Sympathetic Selesmanship

Perhaps one of the greatest annoyances with which the Perhaps one of the greatest annoyances with which the modern housewife has to contend is the practice, particu-larly in hard times, of certain salesmen making house-to-house canvasses selling magazines, neckties, or scrubbing brushes in order to work their way through college, or to take care of a crippled father. One of these crippled fathers, an investigation recent-ly disclosed, best his leg when in a drunken stupor he was struck by a street car. He had been for years, probably all of his life, a lary and shiftless parasite, spending every cent he could get his hands on for liquor and vice of one Kind or another.

Selling magazines for the purpose of making money mough to go to college has its praiseworthy points, but the sympathetic argument is hardly the basis on which to sell anything. Twenty-seven colleges in this country have recent-ly banded themselves together for the express purpose, not of discouraging magazine selling, but of profibiting the sympathy element usually employed in such selesmanship. A statement issued by these colleges holds that "no stu-dent has a right to trade upon his effectional status in seles

dent has a right to trade upon his educational status in selling goods", but that "products should be sold entirely upon their merits... rather than upon the basis of an emotional appeal which has nothing whatever to do with the case". "The average salesman of this type does not consider whether you want the article which he has for sale, or whether it is an article worthy of selling. He aaks you to buy it merely to help him out, to help send him to college. The average parent these days has about all he can do to send his own children to college, or, as a matter of fact, to feed them, without being called upon to contribute to the expenses of an absolute stranger, of whose worthiness he is entirely ignorant.

It is not our purpose to condemn magazine salesmen as a body, but marely the methods usually employed by them. Their product should be sold on the basis of its marits alone. A good salesman with a good product does not have equal footing all valid States to appeal to sympathy.
