Senators To Take Lid Off Florida Crime

Secret Black Hand Society, Mafia, Connected With Tampa Gangsters

WASHINGTON, July 10—(AP)—Senate crime investigators completed plans today for a public exposure of the underworld's hold on Florida gambling, racketeering and legitimate businesses.

Chief Counsel Rudolph Halley of the Senate Crime Investigating Committee leaves tonight for Miami and senators will follow him Wednesday night for hearings Thursday and Friday.

Investigators already have bulging files of reports on gangland operations in Florida and investments in hotels, dog racing tracks, luxurious homes, and other establishments.

Part of this information was given to the committee by director Virgil Peterson of the Chicago Crime Commission, one-time FBI agent who has spent the last eight years studying the operations of racketeers.

Peterson has testified that members of the old Al Capone gang and New York mobsters still have a firm foothold in Florida.

Chairman Kefauver (D-Tenn.) and other committee members have shown particular interest in Florida dog-track operations and the men who operate them.

Peterson has told the committee that William H. Johnston (1900-1948), Jacksonville, Fla., is now listed as president of the Miami Beach Kennel Club, Inc., the Associated Outdoor Club, Inc., Tampa, Fla., the Jacksonville Kennel Club, Inc., and the Orange Park Kennel Club, Inc., Jacksonville.

Peterson added that James Patton, son of John Patton, is listed as vice president of the Miami Beach and Jacksonville Kennel Clubs and as treasurer of the Orange Park Kennel Club of Jacksonville.

John Patton has long been associated with the operations of racketeers.

\$40,000 Worth Of Improvements Are Being Made To Mayfair Inn

Many improvements, including a white outer coating by the Lumino process, are being added to the Mayfair Inn, in preparation for its re-opening Dec. 2 by the New York Giants, Charles Marian, manager said today.

More than \$40,000 is being spent to put the hotel, both inside and outside, in fine condition, he stated.

Mr. Marian arrived here about 10 days ago from New York to direct the operations, and will return this week. He expects to be back in Sanford in September.

There is a possibility that the New York Giant team, which will train in St. Petersburg next winter, will be quartered at the Mayfair Inn during the period of Mar. 26 through 29 when they will play exhibition games here with major league clubs, he stated.

McKibbin Says Wading Pool Can Now Be Utilized

City Workers Remove Hazardous Piles From Lake Monroe

Alterations have been completed to bring the small wading pool at Sanford's Municipal Pool up to sanitary standards of the Florida State Board of Health, City Manager McKibbin said today.

Originally the wading pool was designed to receive city water, he pointed out. The great distance between the pool and the French Avenue pumping plant where sterilization measures are taken caused a reduction in the amount of chlorine that went into the miniature pool.

The Bureau of Sanitary Engineering of the Health Board advised the local authorities that the wading pool could be used only if the water going into it was chlorinated to the same percentage as the water going into the main pool.

Alterations, whereby, water going into the small pool would be drawn from the supply being pumped into the main tank, have been made.

The City Manager also stated that remnants of Sanford's memorable past but hazardous present were removed from the sands of Lake Monroe by a squad of City employees lead by S. M. Richard. Nearly 200 pills were removed from the lake near Mellenville Avenue. At one time these pills formed the foundation for Fort Mellon's extensive water traffic.

Several months ago a pleasure craft owned by Gordon Brisson struck one of these pills during the high water period. The craft (Continued on Page 2)

South Carolina Votes Tomorrow On Vital Issues

COLUMBIA, S. C., July 10—(AP)—South Carolina Democrats choose candidates tomorrow for U. S. senator and governor, ending a primary election campaign in which states' rights and Negro segregation have been major issues.

The voters will pass on Governor James F. Byrnes' bid for a comeback to elected office. And for the first time in 74 years a Negro will be running for an office of more than county-wide scope.

Byrnes is in a four-way race for nomination as governor, while Governor J. Strom Thurmond opposes Senator Olin D. Johnston's bid in the senatorial test.

Democratic nomination is equivalent to election in South Carolina.

The 62,000 registered voters include about 70,000 Negroes to whom the traditionally white primary was opened by federal court order three years ago. A total vote of about \$70,000 is expected. Aha of stake are the state's six seats in the U. S. House of Representatives—although only four are contested—and hundreds of other offices, some statewide, others from sheriff down to constable.

State versus national party loyalty has been argued by Johnston and Thurmond in their two-man race for the Senate nomination.

Thurmond, 1948 State's Rights presidential nominee, and Johnston, who says he supported President Truman's election although he opposed his nomination, have vied as self-styled champions of racial segregation.

Byrnes has campaigned against three other candidates on a state rights-platfom opposing federal encroachment on state powers.

Speaker of the state House of Representatives Thomas E. Pope, 37, is the only gubernatorial aspirant saying he supported the state Democratic party two years ago when it broke with the national party on the civil rights issue and supported Thurmond's presidential bid.

The thing candidate, insurance executive Lester L. Bates has executive a businesslike administration and urged federal education aid without U. S. control. Lumberman Marcus A. Stone has caustically criticized Byrnes' record as Secretary of State.

State Expected To Give \$51 Million To Florida Schools

TALLAHASSEE, July 10—(AP)—State School Supt. Thomas D. Bailey today estimated Florida's school program will cost the State \$51,675,739 for this business year.

That's \$24,241 less than the legislative appropriation of \$52,250,000 for State aid to county schools for 1950-51. However, Bailey said these first figures are only estimates. Final reports, based on actual figures, are expected to boost the amount to meet the appropriation.

The business year began July 1. The estimate is based on preliminary reports from county school superintendents on enrollment and teacher qualifications. These are the two principal items on which the amount of State aid is based.

County school systems probably won't get the total amount, though, because of the 10 percent cut made in State general fund expenditures as a result of the State's financial situation.

Report On Rotary Negro Woman Is Killed In Fight With L. Hughes

Lula Riley Dies In Hospital After Being Shot In Stomach

Lula Hughes, Negro, is being held in the Seminole County jail today on a murder charge following the Saturday night shooting of Lula Riley.

The victim, who was rushed to the Emerald Lido Hotel Memorial Hospital immediately after the shooting died early this morning. She was shot once in the left side of the stomach with a .32 caliber pistol.

Deputy Sheriff Charles Beck, Herman Bunsley, and W. A. Lewis arrested Hughes at his home at 8:30 A. M. today.

Deputy Beck who investigated the case said Hughes ordered Lula Riley out of a Silver Avenue cafe when several men began buying her drinks. When they were out on the street, the 48-year-old Negro grabbed her wrist and refused to release her. She broke away from him, however, and started to back off.

Hughes pulled his pistol, which he said he bought several months ago in a local pawnshop and fired one shot, Sheriff Beck said. The bullet lodged in the victim's stomach.

American Troops In South Korea Are Outgunned And Outnumbered

NEW YORK — (AP) — Americans have pulled back in Korea, leaving their own wounded behind.

It is a kind of healthy to run from a long term point of view — when there isn't much else you can do.

The first time was in the battle which the home folks call the Battle of Chosin Reservoir. Actually, we stood a pretty well at Chosin Reservoir. The real retreat was a few days before at a place called Faid Pass.

This is where General George S. Patton's son-in-law was captured, trying to hold one of two hills outside Faid Pass. Just about two years later, General Patton, from his son-in-law by a bold thrust of his Third Army, once renewed in a push beyond the Rhine.

What makes me feel sad and right now about the American troops being knocked back in Korea — and you don't have to tell me that they are outnumbered and outgunned because, naturally, they can't walk on their heels...

THE WORLD TODAY

One of the most important aims of Soviet strategy in furthering its world revolution is to bleed the democracies economically with the hope of thus rendering them vulnerable to reds attack.

This crafty line of thought long has permeated Bolshevik operations a prime example of it was the Russian blockade of Western Berlin. That forced America and Britain to maintain a long and tremendously costly air-lift to provide the city with necessities.

Now we have the Korean show, which is more or less a piece off the same cloth. Russia has two main objectives in backing Communist North Korea's invasion of non-Communist South Korea.

These objectives are (1) To gain control of the entire Korean peninsula because of its strategic value in possible future operations, and (2) To compel America and other western Allied to spread themselves and to expend economic strength in defending the South Korean republic.

Again we note that while Russia has trained the North Korean armies, and has provided many weapons, the Soviet itself hasn't become directly involved. As usual she is using one of her satellites to do the heavy work for her — under expert Russian military guidance, of course.

Evidence that Russia again has been crafty is seen in the reaction in Washington, where it is reported that administration officials are beginning to regard the Korean war as a long, difficult and costly struggle for America.

John M. Hightower, Washington correspondent, says that, depending on how the fighting goes, this development of a less optimistic outlook about an early end to the war apparently means a steady build-up of American forces in the war zone — with increasing requirements for money, men and munitions.

So that's the strain Russia is putting on America, without taking on any great additional load herself. And Korea isn't by any means the only theater involved in this Red strategy.

Over in China the Chinese Communist regime has served notice on the United Nations that it is on the verge of capturing the big island of Formosa despite any military steps of obstruction taken by the United States government.

So long as this can continue there always will be new Red troops to take the place of those knocked out.

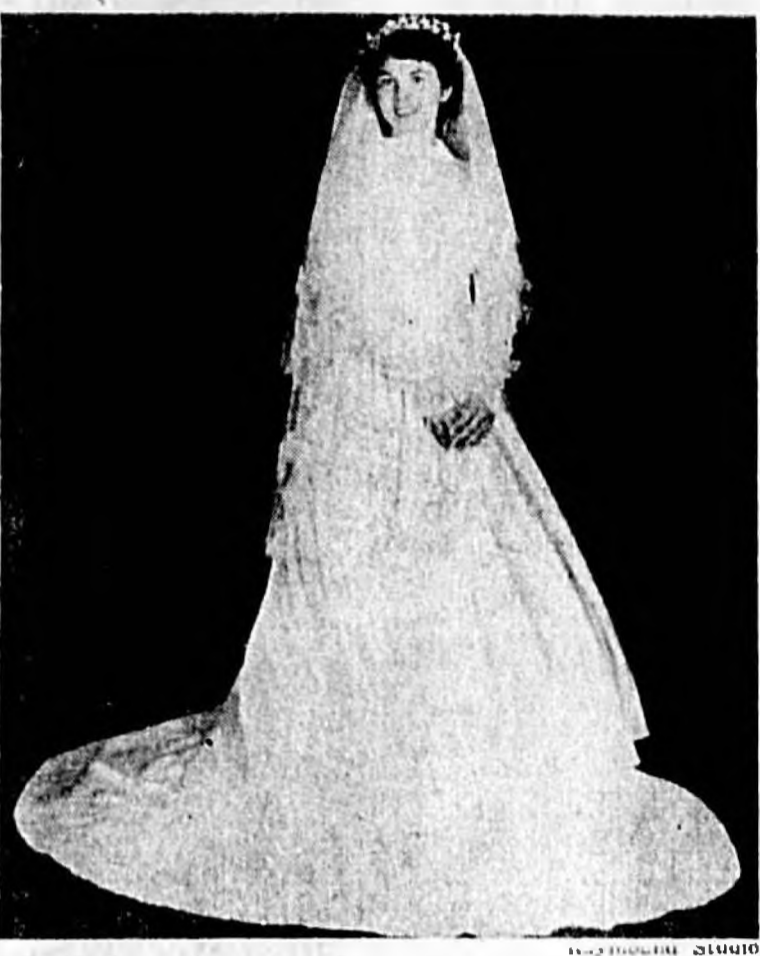
