.

MARCH OF EVENTS

Is Return of the *Ille de France* War Cost French More Than Symbol of French Recovery? 60 Per Cent of Their Vessels Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—The return of a French steamship to the Atlantic lanes as a luxury liner is looked upon here with hopeful eyes as a harbinger that Europe may work out its economic revival. The ship is the *Ille de France*, which carried 630,000 troops during the war without incident, due chiefly to the liner's speed. With supreme effort, the French have restored the ship in an admirable manner perhaps never surpassed. Scores of leading French designers and artists were engaged. All to obtain the precious American dollar.

To realize what such an effort means, even as of today, one has to look back. More than 477,000 buildings were completely wrecked during the war, and 1,343,000 others were badly damaged.

Out of 26,878 miles of railway track merely 11,300 miles could be salvaged. Add 2,139 railroad bridges wrecked, 4,929 locomotives lost and \$12,000 freight cars destroyed. Many of France's hotels were demolished—125,000 hotel rooms having been partially or completely destroyed.

However, the greatest blow suffered by the French economy was in shipping. France, with 1,978 miles of coastline, is primarily a maritime nation. Many industries, especially the luxury trades, depend on foreign business.

France lost 44 ships, totaling 322,000 tons, or 62 per cent, of her 1939 tonnage, in the war. Figures, however, cannot depict the tragic toll in personnel, nor the extent of the economic damage, for the losses included the majority of France's large merchant ships.

The most notable example was the burning of the 53,000-ton *Noranda*, renamed the *Lafayette*, at New York after having been taken over by the United States for conversion as a troop ship.

Surviving vessels, besides the *Ille de France*, were the smaller *Mauro Colombo* and *De Grasse*. The *De Grasse*, while immune in a French port under German occupation, was scuttled by the Nazis as a defense measure.

However, the French raised the ship and put her into service in 1947 as the first example of their mettle. The *De Grasse* is less than half the size of the 43,450-ton *Ille de France*.

Another, even larger reconditioned vessel will join the French trans-Atlantic fleet next year—the *Liberte*, of 49,746 tons. The *Liberte* was the German liner *Europa*, allotted to the French when the few remaining German liners were parceled out under the armistice terms.

Beyond the loss in shipping, however, was the destruction of ports and facilities. In overcoming this the French have achieved their greatest success. No other nation had such complete port wreckage to face.

Even today, behind the port facilities which have been restored, are the ruins of the waterfront towers. Reconstruction of the *Ille de France* at St. Nazaire was performed against a background of rubble.

The British did a remarkable job in restoring their great liners and completing new ones following the war, and they had to pull in their belts to do that, but their ports and shipyards were intact.

The American tourist dollar, as a lifeline to dollar-starved countries, remains one of the chief hopes of economic chiefs in Washington and abroad. Thus the advent on July 26 of the *Ille de France* at New York takes on an international significance.

The *Ille*, smartly refashioned with two decks now instead of three, is viewed as a symbol of what can be done, and the much that must be done.

Hints To Housewives

DEFROSTING A FREEZER

Defrosting a home freezer is a job different in many ways from defrosting any automatic refrigerator, according to Dr. East Crasnow, U. S. Department of Agriculture physicist.

Dr. McCracken offers the following recommendations for removing powdery frost and solid ice:

Defrost before more than half an inch of frost forms over a considerable area of refrigerated surfaces. Ordinarily once a year is often enough, but in humid surroundings or if freezer is frequently opened the job may need doing two or three times a year.

Defrost, if possible, when little food is in freezer.

Remove frost unaided with ice scraper, with freezer in operation. If freezer is not full, move food packages from one part to another as you work—rather than taking them out.

Use special scraping tools sold for the purpose or a hand-sawed spatular, a petty knife or sharp-edged wooden paddle. Catch frost on papers, cardboard or cloth as it is scraped from vertical drawers and walls; or collect it from bottom with dustpan and whiskbroom. If pans and brooms are kept cold, frost will not melt from contact with them.

PAPER MILL EXECUTIVE EMPHASIZES THE VALUE OF FORESTS IN FLORIDA

While attending a recent forestry conference for bankers at the University of Florida, Justin R. Weddell of Pensacola, an official of a large paper company, brought out some facts about Florida's trees that should be of interest to farmers and to everyone else who is interested in forests of the state.

At the turn of the present century, Florida had 22,000,000 acres of timber, much of which was virgin growth, he said, and only one other state, Oregon, had more timber land. In those days, few men thought of the need for planting trees, but today, after years of promiscuous cutting, reforestation is considered a primary necessity for continued progress of the state.

Needing a continuous supply of wood for profitable operations, Florida paper and pulp mills are very much concerned about forests of the state and are taking a leading part in reforestation. Mr. Weddell emphasized the great need of trees for the pulp industry by pointing out that a 1,000-ton mill uses nearly 6,000,000 trees a year.

Trees planted by farmers today will be of pulp wood size in 1970. To indicate the increase in the value of forest lands, the paper mill executive told of one large tract (90,000 acres) where stumpage was valued at \$128,000 in 1929, while today its stumpage is

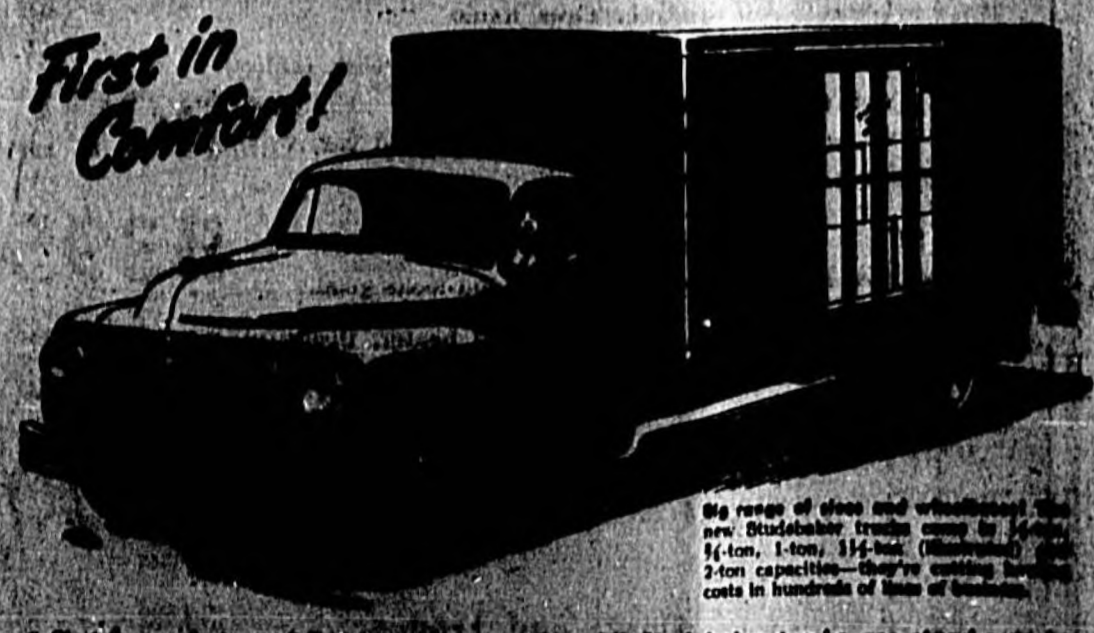

Employment For Women Shows Big Increase In U. S.

WASHINGTON, (AP) Employment for women is increasing while male employment is dropping...

The number of employed U. S. women increased from 16,000,000 in May 1945 to 17,770,000 in May 1946. In the same period the number of men at work dropped from 49,000,000 to 47,250,000.

Unemployment is hitting both sexes alike. The number of women and men seeking work rose almost 100 percent for each sex. This is all a continuation of a long trend since the turn of the century...

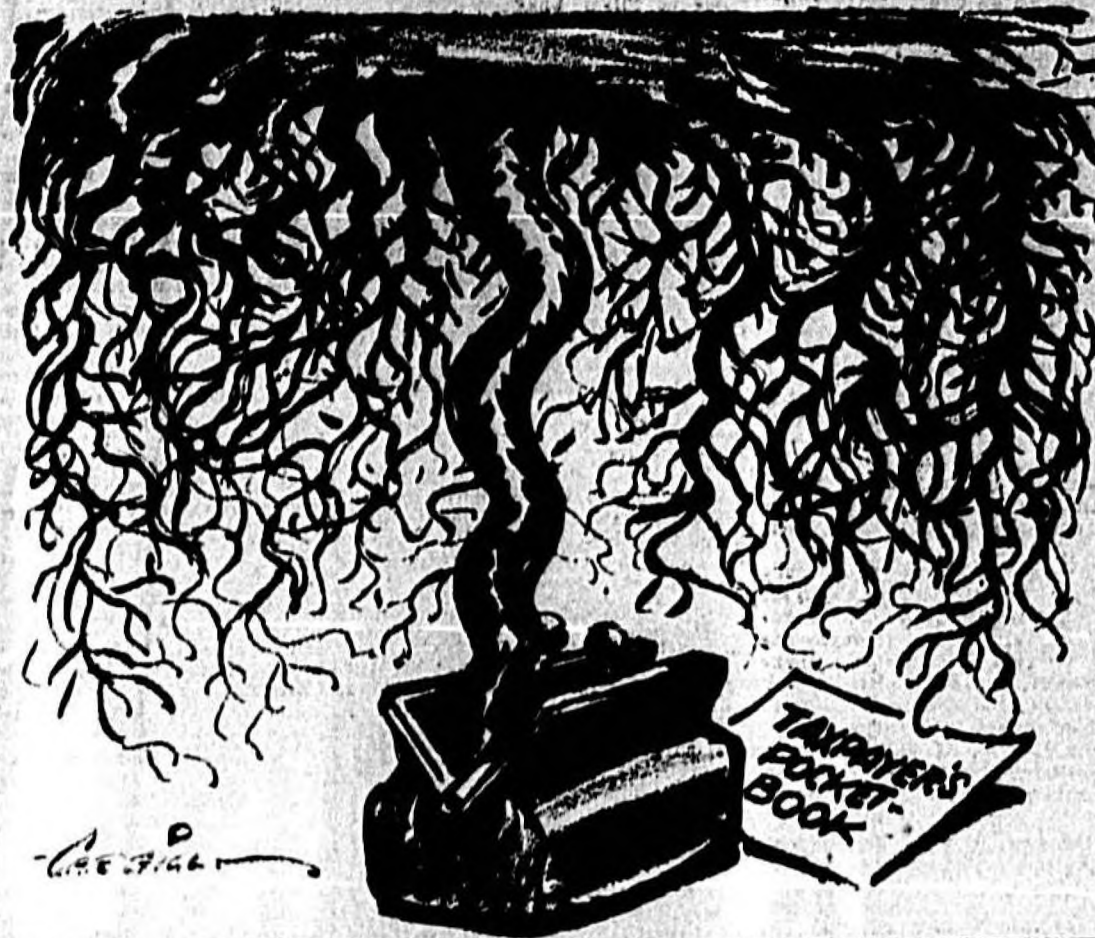
Take the figures on the total labor force. The total of men at work has fallen from 49,000,000 in May 1945 to 47,250,000 in May 1946. Among men the increase in the period was only 1.4 percent.

Women constituted only 18 percent of the total labor force in 1945. They were 20 per cent in May 1946. The rapid work made possible by the new and improved methods revolutionized business processes.

Girls were often found to be better suited for the work than men, and they would work for less money. There was a great moral boost—the complainers for men they once had to provide themselves clothing, laundry and canned and baked goods.

Although the typewriter was not on the market shortly after the war, the "touch system" didn't come into general use until the 1930s. The rapid work made possible by the new and improved methods revolutionized business processes.

U. S. Cities Stress Recreation To Aid Happiness, Health

AP Wirephoto NEW YORK—Cities are stressing recreation more than ever to aid Americans in their pursuit of happiness and health.

Several hundred opened new facilities for recreation in the last two years. They range from tennis courts to wading pools, drama groups, and arts and crafts classes.

New highs in facilities, leaders, and funds spent on recreation in 1946 are reported in the Recreation Year Book just issued by the National Recreation Association.

There were 45,448 men and women employed as recreation leaders, and 5,899 had fulltime, year-round jobs. Another 99,994 volunteer workers pitched in.

Playgrounds and indoor centers with leaders present drew 446,000 children and adults during the year. Swim centers had nearly 163,000,000 customers. Tennis players used 11,964 public courts, and there were nearly as many softball diamonds.

Archery ranges, shuffleboard courts and bowling greens attracted people seeking in mild exercises. Children and young adults used 13,830 outdoor playgrounds, one-quarter of which stayed open all year.

School buildings made up more than half the 6,611 buildings used for community recreation. These were headquarters for many of the forms of crafts, music, nature activities, and hobbies.

A majority of the cities reporting have separate recreation departments. Eleven out of every 12 had unpaid citizen boards.

WASHINGTON, July 27—(AP)—The Senate today accepted with a fight the 10 per cent cut in European recovery funds voted by its appropriations committee. The amendment to the House-passed bill was approved by voice vote. However, a stack of other amendments still had to be acted on before a vote on the bill itself. In approving a 10 per cent reduction the Senate voted to provide \$3,626,390,000 for the Economic Cooperation Administration for the year which began July 1. The House voted \$3,568,470,000 with authority to spend it in 10 1/2 months, if necessary. In addition the Senate bill contains another \$150,000,000 in loan authority for aiding Europe's recovery. That item comes up for action later. NEW YORK, July 27—(AP)—An emergency appeal for special nurses to care for polio cases was issued today by Hospital Commissioner Max Baucus.
