Nicaragans leave south Florida

MIAMI - Nicaraguan refugees are leaving south Florida for better Jobs, lower rents and more receptive communities in places like Toledo. Ohio, and Charlotte, N.C., according to people who have helped resettle the immigrants.

Miami church agencies are helping some of those refugees to relocate as a last recourse. Officials say little other aid is available to help the 50,000 or more Nicaraguans who have landed in south Florida since 1988.

The lack of work permits and a softening job market in south Florida have frustrated the hopes of some of those refugees.

"We get people coming to us all the time saying they're getting evicted. And they're not just sobbing on our doorstep, they're coming with the final notices." Mike Pszyk, director of Church World Services in Miami, told The Miami Herald.

Protesters: Close detention centers

MIAMI - South Florida Haitlans protesting federal immigration policy and the conditions at a U.S. detention center in Dade County have inspired similar protests in other cities, a California activist says.

"Because you tore down the fence at Krome, people across the country have had their eyes opened to the abuses at these places," Travis Morales, a spokesman for La Resistencia of Los Angeles, said Sunday.

Because you attacked. Cubans. El Salvadorans and other immigrants across the nation will be better off." he said.

In April, an angry crowd broke down the front gate of the Krome Avenue detention center.

About 250 angry Haitians gathered outside the center gates Sunday to demand that federal officials close the facility, where Haitlan refugees who reach south Florida shores are held.

On Sunday, the crowd twice shook the gates of the center. while riot-equipped police watched. There were no arrests.

Sandwich bacteria discovered in Florida

Somewhere on the Stewart Sandwiches Inc. production line, a bacteria keeps reappearing, tainting sandwiches packed among the e destined for hundreds of East Coast outlets, the Food and Dr. g Administration says.

The bacteria, Listeria monocytogenes, is a persistent organism that, when introduced into an already weakened immune system, can cause meningitis or serious blood infections. In 25 percent of the cases, the illness caused by the L. mono, as the bug is called, is fatal.

The Virginian-Pilot and The Ledger-Star reported Sunday that the FDA has not blamed any cases of illnesses on Stewart products, but the bug has appeared in food shipped to Louisiana and Florida — and repeatedly in the company plant.

The federal government on May 31 asked the U.S. District Court here to temporarily close Stewart's 22-year-old operation, an action the newspaper said may lead to the troubled corporation's permanent closing.

Informant on murder commits suicide

OCALA - A man who told authorities where they could find a woman's body killed himself before police could find out more, officials say.

Investigators say the man was staying at an Ocala motel when he called Marion County deputies over the weekend. The man reportedly told authorities that he had killed a woman about a month before. He then described where the body could be found in a shallow grave in the Ocala National Forest.

Deputies arrived at the motel about six minutes later to talk with the man, only to find him dead from an apparently

self-inflicted gunshot wound, authorities said-The woman's body was found where the man said it would be, in a shallow grave near the Half Moon campsite.

Russell Coats, 19. A seventh suspect, who is white, was charged Friday for his role in the brawl that led to Coats' death.

Group: Anti-liquor ordinance ineffective

JACKSONVILLE - Community leaders upset about city enforcement of a new anti-liquor ordinance say the law is not doing much to stop the sale of alcohol to minors.

The Jacksonville City Council approved an ordinance last year imposing a \$500 fine for anyone who sells alcohol to a minor.

since last fall, 104 people have been arrested under the law, but the fine has been imposed only 16 times. Records show that in more than half the cases, there was no sentence imposed at all.

Gulf Breeze UFO model found in attic

PENSACOLA - A model fly-ing saucer made of foam plates reportedly has been found in the former residence of a man whose UFO photographs two years ago focused worldwide attention on sightings in northwest Florida.

Ed Walters, 43, who wrote a book about his supposed encounters with aliens and their their paralyzer rays, insisted he knows nothing about the model "unidentified flying object" or how it got in the attic of his former residence.

"There's no logic in me leaving the object up there," Walters told the Pensacola News Journal. "If I were trying to pull a hoax — and I'm not — then it would have been stupid to leave it there."

The newspaper printed several pictures Sunday taken by staff photographers who used the model to show what appear to be UFOs flying above treetops and a house. Walters conceded the photos are similar to the ones he took in 1987.

Walters' pictures were published in his book, "The Gulf Breeze Sightings: The Most Astounding Multiple Sightings of UFOs in U.S. History.

The model is 9 inches across and 5 inches top to bottom. It is made of four foam plates and construction paper, as well as a plastic tube and some electrical

The model was found by the current resident.

Little money spent to save threatened wildlife species

The manatee, the noonday snall and a clam called a fine-rayed pigtoe appear to have come out on the short end of federal and state government spending aimed at saving threatened and endangered wildlife species.

In 1989, the federal government spent \$39 million to aid 347 endangered species and the states \$4 million, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Of that, only \$100 was spent to aid the survival of the noonday snall and the pigtoe clam. In contrast, the recovery effort for the bald eagle attracted a high of \$3.1 million.

Over half the total amount of money was spent on 12 species, one of which was a plant - the Tumamoe globe-berry. Seventy-two species account for more than 90 percent of all expenditures made by the states, the wildlife service and the U.S. Interior Department.

Over the past three years the endangered wildlife that has attracted the most attention in congressional appropriation bills have been the

grizzly bear, peregrine falcon, gray wolf, whooping crane, southern sea otter, West Indian manatee and the black-footed ferret. In addition to the bald eagle.

Of those species, however, the wildlife service said the West Indian manatce "had a rough go of it in 1989." A record 174 of these endangered aquatic mammals died during the year, largely as a result of collisions with boats and barges in Florida waters.

Bob Turner, the service's manatee coordinator, said that 1990 portends to be even worse for the manatee. A record 74 manatee deaths were reported during January, largely as a result of extremely cold weather the previous month.

Three species earn endangered status

TAMPA - The Gulf sturgeon, the salt marsh vole and the gentian pinkroot are being nominated for inclusion on Florida's list of endangered plant and animal species.

Meanwhile, the dusky sea sparrow is being removed. Three years after the last of that species died in a cage at Walt Disney World, experts have given up hope of finding

The sparrow's fate suggests some harsh truths about the prospects for species that do make the updated list. expected to be issued by the federal government next spring, says Michael Bentzien, a biologist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Jacksonville.

"Eighty to 90 percent of the things on the list don't get much, or any, attention from us." Bentzien told the Tampa

Popular animals like the Florida manatee and panther or the bald eagle tend to benefit most from the endangered species program. while dozens of other plant. insect and animal species on the list barely get a second glance, he sald.

The sturgeon — a monster fish up to 10 feet long and weighing up to 500 pounds is one species that is expected

Study: Tampa's racism 'no worse than other cities'

TAMPA - A study of life in Tampa that some are calling the most detailed snapshot ever taken of the city offers insights into the attitudes of the city's white, black and Hispanic residents.

University of South Florida professors David and Miriam Stamps and Susan Greenbaum spent two years compiling their portrait of the city. Fifteen hundred households were interviewed on issues ranging from neighborhood safety and the public school system to discrimination.

The study, just now being completed, has been summarized in a 150-page draft made public last week. Among the findings:

-While at least 60 percent of each ethnic group thought it likely they would be hit by crime within the next year, fewer than 15 percent actually had been victimized in the past 12 months.

-Whites are more likely to see race relations as a problem than blacks or Hispanics, but all groups believe relations are better than a year ago.

-While three-quarters of Hispanics and blacks would prefer to live in integrated

In addition to Tampa, the other winning cities were Coeur d'Alene, Idaho: Stoux City, Iowa: South St. Paul, Minn.: Harrisburg, Pa. and Abilene, Texas.

neighborhoods, less than half of the white population shared that desire.

"I think Tampa is at least no worse than other cities.' David Stamps told The Tampa Tribune. "We have problems that need addressing. But, in some respects, Tampa's in a better situation than some places."

The study draft is being examined by local officials, and those who have seen it predict it will help local governments plan public services, tell police how residents feel about local law enforcement and help community leaders understand how the races interact. Racial problems have often rocked Tampa

over the past five years. So researchers were

surprised when the survey revealed that less than 10 percent of respondents thought race relations were among the three most important problems facing Tampa. More whites 13 percent rated the issue a top concern than blacks (9 percent) or

Hispanies (4 percent). Those responses were in marked contrast to a smaller, 1988 survey of community

leaders that showed race relations to be their biggest concern. Stamps discounted the disparity, saying it doesn't mean Tampa residents are unconcerned about racial issues. Rather, it's a

matter of priorities. Drugs, crime and poverty topped the list of problems by a wide margin. "A person living in College Hill every day

faces crack cocaine and crime in their neighborhood," he said, "Although racial problems are something they face, they're not the most important problem."





Tiananmen's toll

Twelve months ago thousands of heavily armed Chinese troops shielded by tanks and armored personnel carriers began their deadly sweep through Tiananmen Square. Within 24 hours, they had slaughtered hundreds of pro-democracy protesters and arrested thousands more. The scene was tragically reminiscent of 1917, when Czar Nicholas II's troops mowed down hundreds of defenseless Russian factory workers before the Winter Palace.

Tiananmen Square is ghostly quiet today as grim-faced security forces in plain clothes patrol the 100-acre plaza, preventing people from gathering in silent tribute to those who were slain. Beijing has banned all but officially sanctioned ceremonies in the square. The regime also has warned residents not to wear white flowers, black arm bands or other tokens of mourning.

Still, the Chinese people come to the square, looking to pay their respects to the brave men and women who captured would attention for seven weeks as they stood up for freedom. What began in early May as 2.000 students staging a hunger strike soon swelled into a massive pro-democracy demonstration by an estimated 1 million people in Beiling alone. Millions more took to the streets throughout the country, peacefully calling for the government to grant basic civil liberties to the people.

The populist tide that rolled through China last spring was not unlike that which washed away totalitarian regimes in Eastern Europe later in the year. Terrified of that tide, Beijing resorted to brute force to rout the demonstrators and imposed political repression to prevent their regrouping.

No one, save for the government itself, knows the extent of the Tlananmen Square toll. It's believed that several hundred Chinese were killed by government troops on June 3 and 4, while more than a 1,000 were subsequently executed throughout the country. According to a State Department report, an estimated 10,000 political prisoners were being detained in Beijing as recently as two months ago. Although the government released 211 detainees as a "goodwill gesture," Amnesty International says that tens of thousands of dissidents are still behind bars.

Most recently, dissident Peng Rong was arrested after calling for an end to economic sanctions against China. The Beijing University student's crime was to speak at a campus demonstration that had not been approved by the government. So paranoid are China's retrograde leaders, they cannot distinguish between political discourse and sedition.

It is no small irony that repression remains the rule throughout China at a time when most communist nations are experimenting with democratic reforms. The government's security apparatus is so pervasive as to deterorganized opposition. And the climate of fear has had a chilling effect on economic reform as well. Centralized planning has been reimposed on virtually every sector of the economy and a strict austerity program to combat inflation has caused Chinese living standards to plummet.

A Beijing engineer in her early 30s likened the 1.1 billion Chinese to slaves waiting for a Lincoln to free them. The seeds of their emancipation were sown 12 months ago in Tiananmen Square. With sustained cultivation from the Free World, those seeds will take root and grow.

The Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp. is a little-noticed quasi-governmental body that guarantees private companies' pension plans much as the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. insures bank deposits. When a company goes bankrupt, goes out of business or terminates its pension plan. PBGC takes over the assets of the private pension plan and becomes responsible for meeting the obligations of the plan to covered workers and retirees.

In theory, PBGC's operations should be self-liquidating. Covered pension plans pay PBGC annual insurance premiums that meet the corporation's operating expenses and provide a base fund for future outlays. When a pension plan is terminated, PBGC uses the terminated plan's assets to pay future obligations to those covered by the plan. If there are unfunded liabilities. PBGC goes after other assets from the failed company in an attempt to pay them.

PBGC has always realized that smaller failed companies might not have sufficient assets to meet their obligations, but in general smaller companies do not have major pension obligathat did have major liabilities would be backed by significant



Abortion battle a war of words

BOSTON - When some future archaeologists come to explore the battlefield on which abortion was waged during the late 20th century, they'll have to dig down through layers of words and decades of phrases. Semantics, they will discover, are the weapons with which this civil war is being fought.

On this belong nered turk every capture of new territory is marked by the phrases that eatch on. Every victory site is littered with the shells of propaganda that became part of our everyday language.

In this linguistic dig. they will find banner phrases like pro-choice and pro-life - words as loaded with meaning as any cannon. They will unearth debates between those who said "unborn child" and those who said "fetus." They will rediscover arguments between those who said "mother" and those who said "pragnant woman."

And at the layer marked 1990, they may even see the shards of the most current phrase in the battle for the abortion middleground. One expression has infiltrated the media and the legislation this year: "abortion for birth

I heard these words dozens of times before they hit my own language alarm button. They came across my consciousness like a nail on a blackboard, abrasive but brief. Hold your ears and it will pass.

But the phrase finally stuck in South Dakota when a local television anchor asked me what I thought about the "fact" that 90 percent of all abortions were done for birth control. Tape rolling. I asked my colleague: Did he believe that a woman literally chose abortion, that her preferred method of family planning was to place her feet in stirrups while a doctor put a vacuum aspirator into her body? My response never made the news.

Abortion for birth control. The phrase was born in right-to-life publications as a deliberate attempt to capture the ambivalent majority. It appeared full-grown on legislation in Utah. Minnesota, Alabama, Idaho, It acquired respectability on television in print, and in polling data.

What does it mean? This week, Louislana will hold hearings on two such bills that simply define every abortion - except those for rape, meest, the life of the pregnant woman and, in one bill, fetal deformity - as an "abortion for birth control." Abortion "for birth control is verbal dressing for an old prohibition. But the phrase is also a kind of Pasetta stone for the abortion debate, circa-

This expression plays to the widespread belief thin somewhere out there are women choosing abortion frivolously, sexually active womer, consciously choosing aspiration over a diaphragm, young and single women choosing termination because motherhood would be

"inconvenient."

"It's a new and improved packaging of an anti-abortion message," says Frances Kissling of Catholics for a Free Choice, "It's also a way of saying, 'We're not opposed to all abortions only to these irresponsible abortions."

In the 1960s, reminds Walter Dellinger of Duke University, people talked about "therapeutie" and "non-therapeutie" abortions. Inthe '70s and '80s, they talked about abortion for convenience." The linguistic thread has followed a desire to distinguish good reasons: from bad. And then to turn moral distinctions into laws.

The problem, however, is in executing morals. If indeed we are to ban abortions "for birth control," how would we separate out the responsible from the trresponsible women? Have them bring their diaphragm or pill case to a tribunal? If we succeed in that, does motherhood become a punishment? Responsible women may have abortions while irresponsible women have children?

Or, like the bills wending their way through Louisiana, do we define as frivolous the intimate, personal, private details of more than a million strangers' lives a year? Whichever way the archaelolgists cut through the lawguage of this costly war of attrition, they will come upon the same powerful question pushing through all the fancy semantics. Who is going to decide?

Hill called in the heavy-handed Naval Investigative Service for a sledgehammer approach to killing a fly. The final straw was the publication in Playboy magazine of the photos. Hill had managed to escalate a case of sophomoric hijinks into a national embarrassment for the academy.

Then the scandals grew more serious. One of Trost's assignments for Hill was to make the academy more oriented toward high-tech studies, but Hill has given the wrong signals. For instance, he removed a respected teacher. Ralph Santoro, as chairman of the electrical engineering department after Santoro refused to raise some grades.

This spring. Hill deliberately looked the other way when there was evidence that midshipmen copied engineering exams during a break in of faculty offices. Faculty members asked Hill for a two-day delay in final exams so they could prepare other tests. But Hill naively insisted that his midshipmen had sworn to an honor code and could be

The school year ended with another scandal when midshipman Gwen Dreyer resigned, saying that upperclassmen had handcuffed her to a urinal and taken pictures. Another inidshipman, Victor Vaca, resigned after he said he was forced by classmates to eat and drink until he vomited. As if the badpress were not enough, the 990 graduating midshipmen this year were given diplomas which misspelled "Naval" as "Navel." Supreme Court strikes down flag law

WASHINGTON - The Suprme Court Monday struck down the anti-flag burning law enacted by Congress last year in a move that should reignite the call for a constitutional amendment to protect the American flag.

Brennan then quoted from his ruling a year ago that struck down a Texas anti-flag burning law.

"If there is a bed-rock principle underlining the First Amendment, it is that the government may not prohibit the expression of an idea simply because society finds the idea itself offensive or disagreeable."

Brennan was joined in his ruling by Justices Thurgood Marshall, Harry Blackmun Antonin Scalia and Anthony

Attorneys: Poindexter should be spared

WASHINGTON - Defense lawyers say John Poindexter. Ronald Reagan's former national security adviser convicted of lying to Congress in the Iran-Contra scandal, should be spared a prison sentence because he has suffered enough.

But special prosecutor Lawrence Walsh said imprisonment is warranted because of the "diet of lies" that Poindexter fed Congress about the scandal that overshadowed Reagan's second term in office.

Poindexter, 53, convicted April 7 on all five felony charges against him, was to be sentenced Monday by U.S. District Judge Harold Green. He faces up to 25 years in prison and fines of up to \$1.25 million.

Greene was given wide latitude in sentencing Poindexter because the crimes occurred before federal sentencing guidelines took effect. Had the crimes occurred later, a jail term would be mandatory because the convictions involved felonics.

Historic meeting set with de Maiziere

WASHINGTON - In a sign of just how much the postwar political order has changed. East German Prime Minister Lothar de Maiziere was invited Monday where no predecessor had been welcomed in 40 years of Cold War. De Matziere had an appointment at the White House.

President Bush ordered the red carpet rolled out as de Maiziere, at two months into office the first East German leader to visit the White House and perhaps the last, prepared to meet with American political and business leaders on the rapid movement toward a unified Germany and an undivided

"It's just one more step that demonstrated the magnificent changes that have taken place over the past year." Bush said Friday. "So he will be well received here in the White House,"

Mexican leader meets with Bush

WASHINGTON - Mexican President Carlos Salinas de Gortari received a tentative green light from President Bush for negotiation of a free-trade agreement he wants to help spur the growth of a restructured Mexican economy.

Over cocktails and a private dinner at the White House. Bush and Salinas laid the groundwork Sunday night for free-trade negotiations that in recent weeks have assumed high priority in Mexico and divided the U.S. government.

Stopping short of a formal announcement, White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said the two agreed their countries "would derive substantial and long-term benefits irom a comprehensive bliateral trade agreement.

Man spits watermelon seed 32 feet


ST. LOUIS - The Missouri Watermelon Association's 1990 seed-spitting championship effort was a 32-foot missile from the mouth of Frank Davis.

Communist victory seen in Bulgaria

SOFIA, Bulgaria - Observers from more than a dozen countries pronounced the Bulgarian elections fair Monday. despite opposition claims that widespread irregularities contributed to the communist party's apparent victory in the first free polls in 44 years.

"The results which will be published soon will reflect the will of the people," said Lord Tordoff, leader of a British delegation

that helped monitor the balloting. Official results from Sunday's elections had not yet been released, but two independent vote analyses showed the ruling Bulgarian Socialist Party won a decisive victory over its chief rival, the Union of Democratic Forces.

If the projections are borne out by the official results, Bulgaria could become the only Eastern European country to return the ruling communist party to power since democracy fever swept the region last year.

British pilot nearly sucked from plane **United Press International**

LONDON - A British Airways pilot was nearly sucked out of a jet bound for Spain when a cockpit window shattered, causing the aircraft to lose pressure and forcing an emergency landing, officials said.

A British Airways spokesman said Capt. Tim Lancaster, 41, was injured Sunday while flying 81 passengers on Flight 5390 from Birmingham. 118 miles northwest of London, to Malaga, Spain.

The plane had climbed to about 24,000 feet when the window blew out of the flight deck at 8:40 a.m., about 20 minutes after

takeoff from Midlands International Airport. The quick pressure drop aboard the

BAC-111 aircraft Lancaster's upper body out of the broken window, but crew members grabbed the captain and struggled to pull him back to, the spokesman said.

Damage can be minimized if serious storm blows in

The 1990 hurricane season is now under way and reports indicate that the 90's could bring some serious storms to the Central Florida area. Take stock now of your landscape and garden so that you can reduce the damage if a hurricane does pass through our area.

Trees and larger shrubs that were planted during the past year should be staked to prevent them from being blown down. Large trees may need three strong stakes three feet in length degree angle with the slope of pulled out by winds.

otherwise protected before it is placed around the trunk. This will prevent girdling of the bark by the wire as the tree sways in the wind. Also, mark your guy wires with something plainly visible, especially at night, so they won't be a safety hazard.

Inspect all trees for broken. damaged or dead limbs and remove them now, Forceful winds can dislodge these from the trees and fallen limbs cancause considerable damage to cars, roofs and windows if they happen to hit. Palm fronds, too. can do damage, so trim up the palms as well.

The guy wire should be run When storms do threaten, through an old garden hose or move everything into the garage porch or screened-in room. (Screens offer little protection from gale-force winds.)

Before a major storm, if possible, mow your lawn to a 3-inchheight. The heavy rain can cruse the grass to grow rapidly. and after the storm you may not be able to mow immediately.

I sincerely hope that a hurricane doesn't hit our area, but as the old saying goes, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure! Check your landscape today and take precautionary measures to possibly prevent extreme damage later.



Prognosis is good for thyroid-cancer

30-year-old hurband has recently been diagnosed with papillary thyroid cancer. Can you provide facts on cause.

procedures and prognosis?

DEAR READER: Papillary carcinoma is the most common thyroid malignancy, constituting about 65 percent of all thyrold cancers. The cause is unknown. but it is frequently associated with a history of radiation exposure (such as X-ray treatments that were popular years ago for acne therapy). The tumor often affects young people (under 40 years) and is more common in women. The cancer appears to be less malignant in younger patients than in the

elderly. Treatment consists of surgical removal of the malignancy, followed by thyroid suppression, meaning synthetic thyrold hormone is used to deactivate the thyrold gland, thereby suppressing any natural production of thyrold hormone. This combined therapy is almost always effective. With modern treatment, your husband has a favorable prognosis.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can you tell me what appea is, and what causes it? My 57-year-old son has been diagnosed with it. Is this inherited?

DEAR READER: Apnea, the absence of breathing, is a symptom, not a disease. In adults, aprica is usually associated with death or neardeath, such as drowning, choking on a foreign object or massive injury. If patients with apnea are to survive, they must be given assisted ventilation either with mouth-to-mouth resuscitation or with a breathing device. Apnea lasting more than thee minutes causes permanent and severe brain damage because brain cells are deprived of oxygen.

The single exception to the above comments is obstructive sleep apnea, a reversible condition that affects some children and adults. Infants with under-

DEAR DR. GOTI: My developed nervous systems sometimes stop breathing in their sleep because the normal respiratory stimulus, excess amounts of carbon dioxide in the blood, fails to trigger the breathing reflex. This abnormality is believed to be a common cause of the tragedy called "crib


