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## Knowles Urges Action For City Library

Apably on the part of Sanford's and Seminole County's reading public was hit today by City Manager W. E. Knowles in a talk on the "Library Situation" before the Jaycees at the Civic Center.

### Span Destroyed On Struck Road

PORT ORANGE (UPI) — Saboteurs blew up the southbound abutment and span of a Florida East Coast Railway bridge over tidal marsh land about 2.5 miles south of here during the night, FEC officials said today.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A rail labor squeeze play that has slowed construction of the American "moonshot" project was credited today with raising hopes for a settlement of the eight-month-old strike against the Florida East Coast Railroad.

Federal officials were reported to be more determined than ever to end the walkout by 11 rail unions because of a picketing episode last week that filled hundreds of workers building the moonshot on Merritt Island near Capu Canaveral.

The tough stance taken by Edward Hall, Florida East Coast's board chairman, was reported to be the major problem in reaching a settlement of the dispute.

Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz has met with Hall to suggest possible solutions but there has been no reply from Hall thus far.

Rail union pickets, who have not been able to prevent operation of trains by supervisors, decided to march on the causeway leading to Merritt Island where trucks haul tracks to the construction site.

Men are building railroad marshalling yards there to be used in construction of giant launching pads for rockets that are scheduled to launch in the moon by 1970.

The pickets were successful last Wednesday and Thursday in persuading about 1,400 union building trades workers to stay off the job. They returned to work Friday when the pickets were removed.

When labor department officials heard about the squeeze play, they decided to make new efforts to end the strike. In return, rail union leaders decided to withhold pickets at the moonshot site for the time being. It is doubtful whether legal restrictions against secondary boycotts could avert such picketing.

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### Moscow Charges China Started Indian Fighting

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union today put the blame squarely on Peking for starting the border fighting last fall with India.

The Communist party newspaper Pravda attacked Peking for trying to justify its action in invading India and "blacken the policy" of other states involved.

Pravda said in an editorial that the Soviets believe the Sino-Indian conflicts was "favorable only to the forces of imperialism and reaction" who try to maintain tension in the world.

"We have to remember," it said, "that there are not and never have been grounds for the breaking out of the frontier conflict between India and China, let alone for this conflict to reach the stage of armed clashes," it added.

China's attack on India long has been a sore point in Moscow's relations with Peking. The Soviets have given India millions in aid for many years in an effort to win over Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru.

### Tunnel Urged

LONDON (UPI) — A 10-man committee of experts today recommended the construction of a railroad tunnel under the English Channel to establish the first permanent link between the British Isles and the continent.

### Sympathy Offered

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — The executive committee of the Southern Baptist Convention Wednesday night expressed its "deepest sympathy" to the families of four Negro children killed Sunday in the bombing of a Birmingham church.

### Martial Law

JAKARTA, Indonesia (UPI) — Indonesia imposed martial law on this capital Wednesday night as a result of a day of rioting against the new British Commonwealth nation of Malaysia that left the British Embassy a burned-out shell.

### Toll Road Meeting

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The State Road Board meets here today to discuss the Everglades Parkway, a proposed Naples-to-Fort Lauderdale toll road that has met stiff opposition from the American Automobile Association.

### Face Court

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Another group of Negroes arrested during a racial demonstration here Saturday night faced Judge Ben Willis today in Circuit Court on contempt of court charges for violating an order limiting the size of racial protests to 15.

### 'No Combat Units'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A congressman just back from the Soviet Union said today the Russians claim they have no combat troops only training groups left in Cuba. Rep. Robert R. Barry, (R-N.Y.), a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee said he was told by Vasily V. Kuznetsov, Russia's first deputy foreign minister.

### Area Economy To Be Upgraded By Waterway

Economical expansion of the Sanford area, anticipated with the construction of the proposed St. Johns-Indian River Canal, was outlined before the Kiwanis Club Wednesday noon by John Kridler, canal district chairman. Kridler, also Chamber of Commerce manager, said negotiations are being carried out with a large company for the construction of docks and terminals. He added a space petroleum plant also is considering locating along the canal. Further, he said, it is likely that marina facilities will be constructed here to handle the anticipated increase in pleasure craft, of which he estimated 25,000 will dock here annually en route between Jacksonville and Maytown. "He pointed, too, to the large number of commercial craft — tugs with barges — which will move through the canal. Enthusiastic in his belief of the canal, Kridler prophesied that "the project will secure our economy forever. It will forever eliminate the fear of this city and the surrounding area losing its identity."

Pearson in a speech to the General Assembly this morning, warned that "when the United Nations fails, its member governments fail. When it succeeds, the people, the plain and good people of all the world succeed."

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was scheduled to follow Pearson in the first day of policy speeches to the 18th General Assembly, which convened Tuesday.

President Kennedy will address the assembly Friday.

Pearson, a former assembly president who won a Nobel Prize for the idea of sending a UN peace force to the Middle East after the 1956 Suez crisis, offered specific proposals for a stronger United Nations.

**30 Days To Better Grades Sane Students' Guide To Tests**

We'll spend this article on the best ways to review for a test. But before we start, one very important thought: don't get all shook up because a test is coming.

Actually, it's very unproductive to get upset before an exam. You don't score any extra points for a wildly palpitating heart. As a matter of fact, the more anxious you get the more chance there is of "freezing" on the test. Getting shook just gets you lower marks. And even if you don't do as well as you would like to, the sun will still come up the next day. Really.

So let's assume you're calm, cool, collected and have been doing what these articles have been telling you to do. (If you haven't been studying the way you should have been, we have a special article coming next to help you.)

Start to review from your notebook. You've been keeping a general outline of the course in your notebook, so the best thing to do is read that over. As you come to each major point, stop and think about it. Consider its possible ramifications — everything that it leads to. Try to infer what the next major point should be.

Use your textbook to check anything that's not completely clear from your notes. Or if you like, make a general overview of the chapters that pertain, just to confirm the ac-

curacy of your notes. You won't have every little detail in your notes, but you'll have notes on where they can be found.

At first, don't bother with anything that may require memorization. Begin your reviewing at least a week before the test is scheduled so you can study somewhat leisurely and with a minimum of pressure. Save the memorization until the night before, or at most, two nights before the test. As a rule, memorization doesn't stick for a long time.

Review for the test the same way you've been studying. Get the main idea first; learn the general overview before you start to get involved in details. You can afford to miss a detail or two, because if you really understand the main idea of the course, you'll be able to figure out the details — or at least you'll be able to make good guesses.

For most people, a brain-pickling session with four or five others is a good idea — with two cautions: if they turn into bull-sessions, nothing gets accomplished, and secondly, if anyone starts to panic, go off and study by yourself. Panic is contagious.

Finally, the morning of the test, a quick general overview of the notes is in order. It'll refresh your memory and put you in perfect shape.

Make sure you get to class on time for the test, but don't get there early. There'll always be one or two panicky

When you use Jacoby-Stayman with a game going hand the purpose is to find a 4-4 major suit fit if there is one. Hence, you always must have at least one four-card major when you use it.

You may also have a five-card major. In that case if your partner bids either major suit in response to two clubs you raise to three or four as your hand warrants. If he bids two diamonds you jump to three of your five-card major. If you have no five-card major and he bids two diamonds you simply bid the approximate number of no-trump.

Twenty-six points is normally enough for game. This time South saw that 29 points might be inadequate.

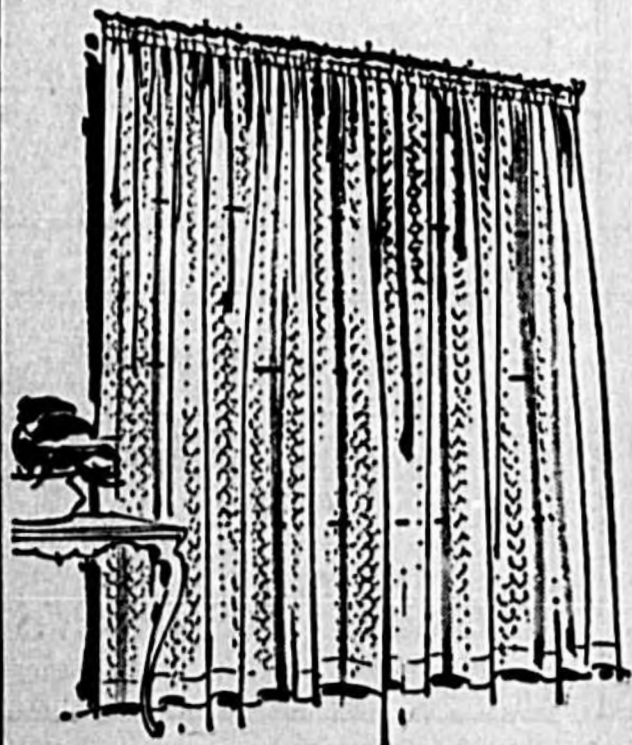

# Homemakers

How does this sound?  
**OVEN CRISP CHICKEN**  
 1 3/4-3 lb. frying chicken cut up  
 2-4 cups Rice Krispies  
 1/4-1/2 cup butter or oleo, melted  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1/4 tsp. pepper  
 1. Wash chicken pieces and dry thoroughly.  
 2. Crush Rice Krispies into medium fine crumbs.  
 3. Combine melted butter with salt and pepper.  
 4. Dip chicken pieces in seasoned butter then roll in Rice Krispies crumbs until well-coated. Place skin side up in shallow baking pan lined with aluminum foil, do not crowd pieces.  
 5. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 1 hour or until tender. Do not cover pan or turn chicken while cooking. Serves 4-5.

Some one sent in this recipe for **STUFFED LETTUCE SALAD**. Really sounds good. Hollow out a head of lettuce that is solid. Prepare the following mixture:  
 1/2 cup cream cheese (8 oz.)  
 1/4 cup salad dressing  
 1 1/4-oz. can of deviled ham  
 1 cup sliced celery  
 1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
 3 tbsps. chopped pimiento  
 1 tbsps. chopped onion  
 Chill thoroughly. Slice and serve with salad dressing or French dressing.

**SHREDDED WHEAT STUFFING FOR ROAST CHICKEN**  
 7 shredded wheat biscuits  
 3 tbsps. chopped parsley  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1/4 tsp. pepper  
 1/4 cup butter or oleo  
 1/4 cup finely cut celery  
 1/4 cup minced onion  
 1/4 cup hot chicken broth or water

1. Break shredded wheat biscuits into pieces. Combine with parsley and salt and pepper.  
 2. Melt butter in frying pan over low heat, add celery and onions. Cook about 5 minutes or until onions are tender. Combine with shredded wheat mixture. Add broth, a little at a time, mixing lightly.  
 3. Place stuffing in prepared chicken being careful not to pack.  
 4. Roast as usual. Makes 4 1/2 cups of stuffing for a 3-4 lb. chicken.

**RASPBERRY FRAPPE**  
 This is very economical and surprisingly good.  
 1 cup evaporated milk  
 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1 tsp.  
 1/4 tsp. lemon rind dash of salt  
 1/2 cup seedless black raspberry jam  
 Pour milk into a refrigerator tray and freeze to an icy mush. Transfer milk to a cold bowl, add lemon juice and beat with a rotary beater until stiff and light. Add remaining ingredients and continue beating until thoroughly blended. Pour mixture back into freezing tray and freeze 5 to 8 hours. Serves 4 to 6.

**BAKED PEACHES**  
 Pare 5 large or 10 small peaches and place whole in a casserole. Add 1 tbsps. water and sprinkle with 1/4 cup sugar. Cover casserole and bake in moderate oven 375 degrees 20 to 30 minutes or until tender. Chill before serving. Serves 5.

 1/2 lb. beef chuck  
 1/2 lb. veal shoulder  
 1/2 lb. lean fresh pork  
 1 bouillon cube

 1/2 cup uncooked rice  
 1/2 tsp. paprika  
 Lay 4 slices of bacon together and with a knife or shears cut into small pieces. Sauté bacon in skillet until done; remove from skillet and pour off about half of the fat. Brown onion in remaining fat; add ground beef and salt and cook until beef is just gray in color. Add tomatoes, cooked bacon and well washed rice and paprika. Turn into a greased casserole. Cover and bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours or until rice is tender. Add hot water if needed during cooking. Serves 5.

**VEGETABLE SLAW**  
 1/2 cup mayonnaise  
 1 tbsps. prepared mustard  
 2 tbsps. peanut butter  
 3 cups finely shredded cabbage  
 1 cup shredded carrots  
 1/2 cup thin sliced celery

 crisp lettuce  
 Thoroughly blend mayonnaise, mustard and peanut butter; add to vegetables, except lettuce, and toss lightly until well mixed. Chill before serving. Arrange lightly in heaps on lettuce. Serves 5.

### Bury Cold War, Kennedy Asks Reds At UN

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — President Kennedy today called on the Communist world to bury the cold war and engage the West in "a contest of achievement instead of intimidation."

Speaking before the 18th General Assembly of the United Nations which opened here Tuesday, Kennedy said he welcomed such a contest "between those who envision a monolithic world and those who believe in diversity."

For we believe, said the President, "that truth is stronger than error—and that freedom is more enduring than coercion. And in the contest for a better life, all the world can be the winner."

Kennedy specifically outlined the areas where the Soviet Union and the United States, together with their allies, could achieve further agreements, "agreements which spring from our mutual interest in avoiding nuclear destruction."

Referring to a speech made to the General Assembly Thursday by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko in which the Russian proposed an agreement with the United States to ban nuclear weapons from space, Kennedy urged that negotiators go back to the negotiating table to work out practical arrangements to this end.

In the field of space, Kennedy said, where the United States and Russia have a special capacity, there is room for new cooperation including the possibility of a joint expedition to the moon.

Pointing to the fact that by resolution of the U.N. assembly member nations had forewarned any claim to territorial rights in outer space, Kennedy asked rhetorically why man's first flight to the moon should be a matter of national competition.

"Why," Kennedy asked, "should the United States and the Soviet Union, in preparing for such expeditions, become involved in immense duplications of research, construction and expenditure?"

"Surely we should explore whether the scientists and astronauts of our two countries—indeed of all the world—cannot work together in the conquest of space, sending some day in this decade to the moon, not the representative of a single nation, but the representatives of all humanity."

### City And County To Vote Nov. 5

Filling two city commission posts and three school trustee posts, three constitutional amendments, a school tax levy and a county question will confront voters in the Nov. 5 election.

City and county voters will vote for the three school trustee posts and on the tax millage. The present trustees are Ray Staton and Don Bales, of Sanford, and Fred Distine, of Longwood. Deadline for candidates to file is Oct. 21.

All city voters will be eligible to pass on the two city commission posts now held by Thomas S. McDonald and A. L. Wilson. Deadline for candidates is Oct. 14.

All city and county voters will be eligible to vote on the county question, approving permissive legislation permitting the county to purchase and offer a site for the proposed state university for East Central Florida. However, if this approval is given and if the State Board of Control selects a Seminole County site, a special election for a bond issue will be held later for freeholders only.

All city and county voters will pass on three state constitutional amendments: A \$75 million bond issue for higher education, permitting the State Recreation Council to issue bonds, and changing the gubernatorial election date to an off-presidential year.

School Supt. R. T. Milwee this morning issued the following statement relative to the school election:

"The principal duties of trustees are to advise with school officials and parents and to recommend the employment or dismissal of members of the instructional staff of the county.

A person may qualify to run for trustee by being nominated by a petition signed by five or more persons qualified to vote in the election. The petitions on which signatures are to be placed may be obtained from the County School Office in Sanford. The signed petitions must be returned to the County School Office no later than 15 days prior to the date of the election.

The millage requested by the School Board to be voted on is the same the Board had for the past two years. In the district the millage proposed is 2.75 mills and in the building and bus reserve fund 1 mill, for a total of 3.75 in the special tax school district.

### Kelly Blasts SRB Approval Of Toll Road

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Lakeland Sen. Scott Kelly said Thursday Road Board approval of the proposed Everglades Parkway was a "prime example" of the need to reorganize the agency.

"If highway construction in Florida were under the guidance of a highway commission who could remain in office from one governor's administration to the next," Kelly said, "I am sure the decisions on the Everglades toll road would have been made on a professional basis rather than a political basis."

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko's proposal for an 18-nation summit conference on disarmament in Moscow found generally warm support among UN delegates today.

### \$22 Million Paid State

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The federal government turned \$22 million over to Florida Thursday in the form of a little blue check representing back funds owed to the Road Department for super-highway construction.

"We have a lot of plans for the use of this," said a grinning Gov. Farris Bryant as he took the money from Federal Roads Administrator Rex Whitten. "We can use the money."

In addition to paying back funds due in the federal-state funds for the interstate roads, the check represented the inauguration of a new repayment system which will bring more liquid funds to the state treasury.

### Cdr. Conrey, Lt. Garrett Feared Dead

A flight crew of a Sanford-based A-54 Vigilante attack plane was missing and presumed dead in the Mediterranean Sea today following a crash while landing aboard the carrier USS Independence.

The missing crewmen were identified by the Commander of Heavy Attack Wing One as the pilot, Lt. Cdr. James Richard Conrey, 33, of 2044 Hibiscus Court, and his bombardier-navigator, Lt. Theodore Carl Garrett, 32. Both were assigned to Heavy Attack Squadron One.

Commander Conrey and Lieutenant Garrett were returning from a routine training mission when the accident occurred at 11:30 p.m. (ship's time) Thursday.

The twinjet aircraft collided with the flight deck and was lost into the sea. An intensive air-sea search was immediately begun for the missing crewmen but neither was located.

Commander Conrey, a veteran of more than 11 years of Naval service, lived locally with his wife, Phyllis; sons, Bryan, 7, and Mike, 5, and daughters Kit, 9, and Ann, 1.

Prior to deployment with Heavy Attack Squadron One, Lieutenant Garrett and his wife, Rosemary, and their daughter, Linda, 3, and son, Gregory, 1, resided at 111 East Woodlawn Drive. Mrs. Gregory now resides with relatives in Hahnville, La. Lieutenant Garrett's Naval career covered 17 years.

Heavy Attack Squadron One deployed to the Mediterranean Aug. 6 after a month of operation off the East Coast.

### Youth Arrested In Parricide

SCARBOROUGH, Maine (UPI) — An AWOL sailor from Massachusetts accused of slaying his mother and younger brother and critically wounding his father was apprehended here early today at a police roadblock.

Police said Stanley N. Garfield, 18, of Frammingham, Mass., readily confessed to the strangling of his mother, Mrs. Ruth T. Garfield, 43, and his brother John, 9, and the shooting of his father, Robert T. Garfield, 43.

The youth will be arraigned here today as a fugitive from justice. Frammingham police arrived early today to return him to their jurisdiction.

Maine police said the youth described the violence as "something that has been coming to a boil for a long time." A family dispute apparently had been fomented by his marriage to a teen-age sweetheart.

### Kelly Warned, Court Told

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The senior circuit judge, of the Pasco-Pinellas circuit testified today that he advised Republican Judge Richard Kelly the day he took office that he might be impeached by the Democratic-controlled Legislature if he didn't "vote the line."

Judge Charles R. Leavengood of Clearwater, also a Republican, said Kelly had had a "rough" campaign with a majority of the lawyers in the twenty-county circuit opposing his election.

"The day he took office, I told him he'd had the same type of campaign I had had eight years before and the best thing to do was let bygones be bygones and forget it and work hard."

"I told him we had a Democratic House, a Democratic Senate and a Democratic Supreme Court and if he didn't toe the line, he was liable to be impeached."

This testimony caused a flurry of contention among senators sitting as judge and jury to decide if Kelly should be removed on House charges of judicial tyranny and abuse of power.

Sen. Clyde Galloway, DeFuniak Springs, asked if Leavengood knew of any instance where the Senate had influenced a circuit judge and, if not, why he'd give a new judge such advice.

### JFK Rejects Use Of Troops In Alabama

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy counted today on two personal representatives to help restore racial peace in Birmingham, Ala. He ruled out sending federal troops to the strife-torn city.

The President named the two special mediators Thursday shortly before he met with seven Negro leaders and appealed for "restraint and responsibility" by all citizens of Alabama.

Kennedy also agreed to meet Monday with five white civic leaders from Birmingham, at the request of Mayor Albert Boutwell, to receive their report on what is being done to restore racial harmony.

Selected by the President to try to bring white and Negro community leaders together in Birmingham were former Army Secretary Kenneth C. Royall and former West Point football coach Earl H. Blaik.

Royall and Blaik received immediate pledges of cooperation from both Boutwell and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., leader of the Negro delegation who met with Kennedy. Three two Presidential appointees will go to Birmingham in a few days.

King planned to meet today with Justice Department officials to discuss the Birmingham situation.

### Rusk To Open World Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk opens a major new round of diplomacy today which will span several weeks, involve 60 or more nations, and chart future relations with Russia.

Rusk planned to meet with West German Foreign Minister Gerhard Schroeder. He also had a session scheduled with Italian Foreign Minister Attilio Piccioni.

They are the first of 50 or 60 foreign ministers and several heads of state Rusk will see individually here and in New York in coming weeks.

The occasion for the new diplomatic round was the annual ceremonial gathering of foreign ministers from all over the world for the opening of the United Nations General Assembly in New York.

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
