# The Zoo Many Pitched In To Save Sanford Facility Decade Ago

The Sanford Zoo, started in 1923 when a carnival went broke here, was in financial straits in the late 1960s.

The Sanford City Commission decided it could not adequately take care of and fund the zoo.

The Chamber of Commerce spearheaded an effort, as a result of public outcry, to relocate the zoo, raising money and turning over plans for the move to the city for implementation.

And Sanford businessmen organized in an effort to save the zoo. In July 1970, land at Fulton Avenue and Seminole Boulevard was designated for the zoo's new home. It had been where City Hall is today. But plans did not work out. Under pressure from the state and federal government, the Sanford City Commission voted in October 1971 to phase out the zoo.

But at the same time the Seminole County Commission was placing on the ballot a parks bond issue. That issue got the county voters' approval and plans were made to acquire park lands.

John Alexander, chairman of the County Commission then, suggested that \$100,000.

# 'I Ain't No Criminal', Parks Employee Says

A personnel hearing for Bill Solitro, who claims Seminole County officials are trying to get rid of him for giving information which led to the arrest of former county employee John Varney, has been continued until 8 a.m. Thur-

Public Services and Development Director John Percy and Personnel Director Lois Martin gave Solitro a three-day suspension with pay to consult an attorney and prepare a defense to charges that he falsified his job ap-

Percy showed Solitro records indicating the 47-year-old Orlando man had lied when he answered "No" to a question on the application asking if hehad a criminal record.

Solitro said he had not falsified the application because he understood the question to mean felony convictions. He admits to several misdemeanor con-

even being insinuated as one," Solitro said. He would not say what the convictions were for, only saying they were minor things that had happened in his

Ms. Martin said a misdemeanor conviction is a criminal violation and constitutes a police record.


Solitro, who has worked for the county in the parks and recreation department for seven months, said he wanted to discuss the falsification charge with an attorney before any action was taken.

Percy agreed to a three-day suspension. "I feel like we owe you at least that much," he said. Solitro had appealed a performance

"I've been manning the telephones most of the morning answering calls from parents asking if school started, what time school started, if their child arrived okay and calls from other schools needing information."

Mrs. Procon added her school has encountered "no problems" with students failing to show proof of immunization before attending class and that "the letters we sent home telling the parents that their child must have their shots obviously did the trick."

# Sept. 7 Election Voting Turnout — To Be Worst TODAY

The voter turnout in the Sept. 7 first primary election in Seminole County could be the worst in the 31 years Mrs. Camilla Bruce has been the county's supervisor of elections.

"I've never seen such apathy in all my years in office," she said. "This is the quietest election I can remember. We don't hear the candidates talking and certainly the people aren't talking about the can-

While Mrs. Bruce says officially she expects a 40 percent turnout, that's her prediction only "because I hate to say it will be 30 percent."

An indicator of voter turnout is usually the number of absentee ballots cast. As of Monday morning, only 257 voters of the county's nearly 75,000 qualified to vote have filed absentees, Mrs. Bruce said. "And that's not very good."

The county has 74,457 registered voters. Of these 37,803 have designated themselves as Democrats, 30,680 are Republicans and 5,974 designated themselves as non-partisan or other parties. . The ballot in the election will be a small one.

Democrats will select nominees for governor, attorney general, comptroller and state senator. Only registered Democrats can vote in the Democratic

Republicans will nominate a U.S. Senator, governor and lieutenant governor and Florida House of Representatives member. Only Republicans can vote in the Republican primary.

All voters, regardless of party designation, may vote in the non-partisan races for one school board seat and two circuit judgeships.

The race for the governor and lieutenant governor in the Democratic camp pits incumbent Bob Graham and Wayne Mixson against Fred Kuhn and Jeffrey L. Latham and Robert P. Kunst and Gary Bryant. Other candidates seeking the Democratic nomination are: Fred Goldstein, who is vying with incumbent Jim Smith for attorney general; Ralph Haben, who is running against incumbent Gerald Lewis for comptroller; and Gary Barnhard, running against

Florence M. Hunter for the District 11 state Senate seat. State Senate district 11 includes parts of Seminole, parts of Lake and other counties.

The GOP has three candidates for the party nomination for U.S. senator - David H. Bludworth, Van B. Poole and George Snyder. Other races for the GOP nomination are: Skip Bafalis and Leo Callahan for governor and lieutenant governor respectively. challenged by the team of Vernon Davids and Wendell Davids, while Jim Lavigne and Carl Selph are competing against each other for the District 34 seat in the Florida House. This district includes parts of Winter Springs, Longwood, Casselberry, Sanford and a piece of Brevard County.

The non-partisan ballot, with all registered voters eligible to vote includes the following races: Irvin B. Gussow and Kenneth M. Leffler (incumbent), Seminole-Brevard Circuit Court, Group 1: Eugene Collier, Edward M. Jackson, Franklin M. Kelly and Jere E. Lober, circuit judge, Group 3; School Board, Jean Bryant, Allan F. Keeth and Kenneth Patrick. In the races with two candidates, the highest votegetter will receive the respective party's nomination.

or in the case of circuit judge Group 1 will win election automatically.

In the three-way contests, the candidate must receive 50 percent plus one vote to win the primary. If none of the three is able to garner that many votes. the two highest vote-getters will square off in the Oct. 5 second primary.

This week before the election, Mrs. Bruce's office is conducting schools for the 300 election officials who will be working the polls in the 72 precincts.

Schools will be held Tuesday at the Altamonte Springs City Hall in the morning and the Casselberry City Hall in the afternoon; Wednesday at Casselberry City Hall all day; Thursday at the County Agriculture season with six straight Center in the morning and at Altamonte Springs City Hall in the afternoon.

# **Congress Racing Deadline** For Government Shutdown

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (UPI) - President Reagan gave Congress a tough deadline to prevent possible shutdowns of government agencies, cutbacks in services and furloughs of federal workers.

Unless Congress overrides Reagan's veto of a \$14.2 billion supplemental spending bill, it must come up with a new package within the next few weeks to keep all of the wheels of government turning.

The president issued a tough-worded veto message Saturday, rejecting the package on the grounds it "would bust the budget by nearly \$1 billion" by spending too much for social programs.

The veto set into motion orders for a range of agencies and departments to trim expenses - focusing initially on discretionary items such as travel. equipment acquisition and contract awards — to avoid running short of funds before Sept. 30, the end of the fiscal year.

# Imported Cars Show Gains

DETP.SIT (UPI) - U.S. businesses have followed the lead of private motorists by buying more imported cars — giving foreign automakers a 13.2 percent share

of the fleet customer market last year, a study shows. Foreign car manufacturers substantially increased their market share of the fleet customer market between 1979 and 1981, said a Hertz Corp. survey released

In the past 15 years, Hertz estimated, nearly half of all new cars sold in the United States were purchased by corporations, government agencies, small businesses and leasing and rental agencies.

### Farmers Can't Repay Loans

DALLAS (UPI) - Nearly half the state's farmers who have loans with the Farmers Home Administration are delinquent in their payments, and one official said it's due to bad luck, not bad faith on the part of the borrowers.

Forty-eight percent of the state's 24,861 farm borrowers are delinquent in their payments on a debt of \$412,581,000, FmHR records show.

Texas has the highest number of FinHA borrowers in the nation and only three other states have higher delinquency rates: Georgia, 55 percent; Florida, 51 percent; and Arizona, 50 percent.

### Convict Could Go Free

BOSTON (UPI) - A man sentenced to prison 16 years ago for a slaying he says he never committed has a job waiting for him once prosecutors dismiss the murder charge against him, ending his legal battle for

Attorneys for George Reissfelder, 42, said Suffolk County Attorney Newman Flanagan would go to court today and move to dismiss charges against their client, meaning he could go freee.

Reissfelder, sentenced to life in prison in 1967 for the murder of a Railway Express clerk in South Station, was granted a new trial by Suffolk Superior Court Judge Paul Connolly. But the immate's lawyers said Flanagan had agreed not to retry the case, meaning Reissfelder could be released from Walpole State

# Sanford Benefit Nets More Than \$2,000

# Helping A Cancer-Ravaged Boy Survive

Anthony Rosehart Day in Sanford netted more than \$2,000 for the medical expenses of a 5-year-old Orlando boy stricken with a rare form of cancer.

A final count of the money collected was being made this morning.

The benefit, held Saturday at Lake Monroe Marina, was the brainchild of Tony Liberatore, a Lake Mary businessman who also was stricken with cancer as a child.

Liberatore recruited help from volunteers, musical groups, Ronald McDonald and Rosie O'Grady's to provide a series of footraces, balloon rides, boat trips and musical entertainment for those who came to participate in the benefit.

David and Lisa Rosehart of 8831 Scioto Court in Orlando still owe more than \$16,000 in medical bills for Anthony's treatment for Burkitt's Symphoma, a rare form of cancer which attacks the lymph glands.

A trust fund, established at Amerifirst Savings and Loan in Orlando, has received \$5,180 in donations, a bank official said today.

The state Children's Medical Services agency also is helping with the family's expenses. Last week CMS officials said they would pay for more than half of the \$37,000 incurred in Anthony's treatment.

A lien on the Rosehart's home, instituted by the Orlando Regional Medical Center, was removed last week following the entry of the CMS into the case.

David Rosehart said Saturday he was "touched by the concern" of those who showed up at the marina to help Anthony.

The boy and his parents arrived at the benefit shortly after 11 a.m. Saturday in the back of a Lincoln limousine. Anthony took advantage of a television in the back seat of the car to catch up on Saturday morning cartoons, his father said.

Anthony, wearing a cap to cover the patches on his head where hair had fallen out as a result of chemotherapy, waved to the crowd from his father's arms.

He had few comments during the afternoon but did say "thank you" to everyone on hand. Later in the day, he went on rides in a helicopter and on a boat.

# 'Historic' Pot To Be Burned: **NORML Fighting Paraquat**

RED BAY (UPI) - About 10,000 marijuana stalks killed with paraquat in the first use of the herbicide on United States-grown pot were set to be burnt today,

Florida Department of Law Enforcement agents and Walton County sheriff's deputies raked the shriveled leaves and buds from the stalks into piles Sunday nigh to prepare for the burning.

Meanwhile, a spokesman for the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws said his group would go to court a second time to block the herbicide's use on home-grown marijuana.

The organization had fought unsuccessfully to block the spraying in a suit, arguing paraquat-laced pot will find its way onto the market and be a health hazard to marijuana smokers.

### **Beryl Gaining Strength**

MIAMI (UPI) - Tropical storm Beryl built its peak winds to 60 mph as it swirled westward in the far Atlantic today, several days away from land.

Beryl was located at latitude 16.2 north and longitude 31.5 west at 6 a.m. EDT today, about 400 miles west of the southernmost Cape Verde Islands. It was moving west-northwest at about 17 mph and expected to continue that track through today.

# Israelis Claim Violation Of PLO Withdrawal Accord

TEL. AVIV, Israel (UPI) - Israel charged Palestinians leaving Beirut are violating the evacuation agreement by turning over their heavy weapons to a leftist Lebanese Moslem militia rather than the Lebanese army.

Chief of Staff Lt. Gen. Rafael Eitan said Sunday Israel had "proposed" to U.S. envoy Philip Habib the leftist Moslem group, known as the Mourabitoun, be sent from the city along with the departing Palestinians.

Eitan did not, however, say what action Israel might take should the Mourabitoun refuse to leave or give up

# Ingrid Bergman Dead At 67

LONDON (UPI) - Three-time Academy Award winner Ingrid Bergman, the madonna-like actress who captivated audiences playing tragic heroines in classic films like "Casablanca," died today, BBC radio reported. She was 67.

Miss Bergman had bouts with breast cancer in 1974

and 1978, undergoing two mestectomies. The triple Oscar winner, once voted the most popular film actress in the world, lived in a modest apartment

in the fashionable Cheyne Walk area of London. Technically, she retired from the movies in 1977, but accepted the challenge of portraying Israel's Prime Minister Golda Meir in a TV film in 1981 and gave a towering performance despite the pain that lingered from her second mastectomy three years earlier.

According to zoo director Rozon, "The zoo project was under capitalized from the outset, and we've been in periodic financial trouble ever since."

That is due in large part to the fact that "we're only one of three zoos in the country that are fully self-sustained without the assistance of tax dollars or subsidies." Rozon said. "The others are the Brooksfield Zoo in Chicago and the San Diego Zoo.

"Only Orange County gives us any money (\$5,000 a year)," he said. For that, the county's elderly, handicapped, migrant workers, and children enrolled in the Head Start program get in the zoo free. And organized groups of students from anywhere in Florida get a discount, Rozon said.

"We get no financial help from Seminole County or any of its cities," he continued.

"We get nearly all of our money from private donations, memberships, admissions, concessions, and fund-raisers like model airplane shows, auctions, special film showings, and contests in the schools," Rozon said. The zoo's current annual budget is \$630,000.

During the early days of the zoo's construction, money trickled in slowly and state and federal authorities, acting under a new animal welfare act, threatened to lock the zoo's gates and sell some of the animals to relieve overcrowding in what was described as an "animal ghetto," Rozon said.

Finally, despite all the problems and brushes with extinction, the current zoo Jack Horner, president of the Greater opened on July 4, 1975, with a modern Sanford Chamber of Commerce, animal exhibit building, a children's

# Reagan's New Taiwan Pragmatism

It took courage for President Reagan to announce that the United States is committed to reducing arms sales to Taiwan.

The president knew that his decision would anger many of his strongest supporters. And it did. Sen. Gordon Humphrey, R-N.H., blamed the "weaklings, sissies and people with mush for brains" in the State Department. Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., said he could think of no other action by the administration "that would disappoint more friends of President Reagan." Another legislator said he felt "doubly double-crossed" by the combination fo the president's Taiwan decision and his prime-time championing of the tax hike.

But, although it was unpopular, it was a decision that had to be made, for it was necessary to salvage our deteriorating relations with China. The issue of arms sales to Taiwan was left unresolved when Sino-American relations were normalized in January 1979, and has been the chief stumbling block to the improvement of relations ever since. The problem was that China had difficulty in believing the credibility of the U.S. acknowledgement that "there is but one China and Taiwan is a part of China" when we continued to sell advanced weapons to Taiwan.

Ten months of negotiations seems to have solved the dispute. Under the terms of a new Sino-American agreement, announced recently in a joint communique, U.S. arms sales to Taiwan will be reduced gradually "leading over a period of time to a final resolution."

But, despite what the president's critics are saying, there was no sellout. Washington refused to agree to Peking's demand that a firm deadline be set for the end of U.S. arms sales to Taiwan. And U.S. negotiators only concluded the agreement after China reiterated its commitment to a peaceful resolution of the Taiwan question.

Mr. Reagan accurately hailed the deal as a mutually satisfactory arrangement that "preserves principles on both sides." As the joint communique affirmed, "The development of U.S.-China relations is not only in the interests of the two peoples but is also conducive to peace and stability in the world."

# Allies, Take Note

The House Appropriations Committee provided an instructive, if regrettable, example recently of how resentment over inadequate defense efforts competition for it. Yet they want you to by allies can feed isolationist sentiments in Washington.

The committee rejected a Pentagon request for \$178.6 million for the construction of base facilities at the Egyptian Red Sea port of Ras Banas. The planned Ras Banas installations, including an long-distance service. expanded airfield and storage depots, were to be used by the Rapid Deployment Force.

Should a military threat to the Saudi oil fields ever develop, Ras Banas would be one of a handful of staging points from which the RDF could be deployed. Without facilities at Ras Banas or other bases in the region, the Rapid Deployment Force would have even more difficulty in mounting a timely defense of the Middle East states that provide 70 percent of the West's oil.

Members of the House Appropriations Committee know all this, and have supported funding for the RDF ordered into being during the Carter administration.

But committee members are unhappy that the United States has accepted almost sole responsibility for the defense of a region that provides only 10 percent of U.S. oil imports.

We hope the full House restores the Ras Banas appropriation. We also hope that officials in Tokyo, Bonn, Paris, and London heed the warning signals of a growing isolationist sentiment on Capitol Hill. Alliances do not fare well when some members grow weary of carrying a disproportionate share of the burden.

# AT&T: Reality Obscured

WASHINGTON (NEA) - With the federal government's landmark antitrust suit against the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. now finally resolved, the nation is poised to enter a new era of telecommunications.

But a panoply of old myths — many of them engendered, embraced and encouraged by AT&T during the century in which it has dominated the country's telephone industry - still obscure the new realities of a radically changed situation.

By far the most insidious AT&T-inspired deception is the myth that local telephone service is a money-losing enterprise that must be subsidized by generous financial "contributions" from long-distance service.

A related canard holds that AT&T's business customers are the principal users of long-distance service while residential customers' telephone usage is concentrated on local service.

Residential telephone users who accept those myths have been led to believe that their monthly bills would double or triple because the settlement of the antitrust case calls for an unprecedented separation of local and long-distance service, thus presumably eliminating the opportunity for perpetuation of the "subsidy" or "contribution."

William G. McGowan, board chairman of the MCI Telecommunications Corp., one of AT&T's most aggressive competitors in recent years, suggests that the entire concept of a long-distance-to-local service subsidy is a fraud:

"For years, AT&T has carried out state and federal regulators and members of Congress that local exchange service is a real dog, propped up by subsidies from profitable long-distance service . . .

"AT&T controls every major local service market in this country, fully 82 percent of the business. They've got the New York market - and Los Angeles, Chicago, Atlanta, Denver

"Local service is more than 40 percent of their business, and they have absolutely no believe they do it all at a loss."

If there is a subsidy, AT&T apparently has no idea of its size. During the trial of the antitrust case in U.S. District Court here, AT&T claimed that in 1979 local service received a "contribution" of \$1.5 billion from

But at approximately the same time, AT&T was telling the Federal Communications Commission that the 1979 subsidy totaled \$3.2 billion - and in another antitrust suit, being considered by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit in Chicago, AT&T said the 1979 subsidy was almost \$6.1 million.

"The simple truth is that no one is able to answer with any precision the question of where there are subsidies from one line of service to another in the telephone industry," says Herbert N. Jasper, executive vice president of the Ad Hoc Committee for

# JEFFREY HART The Real Campaign

Jeff Greenfield is probably familiar to most people through his CBS Convention commentaries, where he appears along with James Jackson Kilpatrick and Bill Moyers.

But Greenfield has published an important book of political analysis that should greatly presidential campaigns. It is called "The Real Campaign: How the Media Missed the Story of the 1980 Campaign" (Summit Books), and it seems to me the finest analysis I have read of the 1980 race, from the primary campaigns through the general election.

Greenfield argues persuasively that we have tended to greatly overestimate the impact of the media, especially network television, in determining the outcome of major political contests.

Greenfield's research is remarkably thorough. He argues, convincingly, that Ronald Reagan won the primary contest and then the general election for remarkably oldfashioned reasons. Reagan was not a "media" candidate, despite his actor background.

First of all, Reagan had had years in public life and a record plain for all to see. He had been a two-term governor of our largest state, and between 1974 and 1980 he had built up a solid personal following within the Republican Party and an effective organization.

Greenfield concedes that the political parties are not as important as they once were, but he insists that they are still very important. The nominee of one of the two major parties receives a seal of legitimacy, not to mention funding and organizational support, lacking to a candidacy like that of John Anderson.

the only valid point is that Reagan is attractive and makes a good political speech, qualities shared with Franklin Roosevelt, among others.

· Finally, Greenfield argues that Reagan revise the conventional wisdom as regards beat first George Bush and then Jimmy they ran media-tocused campaigns, while Reagan took clear stands on the issues.

> It was because most people liked what Reagan was saying about the direction in which he would lead the country that his socalled gaffes were so unimportant. Everyone makes small errors. But Reagan was saying the important and popular things with regard to public policy.

> Bush, in contrast, really was a "media" candidate. That is why his "gaffe" at the Nashua, N.H., debate proved so selfdestructive. His whole campaign, after his narrow and largely contrived victory in the Iowa caucuses, was aimed at establishing media "momentum," Big Mo. Bush only marginally distinguished himself from Reagan on the issues. He basically argued on image and electability. He had no extablished constituency that could compare with Reagan's, and when the voters, first in New Hampshire and later elsewhere, perceived Reagan as healthy, attractive and electable, Bush's appeal faded.

The Carter campaign, argues Greenfield, knew that it could not plead for re-election on the basis of Carter's record. Therefore, it ran a media-based campaign against Reagan, depicting him as reckless, a racist, an ignoramus, and so forth. Against the substance of Reagan's record and his steadily proclaimed positions, Carter's Media campaign against Reagan, failed. .

# Notes From The Campaign

WASHINGTON (NEA) - Political pros are searching for hidden meaning in what may be the biggest upset of the 1982 primary season: the victory of businessman Richard Headlee over Lt. Gov. James Brickley in the race for the GOP gubernatorial nomination in Michigan.

Both the polls and the conventional wisdom had the moderate Brickley, a protege of popular Gov. William Milliken, well ahead of the conservative Headlee, who was best known as a leader of the Michigan tax revolt.

Not only was Brickley thought to be more popular and more politically acceptable than Headlee, but the conservative vote seemed likely to be split among Headlee and the three. like-minded candidates on the ballot.

That did not happen, however. The conservative candidates received 70 percent of the primary vote, with 35 percent going to Headlee. Brickley got only 30 percent.

Headlee's victory, coupled with conservative successes in several legislative races, is conclusive evidence that the right was wrested control of the state GOP from the center represented by Milliken. Given the depressed condition of

Michigan's economy, the state GOP was expected to take the lead in repudiating many of the conservative economic policies ardently embraced by Headlee and his followers. That no longer appears to be likely.

All of this does not bode well for Republican chances in November, when Headlee will face popular Rep. James Blanchard with the

The recent contest for the Republican Senate nomination in Connecticut may become the catalyst for a new political party. You will recall that Prescott Bush, a

brother of the vice president, suddenly abandoned that race when incumbent Sen. Lowell Weicker received the endorsement of the state GOP convention.

Bush was backed by conservatives who cannot stand the liberal and independent

In fact, Bush's campaign staff came out of an organization called Republicans to Replace Weicker, an offshoot of the National Conservative Political Action Committee. NCPAC is headed by John "Terry" Dolan, whose mother, Peg Dolan, led the anti-Weicker campaign.

For some time Terry Dolan has talked about starting a conservative political party sometime after this November's election.

According to Dolan, the party would be national in scope but would not become involved in presidential politics. Rather, it would concentrate on running candidates for Congress and perhaps for state and local offices.

But the Connecticut Senate race has moved up the timetable. Insurance lawyer Lucien DiFazio will run in November under the Conservative Party's banner against Weicker and Rep. Toby Moffett, the Democratic

# Diplomats Face Threats From The PLO

WASHINGTON-The Palestine Liberation Organization has declared "open season" on American diplomats in France. This vengeance against Americans will spread to other countries which have accepted PLO guerrillas from Lebanon. Eventually, the terrorism could reach the United States itself.

These warnings have been circulated at the highest levels in Washington. The chilling secret assessment is that no American diplomat is safe from assassination and that some inevitably will die.

Counterintelligence experts believe that the defeated and embittered PLO will probably disintegrate into radical splinter groups. Perhaps the most dangerous faction is headed by George Habash, who is described in intelligence reports as "nihilistic" and "ruthless," with a preference for "dramatic and violent" methods.

He has been quoted as bitterly blaming the United States for the Israeli onslaught that broke the PLO's power in Lebanon. But he has always been viciously anti-American. Intelligence sources believe he ordered a terrorist campaign against Americans even before the Israeli invasion.

They suspect Habash's assassins may be responsible for the attacks on Americans based in the Paris embassy. Intelligence sources say the Habash people may have

collaborated with an even more radical group known as Abu Nidal. Last November, the acting ambassador,

Christian Chapman, was fired upon by a lone gunman. Chapman ducked behind his car, and the shots missed. Two months later, a military attache was

shot and killed as he left his apartment in Paris. An unknown assailant simply walked up to Col. Charles Ray, pulled out a pistol and blew him away. Then, a couple of weeks ago, a bomb in-

tended for the commercial counselor, Roderick Grant, exploded near the Eiffel Tower. Grant escaped, but a member of the French bomb squad was killed and another critically injured.

The French police have established that the same gun was used to kill both the American military attache and Israeli diplomat. This was also the gun that was fired at Ambassador Chapman.

The murders have yet to be solved. At first, the French police pursued the investigations indifferently. U.S. attempts to get action from the Paris police were extraordinarily difficult, a State Department source told my associate Lucette Lagnado.

Now French authorities are searching for the terrorists with more vigor. Buth they have been so tolerant toward terrorists that it may now be impossible to penetrate the radical community that has grown up in France.

The French have let terrorism thrive, a State Department expert said. France has become the center of terrorism in Europe. Assassins have no trouble "disappearing," he said, after an act of terrorism.

In other words, the French probably cannot protect American diplomats or find their

Footnote: As far back as Jan. 19, I predicted "random attacks" could be expected against American officials. Because it was possible to protect only the top diplomats, I warned, the terrorists "have decided to make middle-level American officials their targets."

ARMS RACE IN SPACE: Sen. Larry Pressler, R-S.D., has been investigating the ominous move toward militarization of outer space by the Soviet Union and the United States. He has already voiced his concern to President Reagan, and plans hearings on the subject next month.

I have seen some of Pressler's preliminary findings on the latest developments in the military space race. Here are some of them:

-The costs are already taking off like a moon rocket. The Air Force's Space Division has been upgraded to the Space Command, with a corresponding increase of its budget.

In the next fiscal year, the military space budget will increase by more than one-third, from \$2.9 billion to \$4 billion.

-The race is no longer just between socalled "killer satellites," though both sides are continuing to develop these. Exotic weapons like lasers are already in the testing

-The lead in military space technology seesaws back and forth between the Soviets and the United States, and will probably continue to do so. For example, a U.S. killer satellite that may be able to sweep 100 to 200 Soviet satellites from the skies in a single day will be operational in the late 1980s. Yet the Soviets' development program for laser weapons is reputed to be five years ahead of OULS.

-The United States, being far more dependent on satellites, has a greater stake than the Soviets do in bringing stability to the development of space. Both the costs and the risks of a stratospheric arms competition will be higher for the United States.

Pressler's solution is the resumption of

U.S.-Soviet arms-control talks on antisatellite weapons. He introduced a resolution calling for such negotiations last year. He still believes this is the only sane solution—a gutsy position for a conservative Republican freshman to take.

# Stadler Outlasts Floyd For World Series Title

AKRON, Ohio (UPI) - Craig Stadler, perhaps the PGA tour's most self-demanding performer, has nearly put the finishing touches on "a fantastic year."

Stadler, so angry with himself after the third round he chucked his practice plans and went home, caught Ray Floyd in the final 18 holes Sunday then beat the PGA Champ on the fourth hole of sudden death to win the \$400,000 World Series of Golf.

"It's a very fitting end," said Stadler, who shot a 5under-par 65 Sunday on the 7,173-yard Firestone Country Club course. "I figured if I could win here it would make a fantastic year out of it, which it has." The victory, worth \$100,000 to Stadler, pushed him

past Floyd as the year's leading morey winner with \$428,000 and also boosted his career earnings to \$1,035,750, making him the 37th player in history to surpass the \$1 million mark. Stadler, who had struggled to a 5-over par 75 Saturday knocking him five shots off the pace, began

his final round with birdies on the first three holes. That got him back into the chase and he and Floyd, who had a final-round 70, battled for the lead the rest of the "Really the only chance I had was to make a few birdies early, put a little pressure on Ray and see what

he does," said Stadler. "I didn't play worth a damn yesterday (Saturday) and got down," Stadler said. "I wasn't in the best of moods when I finished. I should have gone and hit some balls, but I just said 'the hell with it' and went on

In the playoff, he missed greens on three of the four holes but still managed to par all of them, making it 22 holes for the day without a bogey.

# Carner Overcomes Haynie

HIGH POINT, N.C. (UPI) - JoAnne Carner entered the Hall of Fame with last week's victory, but she said her fivehole sudden-death playoff triumph over Sandra Haynle in a \$165,000 LPGA tournament over the weekend was her hardest.

during the tournament, found herself in a playoff with defending champion Haynie when the two finished regulation play at 6-under par. Carner turned in a par 72 in the final round on the 6,191-yard Willow Creek Golf Course, while Haynie carded a 74 for a 282 total in the 72-hole tournament.

DEAR DR. LAMB - My husband has been diagnosed as having hemolytic anemia. He has been on prednisone for the past year but his blood count has not been maintained at a satisfactory level on the dosage considered safe. Now the doctors have recommended a splenectomy. Is this the only recourse he has? They have not been able to pinpoint the cause of this red blood cell destruction except that it is caused by an antibody manufactured by his own body.

We understand that a plenectomy is no guarantee that this situation will be corrected.

The only other medication envelope for it to me, in care my husband takes is for high blood pressure and he has been off that for several months because his pressure has decreased to a safe level.

DEAR READER - The spleen is particularly sensitive to any minor abnormality of red blood cells. It will trap them and destroy them. In many forms of hemolytic anemia, where the basic problem is excess red blood cell destruction, there are minor abnormalities in red blood cells that increase red blood destruction. Splenectomy is commonly used in cases that have not responded to treatment such a prednisone.


The splenectomy may merely mean that your husband will require far less prednisone, but that is a significant aid when the dosage has had to be high.

Most cases of hemolytic anemia are related to an inherited tendency with small rounded blood cells. Your husband's problem of cells that are unusually sensitive to destruction because of an antibody is much more rare. The sensitizing anti-body can be from a number of things. But I was interested in the point he had been treated for high blood pressure. Aldomet (methyldopa) is one of many agents that can cause the body to develop such an immune response and is commonly used in treating high blood pressure.

when taken as directed and if you are followed properly. It is a good idea to have your eyes checked periodically because some rat experiments show some changes in the lens, which have not been noted yet in humans.

You should not take it with aspirin. The combination is not more beneficial and causes an increase in adverse reactions.
