

# Draft Law Changes Should Be Made At Once!

We welcome the changes in the draft laws which are being called for by President Nixon, endorsed by Lt. Gen. Lewis Hershey, director of Selective Service, and are practical moves to free our young men from the uncertainties which have naunted them for en-

The proposal to limit the liability of draft to one year and to make that the 19th year of a young man's life has a lot of common sense to support it. To make this drafting a matter of lottery is also an effective answer to those who are convinced that the present method has shown the possibility

of interpretation by local draft boards which some of our young men - ages 18-26 - view as unfair. Coming, as it has, at a time when the possibility of an end to the fighting in Vietnam has been raised through the various peace plans from Washington and Hanoi (officially opposed, but actually under discussion) does not alter its significance.

Student unrest and rebellion has been fostered by the application of the present draft law regulations. An easy weapon used by those who would upset our entire governmental establishment has been used to foment trouble and exaggerate the personal problems of those drafted.

In making this comment we do not underestimate or discount the difficult, demanding and selfless service of those members of the local draft boards who must conform with the rules and regulations which govern their decisions. All honor to them!
