### Judge Withholds Adjudication Of Guilt

## Woman Gets Probation After Admitting Escape Aid Try

A 21-year-old Apopka woman who admitted scaling a Seminole County jail wall to smuggle tools into the facility for a jailbreak attempt last March has been given a five-year probationary sentence in circuit court.

Circuit Court Judge J. William Woodson withheld adjudication of guilt for Mrs. Mary Jane Shazer and ordered her released on probation under supervision of state probation and parole authorities.

Her husband, Lawrence Shazer, 22, who was an inmate in the jail at the time of the aborted March escape try, earlier pleaded guilty and received a five-year prison sentence.

Mrs. Shazer pleaded guilty to attempted conveying of hacksaws and tools into the jail to facilitate an escape and later turned state's evidence in the trial of the wife of another inmate, Mrs. Elaine Edge Clanton, 24, also of Apopka.

Mrs. Clanton was acquitted by a jury June 12 despite testimony by Mrs. Shazer that Mrs. Clanton was a "lookout" one time when she scaled the wall "like a human fly" with a bag of tools.

Circuit Court Judge A. J. Rosemann Jr. dismissed charges in the jailbreak case against Rocky Ray Darnell, 20, of Sanford; Floyd Joylin, 32, of DeLand, and Roy Brown Clanton Jr., 28, of Apopka, because State Attorney Abbott Herring's office didn't follow the court's administrative order in refiling the charges.

Herring is appealing the dismissals to the Fourth District

Court of Appeals in West Palm Beach and is also challenging in a Brevard County civil lawsuit the circuit judges' authority to make local court rules.

In other sentences, Ronald Roy Addison, 20, of 104 Bethune Circle, Sanford, was sentenced to serve 90 days in county jail, plus five years probation on a plea of guilty to possession of cocaine.

Addison was arrested by Sanford police Feb. 7 at 11th St. and Mulberry Avenue after a car was stopped during a narcotics investigation. Police said packets of cocaine were found in Addison's sock.

Judge Woodson said, before sentencing Addison, that the court file reflected that Addison told officers that the driver of the car, Samuel Jackson, of Midway, had given him the cocaine. But Addison told the court the cocaine was his and declined to reveal

where he got it. Jackson, 22, was wounded May 6 in a shooting incident at a south Seminole apartment complex. He disappeared when his assailant, 27-year-old Tyrone Jones of Fern Park, came to trial and Jones was acquitted.

Jackson was later arrested for contempt of court and sentenced to 11 months in county jail. He named Jones in open court as a large-volume cocaine dealer in south Seminole who allegedly employed "a bunch of dudes" to sell illegal narcotics to users in the Seminole-Orange County area.

Circuit Court Judge Robert McGregor sentenced 41-year-old Wilbur Hall, of Altamonte Springs, to 12 years in prison on a plea of guilty to manslaughter in the March 2 shooting death of Lemo Lovette, 47, his next door neighbor.

### Hattaway Convincing; Casselberry Joins Plan

CASSELBERRY— At the urging of State Rep. Bob Hattaway, the City Council last night voted to participate in a \$10,000 grant to provide goals for Seminole County's Comprehensive Land Planning Act.

Of seven Seminole cities, Casselberry was the only holdout. Officials had said the grant was "too little" and had

charged a lack of communication existed between the city and the county.

But the Altamonte Springs Democrat swayed council members to a unanimous vote after informing officials he'd worked long and hard in Tallahassee "trying to get

"If you don't want it, that \$10,000 will be given to Orange County — or some other county," Hattaway warned.

Two weeks ago the council voted not to participate in the grant from the state Department of Community Affairs because the money is to be administered by the East Florida Regional Planning Council.

Council Chairman Edith Duerr said it was never the city's intention "to have the plan handed by one body. That won't develop the goals of Casselberry."

### Funds Available In 1976 Polk Trims LEAA Budget In Half

Cutting a pie can be fun — unless it's a dollar pie — Sheriff John Polk found out last week as he trimmed a seven-county Law Enforcement Assistance Authority (LEAA) budget almost in half.

Polk was asked by Orange County Sheriff Mel Colman to serve as a liaison between the East Central Florida Criminal Justice Conference and the counties in an effort to fit \$920,000 in fund requests in a \$483,625 "pie."

The funds being sought will not become available until July, 1976, but must be submitted for LEAA approval this year, Polk explained.

Polk was involved only in work covering four counties — Seminole, Osceola, Lake and Indian River — because

Orange, Volusia and Brevard Counties receive their own funds separately.

Seminole County will submit three programs totaling \$60,750 for the 1976 funding, Polk said these will include \$14,400 for an air boat; \$36,000 to complete a

Criminal Justice Information System Master Plan which the county must have on file to be eligible for funds, and \$10,350 for a diagnostic section in the county jail.

Municipalities in Seminole County will seek funds totaling \$183,800 with Sanford asking the largest single amount in a \$32,850 project for surveillance equipment.

Other Seminole cities seeking funds and the projects include: Oviado, \$11,095 for continuation of a crime tactical unit (detective division) and \$14,500 for communications.

Longwood, \$15,362 for tactical unit, \$12,600 for youth services and \$9,225 for communications. Casselberry, \$28,476 for an Environmental Impact and Crime Specific Efforts Unit. Winter Springs, \$11,095 for continuation of tactical crime unit, and \$14,000 for youth services.

## Fuel Adjustment Increase To Cause Hike In Power Bills

Fuel adjustment charges alone will force Seminole County consumers to dig into already deflated pockets next month for an additional 31 cents to \$3.82 to keep electricity flowing.

In addition, many new customers of Florida Power & Light Co. (FPL) are paying \$50 instead of \$30 deposits to have the power company turn on the lights.

Both FPL and Florida Power Corp., the two utilities serving Seminole County are expecting increases in next month's bills because of higher prices of oil used to drive their generators.

Florida Power Monday won an \$11.7 million rate

"Every time we take the nuclear plants off the line, the fuel adjustment goes up," Burns said.

"Two years ago we paid \$4.08 a barrel for oil. Now, it's \$12.73 per barrel—more than triple," said Johnny Higgins, a spokesman for FPL.

"Every time we take the nuclear plants off the line, the fuel adjustment goes up," Burns said. Utilities must have PSC approval each month before tacking fuel adjustment charges onto bills.

FPL spokesman Mel Klein said the policy calling for a \$50 deposit from new customers took effect June 1. The increase does not require approval by the PSC.

In addition, some residential customers who have a poor bill-paying record at FPL may be required to add \$30 cash to their \$20 deposit for a total of \$50, spokesmen say.

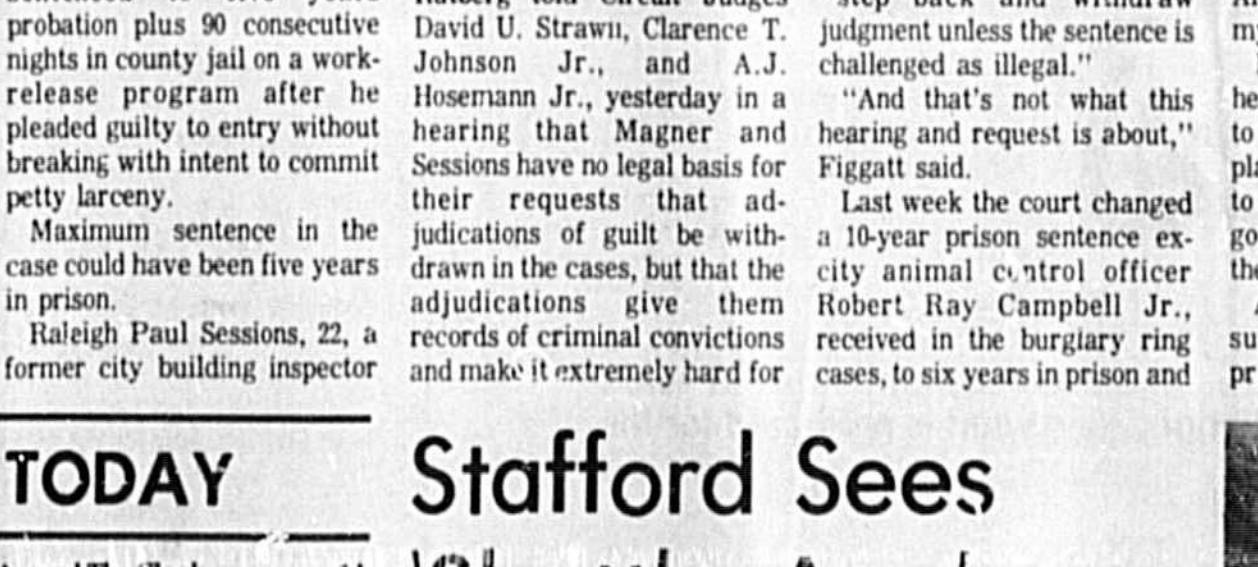
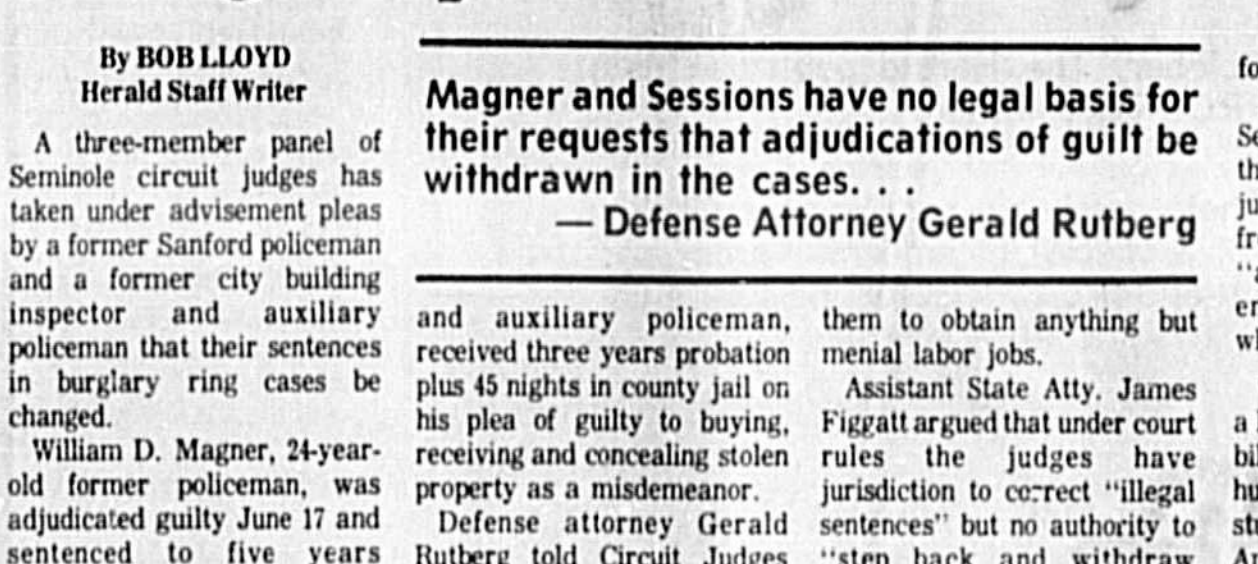
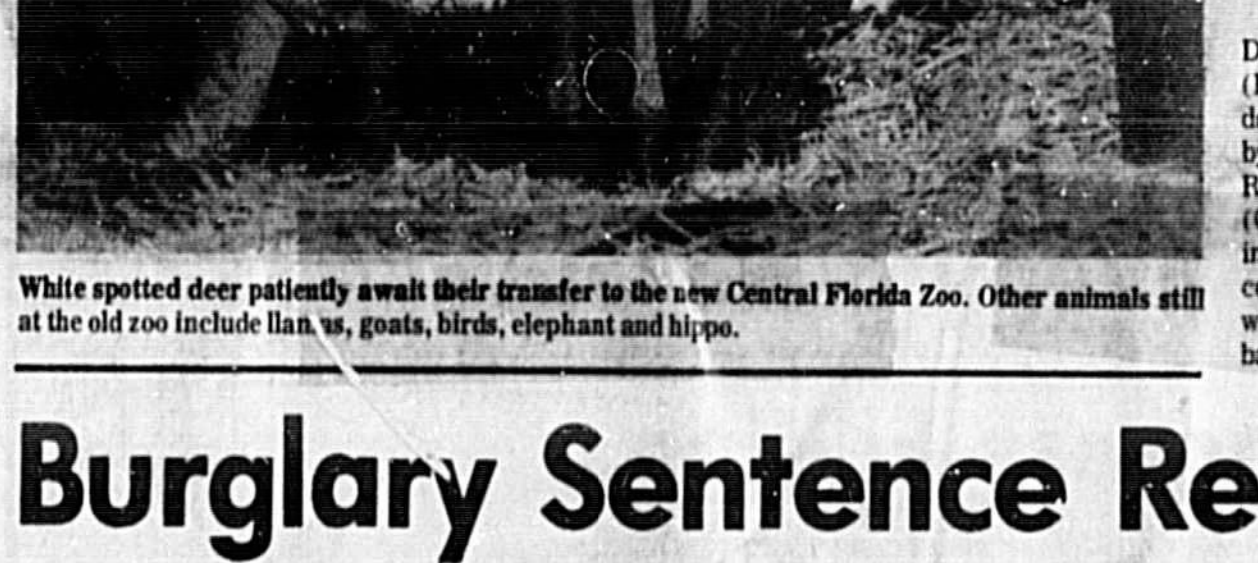
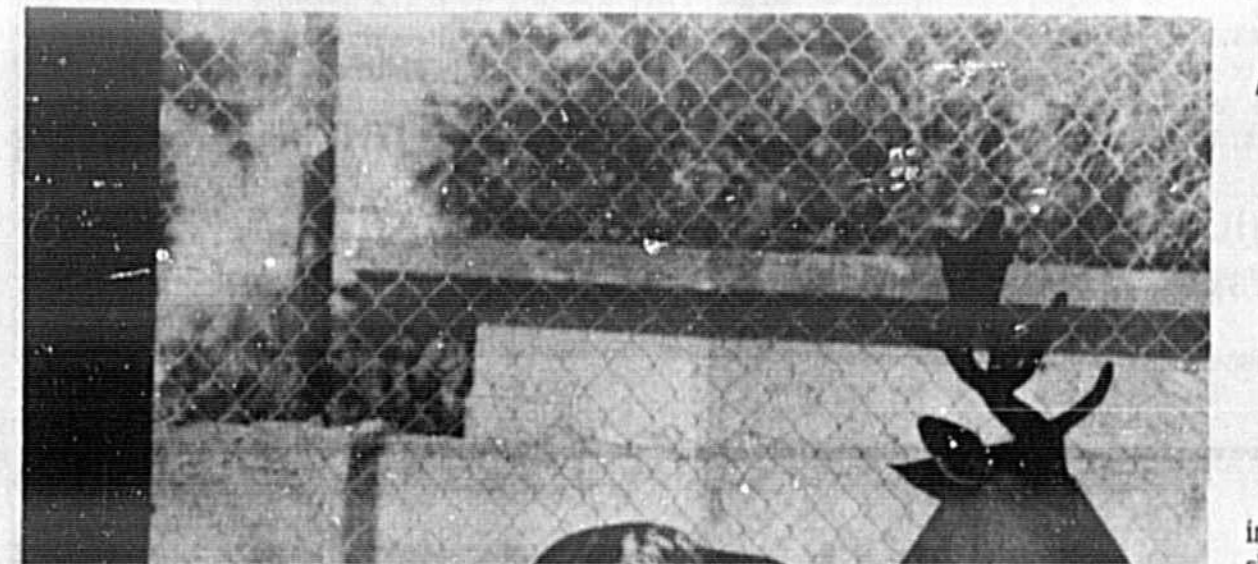
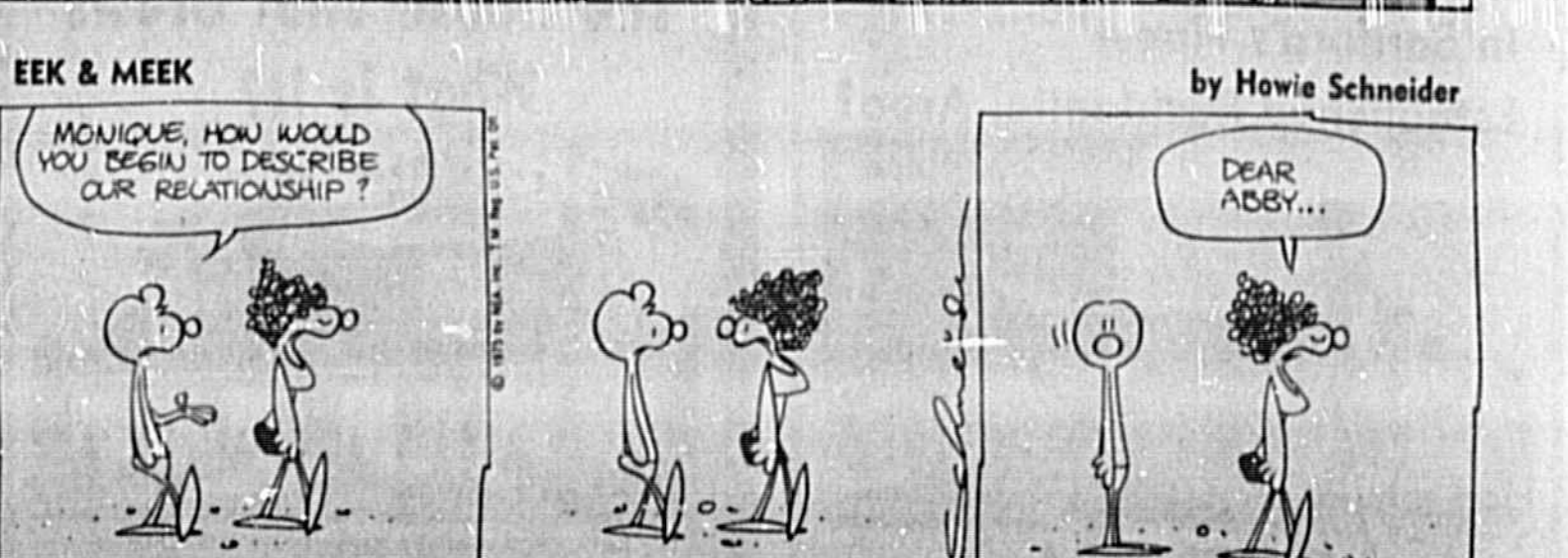
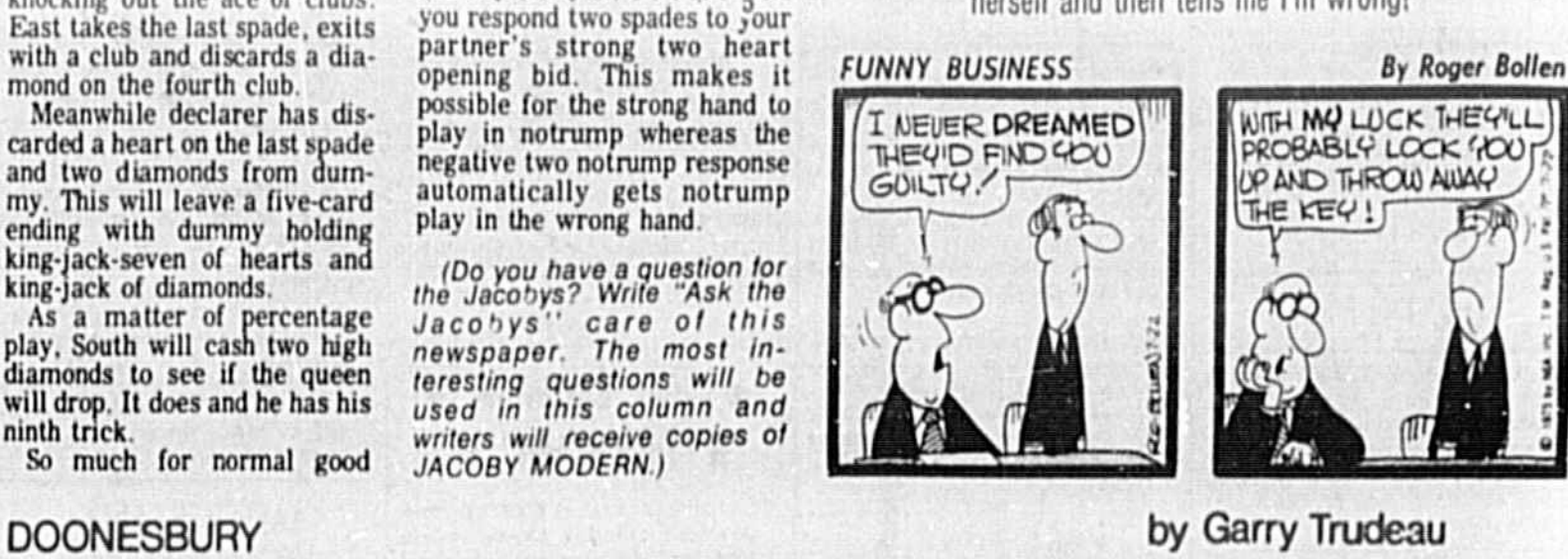
Company spokesmen say the deposit hike was necessary because uncollected bills jumped from \$1 million in 1972 to \$6 million this year.

The higher deposits will apply to new customers who are expected to use \$5 worth of power each month, which in Seminole County is about 70 to 90 per cent of the population, according to Burns.

Those using less would continue to pay \$20. Klein said existing customers with good pay records will not be asked for additional cash deposits.

He said businesses, industrial and commercial customers will continue to pay a deposit roughly equivalent to their bill for two months' worth of electricity.

Florida Power, Jay says, serves about 38,000 customers in South Seminole, while the remainder of the county's population is served by FPL lines.



## Mini-Trains To Run Later Zoo Paving Due In August

By late August the main road into the Central Florida Zoo should be paved.

And sometime between Thanksgiving and Christmas visitors will be able to ride a miniature railway train through the zoo to view the newly-completed children's petting zoo, elephant and hippo enclosure and animal nursery.

That news was reported yesterday by Al Rozon, who has become executive director of the Central Florida Zoo during director Jack Hanna's three-month leave of absence.

Rozon said the Florida Department of Transportation (DOT) requires work on the deceleration lane to be started by Aug. 1. The Central Florida Roadbuilders' Association (CFRA) plans to start hauling in limestone for the main road, completing survey and grade work and stabilizing the sub-base before the end of July.

The CFRA is donating labor, materials and use of equipment for the job.

"I hope the road will be completed by mid or late August," said Rozon. "Of course, when people are donating the work, we've got to take it when the other guy can give it."

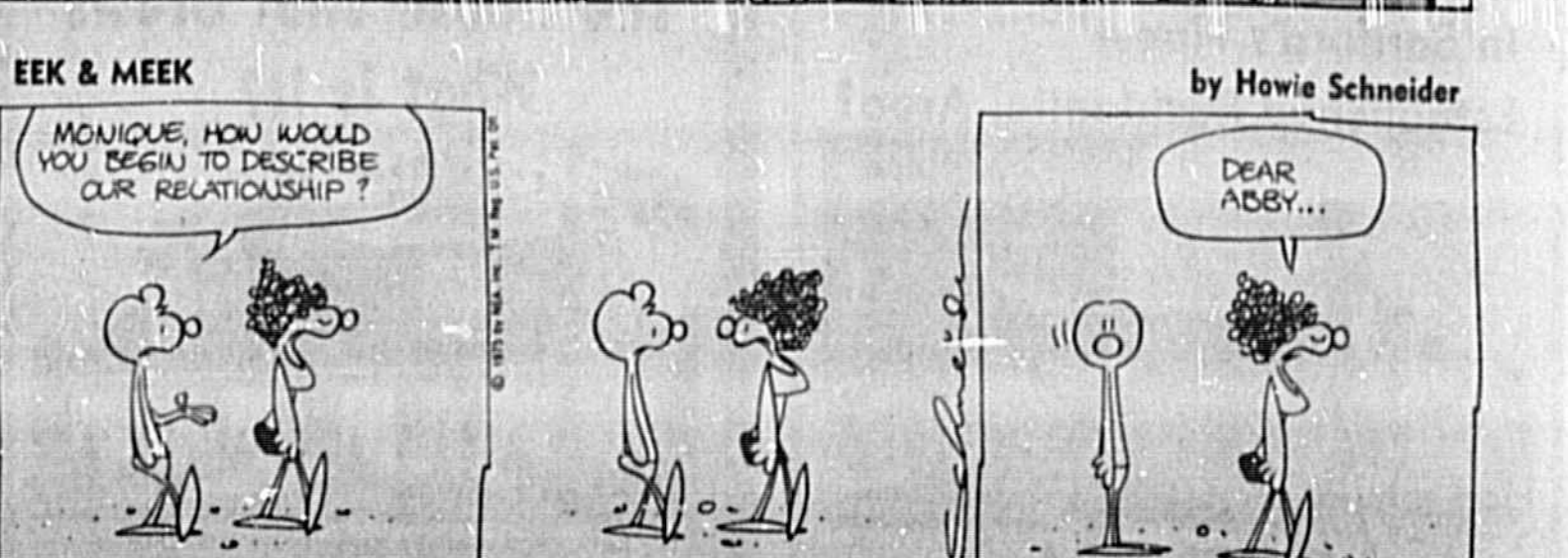
The Roadbuilders will not be paving either side roads or parking areas. According to Rozon, the paving offer from CFRA came as a result of efforts made to help the zoo by Lamar Thomas, an Orange County commissioner and member of CFRA, Chairman of the Roadbuilders' zoo paving committee is Dick Amick.

With most of the animals contentedly settled into their new habitat, construction is proceeding on the last of the enclosures so that animals remaining in the old downtown zoo may be moved to the new zoo as soon as possible.

The children's petting zoo will be completed first and some exhibits should be on display by this weekend. A sea turtle, which can be saddled and ridden by youngsters, will be added to the other animals—goats, llama, rabbits and others—in the petting zoo. The entire petting zoo should be completed within another month, said Rozon.

Designer of the railroad, Don Hanner of Sanford, will be given an exclusive operating permit on a profit-sharing basis with the zoo, but eventually the zoo hopes to own the entire railroad operation.

## Sanford Street Paving Project On Schedule

Sanford's 21-mile street paving program is on schedule and City Engineer Mack LaZebny is more than halfway through the project.

LaZebny said today that work in the Goldsboro community has reached the stabilization process and would be ready for line locking within several days.

"This covers the area north of 20th Street, south of Third Street and west of 17-92," LaZebny said. "The contractor is making excellent progress."

LaZebny said that drainage pipe work for the Goldsboro area was completed and that work in the Georgetown community was "90 per cent finished."

A city-wide drainage pipe program is beginning, he reported, while workers are preparing to start two more sections of the

five-part program within the next three weeks.

The paving project—which will include the southeast section of the city and the Lake Monroe portion of Sanford—has not started as yet, LaZebny reported, but would within the next 30 days.

The project is being carried out by Halifax Paving Company of Daytona Beach on a 450-day completion schedule. Work began on June 12 in Goldsboro and Georgetown.

LaZebny said that a number of improvements have been recorded in the paving areas with residents painting houses and planting small flower gardens.

"It's really amazing to see these people get involved with the paving work as they are," he said. "It makes it worth the wait."

The paving project is being paid for with federal funds and was the outgrowth of a civil rights suit filed in U.S. District Court in Orlando last year by Georgetown residents.

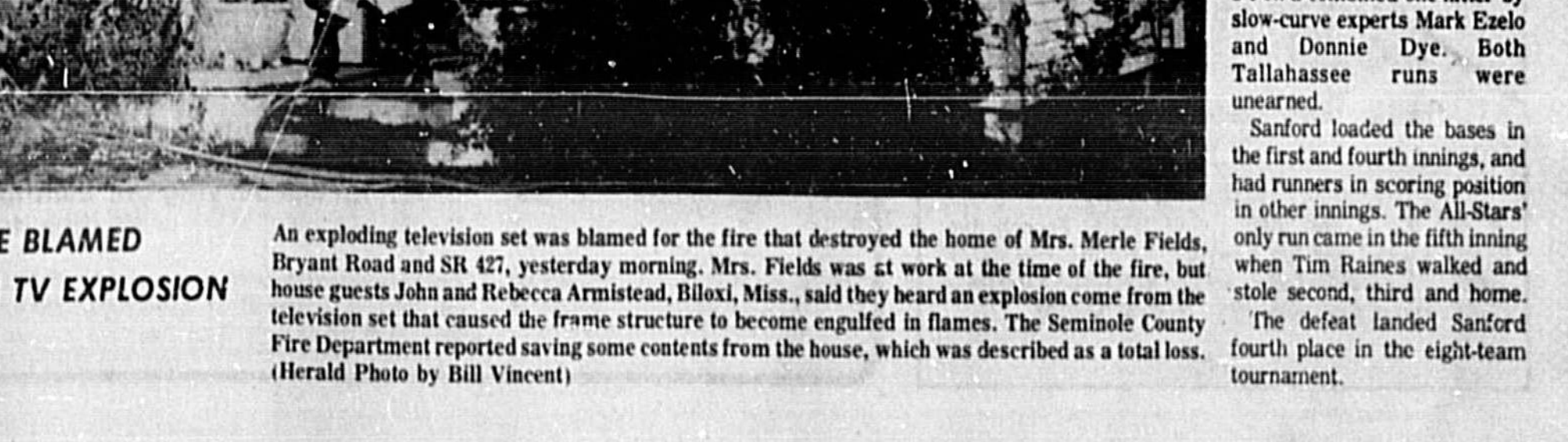
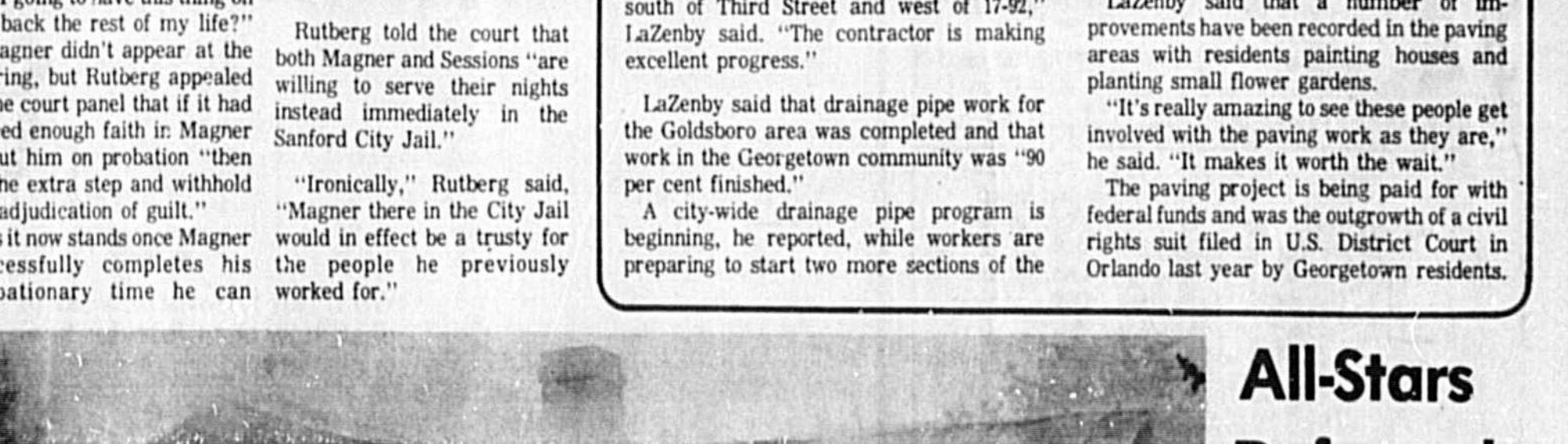
