Florida - Georgia Cattle Sale To Be Staged Soon

GAINESVILLE, Aug. 28 (Special)—Florida dairymen will have an opportunity to purchase 27 females either fresh or about ready to fresh when the Florida-Georgia Guernsey sale is staged at Lake City, Sept. 23, according to Hamilton L. Brown, dairyman with the State Agricultural Extension Service and secretary of the Florida Guernsey Cattle Club. Since there is a big demand for milk in the state now, it is anticipated that the offerings will be eagerly taken. These females and three registered Guernsey bulls have been selected from the best Guernsey herds in the Carolinas, Georgia and Florida. Brown is interested in seeing more good dairy animals come to Florida herds, and hopes that most of these will be bought by Florida dairymen. The sale will begin at 1:00 p. m. and will be held at the state farm's warehouse on the Valdosta highway just out of Lake City. The Georgia Guernsey Cattle Club, Gainesville, Lake City Chamber of Commerce are cooperating in staging the auction. Tom McCord of Montgomery will be the auctioneer. 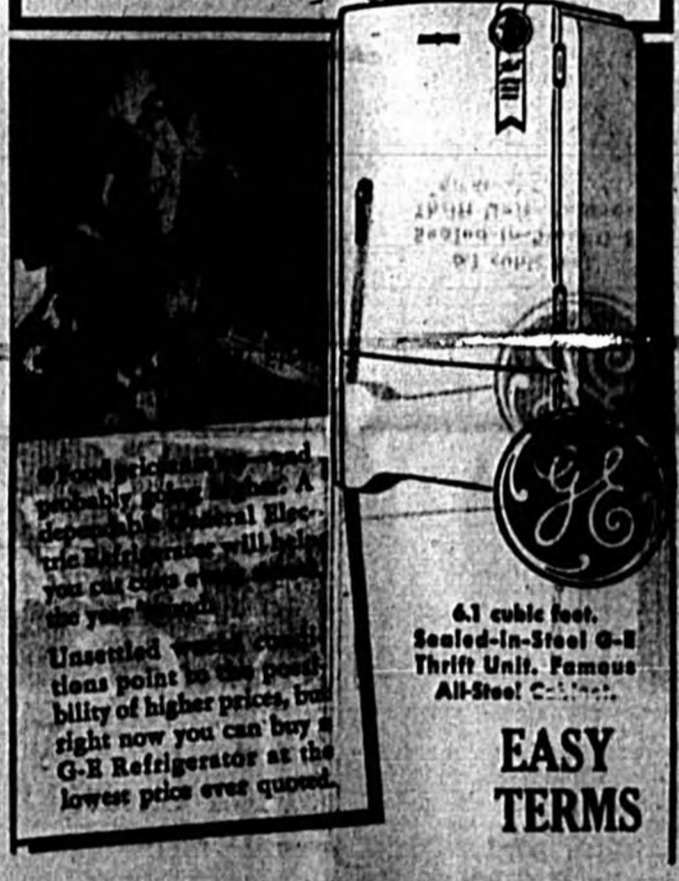

## Hitler, Duce Hold Meeting

Fears Increase For Life Of Laval As Possible Infection Is Seen In Wound

Hitler and Mussolini have met at the Fuhrer's east front headquarters for the last five days. It was announced today in Berlin for a discussion of the development and duration of the war.

It was the first time they have been described as concerned over the length of the conflict.

Fears for the life of Pierre Laval mounted tonight as doctors attributed his sustained high temperature to a possible infection in the assassin's bullet wound just below the heart.

A merciless purge of anti-Nazi elements swept over all France today in the wake of the attempted assassinations of Pierre Laval and Marcel Duce, whose names, according to Paris Police, stood at the top of a list of prominent Frenchmen marked for death.

Three men were beheaded on the guillotine at Santo prison in German-held Paris at dawn yesterday, only 12 hours after Laval, Duce and two lesser pro-German figures were shot by a French youth at Versailles.

Roundups and investigations were under way last night in both German-held and unoccupied France, with police concentrating particularly on a man-hunt for the authors of the reported Communist "death list."

All 1200 members of the anti-Communist Legion due to leave Saturday to fight alongside the Germans on the Russian front were placed under detention and at least three were arrested after they were found to be hiding weapons.

### Several Thousands Of Prisoners And 19 Loaded Transports Taken, Nazis Say

Hitler's High Command reported today that German troops had captured Tallinn, capital of Estonia, after weeks of siege and the Russians acknowledged another minor setback in the fall of Dnieperpetrovsk and the destruction of the hundred and ten million dollar Dnieper dam.

### Finnish Gulf Is Scene Of Battle

The Nazis and several thousand prisoners were taken at the Tallinn naval base along with 19 loaded transports and vast stores of booty.

A violent naval battle was believed raging in the Gulf of Finland south of the Germans attempting to smash the reeling Armada of Soviet warships and troops transports.

The Russians conceded that German assault troops had penetrated the approaches of Leningrad.

Finnish aerial observers reported that great fires riddled the skies last night over Vilppuri, which the Germans were destroying that Kaolin capital, 75 miles north of Leningrad.

Russian dispatches said the Red Army was battling successfully to save Kirovsk, Ustka and other vital industrial cities trapped at the port of Odesa fought to execute an order for defense to the last drop of blood.

German planes claimed smashed within 32 miles of the northwestern Soviet metropolis of Leningrad. Which one of the four German and Finnish allied offensives had made this advance and precisely where was not stated by the Nazis.

The Russian command officially admitted last night the forced evacuation of Dnieperpetrovsk, a great industrial city which the Germans had claimed to have captured.

The night Moscow communicated, issued considerably earlier than usual, had little to add to this acknowledgment save the customary report of continued heavy fighting everywhere.

But while it thus appeared that the Red flanks were swaying in both north and south, a German communiqué that not all the initiative had passed to their arms.

For Russian counterattacks at the center, apparently somewhere in the vicinity of Gomer, the German communiqué acknowledged in Berlin, although it was claimed that in both theaters they had been bloodily broken.

This sharpening of the tempo of the great struggle all along the Russian front came on a day that saw the British and Russian allies win a peace from invaded Iran (Persia) and set about immediately to create an all-weather German counter-offensive to carry American and British military supplies to the Soviet Union.

Russian announced last night the deliberate destruction of her proudest industrial achievement—the great Dnieperpetrovsk dam and all its works, in grim proof of the Soviet determination to leave for the invading Germans no single instrument of value.

It fell to S. A. Lovorsky, Soviet vice-commissioner of foreign affairs and official spokesman, to confirm the act which had been widely rumored for the past eight days.

"We blow up the dam," he said with a solemn nod of his head, "so as not to allow this first child of the Soviet five-year plans to fall into the hands of the Hitler tanks."

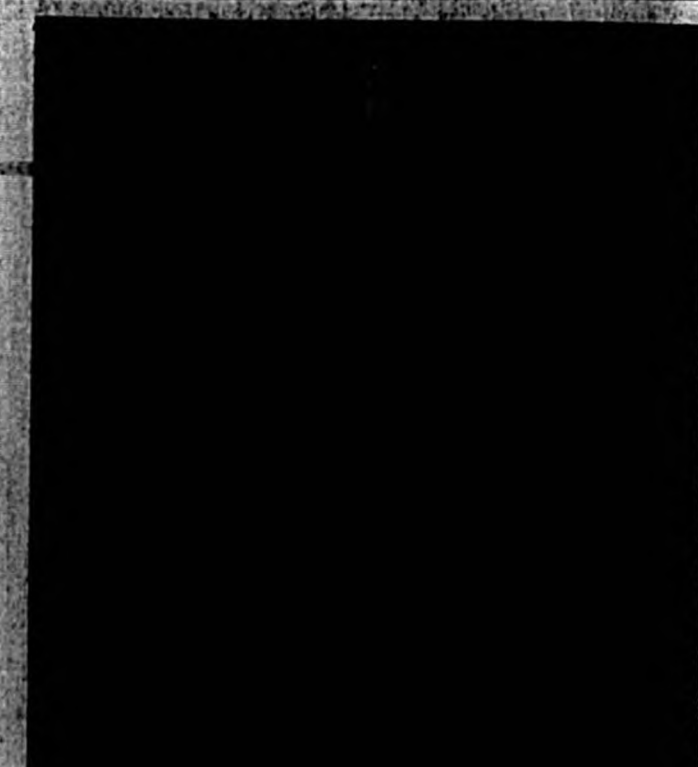

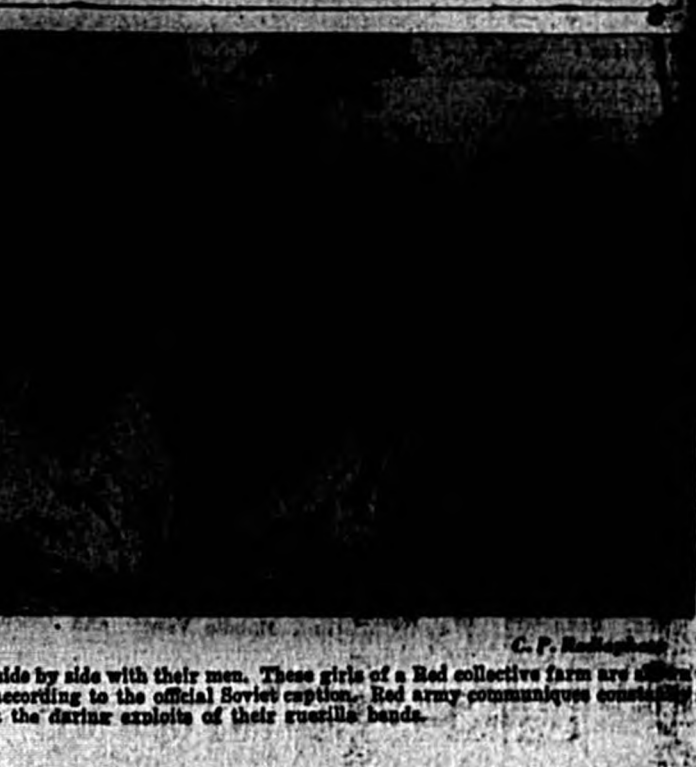

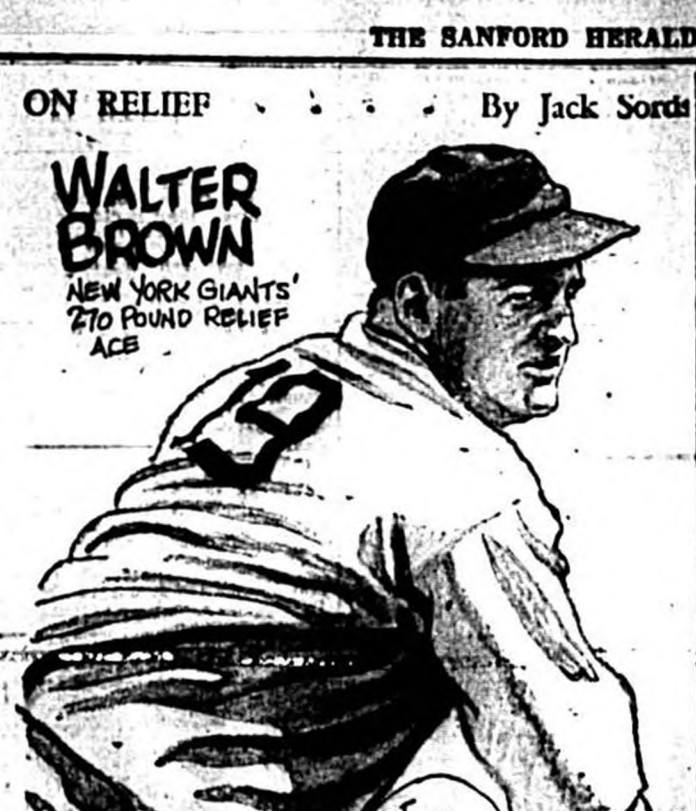
