Truman Asks **Rent Controls Be Continued**

House Ways And Meas Committee Again Votes To Reduce High Excise Tax

WASHINGTON, Apr. 21-(/P) -President Truman asked Congress today to extend rent controls, and a house committee voted for an additional \$250,000,. 000 reduction in excise laxes.

The president sent congress . special message on rent controls delivered in his absence. He flew to Georgia this morning to watch some military maneuvers.

The House Ways and Menna committee, which afready had approved \$85,000,000 in excise tax reductions, look another shot at the problem today and voted to eliminate some of the taxes entirely and cut others in half. The action affects jewelry, furs, handbags and other items now subject to federal sales nace.

Truman predicted "a wave of exorbitant rent increases" if they are allowed to end June 30 when the present law expires.

And if that happens, he said small income people, having to shell out more money for rent, will cut down on buying food, clothing and other necessities; unemployment will increase in industries losing sales.

Federal, state and local governments will have to pay out more money for assistance to the needy. pensions, both government and private, to old people will become more inadequate.



division and consult frequently with its heads.

The proposal has met with enthusiasm in both Congress and the State Department, and among Democrats and Republicans. It is seen as a possible solution to the problem of achieving bipartisan acceptance and support of foreign policy, an achievement which seems to be growing more

policy, an achievement which seems to be growing more difficult and at the same time more necessary to the American position in world affairs.

Traditionally foreign policy has been made by the President and the Secretary of State, with the Senate occasionally called on to ratify an accomplished treaty and Congress expected from time to time to give such support as gress expected from time to time to give such support as provide the means by which a much closer contact could be maintained, and through which the Senate could actually have a hand in the shaping of policy. It is further conceived that the House Foreign Relations Committee might foilow a similar procedure.










The compromise agreement provides that a new government coalition would be formed, probably including Social Christians and Liberals. The new government would ask parliament to pass a law authorizing the King to delegate his royal powers temporarily to Prince Haudouin.
