400 Farmers Sign Up For 1950 Soil Saving Program

A total of 400 farmers who own or operate 106,027 acres of land in Seminole County have signed their intention to participate in the 1950 Soil Conservation program for 1950, Orin Mathews, administrator, announced this morning at a meeting of the county committee of the Public Marketing Administration.

He disclosed that \$19,800 had been allocated by the PMA for soil conservation practices in this county.

Of the 106,027 acres, 8,258 acres of the land are devoted to vegetable crops. This is far from being the total acreage devoted to vegetables in the county, as all growers have not signed up, said Mr. Mathews, and he estimated that the total acreage devoted to vegetables is nearly 10,000 acres.

Grove owners signed up for 6,429 acres of bearing citrus, and 1,201 acres of non-bearing orchard. The balance of the land comprises 60,235 acres of pasture land.

Soil conservation practices, he pointed out, include the planting of cover crops, the use of materials such as lime and phosphate and of minor mineral elements such as magnesium, manganese, copper and zinc. Advice is given on the planting of pasture grasses.

 compromise solution calling for Leopold to return and to turn the throne over to his son temporarily. This compromise was suggested by Leopold in a speech recorded from his exile near Geneva, Switzerland, and broadcast to the Belgians last week.

But the strongly pro-Leopold Social Christian (Catholic) Party of Premier-Designate Paul Van Zeeland hope that Haoudouin's tenure will be strictly temporary and will lead to full restoration of power to Leopold. Apparently they would prefer that Leopold stay in Belgium while his son rules.

The Socialists, bitterly opposed to the King who surrendered his country to Germany in 1940, want the delegation of the powers to Haoudouin eventually to be permanent. They are, therefore, opposed to the King's residence in this country after he turns the throne over.

Acceptance of the compromise except for this vital point came after a seven-hour conference of leaders of the Catholic Social Christians, the Socialists and the Liberals. They are scheduled to meet again today to discuss the matter of the King's future residence.

The compromise agreement provides that a new government coalition would be formed, probably including Social Christians and Liberals. The new government would ask parliament to pass a law authorizing the King to delegate his royal powers temporarily to Prince Haoudouin.

The agreement also would permit the King to resume his royal functions only with the approval of about two-thirds of parliament. Meanwhile, in other European capitals:

 they make "one fundamental assumption that may seem debatable to you. We assume that it makes a great deal of difference who is giving out information."

He said, for example, that the greatest security threat would be posed by a full-time commission employ writing without supervision about atomic matters.

At the other extreme, he added, might be a writer who has no access to classified material but who might be "shrewd enough to pick up significant information by interviews with informed people or even by guessing from published material."

Smyth disclosed that the writings of those in the second category are virtually ignored by the commission — even when their guesses come uncomfortably close to the truth — for fear that in commenting on such material the commission might "reveal the very facts we should be withholding."

He said that while unlimited free speech might prompt an international exchange of ideas which would give this country better weapons, it might do the same for a potential enemy.

"Therefore," he said, "our objective is not the best possible military technology, but a constantly maintained advantage of our technology over that of our potential enemies."

"It is the difference between technologies that is important, not their absolute quality."

That, he said, makes some form of censorship vital.

The editors' interest in retting both sides of this question was indicated by the fact that Smyth was scheduled to share the speaker's platform with an editor who
