TV Culture Effort Added Up To Rather Dull Program

Dated from International in keeping with recent exchanges between East and West, the ABC-TV culture vineyard knows as Music For A Summer Night offered a treat to good will Wednesday night with "The Music of Russia."

Some of the rewarding moments in the hour were Earl Wild's playing of the Piano Concerto No. 2 by Rachmaninoff; James Bill Lewis and mezzo-soprano Maria Marshall singing the love duet from "Boris Godunov"; and the Pas de Deux from "Black Swan," danced by Nina Novak and George Berlich of the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo.

However, most of the program added up to dull television. This has been a common failing for this program all summer. While the intentions are pure and noble, a small budget, cramped studio space, an apparent lack of cameras and other resources have led to some tacky-looking presentations. Often, I found I could enjoy the show's music just by listening and not watching. That's not good TV. Good radio, yes.

Since this show was devoted to music—something radio and record players can duplicate—it would have been wise, I think, to have concentrated more on pictorial values that would enhance the musical experience.

Anyhow, the series is over. If you're looking for classical music on a summer night from now on, don't turn on the TV tube. Get out the records.

51 Years Ago The Herald Published Its First Edition

Paper City's 2nd Oldest Business

The Herald just had a birthday. It was the day in 1911 when a man who came to Sanford just a year after the paper had dropped by with a donation.

The Herald printed its first edition in Sanford Aug. 24, 1911, with J. J. Kelly as editor and proprietor. It has been going ever since and is the second oldest business in the city, with only Chase & Co. preceding it in the longevity department of its paper.

Mr. Kelly, who became business manager of the paper in April, 1911, said the paper started publication in a building built for it in the 200 block of S. Magnolia Ave. just back of where the Red's store is now.

It has had different owners, but Kelly under the name Kelly & Co. the paper.

Mr. Kelly said that he can recall no other business operating here that long, or under the same name, with the exception of Chase and possibly Hill Hardware.

"There aren't a whole lot of old-time stores that are left here either," he said.

The old differences in these early days and now in the city as the country is changed, is pointed out by Mr. Kelly.

"In the early years of the century, political power was headquartered in the railroad shops, which gave Sanford its biggest industry."

"If you wanted to get elected mayor or councilman you first had to engage up to the men at the shops," he said.

Farmers Agree To Full Value Evaluation Of County Lands

Group Says Appraisals Too High In Some Cases

Millage for the coming year's budget should be set on the basis of full cash valuation, the farmers' committee which has been meeting with Seminole County Farm Bureau officials, decided Saturday.

More than 75 farmers and cattlemen heard county farm tax recommendations made by the committee.

The committee and Farm Bureau officials are trying to "provide a yardstick" for measuring fairness of farmland appraisals in accordance with a legal formula, said M. L. Cullum of the Farm Bureau, who presided over the meeting.

"We are not dealing with any political questions. We have no quarrel with any of our elected bodies. We feel sure our aims and theirs are ultimately the same," he declared.

The Tax Assessor can accept the valuations offered her as information and the reports will be offered to her as a fair evaluation of the land, Cullum said.

The millage seems unduly excessive, Cullum noted. Actually it is just the budget divided by the assessed valuation.

"Some people have seemed to think the County Commission arbitrarily sets millage and then they raise or lower it to suit their whims," he said.

"The danger of low millage and high valuations is the sense of inequity it creates," Cullum said. "It is just the budget divided by the assessed valuation."

Note Rash Precedes Talks

PARIS (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has sent notes to the Western Allies expressing Russian determination on the Berlin situation to proceed to his talks with President Eisenhower, State Department sources said today.

The latest note to West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer was delivered Sunday in Bonn. Diplomatic reports said Khrushchev's letters also had been sent to France and Britain, and British press reports said there had been a note to Washington.

The diplomatic sources said they did not know the contents of all the notes but that Khrushchev apparently was warning the Russians' "sneaking down" including a free city status for Berlin and an end of Western military competition.

Some quarters have believed Khrushchev's main idea was to show that the Soviet official attitude had not softened one whit on basic issues like Berlin's status, German reunification and European security.

A West German announcement did not disclose the contents of a 12-page note to Adenauer. The note was being delivered today by courier and neither side was expected to say anything until Adenauer has an opportunity to read it.

The diplomats said they expected Khrushchev's main purpose was to emphasize the demands for a general foreign minister conference in London.

Diplomatic sources in London said Khrushchev wanted to win Eisenhower's support for a non-aggression declaration during his forthcoming talks in Washington. They said Khrushchev preferred a non-aggression pledge between the United States and Russia but would settle for such a pact between NATO and the Communist Warsaw bloc.

Another immediate aim of the Khrushchev trip to Washington is to get the scene for a nuclear test ban accord, the sources said. In this connection, Khrushchev recently warned President Charles DeGaulle against French determination to explode its first atomic bomb soon.

In the meantime, Italian Foreign Minister Antonio Segni, in a major speech at Rome, Italy, warned that there must be no competition against communism during the talks with Khrushchev.

KKK Meets, Talks Election Action

SARASOTA (UPI) — Florida Ku Klux Klan leaders have planned to "fight the segregation battle with ballot not bullets" in the 1960 state elections.

Some 500 persons held a meeting near here Saturday night and heard Klan officials say the organization would not seek segregation votes "by terrorizing some poor negro."

Florida Grand Dragon James K. K. K. said the meeting, which drew no interference from local authorities, was called to launch a statewide membership campaign before the elections.

"We're going to determine who really stands for segregation and then back them all the way," KKK said.

The Rev. Lee Davis, Dallas Tex., imperial grand dragon of the United States, was the only Klansman who appeared uninvited.

Davis, a 71-year-old Baptist minister, said Florida's Klan is the fastest-growing in the nation.

Klan members turned a 15-foot oil-soaked cross at the meeting, which was preceded by an 80-car motorcade through Volusia and Seminole counties.

U.S. Missiles Near Par With Reds, Doolittle Says

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The United States has almost caught up with Russia in the race to build intercontinental ballistic missiles that are ready for use, former Air Force Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle said today.

Doolittle, who was fame in World War II with his bombing of Tokyo early in the war, now is head of the Space Technology Laboratories. He spoke in an opening address before the fourth annual symposium on ballistic missile and space technology.

Doolittle, pointing out that Russia had an eight year head start in the missile race did not say how close the gap had been closed. But he added the U. S. probably was ahead of Russia in some ways "because in all likelihood we have a more compact, smaller, cheaper ICBM."

Another prominent space scientist warned the U. S. public not to be fooled by proposals for military adventures on the moon or other planets.

"Such proposals appear to be no more than childish and transparent attempts to frighten the public and their congressmen into continued appropriations for space programs at which they may be inclined to take a second look," said Dr. Albert R. Hibbs. He is a member of the lunar exploration committee formed by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

"It is virtually certain that the moon occurs elsewhere in the universe," Hibbs declared in his address, which stressed that the main driving force in space research should be man's curiosity about the cosmos — not international competition.

Parks, a junior law student, heads a staff of 30 student leaders preparing the forum which includes three programs. Sponsored by student government, the forum is designed to acquaint entering freshmen with student activities of the University.

Parks is a member of Florida Key Key, honorary leadership fraternity and will be chairman of the University's 1960 Religion in Life Week.

A record enrollment of 13,000 students is expected at the university this year including more than 3,000 freshmen.

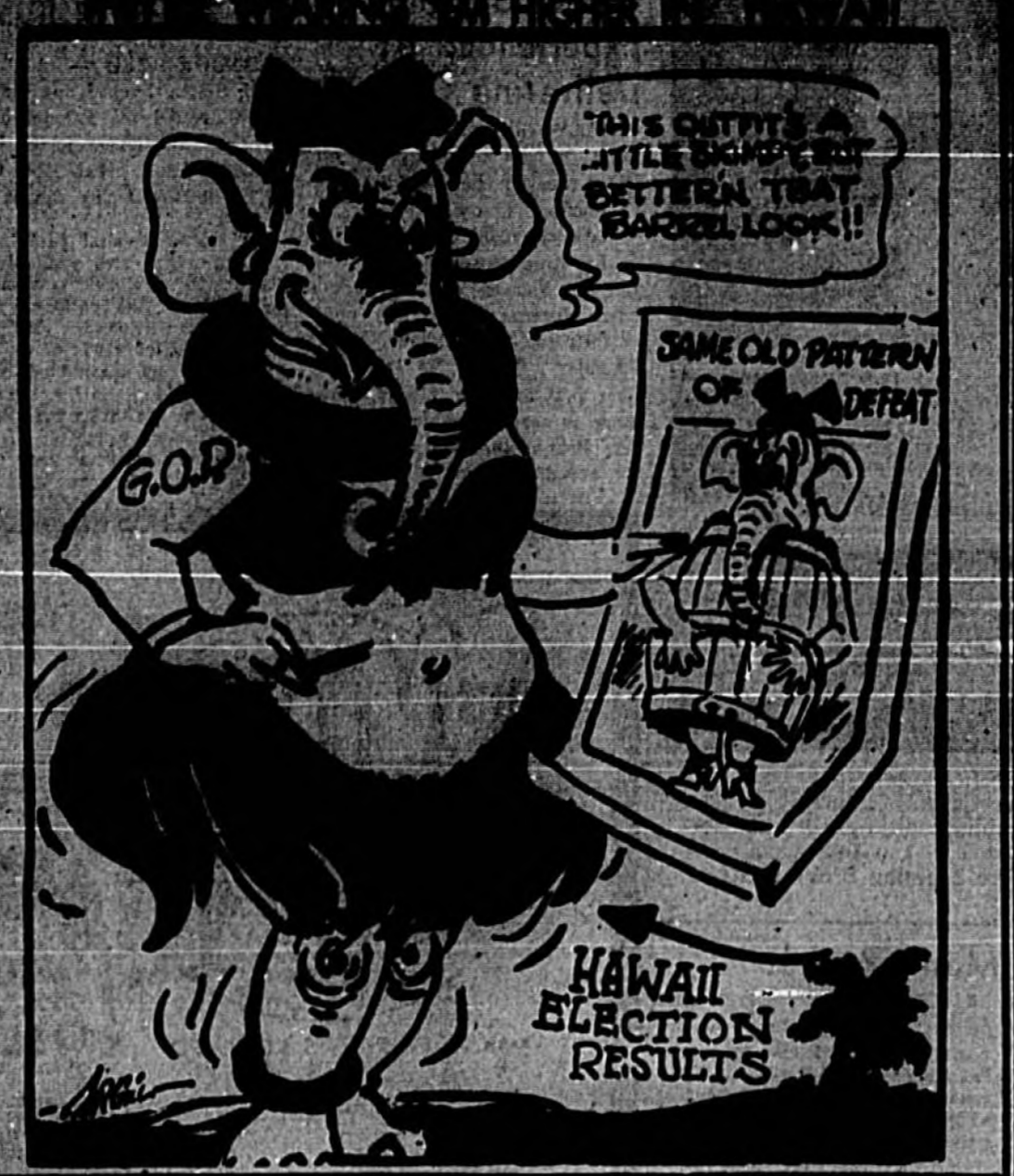

County School Enrollment Hits 10,434 For Increase Of 1,000

Enrollment in Seminole County schools this year will be 10,434. This is about 1,000 more than were enrolled at the end of the 1958-59 term, Walter Teague, administrative assistant, said today. Classes start Aug. 31.

Estimated enrollments: Seminole High, 1,063; Seminole Jr. High, 748; Sanford Grammar, 290; South Side Elementary, 1,200; West Side Elementary, 426; Pinecrest, 450; Lyman, 1,183; Altamonte, 700; Lake Mary, 194; Oviedo, 580; Geneva, 66; Monroe, 140; Wilson, 75; Boccartown, 70; Rosenwald, 330; Oviedo Elementary, 345; Harper, 250; Midway, 510; Goldsboro, 266; and Croome Academy 206.

Attendance areas for Sanford schools this year will follow this pattern:

First, second and third graders living west of French Ave. between 27th and 34th streets, or west of Park Ave. between 9th St. and Lake Monroe will attend West Side School, along with first through third grade pupils living in Loch Arbor, Little Venice and Ravenna Park. Other pupils in these grades will go to South Side Elementary.

Fourth graders going to Sanford Grammar School will be those living south of the lake-front and north of 9th St. between Palmetto and Park avenues, and north of 14th St. between French

and Park, west of Palmetto and east of French Ave.

Fourth graders to attend South Side School will be those living north of 24th St., west of Meltonville, east of Georgia Ave. and north of 24th St. from Georgia Ave. west. Fourth grade pupils on 17-92 from Onora Rd. to Five Points to Ginderville, including Sunland Estates, Loch Arbor, Little Venice, Ravenna Park, Upsala Rd., Wynnewood and W. 1st St. will also go to South Side.

Fourth graders to go to Pinecrest School will be those south of 24th St. between Meltonville on the east and Georgia Ave. on the west, and those south of 25th St. from Georgia Ave. west, not including pupils on 17-92, from Onora Rd. to Five Points to Ginderville, and Sunland Estates.

Fifth and sixth grade pupils to attend Pinecrest live south of 24th St. between Georgia Ave. and Meltonville and south of 25th St. from Georgia Ave. west, including students on 17-92, Old Orlando Rd., Ginderville, and Sunland Estates.

Fifth and sixth graders to go to Sanford Grammar School are those who live north of 24th St. between Meltonville Ave. and Georgia Ave. and those living north of 25th St. from Georgia Ave. west, including pupils in Wynnewood, Loch Arbor, Little Venice, Ravenna Park, Upsala Rd. and W. 1st St.

All seventh graders will attend Sanford Jr. High School at Pinecrest.

Eighth grade students to attend Seminole High are those living south of 12th St. and Celery Ave.,

west of Meltonville, north of 24th St. between Meltonville and Georgia avenues, and north of 26th St. from Georgia Ave. west.

Students in Lake Mary, Little Venice, Loch Arbor, Ravenna Park and Country Club Homes will attend Seminole.

Other eighth graders will go to Sanford Jr. High at Pinecrest.

Croome, Goldsboro, Midway and Harper school attendance areas will be the same as last year.

DCT Program Has Place For High School Students

Seminole High School's Diversified Cooperative Training program opens this fall with a need for students trained in shorthand and typing, Director Louis Girard said today.

There are business positions open for students with these skills and not enough people to fill the jobs, Girard said.

There are 18 applicants for the program which has junior and senior students at school in the morning and at work in the afternoon. Considered regular employees the pupil-workers are at business a minimum of four hours after completion of a 7:45 to 11:45 a.m. study session.

One general, one specific, and two academic courses are taken each morning by a DCT student. Credit, real estate, banking, ethics, public speaking, and health and safety are studied during the general business period. An hour's study is given of the theory behind a student's particular job.

A DCT student can go to college upon graduation if he has taken as full an academic load as possible during the first three years, says Girard. Any employer or student interested in the program should call Girard at FA 8-4586.

Science, Math Facilities To Come To County Through U.S. Funds

Science equipment and facilities for more mathematics and foreign language are to be bought with federal and state funds being given county schools under "Title Three" of the National Defense Education Act.

Another \$10,000 is expected from the government before 1960, says Stewart Gatchel, county director of instruction. This will be matched by \$10,000 from local funds. A state and federal \$10,000 was received last year and has been matched.

This year Sanford Jr. High will have a museum for use in seventh grade anatomy classes and a galvanometer for eighth grade science. The advanced mathematics classes will be continued. These classes which let children learn math at their own pace have been on an experimental basis for the past two years. New maps, a film strip projector and film strips have also been ordered for the school. More than \$1,000 will be spent on new library books.

Extracurricular as well as intraschool sports will be stressed, says principal Hugh Carlton, so that more boys will participate in at least some sport. The junior high level is the changing age, says Carlton. The school will try to make a boy a good spectator if not a good player, the principal explains. The junior high team will play six football games with Daytona Beach at the 135

Commercial Training Course Opens Aug. 31

Seminole County Vocational School's commercial training course is set to open Aug. 31. Day classes will be from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. with an hour for lunch Monday through Friday. Evening classes Monday through Thursday will be 7-10 p.m.

Daytime courses offered are: Typing I and II, Bookkeeping I and II, Shorthand, Dictation and Transcription, Business English, Office Procedure, Commercial Law, Duplicating Machines, Business Arithmetic, Filing, Dictaphone and Business Machines. Instructors will be Mrs. Gladys Hall, principal, and Mrs. Lydia Watt.

Evening courses are: Typing I and II, Bookkeeping I and II, Shorthand I, Dictation and Transcription, Business English, Filing, Dictaphone and Business Machines.

The only charge is \$1 registration fee except in some courses where a student must buy the textbook. A textbook deposit is required.

Except in Shorthand, students may enter the classes any time during the year. Shorthand enrollments must be during the first

week of school. Students are recommended for business positions as soon as they are qualified. Persons interested may call FA 3-0668 or FA 2-4165.

Most drop out after taking the night courses for a while, says one of his teachers, Harold Heckenbach. Willis' accomplishment is very unusual, he explains.

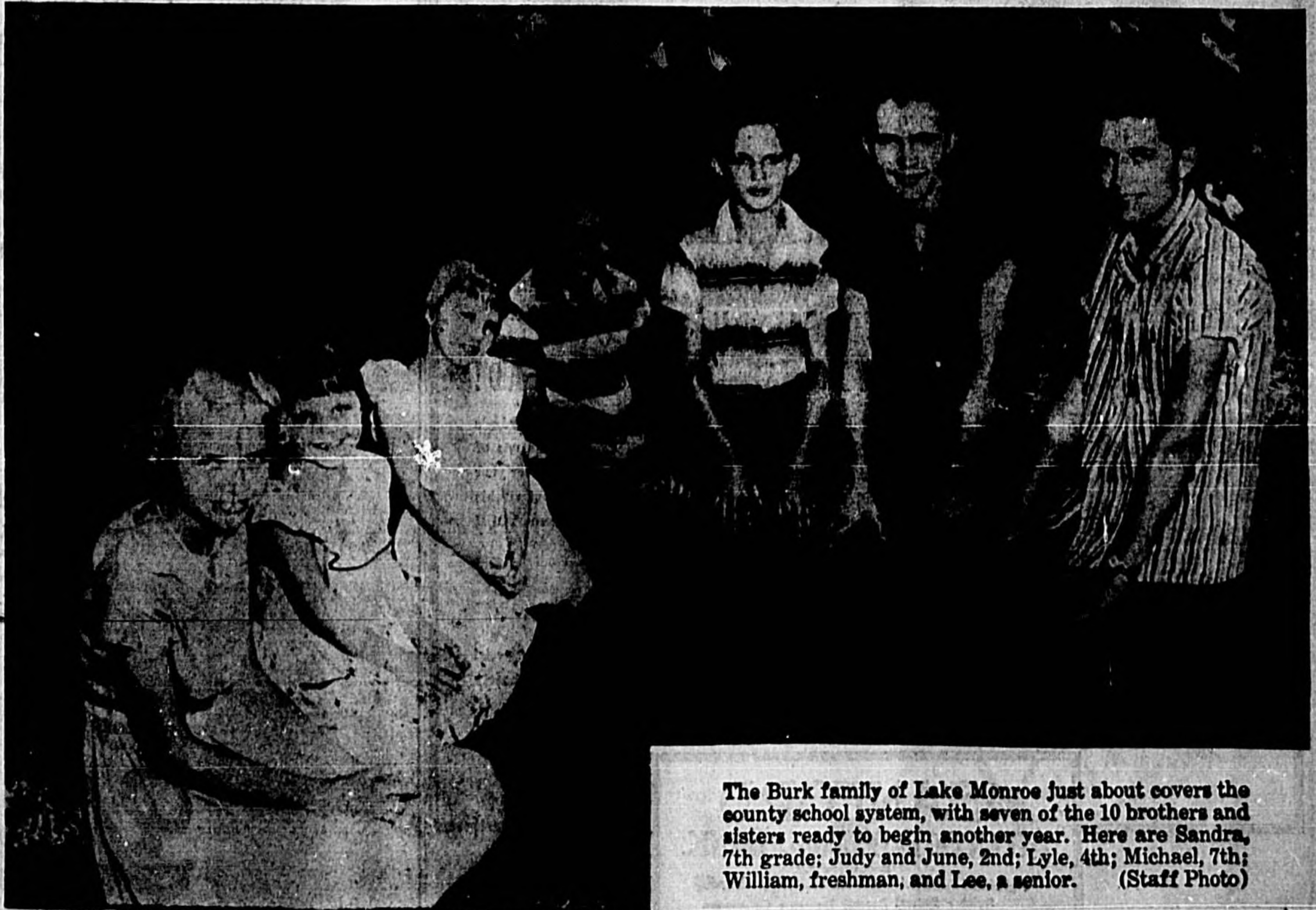
English, psychology, general science, Florida and U. S. history, civics, economics and business arithmetic were among the welder's courses.
