

In 1948, there were 2,172 acres of goldenheart celery planted, and 623 acres of pascal, the same amount of the latter variety as in 1944. New Idea On Jobs Bobs Up In Capital As Congress Meets

The idea is a "national job budget." The principle proposed is to estimate, allocate and expend our manpower every year aist as we do our cash. Sponsors night have added that money is but the measure of energy and the goods which energy creates. They are asking, in effect, "why not keep books more directly on our energy if we can find the right yardistleks to do so?"

The idea of nudgeting before the senate Gomen from the War-Contracts subcommittee of the Senate Gommittee on Military Affairs. Chairman of the subcommittee is Senator James E. Murray (D-Mont.), with Vice President-elect Harry Truman and Senator Chapman Revercomb (R.-W. Va.), as members.

The Murray subcommittee has turned in a "report on war contracts which looks to the end of the war and the problems of reconversion to peacetime economy which will have to be faced. One of these it says, is the problem of national employment—a job for everylody.

It cites President Roosevelt' plea for a national level of employment which would provide 60,000,000 jobs. It recalls that jobs held by Americans produces less than half the goods and services in 1929 which Americans are reducing now. About half out jobs now produce war goods.



Twin Cities Of Hungary

Latest victim among the storehouses of beauty reduced to rubble by the Nazis is the Hungarian capital of Budapest. This lovellest of all central European capitals, union of the twin cities of ancient-Buda and modern Pest, is disappearing in flame and gunfire as the Russians annihilate its German defenders. The destruction is apparently necessary, but is mourned alike by those who have seen the lights of Budapest and those who only dreamed of seeing

What few realize, however, is that although the history of Buda goes back to 375 A.D. when it was the military camp of Aquincum where Valentinian II was proclaimed Emperor of Rome, the city itself has been rebuilt from ashes more than once. St. Stephen, first king of Hungary, started its modern history with a fortified town on the ruins of Aquincum, which later became a splendid royal seat.

During the Turkish occupation, from 1541-1686 everything was destroyed, and the present restoration took two centuries to accomplish. Pest, on the flat plain across the Danube, was united with it in 1872. Since then, the city has grown to a population of a million, center of the industrial as well as the cultural life of Hungary.

Its admirers hope that, once cleansed of its German invaders, it will rise again as beautifully as it did before.







Bulgar King's Frailties Bared At Sofia Trials

Counselor of Boris III Says Sun-Followers

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Jan. 5. (8).

Bulgaria's dead King Boris III was a physically frail and easily influenced mystic who guided his country into war on the strange advice of a counselor, it was testified at the Bulgar war guilt trials at Sofia, a Turkish news agency reported recently.

Yordan Lulchev, one of Boris's counselors, made the assertions about the King, who died mysteriously on Aug. 28, 1943, after being summoned by Adolf Hitler. He said another counselor, Professor Danov, was head of a sunworshiping cult and a back-to-pature seet before becoming adworshiping cult and a back-tonature sect before becoming adviser to the monarch. After attaining power, he decided upon
the abilities of Bulgar ministers
by examining their handwriting.
Nearly 400 of the King's counselors, regents, ministers and legislators tage-trial before two special people's courts.

The trial record was reported as showing that Boris never made an important decision, wrote a major speech or took a journey without the advice of Lulchev, Danov.

Lulchev testified that Boris twice declared he wanted to commit suicide, the Turkish agency reported. One occasion was after a Soviet protest over entry of German troops into Bulgaria. The other was after Germany's military position became hopeless.

The witness said Boris complained that strong pressure was exerted upon him by his exiled father Ferdinand, now living in


