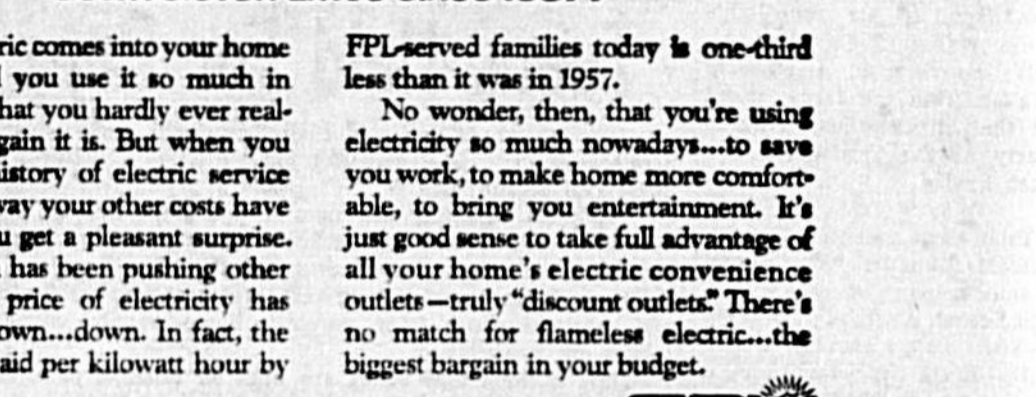

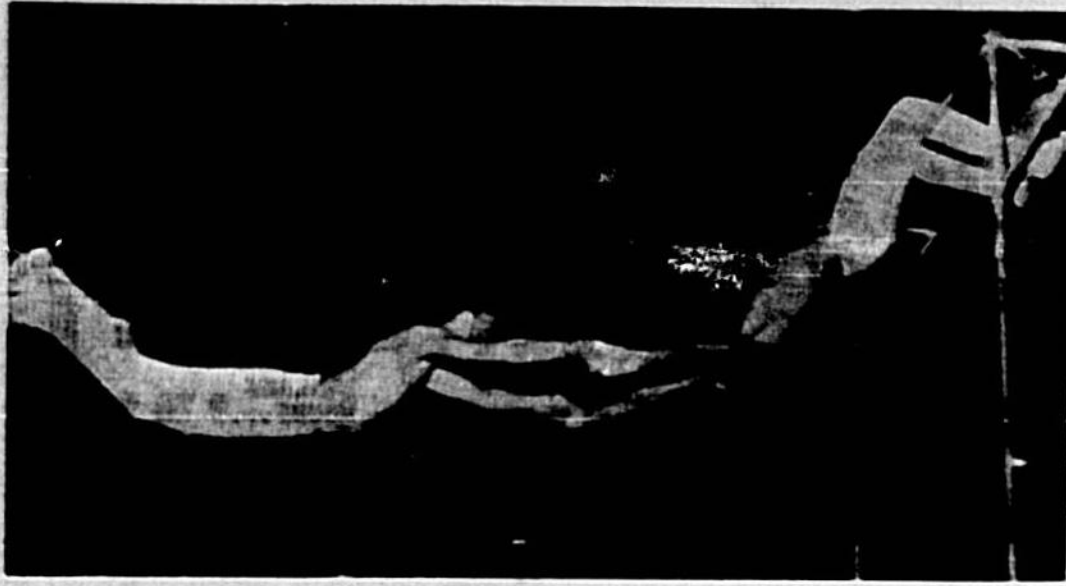

Lake Mary Roundup Set May 29

First grade "round-up" will be held at Lake Mary School Cafeteria, Thursday, May 29th, 9:15 a. m., according to Morris M. Ruby, Principal. Grad-Student Draft Plan Falling Short

WASHINGTON (AP)—The number of college graduates being drafted this year is running far below estimates, even though deferments for diploma holders were abolished more than a year ago. At the same time, graduate schools report a big slow-down in enrollment. Nobody knows whether the missing students were drafted, went to industry for occupational deferments, or stayed home to wait for "Greetings." The National Security Council recommended lifting deferments in February 1968 for all graduate study except medicine and the ministry. Critics of the move predicted a draft of 450,000 college graduates including 175,000 conservative Pentagon estimates were for a draft of 100,000 college graduates, including 55,000 would-be grad students in fiscal 1969. When the fiscal year ends in June, the total will probably reach no more than 25,000. Draft boards could have been inordinately slow to reclassify students, and many students may have applied the reclassifications, creating additional delay. The elimination of graduate deferment was meant to stop students from "yearning" a one deferment on top of another and thus staying out of the draft pool indefinitely.

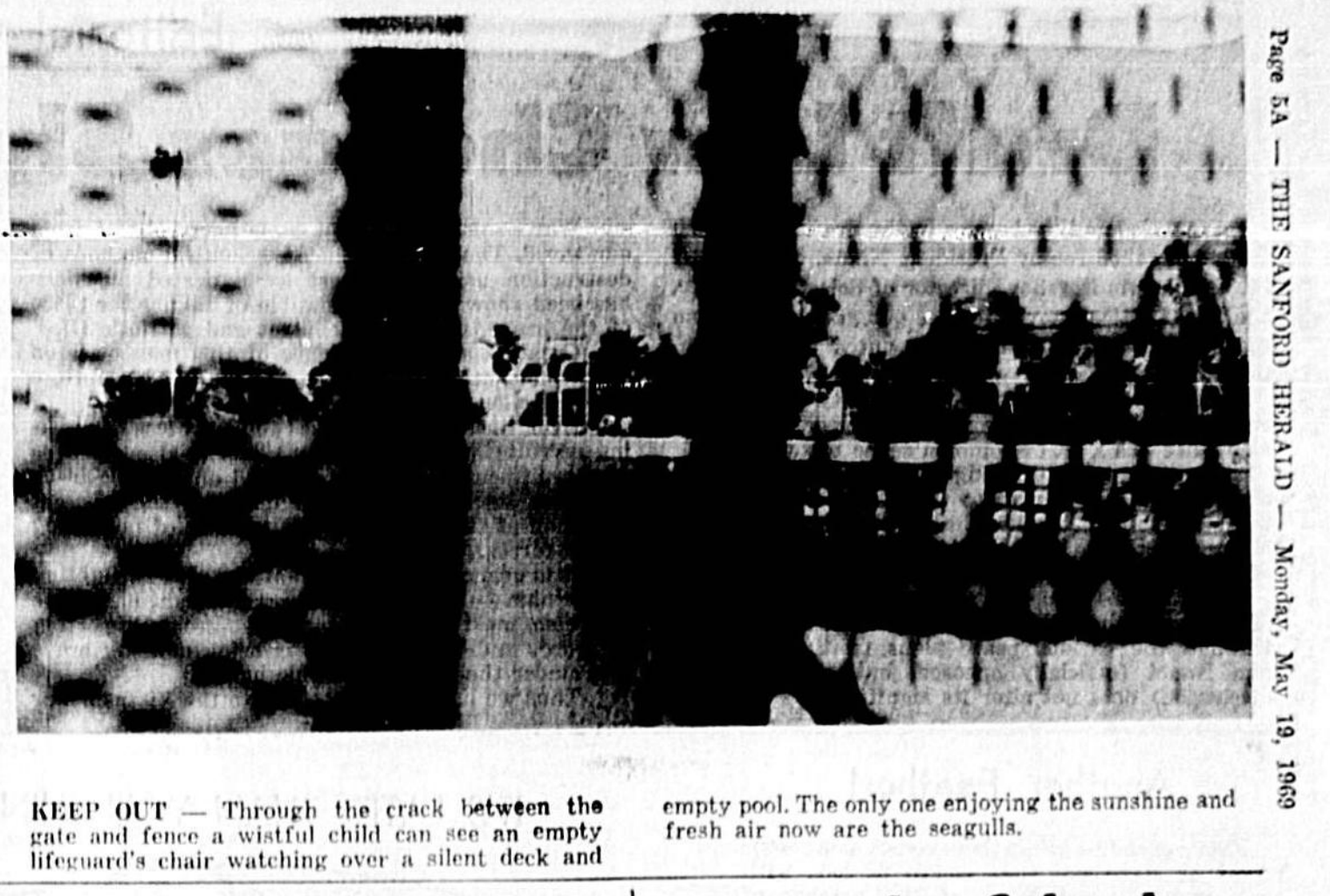

Brevard, Volusia Seek Fun

Are you interested in classes in conditioning, solo and duo, weight lifting, yoga, physical fitness, workshop cosmetics, all acrylic painting, stichery, floral design, gift wrapping, feathered flowers, knitting, square and folk dance, baton twirling, guitar, bridge, checkers and chess, auto mechanics, dog obedience, fishing, golf, flight orientation, cheerleading, modeling and charm, stocks and bonds, decorating, reupholstering, or pastel drawing?
You can take any one or all of them—if you live in north Brevard County. All these and one-half hour a day summer recreation program for children six to 15 years of age AND 215 acres of park space with picnic shelter and site, playground equipment, play fields and Little League facilities, paved courts, tennis courts, rest rooms, community center, and a swimming pool. North Brevard citizens for their operation—a total operating budget of \$120,000. The pool, located at the high school, is being operated this year by the YMCA. However, construction of three new neighborhood pools, located at the junior high schools in the area, should begin soon; bids are now being taken.
Last summer, Daytona Beach offered charm school, card party, painting classes, drama and speech, drum lessons, or-gan lessons, guitar lessons, dance, arts and crafts, liquid embroidery, cheerleading, story hours, baton, square dancing, archery, typing, shuffleboard, canoeing, tennis clinics, can club, junior rifle club, lawn bowling, golf, and a summer playground program from June 10 through July 19, with special events and field trips.
Besides classes and playground programs, the city of Brevard, located at the three pools and the beach, getting at the public golf course, day camping and nature study at Tomoka State Park, and free municipal band concerts.
All this, serving the 50,000 people in Daytona Beach, an additional 45,000 in the area, and 100,000 tourists, costs the people of Daytona Beach \$377,805, or \$6.50 per person.
DeLand, with the Volusia County Board of Public Instruction, offers least leading, shuffleboard, tennis and baroque courts, tennis instruction and tournaments, baton twirling, bowling, physical fitness, day camp, arts and crafts, home economics, chorus and band, ceramic sculpture, basic painting, creative crafts, cooking and sewing, along with swimming at Chisholm Pool, DeLeon Springs, and DeBane Beach.

Here is what it says: "Social Security payments to Florida residents increased 25 cent from September 1967 to September 1968, compared with a 20 per cent increase nationally..."

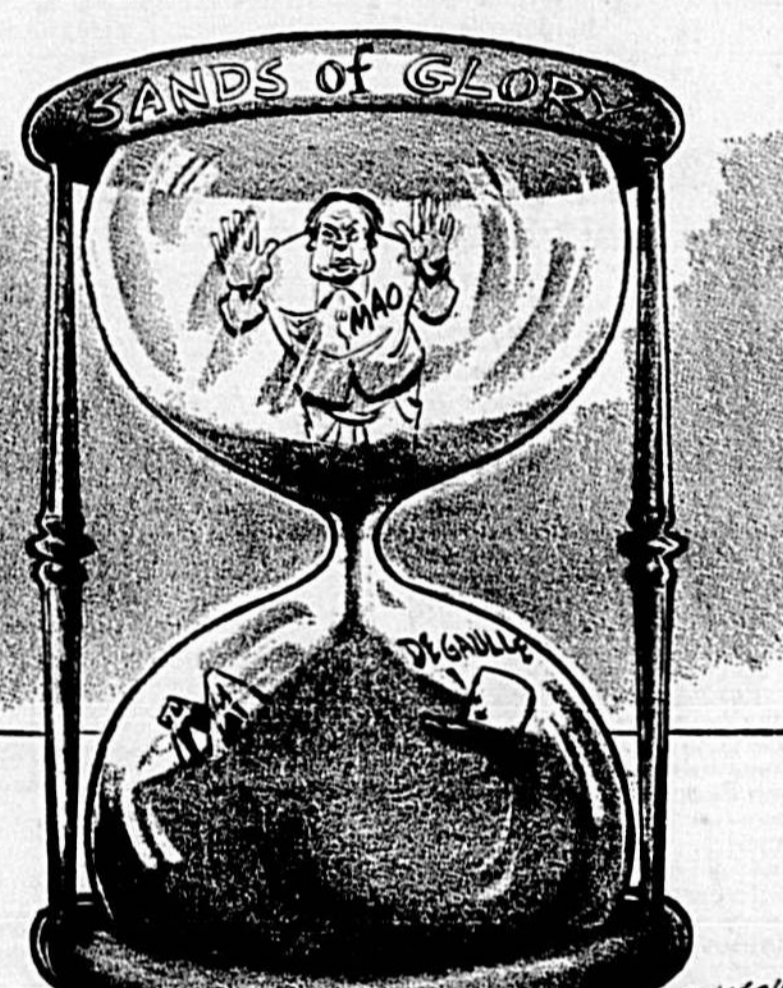

5,000 Malaysians Evacuate Homes 300 Die In 5 Days Of Riots

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Tension eased here today after five days of arson, murder and looting. People crowded streets to purchase essential food during rioting curfew hours.

There were reports looting was increasing in downtown homes evacuated by 5,000 people at the height of the trouble. Some reports said Malay troops were taking part in looting. Authorities said 112 persons had been killed in the capital and four persons in other parts of the country, but unofficial medical sources said at least 300 bodies had been counted in morgues and hospitals.

At least 342 persons have been injured and 2,700 arrested, including many for violating the curfew. Some 140 buildings were burned and 109 vehicles damaged. Two fires were visible from downtown today.

Throughout the capital vigilante groups were organizing to guard shops and homes. Some 2,000 Chinese refugees housed at the Merdeka Stadium organized themselves into teams to distribute food and guard buildings. Children were being washed assembly line style.

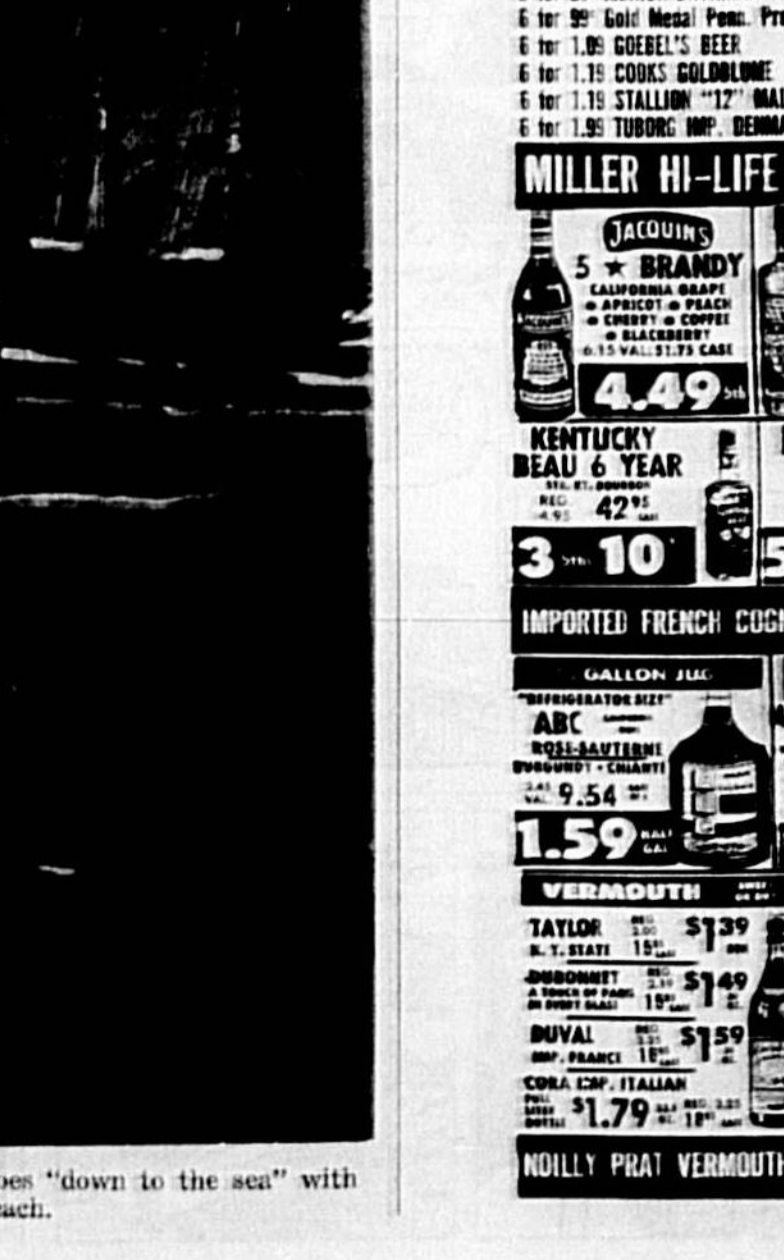
