

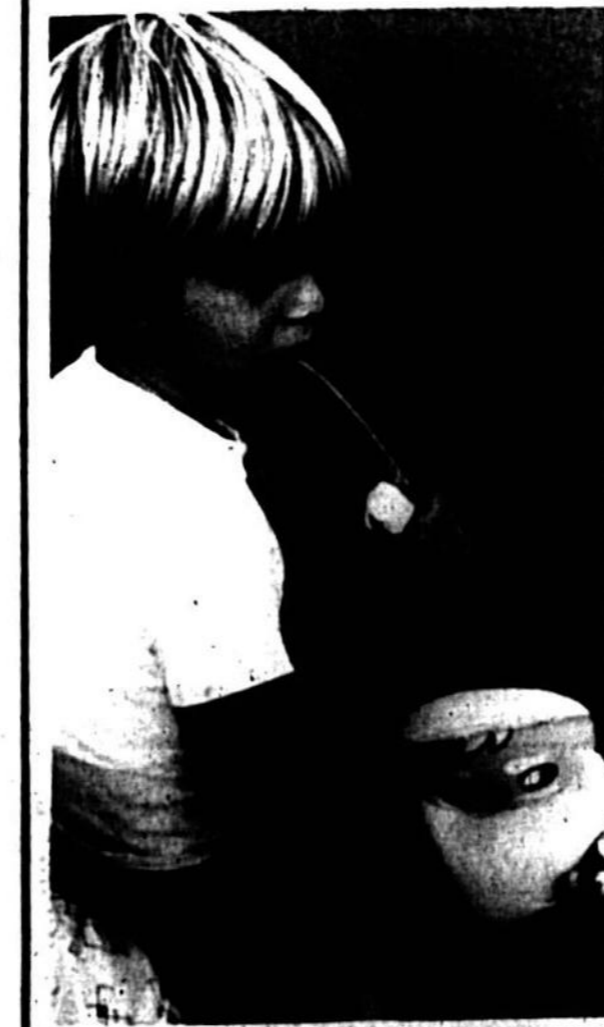

## Dellums To SEEDCO: Carter Ignoring Democratic Humanistic Platform

U.S. Rep. Ronald V. Dellums, D-California, called on the people of the nation to make President Jimmy Carter's life "so miserable for the next two years it will be guaranteed that he will not return to office for another four years."

"Did we elect Jimmy Carter, the individual, or Jimmy Carter the standard-bearer of the Democratic Party?" asked the congressman.

Pointing to the humanistic platform of the Democratic party adopted in convention two years ago, Dellums said the platform has gone by the boards in the Carter presidency and Carter, by ignoring the platform, broke his word to the people.

"The president's program flies in the face of the Democratic Party platform," he said.

"I remember the nation electing Richard Nixon, an individual, to office and he almost stole the whole country," he said.

Speaking at the Seventh Annual Friendship Dinner Banquet of the Seminole Employment Economic Development Corp. (SEEDCO) at the Sanford Civic Center Friday night, Dellums attacked the Carter proposal to cut 15 percent "an incredible amount of money" from the federal budget, saying those cuts will be made from human services—housing, education, health and welfare.

At the same time, said the congressman, the president is proposing to raise the military budget by three percent over and above inflation.

Comparing U.S. military strength to that of the Soviet Union, Dellums said the United States military strength is an superior that it will be a long time before Russia can catch up. "Robert McNamara (then secretary of state) said 10 years ago if we could destroy 30 percent of the Russian population and 70 percent of its economy, it could never come back again as a major industrial country."

## No Study Needed, Sanford Policemen Tell Candidate

About 16 Sanford policemen told a city commission candidate they disapprove of his efforts to establish a committee to survey the department's management because, they said, such a survey is not needed.

That's what David Farr, commission candidate for seat three, said he encountered when he met with policemen Friday. Farr said he went to the department to clarify his position and to give his reasons for asking the department be surveyed.

"My main purpose in asking for a panel to look at the police department is to put the matter to rest," Farr said.

He said he initiated the committee request after being told by people with whom he spoke during his campaign that there is a feeling the police department has problems.

Farr however, confirmed the problems said to exist are primarily the same as those said to exist several months ago but which were examined by at least four separate agencies, all of which concluded they were unable to substantiate the claims with the exception of a few minor departmental operation procedures problems.

Farr also said none of those who told him there may be problems in the department were able to cite specific examples of what those problems might be, or who, if anyone, in the department has any problems.

He did say, however, there was one specific incident he was concerned about in which a police officer allegedly declined to interfere in a disturbance because those involved reportedly had "friends on the department."

"I must admit there are no specific problems I could see a committee to examine, but I feel since it's being talked about it should be looked at so the department can be exonerated and the matter laid to rest."

"I would be more interested in having such a committee look at the department as a whole, and as to how it's managed I assured the policemen with whom I spoke that I am not after anyone's job, but that if a committee looked at the department and found any individuals functioning improperly, perhaps they should be removed," Farr noted.

Farr said the policemen he spoke to Friday indicated they feel such a survey is unnecessary because in their opinion there are no problems and they are disgruntled because the department continues to be an unnecessary target being unfairly held in an unfavorable light in the public eye.

Farr said his meeting with the policemen lasted about 45 minutes, and that his feeling was "I don't think they agreed with me, but I think they understood what my motive is."

Stoned Troops In Europe

The Army's experience in Vietnam demonstrated conclusively that drug abuse in the ranks adversely affected efficiency and combat performance.
In one grisly and tragic episode, an entire platoon was overrun and slaughtered by the North Vietnamese in a night attack while most of the GIs were stoned on marijuana.
Thus, the latest evidence of a new surge of drug abuse among U.S. troops in Europe ought to alarm the Defense Department, Congress and the White House.
A congressional subcommittee touring bases in Europe reports that up to 50 percent of GIs in some units use drugs while on duty.

Merit Vs. Patronage

Despite President Carter's campaign pledge that all federal court judges and U.S. attorneys would be appointed "strictly on the basis of merit without any consideration of political support or influence," some critics are doubtful.
Common Cause president David Colan accuses the White House and the Justice Department of reverting to the patronage system.
"Merit is an attitude in the Justice Department," he said. "To do as little as possible, to change as little as possible and that has been sanctioned by the White House."
As issues to the "merit" approach adopted by the President in writing members, who by tradition recommend political candidates, to establish selection committees to screen potential judges and provide an independent appraisal of their judicial qualifications.
Although the President, in an executive order earlier this year, established nominating committees to select candidates for appeals court seats on the basis of merit, only 16 of the 152 additional judges authorized by the recently enacted Omnibus Judiciary Act fall into the appeals court category. The 177 district judgeships are not covered.

Fun With Toys Can Go Long, Long Way For Children

NEW YORK - Parents are a child's first playmates. Children learn first from their parents and then from their friends. Careful selection and proper use of toys is important to assure children's positive play and healthy development. But the influence of the toys themselves is always secondary to the behavioral examples shown by parents and others in the way they play with children. Toys become most significant and useful when parents establish a close companionship with their child.
According to Dr. Brian Sutton-Smith, research psychologist and specialist in children's play, "It's only when children are sure of parents' love that they can be sufficiently independent to enjoy and derive through their play."
"Modern adults," says Sutton-Smith, "are taught to give up childhood things to be grown up and responsible. Parents who are able to keep in touch with feelings about their own childhood will be able to communicate better with their children and make a more significant contribution to their development."
Research has shown that children who play a lot often become more creative and imaginative than those whose exposure to play and toys is more limited. Children who play regularly with their parents and others are most likely to achieve the highest levels of creativity as adults.
Parental involvement in children's play, at the right time, is vital to the full extent of the children's emotional, intellectual, social and physical development.
Parents must be truly playful, however, to produce the greatest effect on their children. Merely imitating or even ignoring a child's play may not be enough. Through active play with their children, parents can encourage playfulness, introduce new toys and play concepts and assure the progress of a child's play curriculum. They can encourage imitation by children and help them become more comfortable with new things and situations.
As partners in play with children, parents are best advised to do what they enjoy most and to introduce variety into play. This may mean physical play, like rolling on the floor with children, verbal play, such as telling stories or jokes, game play with checkers, marbles or hide-and-seek, or play with words and other playthings.
Dr. Sutton-Smith offers a few simple rules of play to help parents know when, and when not, to play with their children. Observe. Determine through close observation a child's skill levels and play interests.
Play a little often. After playing for a while at the child's level, parents can then introduce a slightly newer, more complex play level. A conversation between two dolls, for example, can be demonstrated by a parent after the child has mastered playing with one doll.
Each day and observe again. After demonstrating a new concept and allowing a child's skills to mature, after the new skill is mastered it will take months in some instances, minutes or hours in others), the parent can playfully demonstrate another, more advanced concept.
Both parent and child must approach play sessions in a spirit of fun. While play does have a serious importance in a child's development, play that is not fun is useless.

I frequently write about the inequities of the Social Security system. Recently I devoted an entire column to one of the most pronounced injustices, which was denied to women who were married less than 10 years.
Many of these women will be helped by a change in Social Security regulations that will take effect Jan. 1. A divorced woman married 10 years or more will then become eligible for benefits based on her ex-husband's Social Security status, providing she meets certain requirements.
I am pleased to report that the new law will help a number of women who are not aware of this new right that may help them collect Social Security checks.
A typical writer recently complained to me that she had been married for a little over 10 years but her husband's Social Security checks were being deducted from her own Social Security checks.
There are some important "ifs" that must be met before a divorced woman can collect on her ex-husband's Social Security. She must be 62 or older and she cannot collect unless he is collecting monthly Social Security checks.
Even if a divorced man is of eligible age, he may not be collecting Social Security if his earnings are greater than the allowable limitation on outside income.

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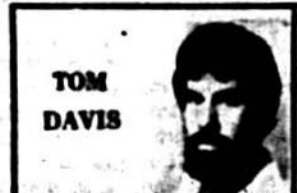

# Sanford Man: Guilty Of Manslaughter

After a two-day trial at the Seminole County Courthouse, a jury found Willie Fred Allen, 37, of Sanford, guilty of manslaughter in connection with the Sept. 25 stabbing death of his son, Jordan Scipio.

Seminole County Medical Examiner Dr. G.V. Garay testified at the trial that the 39-year-old Scipio had been stabbed 12 times. Allen admitted striking his son with a knife during an argument over a rent payment. However, he said, he stabbed the man in self-defense.

"As far as I'm concerned I did nothing wrong," Allen testified. "I predicted myself - I have a right to protect myself - I will protect myself," he said.

Scipio did not have a weapon at the time of the incident and the thrust of Allen's self-defense claim centered on his leg which was severely lacerated in an automobile accident when he was two years old. Allen said after his uncle stepped on him in the head he tried to kick his father's leg.

"I believe he tried to destroy my leg," Allen said. "I felt fear for my life and safety."

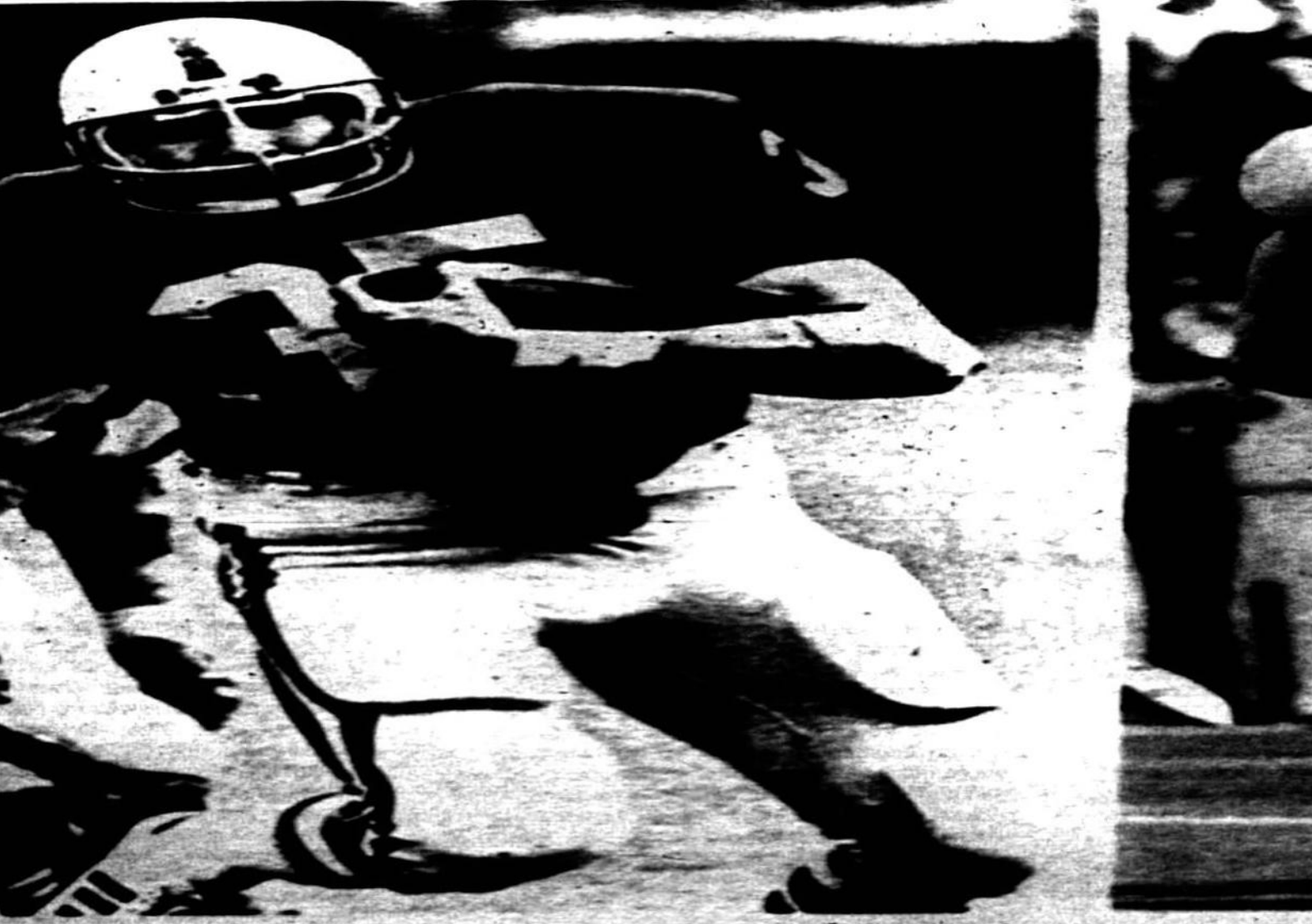

# Added Flexibility In Wage-Prices?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Reacting to complaints from business and labor, the administration is prepared to alter its wage-price guidelines to allow more flexibility for workers' fringe benefits and tighter control over company profits.

The changes, outlined Friday by a top government inflation fighter, are aimed at eliminating major objections to the guidelines program in order to improve its chances for widespread acceptance.

Barry Buzwag, director of the Council on Wage and Price Stability, characterized the changes before a group of prominent business leaders as "somewhat significant."

The revised guidelines will be unveiled officially Wednesday, assuming President Carter gives his approval.

Buzwag said the council has been working on solutions aimed at answering the most common complaints about the guidelines voiced during past weeks by business and labor.

The first involves companies that choose to utilize the "profit-margin" test to determine if they are in compliance with the price standard. The changes under consideration will allow:

—Limit to 4.5 percent the aggregate profit increase that could be earned from price hikes during the year beginning Oct. 1. Profits earned from increased volume would not be affected. The 4.5 percent increase would be reduced to 3 percent if the company's expectations for inflation next year.

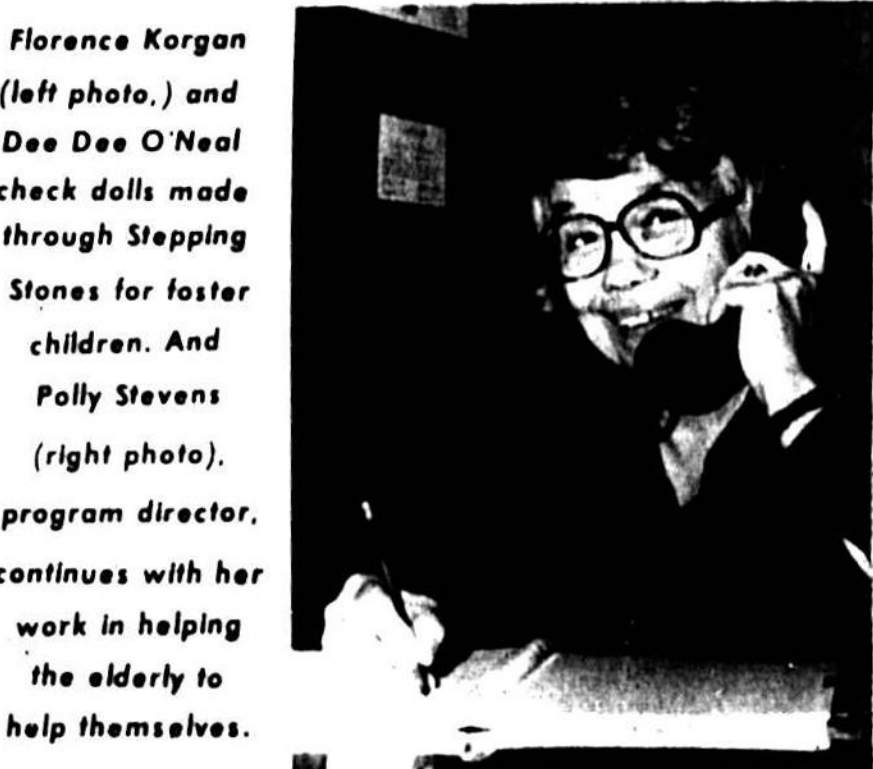

## Sanford Commission Cool On Police Panel Request

Unless the Sanford City Commission can be convinced there are specific management problems at the city police department, a request to establish a panel to survey the department will be tabled at its 7:30 meeting tonight.

That was the consensus of commissioners asked this morning how they would treat the request by David Farr, assistant chief of police, when that agenda item comes up for discussion.

Farr has said he is asking the panel to be established because of comments made to him by the general public during his recent campaign.

However, Farr also confirmed the public comments dealt with problems said to exist at the police department in the past and looked into by four separate agencies, all of which concluded allegations of major departmental problems could not be substantiated.

Farr stated his position and said he will approach the commission tonight not with "specific charges but to report on a need, a general public climate in Sanford that something is wrong at the police department."

Farr continued: "I intend to make suggestions to the commission which could help reverse that mood or correct it."

As to the commission tabling his request until after the election, Farr stated: "If the commission takes action tonight, fine."

"If they want to table it, that's their prerogative, but I don't think that would be wise... I think the public wants to see some positive action."

"That police department has been here since 1888, so far as I'm concerned, and enough is enough. As far as the issue goes for tonight, yes, I'd prefer killing it, but I prefer killing it off altogether," said Commissioner Eddie Keith.

Keith noted he has had many contacts in Sanford and contact has been made in times with what the general public often feel police should be handling, but may be unable to.

"I've had people contact me and tell me about a drunk in the area or something similar, and

## Demo Delegate: 'Well-Run' Parley

There were some grumblings by delegates at the Democratic mini-convention in Manatee over the weekend that it was being controlled or orchestrated and a few South Florida delegates were not pleased with the way party chairman John White handled the gathering.

But Kathleen Reynolds of Sanford, an alternate delegate at large from Florida, said today in the workshop she attended she didn't see either orchestration or control.

"The people certainly had the right to present their views. In the workshop on the national health insurance program, the people on the platform took up so much time, everyone in the audience did not have time to ask all their questions or make all their statements."

"We were told, however, we could write to John White and he would put our statements in the record minutes. Many people were accommodated during the question-and-answer period and didn't seem unhappy when questions and statements were cut off. In other workshops we had elections for those who were going to serve on the platform committee for the 1980 convention.

"I thought the convention was well-run

myself and I learned a lot about many matters including the problems of older citizens," said Mrs. Reynolds, active in the local Democratic Party for the past 18 years and currently state committeewoman as well as Manatee County committeewoman and president of the Democratic Women's Club of Seminole County.

Among those Florida delegates who have complained was Mrs. Nancy Abrams of Miami who announced she has sent a letter to White charging he "obstructed the Democratic process to its ultimate limits."

Others from the Florida delegates complained that the convention produced much praise for the Carter administration but little debate on controversial issues such as abortion and gay rights.

"Petitions to get resolutions on various matters on the floor were circulating throughout the convention," said Mrs. Reynolds. "It is possible resolutions could not get sufficient signatures to get some controversial issues on the floor because the majority did not wish to bring those issues to the floor for debate."

Mrs. Reynolds pointed to a letter put out by the Democratic National Committee (DNC) which outlined procedures for getting amendments to the temporary rules of the

familiar jargon of a television studio. "Are you ready? Lights, camera, action," the director says as he stands poised inside the camera staring at the

This scene is not taking place at a large television station but in the confines of a classroom at Truman Middle School in south Seminole County, Manatee, about 30 minutes

away from punching the necessary data into a computer and recording an answer to be punched up on the printed sheet.

This scene is not taking place in a computer center, but in a classroom at South, Seminole Middle School in Manatee.

In both instances, the participants are students in the Seminole County school district's gifted student program.

The program which has about 60 students is currently in operation at one high school, 13 elementary schools and four middle schools.

If a student is found to meet the criteria for the gifted program but does not live near one of these schools, the school district does permit the student to enroll in a school which does have a gifted student program and if a bus isn't going to that school the district will pay the transportation costs of the parent to take the student, according to Mary Wheeler, program director for advanced education for the school district.

To be admitted to the program a student must have a 120 IQ or higher and has to have parental consent.

Although the gifted student needs to sit day in the program, he is still required to

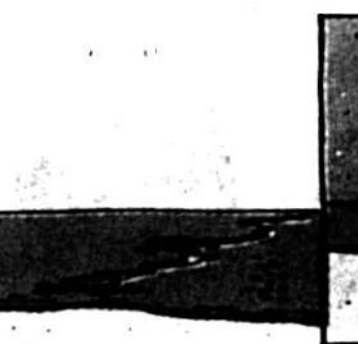

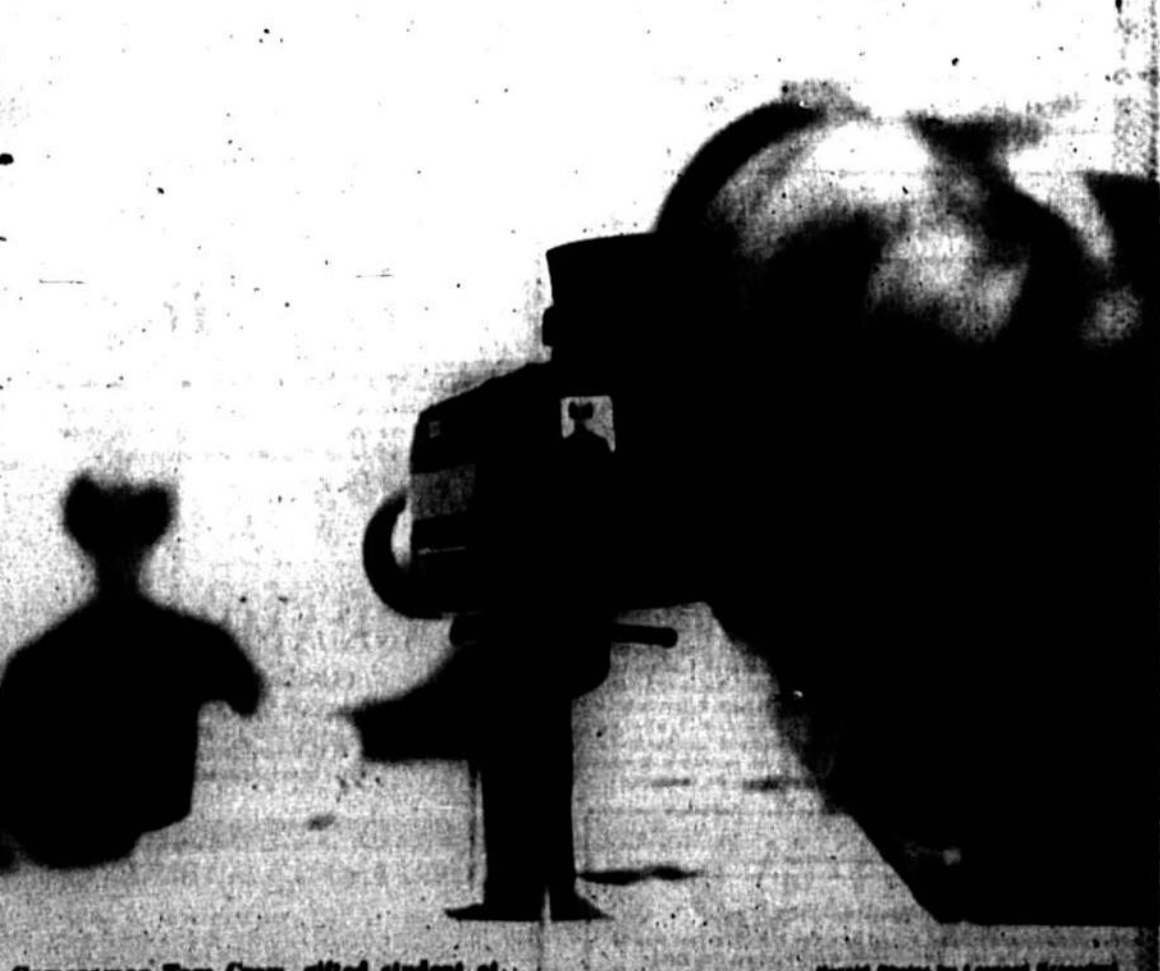
