Any violation on the part of ANYONE having information of these deliberations shall be prosecuted by the law.







The greatest public works project since the pyramids is For the past 17 years, the nation has concentrated on building the Interstate Highway System, putting more than 33 billion federal dollars and 4.6 billion state dollars into it.

The system is now almost 81 per cent finished. Unlike the pyramids, however, the job won't be done when the last concrete is poured on the last mile of Interstate. In fact, the excellence of this system, which enables motorists to travel thousands of miles without a traffic light and with greater economy and safety than on ordinary roads, actually emphasizes the deficiencies of those other roads.

114 million drivers operate 115 million vehicles on them. Yet half these roads are unpaved or otherwise inadequate to and 50 milion vehicles will join the fray. Sounds like a plug by the "highway lobby" for the country to embark on Son of Interstate. Not at all.

"To accommodate all the vehicles beginning to glut our roads, we don't require endless miles of new pavement," says Donald Stabler, president of the Road Information Program (TRIP), a nonprofit organization that puts together figures

"We need better, smoother pavement with ewer hills and curves. We need more overpasses and underpasses, better signs and intersections, stronger bridges and wider lanes to keep traffic flowing smoothly on substantially the same road-

To back up his statement, Stabler notes that according to Highway Administration says 88,900 bridges in this country

TRIP agrees that more attention must be paid to develop cities quickly and efficiently, like good rail lines in densely populated areas. However, millions of workers travel only within the suburbs, driving from home to work and back without entering the city. By 1985, this will represent more than half the total urban work travel in metropolitan areas. But if the nation 23.7 million miles of roads were brought up to federal standards, says Stabler, they could handle almost any kind of foreseeable traffic squeeze with little ad-

The retiring Justice Douglas

When Douglas agreed to give a lecture recently at a branch of Miami University of Ohio, his contract reportedly specified that there be no cameras or tape recorders present. If he so much as spotted one of these devices, said his agent, he would walk off the platform. Not only that, there would be no news conferences before or after and no newspaper, radio or TV interviews - in fact,

no media coverage or publication of his speech of any kind, though Douglas would permit note-taking. The justice's topic, incidentally, was "Participatory De-

Some of this pressure may be coming from officers in Husein's own army as well as from other Arab leaders, the American specialists believe. In the Six Day War of 1967, Israei captured Jordan's fertile food-growing region west of the

Jordan River. Some U.S. sources think Hussein might order his forces to try and recapture the lost west bank lands if the Egyptians and Syrians deal the Istaelis a major setback.

Jordan, which has the longest Arab border with Israel, has not ommitted troops to the current war, although it claims its antiaircraft guns have shot down Israel jets flying toward

Jordan's army, once rated the best among the Arabs, lost most of its tanks in the 1967 war.





CHECKING THE REFRIGERATOR

Too often food flavor is lost or food spoils because a refrigerator, freezer or freezer compartment is not working properly or the temperature is set too high (too warm). Using a good thermometer, check your refrigerator periodically. The temperature should be constantly below 40 degrees to hold foods properly and too avoid the risk of harmful bacterial growth. The freezer cabinet should be maintained at 0 degrees or below. If it cannot hold this temperature then do not store frozen foods in it for more than three to five days.





Using a good thermometer, check your refrigerator periodically. The temperature should be constantly below 40 degrees to hold foods properly and too avoid the risk of harmful bacterial growth. The freezer cabinet should be maintained at 0 degrees or below. 



# Federal Funds Halt Advised By Buchanan

WASHINGTON- In his recent testimony before the Senate watergate Committee, Patrick J. Buchanan, speech writer and special consultant to President Nixon, acknowledged advising the President to block federal funds from going to tax-exempt foundations that were supporting groups whose activities did not support the

Buchanan, discussing a March, 1970, memo to Mr. Nixon, told the committee that the Ford Foundation, for example, uses tax-exempt dollars to support the Brookings Institution, which, he said, is a "government in exile for the Democratic Party."

He suggested to Mr. Nixon that in those instances where the gederal government has discretion in the awarding of federal funds to foundations, such money should go to conservative groups. Buchanan said it would be "a policy of favoritism in

all future federal geants to those institutions friendly to us. . . and we should direct future funds away from the hostile foundations, like Brookings." And after the 1972 presidential campaign, Buchanan

said, he further proposed that, under White House

guidance, a conservative foundation be created, "that we ought to establish our own institutions." Later, under cross-examination by Sen. Herman Talmadge, D-Ga., Buchanan conceded two points:

1. If a foundation-liberal or conservative-is educational, he has no objection to its tax-exempt status; 2. Institutions that study public policy issues should not participate actively in politics, and the Brookings institution does not engage in politics.

What has rankled Buchanan since he went to work in the White House in 1969 is that so many of the foundations seem to be underwriting studies, projects, seminars, public television programs and other public policy forums that appear to promote liberal or progressive government action at odds with the Nixon administration's themes and

But before the Watergate Committee, Buchanan conceded that such activities fell within the scope of the tax laws governing foundations. He just wished there were more foundation activity supportive of the conservative cause, and he suggested to Mr. Nixon that the administration try to channel government funds to such
