#### Delta Rocket blasts off

CAPE CANAVERAL -- The Air Force launched a Delta rocket into space today with the 22nd in a series of advanced military navigation satellites.  
The 12½-story rocket lifted off at 8:38 a.m. EDT, from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, rising on a roaring pillar of flame into a clear, blue sky.  
The launch had been moved up by a day to avoid possibly severe weather from hurricane Emily.  
It was the 44th successful launch in a row for rocket maker McDonnell Douglas Space Systems Co. of Huntington Beach, Calif. — a world record, according to the company. The string of Delta successes began in September 1986.  
McDonnell Douglas had 43 successful launches in a row of the Delta that ended with the failure of a launch set to carry aloft a GOES weather satellite May 3, 1988. Monday's launch was the 44th consecutive successful launch of a Delta since that time.  
"No other rocket in the world, including the Soviets, has had a successful string of 44 launches," said Tom Williams, spokesman for McDonnell Douglas.  
"When we are in the 21st century and look back at this relatively quiet time, we'll realize the Delta rocket was the Conestoga wagon of the 20th century," Williams said.  
The Air Force's \$65 million Navstar Global Positioning System satellite launched Monday joins 21 other advanced Navstars 12,500 miles above Earth. The first in the series was launched in 1989.

#### Evacuations begin as Emily nears

NAGS HEAD, N.C. — Up to 100,000 people on North Carolina's barrier islands were ordered to evacuate early today as Hurricane Emily twisted on a path toward the southeastern United States.  
While beachgoers enjoyed relatively calm seas Sunday, forecasters warned waves would begin to build all along the East Coast. Gale force winds also could reach North Carolina shores by today.  
The state of emergency in Dare County — effective this morning — covers communities stretching along the Outer Banks, a loop of fragile islands off North Carolina's coast. A similar order was issued in Currituck County, just north of Dare.  
"Nobody's going to be arrested for not leaving, but they're probably going to be asked for their next of kin," said Dare County spokesman Ray Sturza. "Use common sense — and then go."

# Grant violation

## Facility off limits to World Cup, soccer

SANFORD — World Cup USA and United States Soccer Federation may not occupy the \$2.8 million training center built for them at Lake Sylvan Park because such non-public privileges violate a 1975 federal grant requirement, the state has told Seminole County.  
In a letter received by Seminole County officials Friday, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection directed the county not to allow USSF or World Cup teams to occupy the training facility until a solution is reached.

"It is unfortunate that this action must be taken at this time," wrote Don Gertelsen, chief of the DEP Bureau of Local Recreation Services. "If the county had coordinated with this department and NPS (National Park Service) prior to entering into the conditional exclusive use agreement with USSF and WC, this issue may have been resolved to meet the requirements of the LWCF program."  
Outraged county officials say they'll ask commissioners to appeal the decision. They say they anticipate the state order will affect their contract with the national soccer teams to use the facility.

"This just far exceeds any reasonable remedy," said County Manager Ron Rabun. "It's like you misspoke in church so off with your head."  
Rabun said this morning pressure was placed on the National Park Service and Department of Environmental Protection through political channels to reach a negative finding against the county.  
"We showed them we have clearly enhanced public access and facilities at the park," said Rabun. "We've built racquetball courts, more soccer fields, the training facility. They should've."

# Strangulation cause of death in 2 murders

## Police link homicides to Asian gangs in New York

SANFORD — An autopsy on a couple found dead in a Sanford apartment on Friday evening shows that the two were strangled.  
According to Sanford Police Commander Dennis Whitmire, the deaths are being investigated as homicides.  
The police are still not positive about the identities of the pair, a man and a woman, but believe they were Asian and that they had recently moved to Sanford from New York City.  
Whitmire said that fingerprints taken from the bodies during Sunday's autopsy will be sent to the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) to try to obtain positive identification.  
"We believe we will be able to get a positive identification on them through immigration," Whitmire said.  
He said investigators were not even sure if they were the tenants of the apartment, but believed that the evidence pointed in that direction.  
According to Whitmire, police were called to the Country Lake Apartments on Ridgewood Avenue

in Sanford late Friday afternoon after residents complained of a strong, foul odor in or around apartment 35.  
He said the management of the complex was planning to move a new tenant into the apartment above that one, but the strong odor, which they attributed to a dead rodent in the walls, kept them from doing that.  
He said that as time passed over the week the odor became stronger and more unpleasant. Had it been a rat, he said the odor would have subsided.  
Neighbors told the manager, Whitmire said, that they had not seen the residents of apartment 35 for about a week.  
Whitmire said they "think" the have identified the female victim, but won't reveal her name until they receive positive identification.  
He said they are not as close to identifying the male victim, but they will submit his fingerprints to INS as well in an attempt to quickly identify him as well.  
He said, also, that the two may have some connection to the Asian community in New York City.


"This type of crime is out of police jurisdiction," Whitmire commented. "We've been sending all of our information to the Secret Service agents in Orlando."

# Stadium lights to come down

## Inspection reveals lighting serious liability to city

SANFORD — The lights at Memorial Stadium have been permanently turned off. The poles will be taken down in the near future.  
A recent inspection of the lighting system revealed it as a serious liability to the city. Suggestions were made

by inspectors that they be taken down immediately.  
As the city does not have equipment with which to remove the poles, several lighting contractors were notified and price quotes obtained. One, Palmer Electric, in submitting a cost estimate, described it as a "ballpark" price.  
Palmer was approved for the work at last week's City

# FPL offers aid to save on energy

## 70 percent of homes have duct work leaks

SANFORD — Through a new Florida Power and Light program, homeowners now have help in finding leaks in heating and air conditioning systems that can lead to real savings in energy costs.  
According to Ingrid Melody of the Florida Solar Energy Center, more than 70 percent of Florida's homes have leaks in their heat and air conditioning ductwork. Melody said the finding was the result of a survey of 300 homes throughout the temperature ranges in Florida.  
FPL estimates homeowners may overspend heating and cooling expenses by up to 25 percent due to leaks. That's from six to 12 percent of the average electric bill. But in

### Sewage spills into Thompson River

**PALM BEACH GARDENS** — A sewage line leak that put an estimated one million gallons of raw sewage into the Thompson River over the weekend has been patched, but authorities are still warning people to stay away from the waterway.

The spill was discovered early Sunday by fishermen who saw sewage floating on the river near Interstate 95, said Andrea Pauley, customer relations manager for Seacoast Utility Authority.

Nearby residents may notice some odor, Pauley said. The 14-inch-wide pipe that gave way had been repaired by the evening and authorities were chlorinating the affected area.

Pauley said no one should fish, draw irrigation water from or swim in the Thompson; the Earman River east of the Thompson, also known as the C-17 Canal; or the North Palm Beach Waterway until testing is complete in a couple of days and results are announced.

Dead fish have been spotted in the area of the spill, Pauley said. They may have been killed by the sewage, the chlorine that travels through the system with the waste, or chlorine authorities used to try and disinfect the river, she said.

The problem occurred when part of a 10-foot length of the aged pipe near a plant broke away.

### Key witness testifies he would lie

**WEST PALM BEACH** — The key witness against two white men accused in the New Year's Day burning of a black tourist has told jurors he would lie to protect his own interests.

"Yes I would," said 18-year-old Jeffery Pellett of Plant City, who was originally charged in the attack but has struck a plea deal to testify against his friends.

In nearly a full day of cross-examination Saturday, defense attorneys pointed out the four different versions of events Pellett has given investigators in the past and the inconsistencies in his current plea-bargained testimony.

Lakeland day laborers Mark Kohut and Charles Rourk sat motionless at the defense table as the pale, longhaired teen-ager described the planned robbery of Christopher Wilson of New York City which left him with burns over nearly 40 percent of his body.

As Wilson stopped for a newspaper near a suburban Tampa shopping plaza, Kohut and Rourk jumped in Wilson's still-running car and forced him to drive, said Pellett, who added he followed behind in Rourk's Chevy Blazer.

### Supreme Court to hear abortion protest

**TALLAHASSEE** — Anti-abortion protesters will ask the Florida Supreme Court this week to lift a judge's order creating a buffer zone around a Brevard County clinic.

The court has scheduled a hearing Tuesday morning on the order by Circuit Judge Robert McGregor that keeps demonstrators away from the Aware Woman Center for Choice in Melbourne.

Demonstrators are also prohibited from singing, chanting or yelling within earshot of clinic patients and must stay 300 feet away from patients or employees.

The hearing comes amid heightened national concern about safety during anti-abortion protests following the March 10 slaying of Dr. David Gunn outside a Pensacola clinic and the shooting of Dr. George Tiller last week in Wichita, Kan.

In July, 114 people were found guilty of violating the buffer zone during protests by Operation Rescue, Rescue America and other groups. They say the order is unconstitutional and limits freedom of speech.

National pro-choice advocates will attend the hearing, including Reminist Majority President Eleanor Smeal. She intends to hold a news conference on what she calls "the eruption of violence against abortion providers nationwide."

### Compound houses circus animals

**WILLISTON** — Romeo and Juliette frolic in the mud — baby elephants tussling like kids who are finally allowed to play outdoors after being cooped up inside.

Nearby, handlers put several multi-ton adult animals through daily training routines. Other elephants roam freely in large, outdoor "corrals." Still others are tethered in breezy, hangar-like stalls that protect against the 98-degree Florida summer.

The scene is an "elephant farm" in North Florida, a 20-acre facility being used for breeding, training and — yes — retirement for performing elephants of the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus.

Currently in residence at the 7-year-old farm are 26 of the pachyderms, including Romeo and Juliette, born days apart at the turn of the new year.

They are the first elephants born and bred in captivity by the 125-year-old circus. Along with their mothers, these cute babies that now weigh about 450 pounds and stand 3 1/2 feet tall will soon become performers for The Greatest Show on Earth.

# Longwood suing Ace Hardware

**SANFORD** — The City of Longwood has filed suit against a hardware company to recover \$52,000 in delinquent uncollected taxes on bottled gas.

City attorney Becky Vose filed the suit against Ace Hardware, Inc. doing business as Ace Hardware of Longwood at 170 W. State Road 434, seeking to recover \$52,170 in taxes. The taxes represent the period between Nov. 3, 1981 and Nov. 9, 1992 when the business was selling bottled gas but the owners were unaware they were

supposed to be collecting a city utility tax on each purchase.

Ace Hardware owner, Robert Parsell appeared before the Longwood City Commission a few weeks ago to request that the city not collect the 11-years worth of delinquent taxes because it would create a serious economic hardship on his business. Neither city officials nor the hardware owner knew the tax was to be collected.

The 10 percent tax on bottled gas was imposed by Longwood City officials on Aug. 5, 1945. The problem with the tax arose with the popularity of gas barbecue grills in recent years. The hardware refills the propane bottles for the grills. City officials

did not alert businesses the tax was due because they were unaware of it themselves, Longwood City Administrator James McFellin explained to the commission.

Since being notified to collect the tax, the hardware store has collected an average monthly tax of \$395.23. The \$52,000 plus figure is based on tax that went uncollected for 132 months.

Although the commissioners were sympathetic to the business owner's plight and discussed forgiving some or all of the delinquency, Vose advised against the move unless a possible compromise is reached in the settlement of litigation.

## South Carolinas relieved over Emily

Like Floridians a day earlier, residents in lower South Carolina were feeling relief after learning that they apparently won't be getting the brunt of Hurricane Emily.

The only South Carolina counties under hurricane watch late Sunday were Georgetown and Horry. But up and down the state's coast, stores have been selling out of supplies such as flashlights and bottled water during the weekend.

Wendy Morris of Pawleys Island said she didn't know where Emily would hit, but after 1989's Hurricane Hugo, "you can't take anything for granted."

In Beaufort County, the emergency preparedness director felt by late Sunday afternoon that the danger was gone.

"It's over," Director William Winn said in a tired voice Sunday afternoon. "Now I can go home and go to bed."

He said the National Weather Service gave him approval at 5 p.m. to cancel the hurricane standby status. He said he would reactivate the standby if the hurricane takes an unexpected turn.

"I'm just glad it missed us," said Beaufort County Sheriff D.J. Lucas.

Residents around the lower South Carolina said Sunday they had been keeping close track of the weather.

"I'm on pins and needles," said Mike Humphrey of St. Helena, S.C.

Humphrey, who works on a shrimp boat, said he had been waiting by the phone to hear from his captain on whether the crew needed to move the boat to safety. He said he's ready to leave town at a moment's notice.

"We're all sitting in front of the TV set waiting to hear the news," he said. "I'm also saying a prayer for the people up north."

After first heading toward south Florida, Emily veered off. Hurricane Andrew tore through South Florida and Louisiana last year with sustained winds of 145 mph.

With landfall expected sometime Tuesday, meteorologists said Emily's movements presented any precise forecast of where it will hit.



### Way Back When

The Herald article entitled "SC Grad Thigpen Joins Phillies" in the Aug. 11 edition, brought back fond memories for Lake Mary resident Buddy Lake. The Associated Press story announced that former Seminole Community College moundman Bobby Thigpen had been traded by the Chicago White Sox to the Philadelphia club. Lake accomplished feats on a baseball diamond for Sanford that endeared him to old time fans from the 1920s until the 1950s. Thigpen was baseball's single-season "save" leader. It was 10 years ago that

## 3 ex-congressmen still spending campaign money

**TALLAHASSEE** — Eight months after leaving office, three Florida ex-congressmen are still spending thousands of dollars in leftover campaign cash.

Ex-Reps. Dante Fascell and William Lehman of Miami and Larry Smith of Hollywood, all Democrats, each reported more than \$200,000 left in campaign dollars at the end of June.

Federal campaign laws give former members of Congress wide latitude in how they can spend surplus campaign funds. They can pay expenses related to their former positions, donate money to charities or political committees and use for any "lawful purpose," which isn't clearly defined.

The Florida trio has taken advantage of the law. Records obtained by The Tampa Tribune for a story published Sunday show all three spent thousands on expenses stemming from congressional service, such as office and travel expenses, staff costs and gifts to former constituents.

They've also been giving political contributions and donating to charities during the first six months of this year.

Fascell gave \$100,000 to the University of Miami, which has agreed to accept his congressional papers. He spent \$30,124 on expenses and had \$236,678 left in his campaign account.

"What we're doing is following the law to the letter," Fascell said. "I view it just the way the law views it."

Lehman gave \$1,000 to his 9-year-old grandson. On his Federal Elections Commission report, Lehman said it was a contribution for the boy's congressional campaign in 2012. Lehman spent \$26,914 in office expenses and had \$212,189 remaining.

Lehman's daughter-in-law, Amy Lehman, said the \$1,000 was put in her son's bank account. "He's a nice little boy, and he has a nice grandfather," she said. "We're good people."

Smith, who pleaded guilty earlier this year to charges of tax evasion and filing false campaign reports, spent \$31,565 to pay lawyers in that case. He reported spending \$41,817 on expenses, made \$5,811 in donations and had \$212,397 left.

The charges involved a \$10,000 diversion of campaign funds to Smith's pocket.

## Robbery suspect shot in Tampa shootout

TAMPA — Police killed a man suspected of armed robbery in a shootout that injured one officer and two others while sparking a near riot at a Tampa public housing complex here, authorities said.

Shortly after the shooting, a motorist near the scene was dragged out of his car and attacked in apparent retaliation for the shooting, Tampa police spokesman Steve Cole said. The motorist wasn't seriously hurt.

Police said they opened fired on Edward James, 21, after he shot at them from a second-story apartment porch.

Two bystanders were struck by stray bullets fired, but suffered only minor injuries. All six officers who fired on James were placed on administrative leave while the investigation continues.

James died at Tampa General Hospital three hours after the shooting. Sgt. Mark Townsend, 36, was in fair condition after his left kneecap was shattered by a James' bullet.

One of the bystanders, Marilyn Henry, remained at St. Joseph's Hospital overnight for observation of a gunshot wound to the leg. Another man, who was shot once in the buttocks, was treated and released.

Some residents blasted police for opening fire on James first.

"They don't care about us," said Angela Harris, who was standing within a few feet of James after he collapsed with gunshot wounds to his head and back. "They were shooting into the crowd. We were all running like animals, like we were dogs."

As word of the shooting spread through the complex, tempers erupted in a

rock-and-bottle assault on officers and three cruisers about 30 minutes later. The cars were damaged, but none of the officers was injured.

After an angry mob pulled the motorist from the car, a thunderstorm quelled the disturbance.

The incident started late Sunday afternoon when two officers recognized James riding on a bicycle. They saw he had a gun and began chasing him because James was wanted in connection with an armed robbery last week, Cole said.

James ditched the bicycle and ran into his girlfriend's apartment. Police were going to follow the girlfriend into the apartment, but James hurled a fan through the upstairs bedroom window, pointed his gun out and then jumped on the porch roof, witnesses said.

## Tokars fights for bond, sons in court today

ATLANTA — Fredric Tokars, facing various charges in the slaying of his wife, is beginning court battles in two states — a bond hearing in Atlanta and a custody fight over his children in Florida.

Jerry Froelich, Tokars's defense attorney, said Sunday he will "fight like hell" to get the former tax attorney and part-time municipal judge released on bond today during a scheduled hearing before a U.S. magistrate in Atlanta.

"He's not a danger to the community and he's not a risk to flee," Froelich said.

U.S. Attorney Joe Whitley said the government would oppose any bond.

Froelich said Tokars would plead innocent to federal racketeering and conspiracy charges that include drug trafficking, money laundering and murder in the Nov. 29 slaying of his wife, Sara Tokars, in Cobb County.

Federal and Cobb prosecutors say Tokars, 40, had his wife

killed to protect a drug-running and money-laundering ring.

Tokars had not been transferred to Atlanta from the Palm Beach County Jail by Sunday evening.

In Florida, Tokars's attorneys were trying to overturn a judge's ruling last week that granted temporary custody of his sons, Michael, 4, and Ricky, 6, to the parents of Mrs. Tokars.

## Dr. Elders and the return of eugenics

Although the Senate vote on confirming Dr. Joycelyn Elders as the next surgeon general of the United States has been delayed, she will surely take office. But for the record, it's illuminating to contrast her with a predecessor, Dr. C. Everett Koop, as to how the American zeitgeist is moving toward an acceptance of eugenics.

People who want to stop the breeding of those whom they regard as the physically and intellectually unfit have been uncomfortable with the term "eugenics," because of its history elsewhere in this century. The American Eugenics Society, for instance, changed its name years ago to the Society for the Study of Social Biology.

Dr. Elders' view on preventing at least one kind of defective genetic material from further lowering American population standards was cited on Aug. 5 by Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz.

The senator quoted from testimony before the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee by Elders on May 23, 1990. The issue then was the Freedom of Choice Act. In stressing that "abortion has had an important, and positive, public health effect," she pointed out — by way of celebratory example — that "the number of Down syndrome infants in Washington state in

1978 was 64 percent lower than it would have been without legal abortion."

Dr. C. Everett Koop has a distinctly different attitude. Before he became surgeon general, Koop was the nation's leading pediatric surgeon. And at Children's Hospital in Philadelphia, he spent a considerable amount of time and energy on Down syndrome children. For years, it had been the practice in a number of hospitals throughout the country for some of those infants to be "allowed to die" — as the euphemism had it — very soon after birth. Some called it a late abortion. This was the wish of their parents, concurred in by their physicians.

Koop believes, as he told me once, that Down syndrome children "are part of the human race." Accordingly, he saved many of those children from extinction, arranging instead for them to be adopted. Unlike the doctors who had told parents that these infants would grow up to be "blobs," Koop knew better. There is a wide range of potential intelligence among these kids, and there is no way of knowing at birth just how far the child will develop.

When he was surgeon general, Koop worked with the Down Syndrome Congress year after year to — among other things — dispel the destructive notion that these children were not fit to be among us.

Koop says — quite correctly — that it is not easy to upstage him. He has the presence of a whaling captain who easily ended the career of Moby Dick. But once, as he tells the story, he was eclipsed on stage. It was by a 14-year-old Down syndrome youngster. "It happened in Cincinnati," Koop recalled, "and he was going to introduce me. He walked across the stage, stood before the microphone, and said, 'I have Down syndrome. That means I have 47 chromosomes. And you,' he turned to me, 'have only 45.'"

## Separation of church and state

Two interesting news items the other day illustrated the wisdom of contemporary American thought and practice on the subject of religious belief and state power. They also underscored the necessity in this extremely diverse society of continually strengthening the constitutional buffers between the two.

One item was datelined from California. The second story came from Israel. As distant as one was from the other geographically, they were bound at the hip theologically and politically. More about both in a moment.

To talk about church and state in the United States of 1993 requires an appreciation of the work of those who wrote the Constitution and its Bill of Rights just over 200 years ago. The men who added the first 10 amendments to the Constitution were intent on creating an appropriate space between church and state. Different as they were, whether from Puritan Massachusetts or Catholic Maryland or Quaker Pennsylvania, they all had the bad example of England squarely before them.

There, the Anglican Church was an establishment of the state and the two were inextricably bound. Anglicanism was for a time the only accepted religion and the king was chief enforcer as well as exemplar of the faith. Many of those who came to the New World did so to escape the stifling confines of that arrangement.

That is why the First Amendment to the Constitution opens with the famous phrase, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

It was intended to prevent the state from setting the terms of reference for religious practice. Over the next two centuries, and most particularly over the past 50 years, court decisions and legislative acts added a new and different dimension to the original doctrine. A "wall of separation" between church and state was built, piece by piece, to ensure that no particular religious form or faith is underwritten, endorsed or practiced by the government. Prayer in schools, specific religious representations at holidays and theology imposed through acts of the state were struck down or forbidden. At the extreme end of this newer notion of separation of church and state is the idea that religion and the secular state should never meet, which is bad history, bad politics and bad religion.

But the roots for such a belief are not hard to find. Catholics and Jews forced to endure Protestant prayers in the public schools nurtured them. So did atheists and non-Christians, required to pay through their taxes for crosses and Nativity scenes erected by local governments. And large groups of Christians as well as non-Christians eventually rebelled against laws such as Prohibition, which reflected an extremely narrow reading of the Bible. In my youth, many Southern communi-

ties had laws against dancing because of the teachings of the Baptist church. All prohibited the teaching of evolution because it seemed to contradict the biblical account of the Creation.

Now there is a religious counter-revolution in reaction to the "wall of separation" and the perception among millions of devoutly religious Americans that their faith is being actively persecuted by a Godless state. Even as the people of the United States become daily less homogenous religiously, ethnically, racially and in national origin, there is a concerted effort to reimpose the "old time religion's" most cherished beliefs on the larger society.

It has been an open effort conducted through democratic means. Religious fundamentalists have won control of Republican state and local committees in scores of places. They sit in Congress and in governor's mansions. And lately they have been concentrating on grassroots activism, with school boards their particular focus from New York City to San Diego, Calif.

They won total control of a school board in Vista, Calif., last November. In mid-August, the board adopted three directives which taken together challenge evolution as a valid scientific theory and require that Creationism be presented as an alternative. The actual wording of the three directives is almost unexceptional, particularly one that requires that no scientific theory be taught "dogmatically." Such an injunction should be, but too rarely is, the basis of all science.

But disingenuous as the board majority tries to be, the fundamentalists' goal there and elsewhere is clear. It is to reassert religious dogma in the classroom, incremental piece by incremental piece, and then in the halls of government. Where that would lead is illustrated by the story from Israel, where ultra-Orthodox Jews are cracking down on a company that uses dinosaurs as illustrations on the package of food products. They are "imbuing Orthodox children with heresy," one rabbi said. "The dinosaur is present in encyclopedias as an animal that is millions of years old, despite the fact that the world was created only 5,753 years ago."

## AID finds ways to squander money

WASHINGTON — Surgeon General-designate Dr. Joycelyn Elders, who has been vilified for her support of condom distribution to teen-agers, might feel more appreciated at the Agency for International Development.

The federal government spends about \$60 million a year on 18 varieties, two sizes and five colors of condoms, and six brands of birth control pills. AID is in the forefront of family planning.

The agency has published comic books for prostitutes in the Dominican Republic emphasizing the use of condoms, while in Mexico it produced a pop record promoting sexual abstinence among teen-agers. It has also lost 750,000 condoms at sea.

The history of AID is replete with examples of waste, fraud and abuse in areas ranging from contraception to computers, construction and communications equipment. Though AID is in the vanguard of the effort known as "nation building," its own internal audits suggests that the agency needs to import better management.

As we previously reported, AID auditors discovered that during the 1980s, the federal Contraceptive Procurement Project lost more than \$2 million worth of birth-control devices and drugs, and has had to destroy at least another \$2 million worth. In Mexico, 1.6 million condoms and 3.6 million cycles of pills valued at \$1 million were destroyed a few years ago because their shelf life expired.

Brian Atwood, the new reform-minded administrator of AID, recently told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee: "I think we have acquired a new name. We're now called the (beleaguered) Agency for International Development. In fact, we had a debate in our office the other day as to whether it was really positive that we're now called beleaguered as opposed to troubled. Maybe that's a sign of progress."

According to the agency's own internal investigations, signs of progress are hard to find. Consider the fact that AID has spent \$4 million in Kenya on contraception alone since 1989. With 66 million condoms and 300,000 Intrauterine Contraceptive Devices (IUCD), the agency figured to curb population growth in Kenya. AID neglected to ensure that the necessary surgical gloves, lotions and disinfectants were purchased by the Kenyans. As a result, at least 11,390 IUCDs went bad sitting in storage while another 125,771 will go unused in the next year because the other supplies were never acquired.

Meanwhile, more than \$150,000 worth of laboratory equipment languished in storage in Kenya for two years because the equipment was shipped before the laboratories were even constructed. When 51 computers and 34 printers that AID installed at Egerton University in Kenya broke down, university officials told AID investigators that they did not have the spare parts or anyone skilled enough to fix the computers.

"If the availability of spare parts locally was considered ... other types of (computer equipment) for which spare parts and maintenance would have been readily available locally would have been procured instead," according to the report reviewed by our associate Andrew Conte.

A phone system that AID spent \$787,157 to install at the university is also in disrepair. University officials told the AID investigators that "a number" of the phones had broken down and were not being used because the university did not have spare parts or anyone with enough skills to repair the system.

# March marks crossroad between young, elders

WASHINGTON — Two notices were served on the civil rights movement at the 30th anniversary march on Washington: the young may want to take over, but the old aren't ready to retire.

"We believe this march is not the benediction, but a rebirth," said Joseph Lowery, 70, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference for the past 17 years.

There was some talk that maybe, just maybe, the movement's elders would "pass the torch" of responsibility for social change at this additional celebration of 1963 and the dream of equality Martin Luther King Jr. embossed on the nation's psyche.

Yet on Saturday, fond remembrance prevailed, and the old guard made it clear that fond remembrance will endure.

"We're going to celebrate the march on Washington until there's nothing left to celebrate," declared Benjamin Hooks, 68, who retired from the NAACP and resurfaced at the helm of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights.

The young, however, made a few things very, very clear.

"We let everybody know we will challenge, seriously, their leadership," said Carl Upchurch, 35, head of the National Urban Peace and Justice Movement and the most vocal critic of Saturday's festivities. "They're on notice now."

Upchurch, along with three other leaders from his group of reformed street gang members, appeared at Saturday's march, even though they had said they weren't coming.

They stood with NAACP executive director Benjamin Chavis, 45, who pledged his group's support of their efforts to curb violence in the inner city.

"We have worked with these gang members for over a year," Chavis said. "They are my friends. I intend to work with them in every community in this nation."

"Ben Chavis is welcome in our circles. He is making a valiant effort to link the traditional civil rights efforts with our current struggle," Upchurch said. Other older black activists, he added, have not been so forthcoming.

But the young were. Upchurch's National Urban Peace and Justice Movement plans to link with the Student Coalition of Conscience, the teenagers and young adults who worked with Saturday's march.

The Rev. Barry Hargrove, 27, a leader of that coalition and a youth coordinator for Saturday's march, said, "We were on the same side" on a lot of issues and will meet further to discuss strategy.

They want to "weave young America with urban America," Upchurch said, and take this mixture into every major civil rights forum, to tackle the problems most affecting the young: unemployment, poverty, murder.

Those sentiments were echoed by Lant Guinier, whose nomination as chief civil rights officer

in the Justice Department was withdrawn by President Clinton after controversy arose over some of her writings.

"I think that there's a lot of energy in our youth and what we need to do is to tap into that energy and to help to create a climate in which people are not afraid to talk about the hard problems," said Guinier on Sunday. In an interview on CBS' "Face the Nation."

"I think that the apathy or the sense of alienation is profound. It is real and we have to deal with it," warned Guinier.

But dealing with the problem goes beyond the generational dispute to the arena of partisan politics where Republican and Democratic blacks often disagree over how best to improve conditions for African Americans.

"I think the government can play an important role in trying to correct these things," said Guinier. "We have seen that help rebuild Japan, help rebuild Europe ... it needs to rebuild American cities."

"The government has a role to play ... (but) what the U.S. government did was help to create the environment where the Europeans rebuilt Europe," said former Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan who appeared with her on CBS.

"We can't look to government to solve all this. Having served in the government for four years I can tell you that government is a big bureaucracy that indeed doesn't do a lot of things well," he added.

WASHINGTON — Don't be misled by all the partisanship and exaggeration. There's more to the big new deficit-reduction law than an 11 percent tax increase on the well-to-do and an extra dime-a-day gasoline tax on the average driver.

But this expansion, costing \$20.8 billion over the next five years, has broad support in both parties because it goes only to the working poor. It would supplement the wages of about 11 million families with children.

# 600 murders?

## Drifter sits quietly on death row

HUNTSVILLE, Texas — If the subject matter had not been so serious, so abhorrent, the scenes would have been almost funny, like a bad drive-in horror movie.

A grizzled one-eyed drifter, his fingers and teeth stained brown by endless cigarettes, his arms spotted with thick green tattoos, delights police by describing scores of unsolved killings: Texas, Florida, Louisiana, Arkansas, Maryland. More than half the country.

But after regaling eager officers and caravans of salivating reporters throughout the nation, Henry Lee Lucas changed his tune. He had made it all up, he said. The only person he had killed, he said, was his mother.

By then, hundreds of murders had been pinned on him — the result, Lucas says, of authorities who "helped his memory" by providing details of unsolved killings they hoped he would clear.

"It all seemed fun to start with," he says. "Now, it isn't. I should have my tail kicked for that. I just didn't have any willpower."

It was 10 years ago that the saga of Henry Lee Lucas began with his arrest for a simple firearms violation.

It wasn't long after that before he started talking about murders — lots of them. But when the seemingly unending series of revelations reached almost 600, he began recanting. And even the Texas attorney general at the time, Jim Mattox, admitted Lucas had taken people for a spectacular ride.

Home for Lucas these days is death row, where he was sent in 1985 after his conviction on charges of killing an unidentified hitchhiker known only as "Orange Socks."

It is his only death sentence, although by his attorney's count he has at least 10 other life terms.

The state's appeals courts have upheld his death sentence,

but the U.S. Supreme Court in June returned the case to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals for further review.

"I've given up hopes of getting out," says Lucas, now 57, as he peers through his bifocals. "I've accepted this. This life is gone. Maybe God will find something. I've left it in his hands. I just have to accept it."

"I can't say 'believe me' and expect people to believe. My character as far as telling the truth back then hurt me."

Lucas denies participating in the "Orange Socks" slaying and the others for which he is facing decades of prison time. The only killing he does acknowledge is that of his mother in 1960 in Michigan.

That, however, hasn't stopped authorities from continuing to press for additional convictions. He faces trial this fall in Tyler, Texas, on capital murder charges in connection with the 1982 slaying of a 35-year-old woman found shot in the head in her rural home.

"It's interesting Henry never led law enforcement to a single body that had not already been discovered and had surveyor flags all over it," says his attorney, Vic Feazell, a former McLennan County district attorney. "This was the biggest botched mess in the history of U.S. law enforcement. Henry was such a pawn of law enforcement."

Feazell, who as district attorney began investigating Lucas when officers tried to pin the drifter with murders in his central Texas county, notes that only two of Lucas' convictions

resulted from jury verdicts. "If any case had to be tried again, there's absolutely no way the prosecution could win," he insists. "There's no evidence. I've been standing on this soapbox for years."

One who doesn't agree is Jim Boutwell, the sheriff in Williamson County where the woman known as "Orange Socks" was found.

"I'm not in a position to say all of the cases that he admitted to were correct," Boutwell says. "The vast majority didn't have anything to do with this county. But I would say (he's responsible for) between 100 and 200, all over the United States."

"He's soft-spoken, frequently pretty quiet. I think that was one of the secrets of his success. He would fool people, primarily women, because of his nature."

Boutwell believes Lucas eventually will be executed in Texas, Feazell says the future is uncertain.

"I think what they're likely to do," Feazell says, "is sweep it under the rug and hope it would go away."

"He's not a danger to himself or anyone else," Feazell says. "I don't think he even belongs in a hospital."

Lucas describes his tenure in Texas as the worst of his life. The decade since his time in the limelight began seems "like a hundred years," he says, even though being behind bars is not new.

As a 17-year-old, he got three years in prison in his native Virginia for breaking and entering and burglary. Then he was in a federal lockup in Michigan on charges related to auto theft, and a Michigan state prison for the 1960 murder of his mother. He was transferred to a Michigan state hospital a year later and released in 1975.

"Michigan was like heaven compared to here," he says. "This is a concentration camp, not a prison. Of course, I realize I'm on death row."

## Rains bring floodwaters back

DES MOINES, Iowa — Volunteers were back to filling sandbags and keeping a nervous watch on swollen rivers and creeks after yet another round of heavy rain added to record-setting summer flooding.

"I'm sick and tired of this," said West Des Moines Fire Chief Randy Bracken.

As much as 10 inches of rain forced hundreds to evacuate Sunday as crews rushed to protect Des Moines' water treatment plant for the second time this summer.

Flash flooding was reported along streams throughout the central part of the state, sending water back into homes and businesses still being cleaned from a deluge last month.

"It just never stops," said

Steve Little, who stopped cleaning and started sandbagging at his Rocket Diner. "Unless the dike breaks, we'll probably be all right. But I'm not taking any chances."

Rain was in the forecast overnight, and another heavy deluge could spark more flooding, forecasters said.

"We're not quite out of the woods yet," said National Weather Service Dan Smith.

## Asian gang raids follow reputed crime kingpin's Hong Kong arrest

NEW YORK — The suspected mastermind behind much of the smuggling of Chinese immigrants to America was arrested in Hong Kong and could be extradited here on murder charges.

Reputed crime boss Kwok Ling-kay is believed to have organized the ill-fated voyage of the Golden Venture, which ran aground off New York in June while trying to slip into the United States. Ten passengers drowned and 277 other Chinese aliens were taken into custody.

Kwok, 27, was to appear in court Wednesday for a hearing on extradition to the United States. New York police and the FBI had been seeking Kwok in connection with slayings in a gang-related shootout in

Manhattan's Chinatown this year.

He was arrested Friday in Hong Kong at the request of the FBI, police said Sunday. Hours later in New York City, police and the FBI arrested 14 people in raids on strongholds of Asian organized crime, including the Fuk Ching gang, which Kwok leads, police said.

They were to be arraigned today in federal court.

Five other suspects already are in jail serving time on unrelated charges. The New York Times reported today that authorities were searching for six more Kwok associates.

Those arrested were not identified, and the specific charges against the men were not released. The FBI said documents in the case were sealed.

Beyond that, the agency would

only say that the raids were in connection "with a major Asian organized crime investigation."

Kwok has reportedly traveled freely between the United States, China and Taiwan despite being deported from the United States in 1988. His many aliases include Ah Kay and Guo Liang Chi.

New York Newsday reported Sunday he was charged with murder, conspiracy to commit murder and attempted murder in the Jan. 8 shootout in Chinatown.

Police say the Fuk Ching gang, named for China's southern Fujian province, deals heroin, is involved in protection rackets and plays a dominant role in the smuggling of desperate Chinese to the United States, charging them up to \$30,000 for passage.

## Cult raid

### Senior ATF officials faulted in Waco attack

NEW YORK (AP) — Senior officials of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms have been faulted for putting agents with no paramilitary training in charge of the raid on the Branch Davidian cult, according to a published report.

A review of the February raid near Waco, Texas, casts doubt on the future of Stephen Higgins, the director of the ATF, a division of the Treasury Department, according to Monday's editions of The New York Times.

The inquiry found fundamental problems with planning and execution during the 51-day standoff.

The Times said investigators

also found that senior officials were "too detached" from the operation, and that Higgins and others made misleading statements about what had occurred in the Feb. 28 raid that left four agents and at least six cult members dead.

The standoff ended April 19 when federal agents pumped tear gas into the compound. A fire broke out and most of the Branch Davidian members were killed, including 17 children.

People involved with the review told the newspaper that the Clinton administration, wary of repeating the messy departure of

former FBI Director William Sessions, will likely encourage Higgins to step down when he turns 55 in October.

The findings on the Waco raid are expected to be made public in mid-September, and Higgins told the paper he would decline comment until then.

In a brief interview, he said he preferred to stay on but would retire if his leadership was found wanting.

"I'll stay here as long as I and the people in the organization and the department think I can do an effective job," he said.

# Can Martin make it four wins in a row?

BRISTOL, Tenn. — Two months ago, Mark Martin was wondering if his run of bad luck would ever end. Now, he's riding a streak of success that has him on the verge of entering the Winston Cup record book.

Martin's victory Saturday night in the Bud 500 at Bristol International Raceway was his third in a row.

One more, and he'll tie the modern record of four consecutive victories. The record is shared by several drivers, most recently by Bill Elliott at the start of the 1992 season.

Martin gets his shot at No. 4 on Sunday at Darlington International Raceway.

"We should run better at Darlington than we ran here," Martin said. "but the more you win in a row, the more likely you are to not be as fortunate. We'll go down there and give 'em all we've got. I'm looking forward to it."

If Martin's Ford Thunderbird runs better than it did at

Bristol, his competitors will be in trouble.

Martin, who started on the pole after a record-setting qualifying run on Bristol's .533-mile, high-banked oval, looked to be the class of the field early in the race.

Even though Martin fell two laps down after a loose lug nut was discovered on his right rear wheel, he still had enough power to overtake Rusty Wallace with 12 laps remaining.

The win gave Martin a stretch of seven races in which he's finished sixth or higher six times, vaulting him from 12th to third in the Winston Cup points standings.

But it's how Martin wound up 12th that's still bothering him.

"If you get your good luck when you're running worse, you won't get enough," he said. "If you can stay running good, then you'll get your share."

Martin was running well enough to win several races earlier in the season, but bad luck kept popping up in his path. A flat tire, an empty fuel tank, a wreck he didn't cause — all added up to a bedeviling period for Martin and his Jack Roush Racing team.

"Now, I guess it's our time," Martin said.

The Lake Mary City Commission found itself in that no-win scenario recently when problems arose over the recreation department's basketball courts on Country Club Road.


According to reports, residents in the area complained about the noise and profanity coming from the courts, especially late at night.

I know it can be done, because I've managed to play through several softball seasons with the threat of automatic ejection for just uttering a profanity that only an umpire can hear hanging over my head and haven't been thrown out yet.

Now, the City of Lake Mary is in a difficult situation. The need for recreational activities is a given, but they do no-one any good if removed from the population center. At the same time, people have a right not to have the peace of their home disturbed by trash-talking clowns.

Answer? Eliminate the trash-talking clowns.

The way that Lake Mary opted to handle the situation is close down one of the two courts, take down the lights, and restrict access to the remaining court to Lake Mary residents under the age of 15.

Is that extreme? Perhaps, but that's their prerogative. As much as I might like to take issue with the way Lake Mary resolved the problem, I'm very sympathetic concerning the way the situation was forced upon them.

Also, Lake Mary is to be commended for not subtracting something from the equation without

adding something else to it. Along with the reduction of use of the existing Country Club Road courts, Lake Mary has stepped up plans to have courts built at its new athletic complex on Rantoul Lane.

In effect, Lake Mary has been able to give the people what they want while making sure it will be able to give them what they need.

But what of the larger problem of offensive behavior by adults in a public recreational setting?

If we're lucky, Lake Mary's actions of restricting use of its basketball courts will serve as a wake-up call for those guilty of creating the problem in the first place.

More than likely, it falls to the rest of us — the other adult athletes looking for a place to play — to police our games and deal with the disturbers of the peace.

Since most of us dislike being disturbed at home, you'd think that it'd be easy to understand the need to employ the same simple courtesy when visiting someone else's neighborhood that we'd like to see practiced by visitors to our neighborhood.

Is that too much to expect?







# See a dentist about bone loss in jaw

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My doctor says I am in danger of losing some of my teeth due to bone loss in my jaw. I can't understand his explanation of what causes it and don't know what I should be doing to prevent it from getting worse.

**DEAR READER:** Bone loss around teeth can be secondary to gum infection and inflammation of the supporting tissue (periodontal disease), as well as to aging. Osteoporosis can contribute to bone loss in the jaw, but much more commonly affects the spine and legs. Sometimes, calcium supplements, such as three or four TUMS daily, can help retard loss of bone around teeth.

However, as a primary-care physician, I've found that dentists are often the best resource because they are trained in methods, such as deep cleaning, that will assist patients with this malady. Also, dentists can prescribe antibiotics when necessary. Periodontists, specialists in this very problem, can be called upon as needed.

I suggest that you bypass your doctor on this issue and proceed directly to your dentist who, after examining you and X-raying your mouth, should be able to help.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Our grandson is in the habit of donating plasma twice a week for several weeks in succession as a means of picking up some extra spending money. Is donation this often harmful? What is the normal pattern?

**DEAR READER:** Plasma is the clear liquid portion of blood, in which the various types of blood cells are suspended. Plasma contains proteins and other nutrients.

I'm surprised that the authorities would allow even a healthy young man to donate blood so frequently. Each time he donates, he is losing important blood constituents. Eventually, he could experience def-

iciencies that could affect his health. Donating blood every three to four months would be more appropriate.

directions. You need have no concerns, providing the personnel in your place of employment are familiar with the usual safety precautions.



## WIN AT BRIDGE

This year's world championships, the NEC Bermuda Bowl and NEC Venice Cup, began yesterday in Santiago, Chile. North America is represented in the Bermuda Bowl by two teams from the United States and one from Mexico; in the Venice Cup, by two U.S. teams and one from Canada.

The U.S. teams were chosen during trials held in Memphis last June. Today's deal was the last in one semifinal, and the score was tied.

There were two tables in play. At the first, North opened two diamonds. Flannery, showing four spades and five hearts, South jumped to four spades, silencing West. The contract made with an overtrick: plus 650.

At the second table, the slower start persuaded West to overcall.

This had the effect of pushing South to five spades, but it also induced East to double.

West led a club. The declarer, Michael Becker, won with dummy's ace and discarded a heart loser. He cashed dummy's spade ace, unblocked the diamond ace, played a spade to his eight, ruffed a diamond in the dummy, drew trumps and claimed 11 tricks. The score of plus 850 brought victory to Becker and his teammates, who proceeded to win the final and qualify for the world championships.

If the contract hadn't been doubled, the match would have moved into overtime.

East-West can defeat the contract. West leads a low heart to East's ace. Back comes the heart queen, overtaken by the king. Then East receives a heart ruff. However, nobody is as clever as that in this world.
