

Race Suicide

The definition of a college graduate is likely to include the point that he or she has no children, or at least very few. Half a century ago Theodore Roosevelt denounced this condition, whereby the best educated group of the popula-tion was not reproducing itself. He called it "race suicide".

Roosevelt's rhetoric did not make much difference. The situation has continued, perhaps even become intensified. That is the conclusion of Dr. Clarence J. Gamble, director of the Population Reference Bureau of Washington, D. C. This is an organization to gather facts about population and its increase or decrease. He starts on the basis that 2.1 children per adult individuals are necessary to replace a class, Members of the Harvard University classes from 1916 to 1924 have had but 1.7 children, less by 19 per cent than they should have for replacement.

Other colleges are not doing much better. Yale graduates have 2.03 children apiece. Brigham Young University in Utah leads all the rest with a rate of 3.47 children for the graduating class of 1924. The women's colleges fall below the men, graduates averaging only 1.31 children apiece.

Trying to increase the birth rate has perplexed rulers from the Roman Empire on down. Contemporary France, with a population which at best stood still and in many years receded, found that all its attempts to encourage births by subsidies or remittance of taxes have done nothing. This is a long range problem whose effects may not be seen for many years, but will eventually prove of the first importance.
