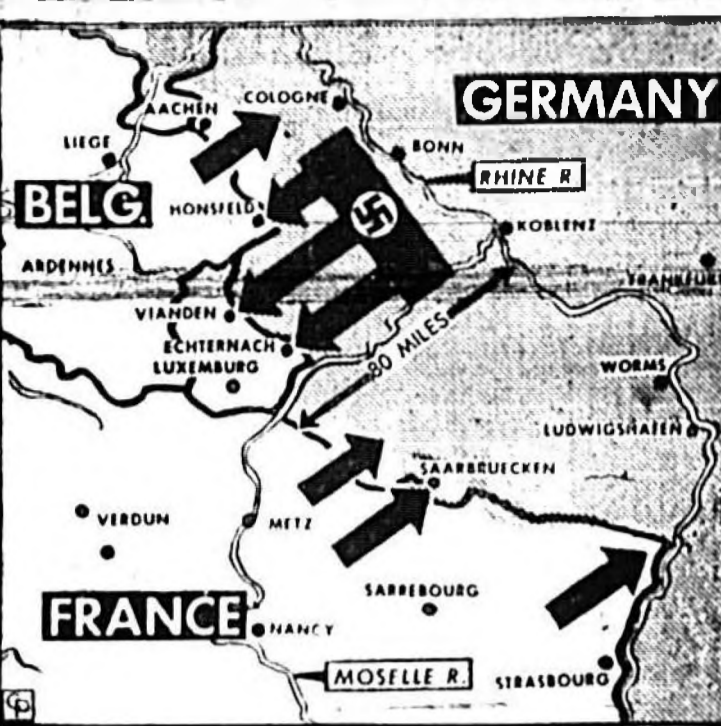

## Bastogne Story U. S. Air-Ground Team Is Tops

### Thunderbolts Plunge From Sky As Yanks Lash Out At Fox

PARIS, Jan. 3, (AP)—The 101st Airborne Division's "blitzkrieg" of the bastion of Bastogne wasn't reserved; they were getting ready to start pursuing the Germans themselves when Third Army forces happened to break into the encircled town last week.

Hard-bitten, 40-year-old Brig. Gen. Anthony C. McAuliffe, acting commander of the 101st, said so today.

"Anybody who says we were reserved or who thinks we needed a pre-conference," he told a press conference, "On Christmas night I called my regimental commanders together and told them we were now ready for pursuit."

When Major Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, divisional commander, flew from Washington and jumped into Bastogne before the battle was over, he asked how the division was and General McAuliffe told him:

"Sir, we're ready to attack." The man who dares to say "No" to the Germans is Brigadier General Anthony C. McAuliffe of Washington—known to his friends as "Tony"—and to his men as "General Mac" and "Old Croc."

"Old Croc" McAuliffe is forty-six years old, which makes him one of the oldest jumpers among the paratroopers. On D Day he jumped with the men of the 101st, the first division to land in France.

Its mission was to secure roads leading from the beaches and later to capture Caen. They succeeded in those missions as in all subsequent ones.

The "Old Croc" made the Holland invasion in a glider. There the mission was to take bridges and highways for fifteen miles from Eindhoven to Vechel and to capture both of those cities. They took Eindhoven, a city of 110,000 population, with one regiment.

By Truck to Bastogne The mission to Bastogne was made by truck which is rather

the Americans four to one. It was as simple as all that and yet it never could have succeeded had not the 101st been composed of the toughest fighters in the world, men who do not know the meaning of failure and who would fight to the last man though outnumbered 10 to 1.

The story is told of a tank force comprised of stragglers from other units which had been mauled in the swift German advance through Luxembourg. Among the stragglers were gunners, truck drivers and mess attendants. They were a weary and discouraged lot.

General McAuliffe organized them under a colonel as a task force and put them to work guarding prisoners, packing supplies and gathering supplies dropped by parachute.

He expresses the belief that within the lifetime of the next generation the South's resources, skills and capital will bring the section into the vanguard of world industrial progress, while its fresh social vitality will contribute enormously to the shaping of a greater America and a richer world.

## Akyab Captured On Road To Singapore

### Philippine Bombers And PTs Made 3-Day Attack On Jap Ships Knocking Out 69

(By Associated Press) British troops seized the Burmese port of Akyab in the first amphibious operation on the long road back to Singapore, swarming a shore at Akyab Island off southwest Burma Wednesday simultaneously with an attack on Formosa. The Japanese garrison fled the night before.

Philippine-based American bombers and PT boats knocked out 69 Jap ships in a three-day attack co-ordinated with carrier raids on Formosa. Tokyo claimed an American aircraft carrier and two battleships or cruisers were sunk in the western Philippines and both sides intensified the air war swirling around invasion-threatened Luzon and the U.S. base on Mindoro.

Tokyo reported four Superfortresses reconnoitered and harassed Japan within 75 miles of Naraya.

Flying from a powerful task force, American carrier planes blasted Formosa, 200 miles north of Luzon, and its companion bastion of Okinawa, for the second straight day Wednesday. Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced.

Japanese broadcasts, estimating the attacking planes to number 400 connected the raids directly with Philippine operations, hinting at the possibility of new landings, and the Japanese Domei agency reported that a task force escorting a transport convoy had been sighted in the Sulu Sea at the southwest corner of the Philippines, "seemingly to effect new landings."

Nimitz gave no details.

This was taken to mean that the attacking Naval force was still in enemy waters and that radio blackout was necessary.

Formosa, the great fortress island in the Pacific, is the chief target in both attacks, enemy broadcasts indicated. Okinawa, the chief island of the Okinawa group in the Ryokyu Islands 350 miles east of Formosa, was a secondary target.

## 14 Fewer Marriages In 1944 Than In 1943

Fourteen fewer marriage licenses were issued in 1944 than in 1943, the office of County Judge R. W. Ware, records show.

During the past year, 674 marriage licenses were issued as compared with 688 licenses issued in 1943.

The most marriage licenses issued during any month of 1944 was in March when 81 were recorded. August was the low month with only 36 licenses on record. June which in 1943 was the biggest month with 77 licenses issued, showed only 57 marriage licenses issued in 1944.

## Celery Acres In Sanford Cut By Weather

### 2,451 Acres Are Now Planted, Or 344 Less Than In 1943; Mostly Goldenheart

Effects of the hurricane freezes and drought in Seminole County are reflected in decreased plantings of celery due to damage to seed beds, according to J. E. Wathen, secretary of the Seminole County Farm Bureau, and secretary of American Fruit Growers Inc.

Figures compiled by Mr. Wathen show that a total of 2,451 acres of celery were planted this year in the county, as of Jan. 1, a decrease of 344 acres from the 2,795 acres had been planted. Of this year's crop of celery, 1,838 acres have been devoted to the goldenheart variety, and 623 acres to green parcel. In 1943, there were 2,172 acres of goldenheart celery planted, and 623 acres of parcel, the same amount of the latter variety as in 1944.

Rain, which on Thursday totaled 2.9 of an inch, and last night 2.1 inch, a total of 5.0 of an inch, has proved of great benefit to celery and other vegetables.

Mr. Wathen pointed out that while celery plants obtain moisture by sub-irrigation, even during such a long period of drought as has occurred since October, the leaves of the plant need moisture to maintain normal growth. Rain of 1.5 inches, which the plant and helps its root and top growth.

During a time when they have been in price ceilings on celery, F.H.B. prices on celery have been bringing \$4.00 to \$4.50 on the average, up until lately with highest prices being received for the smaller sizes. However, these prices have decreased recently, probably due to the fact that the supply of celery has increased. Price ceilings are expected in the near future, he added.

A 50 percent increase in cabbage plantings was recorded by Mr. Wathen, with an estimated 609 acres planted this year, compared with 442 acres in 1943. At present, cabbage at the Sanford State Farmers Market is bringing \$2.05 for a 50 pound bag, and Manager H. J. Lehman predicted that prices on the vegetable will hold up.

Extensive plantings, estimated at 200 acres, compared with 308 acres planted in 1943, are bringing fine returns to growers of this section, as is also lettuce which has good reports from the market.

Most vegetable shipments have been by rail, with F.O.B. prices at from \$2.50 to \$2.75 a crate. Boston lettuce plantings declined in the county from 19 acres in 1943 to 19 acres in 1944. Broccoli increased from 17 acres in 1943 to 21 acres in 1944. Cauliflower plantings increased from 25 acres in 1943 to 72 acres in 1944.

Mr. Wathen said that the weather conditions in the county about Jan. 1, were estimated at 10 acres in the county as compared with 45 acres in 1943.

Brisk sale of vegetables at State Market was reported by Mr. Lehman, with good crops of cabbage, tomatoes from the east coast and southern part of the state, celery from this and other southern counties, broccoli, cauliflower, iceberg and Boston lettuce, onions, English peas, and turnips. Big demand is reported for citrus fruits and packing houses are very busy.

## Welles Blames Government Leaders On Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (AP)—President Roosevelt will include comprehensive discussion of foreign affairs in his annual message to Congress Saturday. However, he is not expected to define exactly what U. S. policy is toward current European political problems.

The President announced he would broadcast the message Saturday at 8 p. m. and confirmed the report it would deal with foreign policy and management questions.

Welles Under Sec. of State Sumner Welles, secretary of the War Relocation Authority, in the preface of a new book to be released in a day that will tell a few in stances behind the U. S. foreign policy. He said that the people should be informed about foreign affairs.

He made the statement at the introduction of the "Foreign Affairs" book by the government, which is available to the public in the full text of the book, about all aspects of our foreign policy, and the government's position on foreign settlements.

According to the publishers, Welles revised the manuscript so that even the minor details represent his views on world conditions. The book is a guide for the citizen about the nations of the world, there being separate sections on all parts of the world.

Welles appealed to the government to provide the people with the facts about their relations with other countries.

"When the ultimate appraisal is made of the fundamental causes of the second World War," he wrote "such an estimate will undoubtedly maintain that by no means the least of the contributory factors was a lack of knowledge of, and interest in, the foreign relations of their country on the part of the peoples of the democracies. That charge will be peculiarly applicable to the people of the United States.

"Insofar as the United States is concerned, it can not be denied that a measure of responsibility for the existence of these conditions over a period of many decades must justly be laid at the door of those leaders of the executive and legislative branches who have the people entrusted with authority."

Boyd, executive secretary of the Seminole County Welfare Board, as secretary and treasurer.

## Biggest And Hottest Battle Is Expected As 3 Armies Join In Push From North

(By Associated Press) British Second Army infantry and armor were thrown into the battle of the Belgian bulge, it was announced today amid indications the main struggle is yet to come and would be the bloodiest of all on the Western Front.

The British joined two American armies and possibly a third—the U.S. Ninth in attacking the German yesterday reaching within a 1,000-yard advance in the Marche area on the northwestern tip of the Nazi salient.

The counter-attacks widened the Allied sector on the northern bulge to 35 miles despite miserable weather. The First Army whittled down the German escape gap between Bastogne and Grandmont to 12 miles.

On the other side of the salient the Third Army, reinforced by the First Army, repulsed a force Nazi counter-attacks, but the front remained largely unchanged in Alsace, where the Seventh Army was driven off German soil, although it had held a 1,000-yard advance with the death of a German paratrooper seven to ten miles behind the lines. 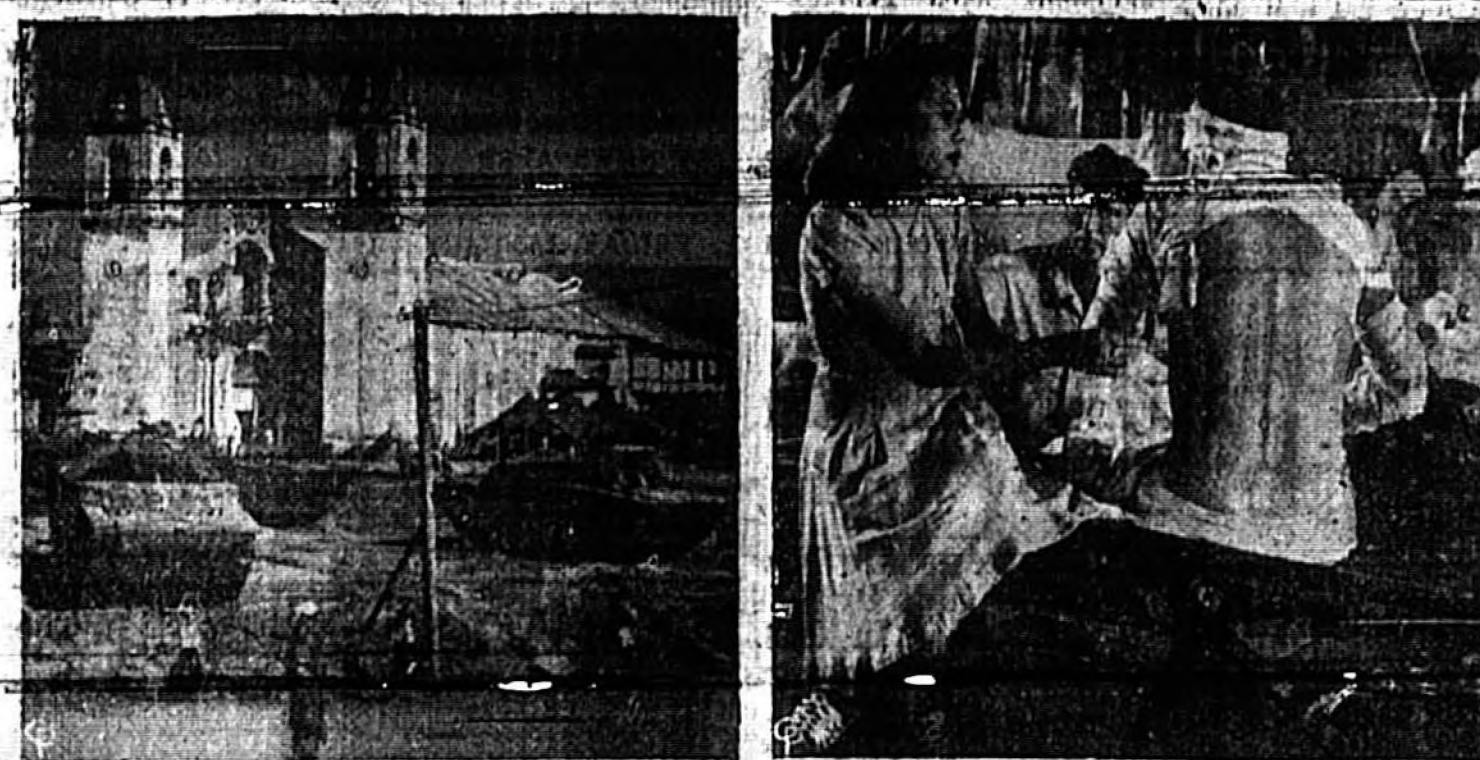

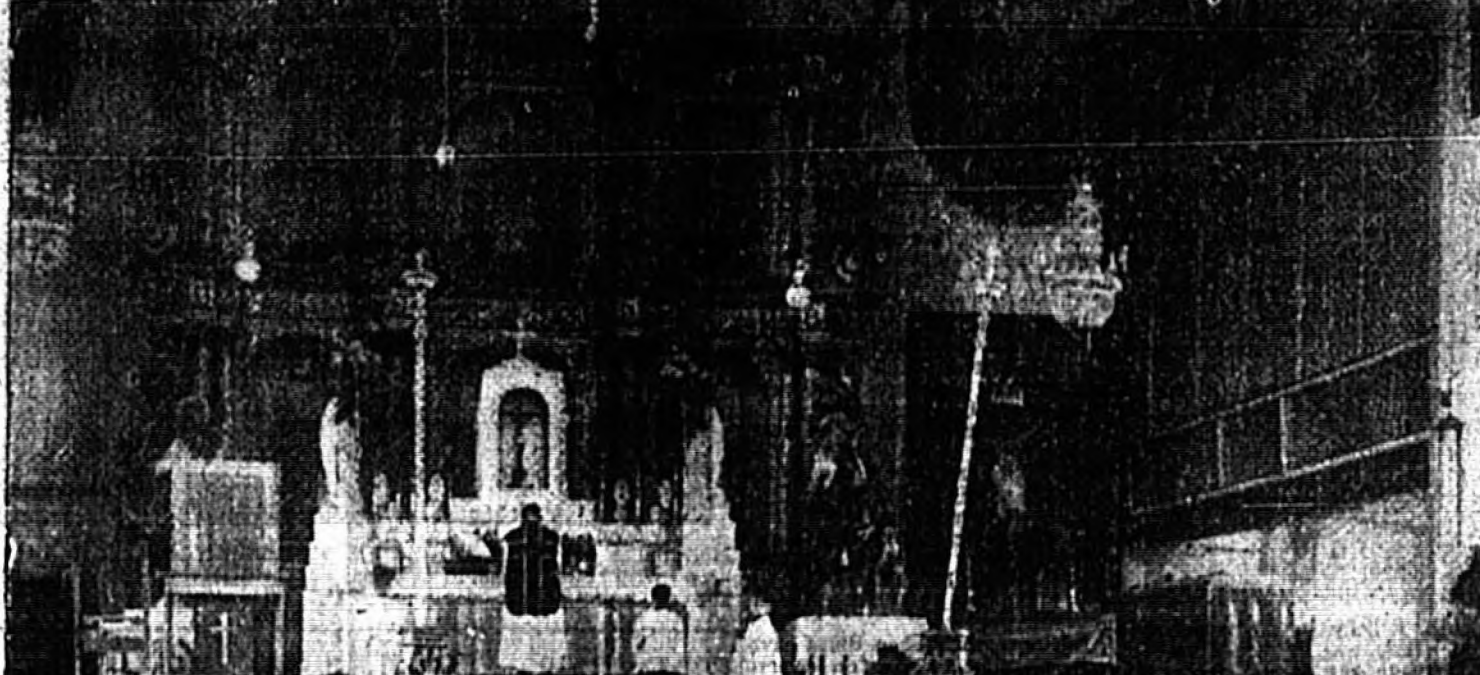

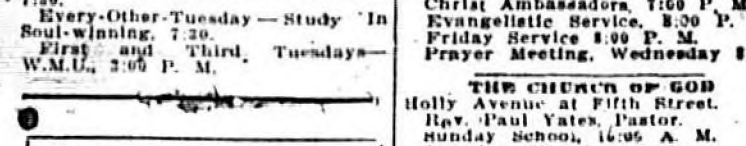

Well if there are any "society girls" who don't have anything to do these days but play bridge and go to cocktail parties, there is a good place waiting for them in any one of Florida's hospitals.

In spite of restricted automobile driving brought about by the war, in spite of reduced speeds and added emphasis on caution, railroad grade crossing accidents increased during the first nine months of 1944 over the same period of the year before. With some 1,335 persons equivalent to two battalions of soldiers, killed by trains at railroad crossings, it would seem to be high time the tragic consequences of these preventable accidents were brought home to the public.

The seriousness of the manpower shortage is again emphasized by the Army request for 354,000 deferred farmers in the 18-25 group. These men are sorely needed on the farms but they are also needed in the Army and the Army comes first. Farmers will have to find replacements from among those who for one reason or another are not now working or are working only part time. And very likely a National Service Act will be necessary to compel some people to do their full part toward the needs of their country.

We suppose efforts will be made now to find a counterpart for the German offensive in Belgium and the capture of some excellent officers. Our Civilization

This is the Age of Invention, especially in America. It might be called the "flowering of invention," except that the products don't all seem so fine lately, when one considers the purposes for which they are used. In fact, when people sit down and start making a mental survey, just now, of the gadgeteering results of this generation, it may give them a bad taste in the mouth and a sick feeling around the heart.

For what has this generation done with its marvelous inventions? Bitten that in time, food and use without a doubt. But over the whole picture are marks of futility and smears of blood.

What are the proper aims of human life? According to old and tested standards, they are the true, the good and the beautiful. For the pursuit and development of these, if for any definite purpose, it may be assumed that man came into the world. But a general and honest look around at our civilization is not very reassuring as to the product and the finish.

There are, to be sure, good people and kind hearts everywhere, and much nobility and sacrifice. But these are not organized or logically pursued and sustained, so that vast futility, selfishness and crime are mingled with the finer traits. It is not surprising that so many people regard our world, with all its gadgets and activities, as a failure.

If there is any salvation for such a world, it is probably to be found in religion, with the development of a strong, honest, frank development of religious life woven through all our activities.

Twin Cities Of Hungary

Latest victim among the storehouses of beauty reduced to rubble by the Nazis is the Hungarian capital of Budapest. This loveliest of all central European capitals, union of the twin cities of ancient Buda and modern Pest, is disappearing in flame and gunfire as the Russians annihilate its German defenders. The destruction is apparently necessary, but is mourned alike by those who have seen the lights of Budapest and those who only dreamed of seeing them.

What few realize, however, is that although the history of Buda goes back to 375 A.D. when it was the military camp of Aquincum where Valentinian II was proclaimed Emperor of Rome, the city itself has been rebuilt from ashes more than once. St. Stephen, first king of Hungary, started its modern history with a fortified town on the ruins of Aquincum, which later became a splendid royal seat.

During the Turkish occupation, from 1541-1686, everything was destroyed, and the present restoration took two centuries to accomplish. Pest, on the flat plain across the Danube, was united with it in 1872. Since then, the city has grown to a population of a million, center of the industrial as well as the cultural life of Hungary.

Its admirers hope that, once cleansed of its German invaders, it will rise again as beautifully as it did before.

Re-Making The Senate

The late Blair Lee was the first man elected United States senator by direct popular vote. The 17th amendment providing for direct election was passed in 1913. Soon thereafter, a vacancy arose in Maryland. Lee ran for the office, and obtained it. Though he was generally expected to have a brilliant political future, the fates were not kind to him. He was defeated for renomination in 1916, and for some time afterward was leader of a Democratic faction whose struggles with its rival make Republican victories much easier in Maryland.

His death is a reminder that victory eventually came to what seemed at first a hopeless fight. As far back as 1889 resolutions had been introduced in Congress to have senators elected directly, and not by the state legislature. Under the indirect system an undue number of party bosses and wealthy nonentities had entered the upper house of Congress. Direct election, it was thought, would bar both types. Eventually the Senate yielded, and the direct election method was adopted as the Constitution's 17th amendment.

The outcome of this fight should encourage those who would like to change the present rule of ratifying treaties by a senatorial two-thirds vote.

IT'S TIME TO SPEAK

"Of course it's none of my business, but—" How often have you heard such an opening remark, followed by some quietly sensible opinion or some reasonable suggestion for public or private behavior?

So quiet, indeed, and perhaps so reasonable, that its author was never heeded amidst the hubbub of much that is neither quiet nor reasonable.

And to those quiet, reasonable people who find it easy to say "It's none of my business," can you think of no more appropriate New Year message than this: It is your business...

For unfashionable doctrine though it may be at the moment—I still believe that a majority of people throughout the world have enough reasonableness in them to outweigh the unreasonable, provided they are given the chance. But who will give it to them? Not the unreasonable, you may be sure. So the reasonable must give themselves a chance, and that, in a world full of sound and fury, is precisely what the quiet man frequently finds hard to do.

But this coming year, 1945, he had better do it. It will not be enough merely for him to have opinions; he must believe in certain things passionately, and he must speak up for what he believes. For it will be a year of Destiny. Like 1918, by the middle of 1945 it may be a year in which wisdom is not questioned. We might remember how (to take but one example) the League of Nations died because so many approved of it while so few stood up for it, because it received too many votes on the floor, and too few stood in the arm. And whatever future 1945 holds for the world will be an shining stand unless the avengers, decent, peace-loving reasonable men will do more than let say "no" and then shut their lips in an archaic, "It's none of my business."

And there, of course, comes the difficulty. For the reasonable man seldom is a speaker. He is always tempted to think that the facts of a case, stated simply and calmly, are enough. He would like to assume that humanity, left to think things over, will sooner or later choose the right path through some kind of cheerful inevitability. But history, and to say, does not encourage that assumption.

We have all seen how, during the past quarter century, ideas of evil, trumpeted by a noisy few, have challenged ideas of good, which were too often merely accepted and taken for granted by the quiet majority. Indeed, it has been part of the world's tragedy that the good people have minded their own business—so exclusively that many of them have been driven out of business altogether.

Not, of course, that reasonable people will ever find it easy to speak. But even a whisper, an echo heard if it is well-timed, and the basic hopeful fact is that today the world is full of whispers and of eager people listening for them. The hearts of modern men and women everywhere are stirred profoundly by the crisis of civilization.

There is desperate wickedness in the world, beyond doubt, but there are also in the world deep reservoirs of good will. And during this year of Destiny 1945, you cannot afford the luxury of an easy chair. You must not only stand up to be counted; you must stand up to be heard. For it is your business to help in building a better world.

Railway Wreck Puzzle Rests On Fireman's Story

Only Survivor In 2nd Engine May Explain Crash Killing 48

OGDEN, Utah, Jan. 5. (AP)—A railroad fireman who escaped the death which took his engineer may supply some explanation of why one Southern Pacific train crashed into another in one of the West's worst rail disasters with forty-eight killed and eighty-one injured.

The second section of the westbound Pacific Limited, carrying express and mail, crashed at high speed Monday into the rear of the slowly moving first section, a passenger train, on a causeway crossing a shallow estuary of Great Salt Lake.

Engineer James McDonald, sixty-four years old, of Ogden, died at his throttle as the locomotive ripped into a tail-end sleeper, but the fireman, M.E. Hardman, of Ogden, survived with minor injuries.

One report said Mr. Hardman observed a warning signal hoisted against the second section and shouted to the engineer, George Daling, an Ogden mortician, said Army authorities had requested an autopsy on Mr. McDonald's body to determine the cause of the engineer's death.

However, Carl O. Olson, Southern Pacific general agent at Salt Lake City, refused to comment and said all such announcements must come from the rail's San Francisco office. Nor would he say why the first section hoisted its red signal.

Mr. Hardman declined to discuss the wreck since he probably will be called as an inquest witness.

Twenty-eight of the dead and forty of the injured were military personnel.

High as the death toll was, officials said it probably would have been worse but for Army and Navy medical companies aboard two hospital ward cars in the forepart of the passenger train. Within minutes after the collision they hurried back to the smashed cars to give aid. They administered blood plasma to some passengers and produced quantities of blankets to protect others from exposure to sub-freezing cold in the foggy darkness.

The trains smashed together on a rock-filled causeway crossing Bear River Bay of Great Salt Lake. The spots lie about thirty miles north of the point where the Golden Spike was driven to signalize the joining of transcontinental rails seventy-five years ago.

Among civilian dead was one entire family of father, mother, two daughters, uncle and aunt.

118 Billion Dollars Is Given To Navy In Four Years

More than 118 billion dollars has been authorized by Congress for Navy expenditures since July 1, 1940, from the outbreak of hostilities, it has been official.

Announced by the Navy Department in a folder recently sent to The Herald by W. W. McEachern, state chairman of the Florida War Finance Committee, of this total, the Navy still has unused and available for future needs, 24 billion dollars.

Subtracting this amount from the total allotted shows that the Navy has placed orders and expended into other commitments for 94 billion dollars.

Of these orders and commitments, some have not yet been fulfilled and, therefore, are not yet payable, they amount to 25 billion dollars.

This all boils down to the fact that in four and a half years, the Navy has actually spent 69 billion dollars.

Since July 1, 1940, the Navy has inducted, fed, clothed, housed and trained 2,000,000 officers and men. It has built, armed, supplied, fueled and sent to sea, 10,300,000 tons of ships and built, armed, fueled and launched 62,000 planes. It has built and equipped 300 advance bases.

These new weapons, added to what the Navy had in existence on July 1, 1940 makes up the world's largest fleet. This fleet in three years of war, it was revealed, has convoyed in the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, troops and supplies aggregating 61,000 ships. Its enemy beaches it has landed 1,200,000 assault troops.

The Navy report also shows that 1,100 enemy ships, totaling 1,750,000 tons have been sunk, 10,000 of their planes shot down or destroyed and that the Japs have been cleared from a Pacific area of 8,170,000 square miles.

According to Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal, 29,000 Navy men have given their lives. More than 9,000 are missing and 4,500 are prisoners of war. More than 30,000 have been wounded.

To these men and to their families, the Navy and the Nation acknowledge a debt surpassing all measure," it was stated.

NEW YORK CITY, Jan. 5.—(Special)—"You can build a miracle house if you have enough money, employ an architect, have a vision, and plan now," writes Tyler Stewart Rogers, a prominent building official consultant in the current issue of Parents' Magazine.

The only thing that is fresh in the nerve to put so many advanced features together under one roof and then to improve them is the fact that you can have it erected some afternoon while the family attends the movies.

"What makes these 'miracles' combining many developments of the last five to twenty-five years with new room arrangements and non-traditional styling. What makes them dangerous to the public eye for new homes are the false or irresponsible statements implying low cost and quick availability.

"Miracles" Not New

"Let's examine the case of some of the ideas frequently found in these miracle houses," invites Mr. Rogers, who has had years of experience in the home-building field.

"Complete year-around air conditioning was possible, though costly, more than twenty-five years ago. Complete prefabrication of houses gave me my first job after World War I, just twenty-five years ago.

"Automatic washing machines, dishwashers, garbage disposal devices, indoor clothes driers, quick-freeze units, automatic can openers with visible oven interiors and a host of household labor-saving necessities and conveniences are all strictly prewar. Garage doors controlled automatically by radio from your car were in use as early as eight years ago. Electric lights that would snap off a few minutes after you left the house, and even come on again a few minutes before you were due back from the theater could be had about ten years ago. I had one such device in my home in 1930.

"Solar heating is very old; in its present modern form it was offered by operative builders in a Chicago suburb before the war. Radiant panel heating has more than twenty years of use behind it in England, nearly as many here. Aluminum framed windows were developed at least fifteen years ago, in both cement and double-pane types. Steel-framed houses were commercially active in prefabrication as well as custom-built types around 1930; steel 'lumber' is even older.

"All this is as it should be," continues Mr. Rogers in his article in the current issue of Parents' Magazine. "Your best protection when buying new things for your home is to know they have been thoroughly tested. Reputable manufacturers cannot afford to promote new units or new materials until they are certain their products will perform well.

Postwar Products of Prewar Vintage

"For example, a new type of year-around gas-fired air conditioner is promised for delivery immediately after the war. The manufacturer will control it, one for heating, one for cooling, one for ventilation alone when neither heating nor cooling is needed. But the manufacturer has already spent nine years on its development and has made over 300 test installations under the constant supervision of his research engineers. Another case is the announced development of a new type of radiant panel heating which employs a metal base-board all around the room as a continuous radiator. This manufacturer has spent seven years on its perfection and is still withholding design data and working details until remaining tests have been completed. Still another case can be found in the development of highly advanced automatic controls for house heating systems. One manufacturer has devised means of providing controls that will maintain different temperatures in different parts of the house. In actuality, they units that do this work have been available for at least ten years and have been used in the 'zone control' of deluxe residences and large hotels.

"The one, untested, undeveloped, unskilled combination of well-tested devices to form control systems suitable for new or old homes heated by almost any standard method.

"Such examples show why most of the details of ultra-modern homes are of prewar vintage. They also show why super-imaginative dream-houses requiring fanciful, undeveloped materials and gadgets are not likely to appear on V-day.

"When restrictions are lifted on civilian production, we will inherit the results of research started long before Pearl Harbor and only interrupted by war activities. We will also benefit from the better manufacturing methods and the war materials developed under stress of war, wherever they are adaptable to home building.

"Although housing was the only major industry seriously curtailed by the war, it has not remained static. The building industry has learned much, planned much and advanced far in spite of all obstacles.

"You Can Build Postwar—If

"Name any really desirable feature you want for your new home and you can have it—if," continues Mr. Rogers, "but perhaps we should examine these first.

"If you have enough money—the greatest fallacy in the pipe dreams of miracle houses in the future is that they will cost less in the future. They will cost ten or fifteen years, or if we suffer another sharp depression that deflates the dollar below prewar levels.

"A square look at the facts shows that wages and living costs have risen about 30% over 1940 prices. How can building costs be expected to drop sharply in the future? Higher wages, higher transportation and distribution costs and a scarcity of trained labor? Based on these facts alone, a house costing \$5,000 in 1940 may be expected to cost \$5,500 in 1945.

"On the other side of the ledger are the strenuous efforts of the building industry to find economies that will save you money and architects are designing houses with a better knowledge of materials.

"The point is this: Identical houses will cost more after peace than before, in proportion as about the same proportion as

other things will cost more, but you may get equal or better accommodations and livability through modern design for a smaller share of your income in 1945 than you spent in 1940.

"If you employ an architect he is not to be erected for sale by speculative builders until long after they cease to be 'miracles.' Very few builders will take the risk of using new designs, new materials or new equipment until these costs are low and until they are sure the public will buy their houses as fast as they are finished.

"So if you want a miracle house you must take the initiative. It is not enough to go to a builder with amateur sketches. You not only need an architect, but one of the best—a man who has kept pace with new materials as well as designs, and one who has access to competent mechanical and structural engineers. New materials and equipment, often new designs, involve engineering calculations and careful detailing so that builders and construction labor can put things together correctly, though in an unfamiliar way.

"If you have a pioneering spirit and will start planning now in the third requirement, miracle houses are for pioneers—families that enjoy setting the pace for others and are willing to depart from the habits that tradition has fostered. The most striking feature of the truly modern house is that it is designed around present-day living habits, the family, its possessions and the site on which it is erected. There is no attempt to copy other houses. Each set of conditions in the house design, logically, simply and without pre-

Such designing requires both a skilled architect and an intelligent client.

"Flourishing also implies being there first. If you want a house right after the war, the time to start is now. There is nothing to wait for. Materials worthy of use, tested and of known performance, are the standard prewar materials that will be available soon. New equipment may be anticipated, but it will not basically change the architect's dimensions or design. If plans and specifications are not made now, while architects are still able to take on new work, you will not be prepared to take bids until long after builders are ready to start work. And if you wait too long, architects, builders and construction labor will all be so busy that you will miss many months of enjoyment in your new home.

"Yes, you can have a 'miracle' house right after the war," promises Mr. Rogers, "if you start now, plan wisely within your means, employ good counsel, and let common sense and good taste supersede the mere copying of traditional styling and space arrangements."



**Bulgar King's Frailties Bared At Sofia Trials**

**Counselor of Boris III Says Sun-Following Mystic Guided King**

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Jan. 5. (AP)—Bulgaria's dead King Boris III was a physically frail and easily influenced mystic who guided his country into war on the strange advice of a counselor, it was testified at the Bulgar war guilt trials at Sofia, a Turkish news agency reported recently.

Yordan Lulchev, one of Boris's counselors, made the assertions about the King, who died mysteriously on Aug. 29, 1943, after being summoned by Adolf Hitler.

He said another counselor, Professor Danov, was head of a sun-worshipping cult and a back-nature sect before becoming adviser to the monarch. After attaining power, he decided upon the abilities of Bulgar ministers by examining their handwriting.

Nearly 400 of the King's counselors, regents, ministers and legislators (page 1) before two special people's courts.

The trial record was reported as showing that Boris never made an important decision, wrote a major speech or took a journey without the advice of Lulchev, backed by the sun-worshipping Danov.

Lulchev testified that Boris twice declared he wanted to commit suicide, the Turkish agency reported. One occasion was after a Soviet protest over entry of German troops into Bulgaria. The other was after Germany's military position became hopeless.

The witness said Boris complained that strong pressure was exerted upon him by his exiled father Ferdinand, now living in Germany.

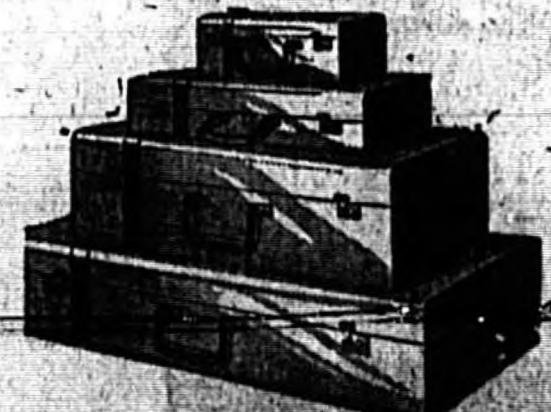

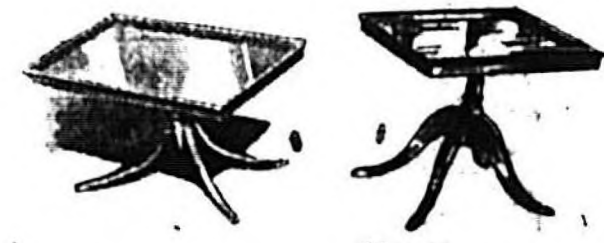

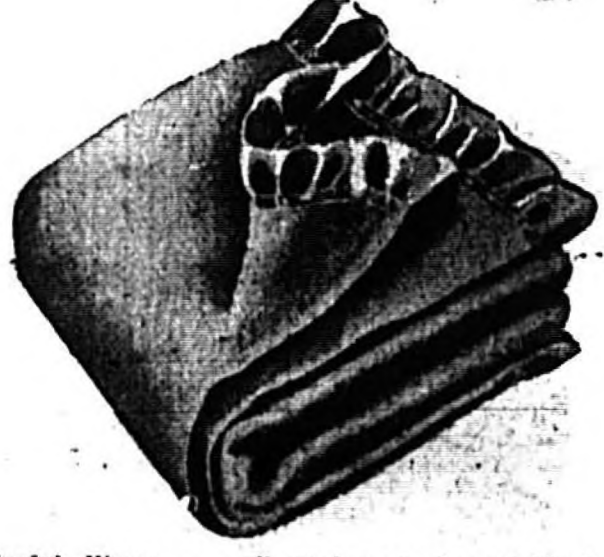

## Japs Announce Fierce Battle Near Manila

### 450 American Transports And 70 Warships Are Reported In U. S. Convoys

(By Associated Press) Tokyo today reported more than 450 American transports were steaming north toward Luzon Island in the Philippines where the Japanese said more than 70 warships and carrier planes bombarded Lingayen Gulf continuously for two days, 120 miles north of Manila. A Tokyo broadcast said that whether transports were being escorted into Lingayen or in the vicinity of Manila remains a question, but in either case it is a surety that the enemy will play right into waiting Japanese hands.

The broadcast said Japanese gave the American fleet in the Lingayen battle the "hottest reception ever recorded in the annals of war" and forecast an invasion "at any time". It was reported three powerful American convoys were speeding northward to join the assault.

The Japanese landed fresh forces on the northeastern coast of Fukien Province in preparation to counter any American attempt to establish beachheads on the Asiatic mainland, the Chinese announced.

Yanks moved 15 miles closer to Manila and amphibious troops were capturing Paluan on the northwest coast of Mindoro against light resistance. Landing troops of the tiny Fais Island in the Carolines.

American carrier and land-based planes attacked the main Philippine island of Luzon Saturday (Friday, Pearl Harbor Time), it was announced today.

Naval planes hammered ships, airfields and installations on Luzon. Douglas MacArthur's command ship, the USS Yorktown, was in the vicinity of Manila and Clark Field, 47 miles northwest of Manila, destroying 18 Japanese planes during the ninth successive day of heavy land-based attacks on Luzon.

MacArthur also announced that American troops within 87 miles of Paluan on the northwestern coast of Mindoro only 34 miles from the southwestern coast of Luzon. Other American forces on Marinduque Island are 10 miles from southeastern Luzon.

## Dr. J. S. Young Tells Rotarians Of Peace Plans

### Says Another World War Evident If Senate Blocks Treaty

Outlining the world peace plan as drawn up at the recent Dumbarton Oaks conference and declaring that the gist of the problem is "winning the peace," Dr. J. S. Young, professor of government at Rollins College, told the Rotary Club at the Mayfair Hotel today that another President will stand before Congress 25 years from now and ask for another declaration of war "if the United States becomes a slacker in world peace plans as it did in 1920."

Pointing out that Senate ratification is necessary for United States participation in any kind of peace plan based on international treaty, Dr. Young said that if the necessary two-thirds majority cannot be obtained "an amendment to the Constitution calling for a simple majority vote might be required. If he added, the plan might be put into effect by executive agreement by the President as one delegated by the Constitution to have charge of foreign affairs.

Declaring that "the League of Nations lacked teeth, especially in peace plan based on international treaty," the Dumbarton Oaks plan embraces a general assembly, a security council, a world court, and a secretariat. All members of the world league are to be represented in the general assembly by one delegate each with one vote.

The security council is to consist of permanent members for each of the so-called "big five"—Russia, China, Britain, the United States and ultimately France, while the remaining members are to be elected as temporary members by the general assembly. The powers of the general assembly are legislative, executive or administrative. It would be vested with the power to take whatever action might be necessary to preserve the peace.

**Combat Cargo Ship Named For County**

Seminole, 22nd combat cargo ship to be completed at the yard of the North Carolina Shipbuilding Company, was recently launched under the sponsorship of Miss Pamela Cole of Newport News, Va. Seminole County, however, in this instance refers not only to this county, but to similar named counties in Georgia and Oklahoma.

## FDR Expected To Ask Large Cut In Costs

### Budget Message May Seek Ten Billions Less For Next Year With No More Taxes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—President Roosevelt favors the general principle of legislation giving the insurance business a moratorium from the Sherman Anti-Trust act until March 1, 1946, except for acts of boycott, coercion and intimidation. He said it would give the insurance companies sufficient time to present themselves in the Supreme Court decision holding the business subject to the Anti Trust Law.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—President Roosevelt's budget message which goes to Congress Tuesday is expected to allow way for a \$10,000,000,000 cut in expenditures and a slight cut in domestic outlays in fiscal 1946.

Best information available today is that he will ask for \$200,000,000,000 compared with \$100,000,000,000 for this year, and it is probable that he will make no request for new taxes although he is expected to outline a comprehensive post-war tax program.

A highlight of his state of the union message Saturday was that everything possible must be done to insure and reinforce private business after the war and fiscal objects insisted that reduced tax scales are a necessary prerequisite to any forward-looking legislation.

At the same time that he is asking for a \$10,000,000,000 cut in expenditures, he is also asking for a \$10,000,000,000 increase in expenditures. Some of the heavier cuts which the new budget must cover are muzzling out pay for men and women of the armed services, increased funds for income and excess profits taxes and military factors.

War front supply lines in the Atlantic and Pacific have been firmly established and the cost in this category will be considerably less. The heavy munition and tire programs will be at a much higher level. These costs probably will be weighed by cuts in other fields.
