## Dellums To SEEDCO: Carter Ignoring Democratic Humanistic Platform

U.S. Rep. Ronald V. Dellums, D-California, called on the people of the nation to make President Jimmy Carter's life "so miserable for the next two years it will be guaranteed that he will not return to office for another four years."

"Did we elect Jimmy Carter, the individual, or Jimmy Carter the standard-bearer of the Democratic Party?" asked the congressman.

Pointing to the humanistic platform of the Democratic party adopted in convention two years ago, Dellums said the platform has gone by the boards in the Carter presidency and Carter, by ignoring the platform, broke his word to the people.

"The president's program flies in the face of the Democratic Party platform," he said.

"I remember the nation electing Richard Nixon, an individual, to office and he almost stole the whole country," he said.

Speaking at the Seventh Annual Friendship Dinner Banquet of the Seminole Employment Economic Development Corp. (SEEDCO) at the Sanford Civic Center Friday night, Dellums attacked the Carter proposal to cut 15 percent "an incredible amount of money" from the federal budget, saying those cuts will be made from human services—housing, education, health and welfare.

At the same time, said the congressman, the president is proposing to raise the military budget by three percent over and above inflation.

Comparing U.S. military strength to that of the Soviet Union, Dellums said the United States military strength is an superior that it will be a long time before Russia can catch up. "Robert McNamara (then secretary of state) said 10 years ago if we could destroy 30 percent of the Russian population and 70 percent of its economy, it could never come back again as a major industrial country."

## No Study Needed, Sanford Policemen Tell Candidate

About 16 Sanford policemen told a city commission candidate they disapprove of his efforts to establish a committee to survey the department's management because, they said, such a survey is not needed.

That's what David Farr, commission candidate for seat three, said he encountered when he met with policemen Friday. Farr said he went to the department to clarify his position and to give his reasons for asking the department be surveyed.

"My main purpose in asking for a panel to look at the police department is to put the matter to rest," Farr said.

He said he initiated the committee request after being told by people with whom he spoke during his campaign that there is a feeling the police department has problems.

Farr however, confirmed the problems said to exist are primarily the same as those said to exist several months ago but which were examined by at least four separate agencies, all of which concluded they were unable to substantiate the claims with the exception of a few minor departmental operation procedures problems.

Farr also said none of those who told him there may be problems in the department were able to cite specific examples of what those problems might be, or who, if anyone, in the department has any problems.

He did say, however, there was one specific incident he was concerned about in which a police officer allegedly declined to interfere in a disturbance because those involved reportedly had "friends on the department."

"I must admit there are no specific problems I could see a committee to examine, but I feel since it's being talked about it should be looked at so the department can be exonerated and the matter laid to rest."

"I would be more interested in having such a committee look at the department as a whole, and as to how it's managed I assured the policemen with whom I spoke that I am not after anyone's job, but that if a committee looked at the department and found any individuals functioning improperly, perhaps they should be removed," Farr noted.

Farr said the policemen he spoke to Friday indicated they feel such a survey is unnecessary because in their opinion there are no problems and they are disgruntled because the department continues to be an unnecessary target being unfairly held in an unfavorable light in the public eye.

Farr said his meeting with the policemen lasted about 45 minutes, and that his feeling was "I don't think they agreed with me, but I think they understood what my motive is."

### First Woman County Attorney

# She's Not Certain Yet Of Her 'Major Expectations'

The year 1978 has been the year of the woman in Seminole County.

First, Fran Lamson of Bradford County became the first woman in Florida history to be elected to the circuit court bench. Her judicial circuit comprises Seminole and Bradford counties. Then, Sandra Glass became the first woman in Seminole County's 50-year history to be elected to the county commission. Now, Mildred Clayton, 34, has become the first woman to be named Seminole County attorney. She was chosen from 29 applicants for the \$21,000 position.

She succeeds a long list of well-known political figures in that job — including Mack H. Cleveland Jr., who has since served in the Florida Senate; Harold Johnson, who has since been serving as a county judge; E. Thom Rumberger, who was a circuit judge before assuming the county attorney's office; and Tom Preston, who is still active in the Democratic party as state commissioner.

Clayton, many of her predecessors, however, Miss Clayton says she is "apprehensive." I haven't started out what major expectations I have. I've been fortunate in having opportunities come along in a natural cycle. Each has proven to be an opportunity for learning and different kinds of problems. I don't have any political aspirations.

"I am not performing politically. I'm still developing as an attorney and trying to have a good handle on the practice of law," Miss Clayton said.

One of the women who with 89 men in her graduating class from the University of Florida Law School in 1974, Miss Clayton said it is tough out there for a woman to become a lawyer. "It has a lot to do with your early upbringing. In the past, women did not have the strength or aggressiveness. Don't get me wrong, I love the difference between men and women. But there is a willingness by women today to enter the fray. They are not being held back from the beginning.

"As many girls participate in competitive sports like Little League, the competitive spirit develops and enhances their ability to work with males," she said. Miss Clayton, although married to John Knight of the Florida Ranchlands, a real estate company, retains her maiden name. "There is no particular special reason other than I had been practicing under my maiden name before I got married. I had gone to law school under that name and was known by Clayton," she said.

Asked whether she uses her husband's name professionally, she said a person legally has to choose one or the other. A native of Orlando, Miss Clayton officially became the county's attorney on Dec. 1, had a few days' assistance and reputation from immediate past county attorney, Harry Stewart.

and now is on her own. She is currently assisting from a large stack of applications. "I thought I had found one," she said, noting that earlier in the week the county commission approved the hiring of \$20,000 annually of the person she suggested.

"She, before I could notify him that he had been chosen, he called me to say he had found another job elsewhere," she said. With a thick folder of applications for the job before her, Miss Clayton said many of the applicants are from out of state and are making the position in order to move to Florida. "Even my undergraduate degree seemed unusual at the time because women were not supposed to be interested in economics," said Miss Clayton. She received a Fulbright scholarship to South America in economics. "Then they made economics a numbers game. I had been reasonably successful in school and found words better tools for me than numbers. The combination of numbers and other factors compelled to encourage me to go to law school. It was the



# Goal Of Program Is Steps To Better Living Stepping Stones Stresses Independence

Communication is the name of the game! We teach crafts to work out the person's frustrations with society. They learn to communicate with their peers, by touch, by spoken word or eye contact. There are many ways of expressing yourself. We try to bring out each person's creativity," Polly said.

Another of her talents is getting people to learn to crafts rather than food. CATS (Creative and Thinking Secret) is a therapy group based upon behavior models.

"This program emphasizes people living independently. We promote these steps by teaching coping skills for a better quality of life. There are many different life styles. People become frustrated trying to live up to expectations. We teach them to live a better life at a level in which they are functioning," said Polly.

The program is funded by grants. "Right now, we are working on two projects - making dolls for foster children for Christmas and making dolls for foster children's hospitals. We work in cooperation with other agencies."

"We promote these steps by teaching coping skills for a better quality of life. There are many different life styles. People become frustrated trying to live up to expectations. We teach them to live a better life at a level in which they are functioning," said Polly.

"I love all types of weaving, from very primitive to an eight-harness loom. I teach that loom weaving here. It makes me learn out of scrap material. This type of work goes along with my own weaving, as I'm part Algonquin Indian, on my father's side," she said.

There are four Stepping Stone Centers in the county, including the ones on Robin Road and St. Marks Presbyterian Church, both in Altamonte Springs; and the ones on Westside and Redding Gardens in Sanford. A new Center opened in Geneva during the latter part of the year. "We hope to have one in Oviedo by the first of the year," she said.

Polly is also a consultant at a community service center at the Regency Apartments in Altamonte. Mary Gilmore supervises the program for the elderly.

Coordinator for the Stepping Stones is Paul Green. John Hope conducts group and individual therapy. Sheila Fryer teaches coping skills.

Most of the people in the Stepping Stones program are elderly, according to Polly.





Fold crosswise and put between the mattress and mattress pad or sheet.  
Works like a charm.







## Demo Delegate: 'Well-Run' Parley

There were some grumblings by delegates at the Democratic mini-convention in Manatee over the weekend that it was being controlled or orchestrated and a few South Florida delegates were not pleased with the way party chairman John White handled the gathering.

But Kathleen Reynolds of Sanford, an alternate delegate at large from Florida, said today in the workshop she attended she didn't see either orchestration or control.

"The people certainly had the right to present their views. In the workshop on the national health insurance program, the people on the platform took up so much time, everyone in the audience did not have time to ask all their questions or make all their statements."

"We were told, however, we could write to John White and he would put our statements in the record minutes. Many people were accommodated during the question-and-answer period and didn't seem unhappy when questions and statements were cut off. In other workshops we had elections for those who were going to serve on the platform committee for the 1980 convention.

"I thought the convention was well-run

myself and I learned a lot about many matters including the problems of older citizens," said Mrs. Reynolds, active in the local Democratic Party for the past 18 years and currently state committeewoman as well as Seminole County committeewoman and president of the Democratic Women's Club of Seminole County.

Among those Florida delegates who have complained was Mrs. Nancy Abrams of Miami who announced she has sent a letter to White charging he "hindered the Democratic process to its ultimate limits."

Others from the Florida delegates complained that the convention produced much praise for the Carter administration but little debate on controversial issues such as abortion and gay rights.

"Petitions to get resolutions on various matters on the floor were circulating throughout the convention," said Mrs. Reynolds. "It is possible resolutions could not get sufficient signatures to get some controversial issues on the floor because the majority did not wish to bring these issues to the floor for debate."

Mrs. Reynolds pointed to a letter put out by the Democratic National Committee (DNC) which outlined procedures for getting amendments to the temporary rules of the

## Sanford Commission Cool On Police Panel Request

Unless the Sanford City Commission can be convinced there are specific management problems at the city police department, a request to establish a panel to survey the department will be tabled at its 7:30 meeting tonight.

That was the consensus of commissioners asked this morning how they would treat the request by David Farr, assistant chief of police, when that agenda item comes up for discussion.

Farr has said he is asking the panel be established because of comments made to him by the general public during his recent campaign.

However, Farr also confirmed the public comments dealt with problems said to exist at the police department in the past and looked into by four separate agencies, all of which concluded allegations of major departmental problems could not be substantiated.

Farr stated his position and said he will approach the commission tonight not with "specific charges but to report on a need, a general public climate in Sanford that something is wrong at the police department."

Farr continued: "I intend to make suggestions to the commission which could help reverse that mood or correct it."

As to the commission tabling his request until after the election, Farr said: "If the commission takes action tonight, fine."

"If they want to table it, that's their prerogative, but I don't think that would be wise... I think the public wants to see some positive action."

"That police department has been here since 1882, so far as I'm concerned, and enough is enough. As far as the issue goes for tonight, yes, I'd prefer tabling it, but I prefer killing it off altogether," said Commissioner Eddie Keith.

Keith noted he has had many contacts in Sanford and contact has from time to time with what the general public often feel police should be handling, but may be unable to.

"I've had people contact me and tell me about a drunk in the area or something similar, and

As she rode along, she kept thinking to herself, "God and little poor children made this all possible, without them I wouldn't be here and this would never be happening," she said.


"In case you should start to get a worried look, you have to remind yourself you could never have done it without God's help," said the Sunday and president of the Good

## 'Gifted' Children: They Punch, Film, 'Expand Worlds'

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The sign on the door says "Museum." Once inside, you hear the

familiar jargon of a television studio. "Are you ready? Lights, camera, action," the director says as he stands poised inside the camera staring at the

This scene is not taking place at a large television station but in the confines of a classroom at Truman Middle School in south Seminole County, Manatee, about 30 minutes

away from punching the necessary data into a computer and recording an answer to be punched up on the printed sheet.

This scene is not taking place in a computer center, but in a classroom at South, Seminole Middle School in Manatee.

In both instances, the participants are students in the Seminole County school district's gifted student program.

The program which has about 60 students is currently in operation at one high school, 13 elementary schools and four middle schools.

If a student is found to meet the criteria for the gifted program but does not live near one of these schools, the school district does permit the student to enroll in a school which does have a gifted student program and if a bus isn't going to that school the district will pay the transportation costs of the parent to take the student, according to Mary Wheeler, program director for advanced education for the school district.

To be admitted to the program a student must have a 120 IQ or higher and has to have parental consent.

Although the gifted student needs to sit day in the program, he is still required to
