

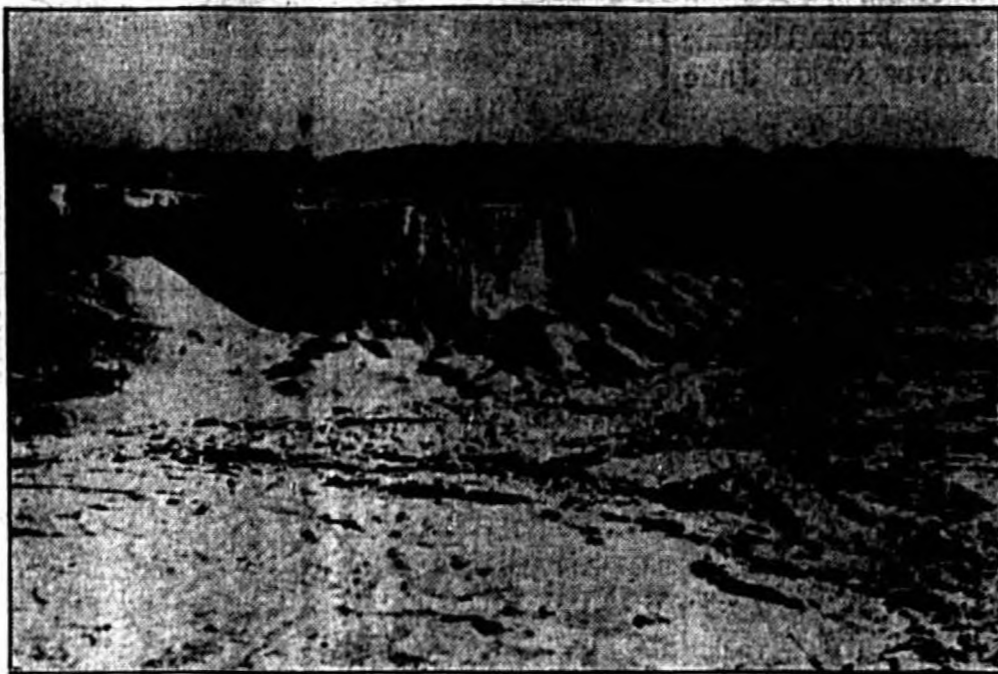

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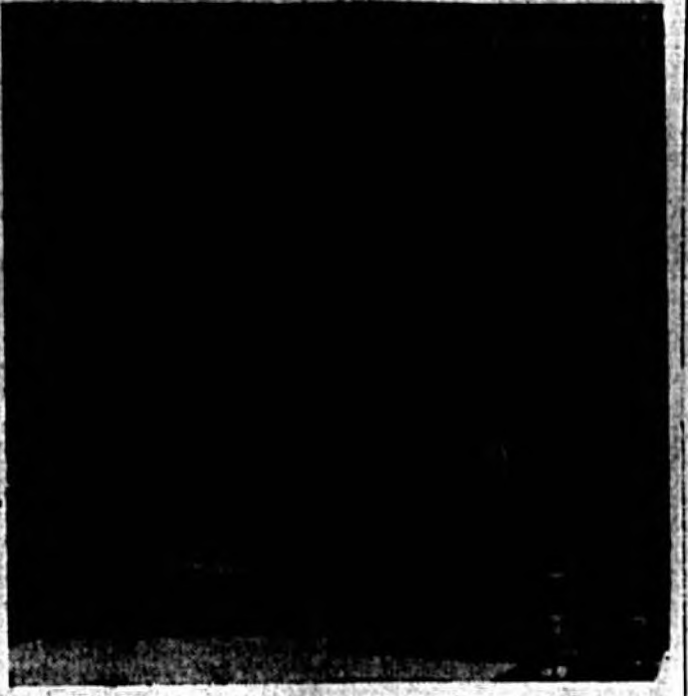
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"CONSIDER DEMOCRACY'S PLIGHT"

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Frost Danger In Florida Is Believed Past

Crops Not Harmed By Cold; Below Zero Weather Continues Through The North

LAKELAND, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Meteorologist E. S. Ellison of the government frost warning bureau said today there is no danger of freezing temperatures or frost for the citrus and truck region tonight or tomorrow.

Today's sun fought through the clouds to bring Florida warmer weather after two nights of cold winds and low temperatures. There were no reports of crop damages. A fall of sleet was detected this morning in Tallahassee, but it melted as it touched the ground.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—An inquiry to determine "who truthfully contributed" to the American Liberty League and six other organizations which have been critical of the New Deal is revealed by the Senate lobby committee.

A committee questionnaire was addressed to several hundred individuals and corporations. It was prepared, committee men said, long before Alfred E. Smith's anti-Administration league speech Saturday night. Through it, the investigators sought particularly to find whether there have been any "dummy" donors.

They were convicted of criminal negligence in connection with the sinking of the ship Sept. 8, 1934, with a loss of 194 lives.

Owners Ask To Prevent Undermining

Threat In Operating Of Closed Mines in Pennsylvania Seen

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 28.——The anthracite coal industry looks to 1936 for a solution of what its leaders term its greatest problem since the great strike of 1922—the unauthorized mining of millions of tons of coal by unlicensed workers.

Colliery owners and miners have appealed to Pennsylvania's government to settle the dispute, operators demanding that the men be driven from their makeshift mines and the "threat to legitimate industry" removed; the men fighting against legislation, promising they have no other example of defiance.

Deploring a rising Governor George E. Earle to use state police if necessary, yet furling these activities of the unlicensed industry.

"Annual production, 4,000,000 tons; number of men engaged in mining, 15,000; average price per ton for steam coal at preparation plants, 100; estimated value of total annual production at preparation plants, \$20,000,000; estimated retail market value, \$23,000,000."

The operators say "practically all the persons engaged in the production of stolen coal belong to outlaw organizations for the purpose of production, preparation, transportation and sale."

"Of 7,700 workers questioned, the Anthracite Institute says, "41 percent admitted that they were recipients of federal relief; only 33 percent had previous experience as certificated miners; 17.3 percent of those engaged in this illegal business never had been previously employed in any gainful occupation."

It also was set forth that about 5,000 men are engaged in trucking this coal to markets, mostly in Eastern states, and that about 1,000 men are engaged in hauling stolen coal from mine holes and preparing it for sale.

The Institute claims early attempts of unemployed miners to "pilot" coal were overlooked in the hope that the mines soon would reopen and "pilfering" would stop. Then the men began to sell the coal . . . in Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey, New York, and Maryland.

It became, adds the Institute, "a major racket in some sections" and "efforts to drive the recipients off the mining lands met with resistance from angry mobs."

"Local enforcement of the criminal statutes is impossible because of popular sentiment . . . There is a widespread understanding that the coal is being stolen from workings that have been abandoned by the mining companies, or from coal veins that are too small to be of interest or value to the large companies. This is far from the truth."

But the miners recently told Attorney General Charles J. Marshall they would give up their "home made" coal plants if they could obtain regular jobs. They suggested the coal companies take over the make-shift mines and hire the men.

"It would cost them less than what they are losing in business," Marshall said. "We seem to be the only way to make a living when we couldn't get work any where. Many of our men have only one industry—mining—and when the plants shut down, many of us were left stranded."

We have learned to keep . . . The growth of unauthorized mining was limited to one official Pennsylvania . . . an industry of three large coal operators by the Anthracite Institute.

Thousands of tons, tunnels and caves were seen in operation. Mining men estimated some of the plants cost but a few dollars; others could not have been set up for less than \$500 to \$1,000.

In other sections, stripping—surface operations—were found in backyards, in open fields or on hillside where men and women dug with picks and shovels.

Several places showed junked automobiles pressed into service, with a belt attached to a wheel of a car and to a wheel of the hoist. The car was jacked up and the revolution of the wheels brought up sacks of coal.

Children, women and ducks, geese, goats and cows sought scraps of food from distant dumps in the midst of this strange industry.

Once Gay Tijuana Hopes New Year Will Be Kinder

TJUANA, Mex., Jan. 23.—(AP)—Three times hit by "death sentences" this once gay border town clings to life and hopes 1933 will bring back its lost prosperity.

Its residents are subsisting on emergency fare now. They make plain their loyalty to President Lazaro Cardenas faded when his anti-gambling edict struck at this resort.

Tijuana hit its peak in 1932 with the sky-limit of racing, gambling and other attractions which made the town and neighboring Agua Caliente celebrated.

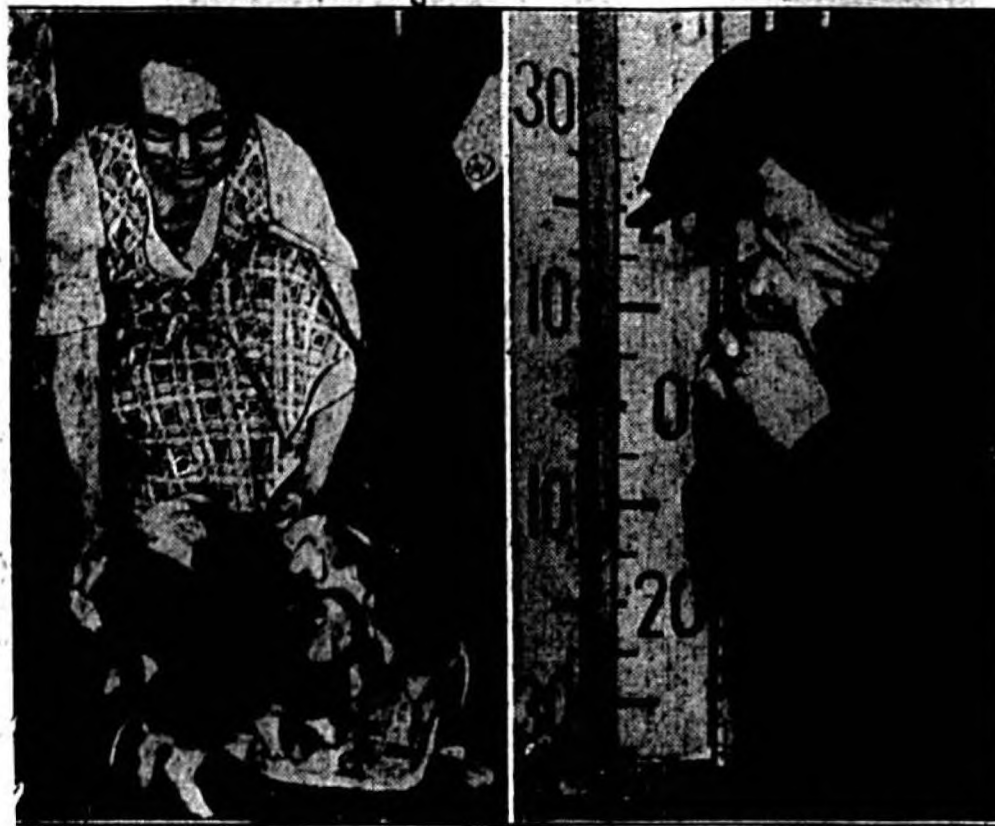

Business 'Scouts' Scan Legal Skies; See 'Uncertainty'

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13. — (AP) — Representatives of business and industry who privately keep their bosses informed about the situation in Washington are serving up some rather pessimistic information. They're detailing any number of coming events that they believe may lead to uncertainty. One such representative frankly has advised his clients they need not expect anything resembling a "breathing spell" for some time to come. Here are some of the more important questions which, pending settlement in their opinion, make for "uncertainty":

1. The bill sponsored by Senator Walsh of Massachusetts requiring those firms securing contracts with the federal government to conform to principles set up under NRA.
2. The new Wheeler-Rayburn bill, empowering the federal trade commission to investigate complaints of fraud and "deceptive practices" in business and industry. The phrase "deceptive practices" goes much further than anything yet suggested along this line.
3. The position the Supreme Court will take on the new payroll taxes now mounting for social insurance. Will they go the way of NRA codes and AAA processing taxes?
4. What will be decided on as to future relief policies and how much money will be spent?
5. If the Guffey coal act is invalidated by the Supreme Court will it bring on a strike among the soft coal miners?
6. The ultimate set-up under the new farm control program. Will the Administration be able to offset the demands of the industrialists and other advocates for various subsidy plans?
7. Taxes. Are there to be new

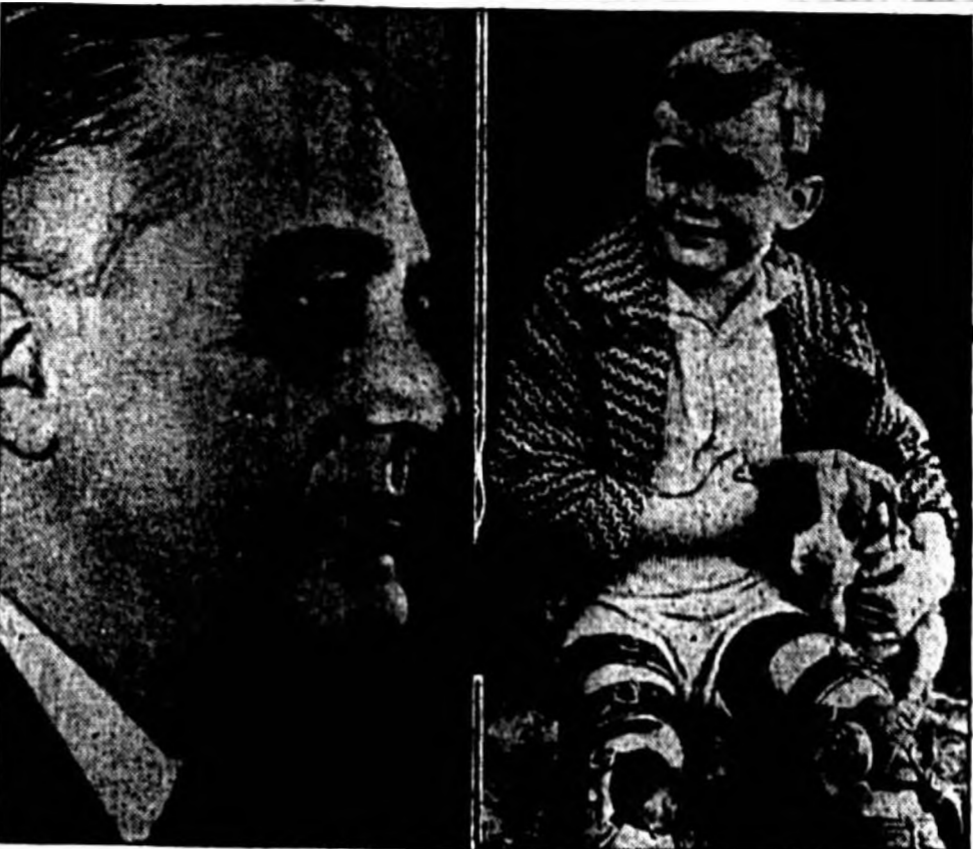

New Tax Plan Will Be Ready Within A Week

Soil Subsidy May Require 440 Million; Over 2 Billion To Pay Bonus To Vets

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Attorney General Cummings said today that a tax program to provide for a new farm plan will be sent to Capitol Hill within a week. The cost for one year of soil conservation subsidy plan has been estimated at \$440,000,000.

Also, President Roosevelt's request for \$2,100,000,000 appropriations to meet bonus payments to World War veterans, which did not mention taxes was made public today by Speaker Hiram Bidsell. Bidsell said he would refer the letter to the appropriations committee.

In a message to Congress today the President recommended that Congress define principles of federal state cooperation in dealing with soil and flood problems originating in "little rivers." He seeks to take running waters back to ultimate sources and find means controlling and using them.

"That was a question on many legislators' minds as an AA substitute and the bonus were pondered." Cummings answered Attorney General Cummings insofar as the new farm plan is concerned.

"New currency" was urged by Representative Patman, Texas, in the wake of the President's request for bonus funds. He promised a "battle" to provide cash by issuing currency against gold now pile in the treasury.

The Senate agricultural committee, showing the subsidy soil conservation bill toward debate, sent along a statement that the agricultural problem is "very largely a monetary one."

Hopkins Admits As Many On Dole As One Year Ago

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(AP)—A dozen Democratic senators were informed at a private conference with Harry L. Hopkins yesterday that almost as many persons are on the dole or work relief as a year ago.

The relief population reached an all-time peak of more than 20,000,000 last January, and Hopkins was reported to have said yesterday that while there had been a "slight" improvement, the relief load was about the same now.

About 1,000,000 "unemployable" heads of families, however, now are being supported by state and local governments rather than through federal relief.

Silencer Of Static In Radios Invented

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 30.—A new device, as yet unnamed, designed to kill the bangs, clatters and rapid succession noises arising from electrical interference on radio receiving sets, was announced by James J. Lamb, technical editor of "QST," the publication of the American Radio Relay League, which has its headquarters here.

Mr. Lamb said the noise silencer has been developed in the laboratories of the league and tests had proved it successful on standard built sets. He said it was likely that the better models of next season will be equipped with the apparatus. Development of the silencer has been carried on for two years and applications for patents have been filed. Separate units attachable to sets already in operation, provided their circuit were adaptable, would be made available, Mr. Lamb said.

Italy Orders Registration Of Citizens

New War Measures Taken While Flank Attacks Threaten Army In Ethiopia

FRENCH-BRITISH Work For Peace

New French Premier Says Co-Operation Will Prevent War

The Italian cabinet voted approval of three new war measures today as a Fascist column along the southern Ethiopian front was reported threatened by rear flank attacks after driving deep into the Wadara region.

At Rome the Italian ministers moved swiftly to requisition wool for military supplies, register physical status and military training of all citizens and revise organization of internal defense units.

The Ethiopian government reported that General Rudolf Graziani's troops were retreating toward Neghelli after a fight with defending forces.

At Paris Premier Albert Sarraut of France threw his lot with Great Britain by declaring before parliament that England's "co-operation with France" is the essential guarantee of the peace of Europe.

From London came the word that Anthony Eden, by talks with foreign dignitaries, had quieted the western European political situation.

Leaders of Italian industry are anxious to revive a trade mission to the United States which failed last year, informed persons said. Shortly before the disclosure an apparently authoritative source gave Italy, because of Italian sanctions, will look to the American for his future raw materials and commerce.

35,000 Arrested By Treasury Last Year

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, reported today that Treasury law-enforcement agencies had more than 35,000 arrests in 1935 and seized more than 1,000,000 gallons of liquor. Automobiles, boats, an airplane, narcotic drugs, and counterfeit money also were listed among the seizures.

The enforcement agencies are the alcohol tax unit, the customs bureau, the coast guard, the narcotic division, the secret service and the intelligence unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Three Suspects Held After Bank Robbery

OCALA, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Three men were held last night as suspects in the robbery yesterday of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Trenton.

The five robbers who cut their way into the bank vault after holding J. P. DeLoach, night watchman, were reported to have obtained between \$500 and \$600 in cash. Bank officials declined to reveal the amount of the loss.

DeLoach came here with Sheriff R. E. Davis of Gilchrist county to view the suspect and was reported to have recognized one as a member of the gang.
