Sold! County purchases Katie's Landing

Years of negotiations between Moncriefs and state and local officials finally conclude

SANFORD — With tears running down her face, Katie Moncrief bid farewell to Katie's Wekiva River Landing as county commissioners Tuesday unanimously approved a joint acquisition of the property.

The board approved the final purchase price of \$665,000 as well as agreed to an intergovernmental agreement with its purchasing partner. The county will contribute \$119,700 for the land and an additional \$8,500 for surveying while the State Department of Environment

Protection will supply the remainder. "It's been a long road," said Chairman Dick Van Der Weide.

The county has looked at purchasing the property and returning it to the public for more than two years. The DEP and county will work toward that goal with the intergovernmental agreement allowing for both parties to participate in the plan development.

"We were ready to sell and we wanted it to remain in a natural setting," Katie said. "We've been dealing with the county and state over six years for this. We definitely had some champs and foes along the way."

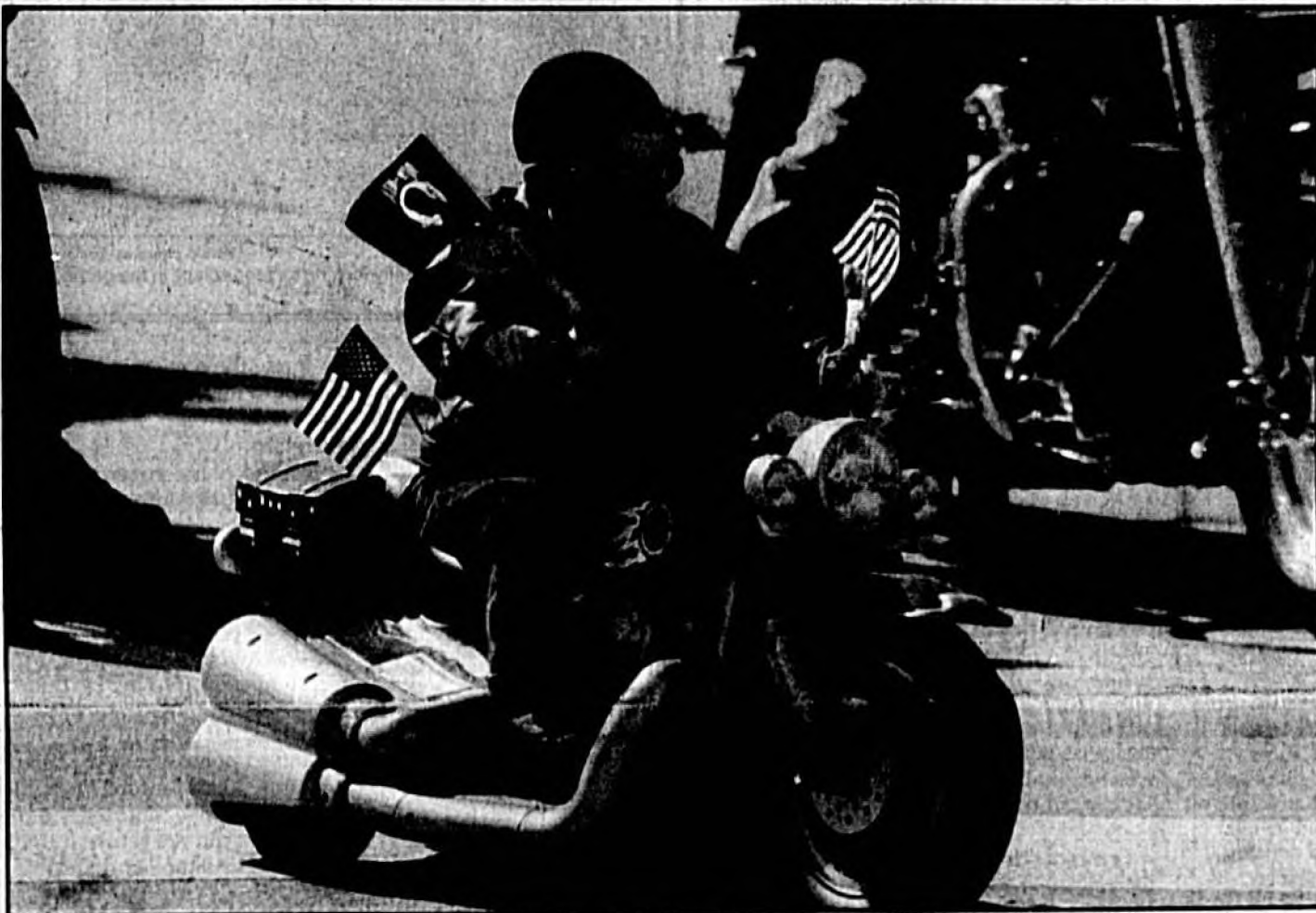
For 27 years, Katie and husband Russ have managed the campground that has direct access to the county's most coveted environmental jewel, the Wekiva River.

"Some of those people have been out there a long time," Russ said about the Landing's campers. "We are very grateful for their cooperation."

While some of the long-time tenants have moved out knowing the deal was near, the rest of the campground will have until Dec. 1 to clear out. Unfortunately, business this year has been the best he can remember, said Russ. The nearby power plant work by Florida Light and Power has brought an unusually large influx of tenants to the campground.

City denies agency's appeal

Commissioners direct mental health agency to follow the process

SANFORD — City Commissioners upheld a staff decision to deny a transfer of an occupational license for Seminole Community Mental Health Center (SCMHC).

The decision doesn't end the agency's chance to transfer the license. Commissioners directed SCMHC officials to seek a conditional use permit from the Planning and Zoning Commission, with the City Commission providing a final review.

In addition, the agency must address code violations. Despite not having an occupational license or a certified fire inspection, SCMHC is conducting business at its new facility at 919 E. 2nd Street, the former Lakeview Nursing Home.

"They're in violation," said Jay Marder, director of planning and engineering for the city of Sanford. "They don't have the proper permits, and the don't have the proper zoning."

The crux of the controversy is whether SCMHC is operating a Community Resource Facility (CRF) at its 2nd Street location. Marder contends the agency is operating a CRF and denied the occupational license transfer because Ordinance 3502 requires CRFs to be at least 1,500 feet apart. The agency operates two facilities on Bay Avenue, adjacent to the 2nd Street property, which marder says triggers

Local dignitaries and community members were invited to the business to sign a banner that will be sent to the USS Kennedy, said Teresa A. Lineberger, a realtor for Lake Mary's Watson Realty Corp. The 2 foot-by-24 foot white pennant is imprinted with the words

"God Bless Our Troops." "Our goal was to do something for our veterans and let them know how much they are supported by our community and appreciated for defending our freedom," Lineberger said. "This was an event put together by the agents at Watson Realty in Lake Mary to solely give individuals and ourselves an opportunity to show how much we all care for our country, freedom and those who protect us."

For the past few years, the Lake Mary agency sponsored a pumpkin give-away during Halloween. This year, however,

On one side would be a photograph of me on a ladder, painting my house. On the other side would be a picture of my oldest sister, who is 90, boarding a plane in Texas to visit friends and family in New England.

In the center would be a photo of our middle sister sitting in a wheelchair in her nursing home, hooked up to her 24-hour oxygen supply, having returned from yet another visit to the hospital with pneumonia and congestive heart failure.

Across the bottom of the poster in large letters would be: **GUESS WHICH SISTER SMOKED FOR 40 YEARS?**

GLAD I DIDN'T IN MASSACHUSETTS

DEAR GLAD: I can think of no more powerful anti-smoking message. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I began smoking when I joined the military at 17. It was the cool thing to do. Movie stars, athletes and even doctors endorsed smoking in advertisements. Over the next 25 years, I tried to stop but didn't have the will power.

In 1977, my town sponsored a health fair. I went and took a breathing screening. I was told to blow into a tube. The attendant asked me to please blow harder because I was barely able to move the needle. Then she said, "I notice you have a pack of cigarettes in your shirt pocket." I was offended. I felt it was none of her business — but a seed was planted.

Three weeks later, the American Cancer Society sponsored its first Great American Smokeout, encouraging smokers to quit for at least one day. I didn't smoke all day. That night, I threw the rest of my cigarettes away — and I haven't smoked since. Quitting cold turkey was the hardest thing I ever did, Abby. This year I'm proud to say I have enjoyed 25 years of smoke-free living.

ENJOYING A HEALTHY REQUIREMENT IN FLORIDA

DEAR ENJOYING: Thank you for your timely letter. Tomorrow, Nov. 15, the American Cancer Society's Great American Smokeout will mark its 25th year. It grew out of a 1971 event in Randolph, Mass., in which Arthur P. Mullaney asked people to give up cigarettes for just one day and donate the money they saved to a high school scholarship fund.

In 1974, Lynn R. Smith, editor of the Monticello Times in Minnesota, spearheaded the state's first D-Day, or Don't Smoke Day. The idea caught on. On Nov. 18, 1976, the California Division of the American Cancer Society succeeded in getting nearly 1 million smokers to quit for the day.

Over the past 25 years, there have been dramatic changes in the way society views tobacco promotion and tobacco use. Smoking is now forbidden in airplanes, most public buildings and restaurants. Unfortunately, an estimated 47 million adults in the United States currently smoke, and because of it, approximately half of them will die prematurely.

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death, and this year alone, there will be approximately 169,500 new cases diagnosed. More than 80 percent of lung cancers are thought to result from smoking.

So, Dear Readers, if you're hooked on tobacco and have been saying, "One of these days I've got to quit," take my advice — join the Great American Smokeout and quit today!

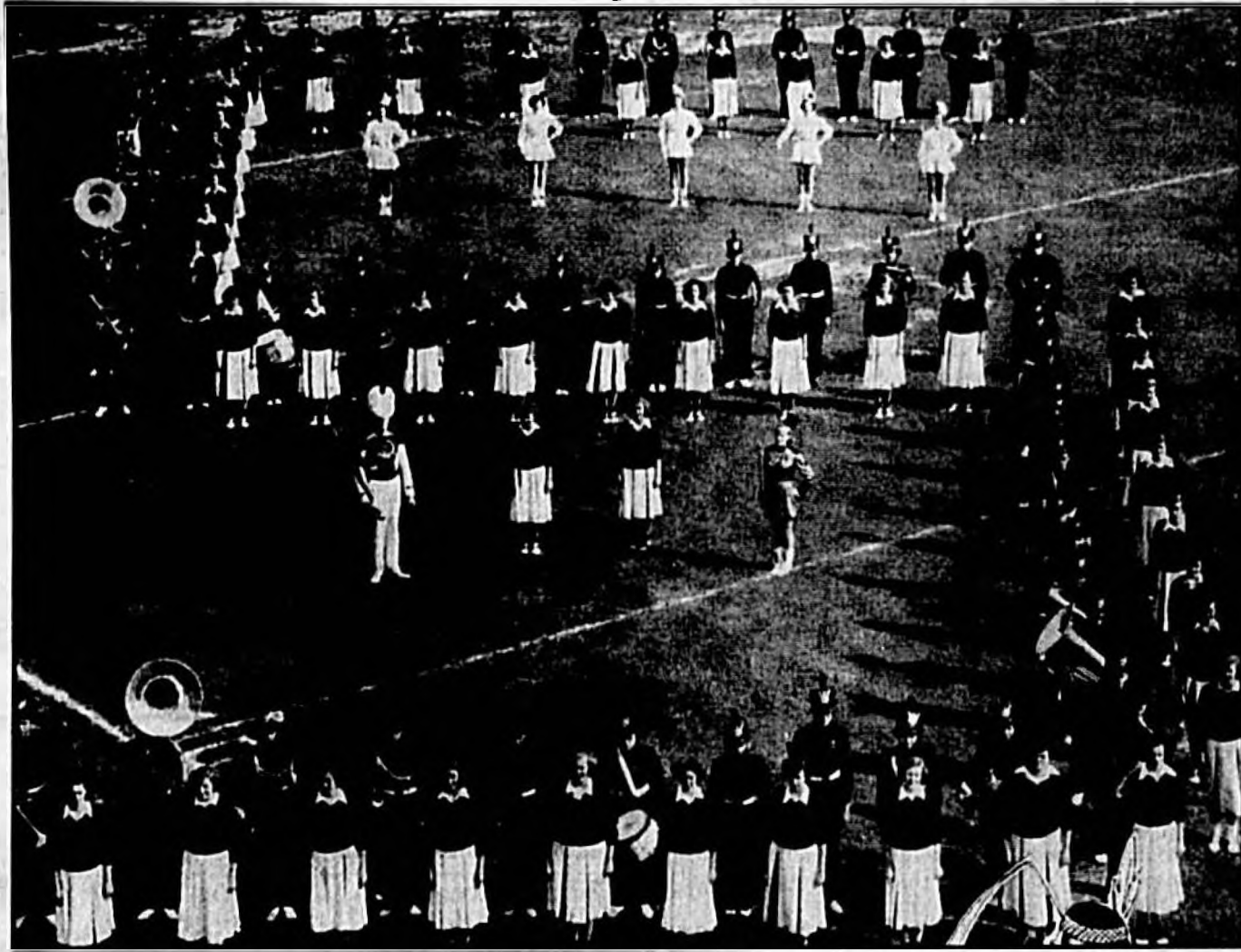

The Way We Were: Local baseball

I'm sure that many of you long-time Sanford residents have wondered, along with me, about the so-called historical facts that have accompanied the stories about the rededication of the restored Memorial Stadium. Some of these articles have completely confused the two stadiums. I even had one person tell me that he was told the first stadium was located on the site of the present Hamilton School. Let me try to clear up the misunderstandings today. My information comes from my own memory plus research

in the files of the Sanford Museum.

The Municipal Ballpark was built on the corner of Mellonville and Celery Avenue, facing Mellonville, in 1926. It had a wooden grandstand.

It was in this Municipal Stadium that Early Wynn and major leaguer Ellis Clary got their start in professional baseball, playing for Sanford's Florida State League team in 1937.

Stan Musial played against Sanford there in several games during 1940. Also in 1940, Sid Hudson played so spectacularly for Sanford's FSL team that he was promoted to the Washington Senators, becoming the first player to go directly from Class D team to the major leagues.

In 1946, Jackie Robinson reported for spring training

here and on April 8 he played two innings at the Sanford Municipal Stadium. This was the second integrated game in minor league baseball. (Some in the area believe it was the first.)

On March 17, 1948, Babe Ruth greeted fans at the Sanford ball park as part of a promotional tour for Ford Motor Company. I was there and as a sixth grader remember his standing on the field, speaking in a raspy voice. He died of throat cancer not long afterwards.

In a recent article I wrote about John Krider, published July 11, I stated that Krider joined with a number of other local businessmen who convinced the New York Giants to form a farm team here to play in the reorganized Florida State

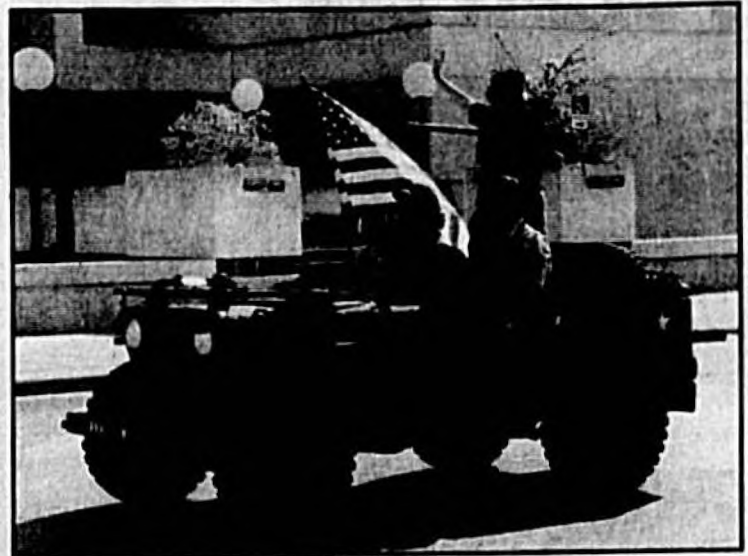

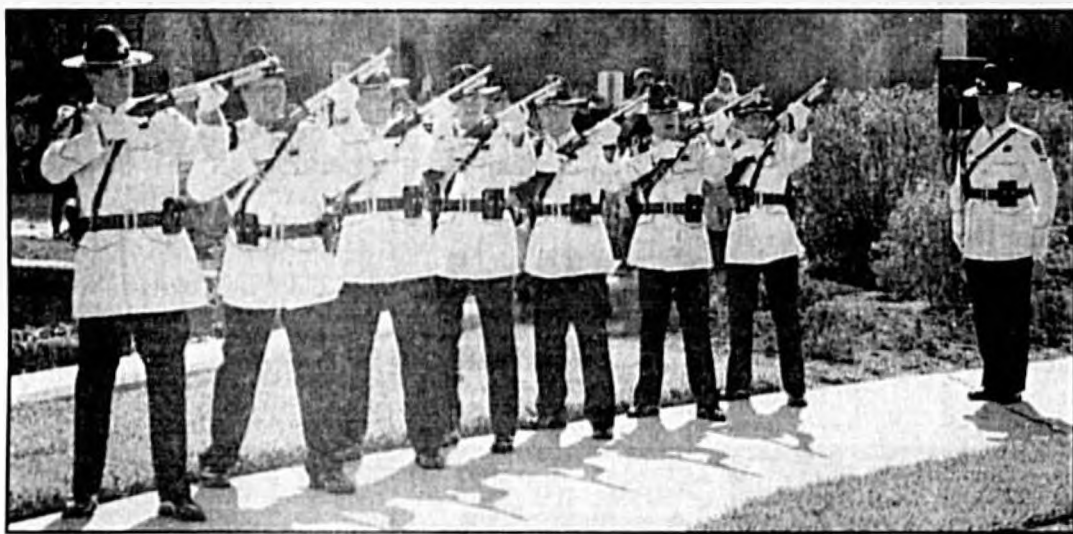

League after the War. The Sanford Giants team was formed in 1946 with Krider as general manager. He was field manager in 1947.

In 1948, the New York Giants brought together 700 players for spring training at the facilities of the deactivated Sanford Naval Air Station. They took over ownership of the FSL Sanford team that year.

In 1950, Willie Mays trained in Sanford with the Minneapolis Millers.

All of the above events occurred at the Municipal Stadium on the corner of Mellonville and Celery, not the present Memorial Stadium as has been inferred in some articles.

The new Memorial Stadium was under construction by My, 1951, next to the old Municipal Stadium. This was a new stadium on a different site, designed by Sanford architect Elton J. Moughton and constructed by Jarco Construction Company. It was dedicated "To the memory of the men and women of Seminole County who served their country in World War I and World War II." It was completed in May, 1952 at a cost of over \$180,000. It seated 2,362. It is this stadium that has been restored and rededicated.

I have detailed diaries from 1949-54, my junior high and high school days. I knew that I had attended Sanford baseball games quite often during those years and my diaries back me up. From 1949-53 I was there several times each summer. I always recorded Sanford's opponent, who won, who I sat with, and sometimes made comments about the game.

I remember going either with friends or with my dad, and then usually sitting with friends. We each had favorite players who we rooted for and of course, we always sat in the bleachers.

Some of these baseball fan friends mentioned in my diary were Nancy Roundtree, Patricia Tooke, Rosemary Garner,

Beverly Cooper, Carol Loehelt, Polly Graham, Ellen Lyon, Peggy Wright, Jeanette Cleveland, Martha Owen, Paulette Cason, Rodman Brumley, Randall Ferrell, Junior Metts, Lynwood and Jimmy Whatley and Leonard Jones.

On May 2, 1950, I have recorded in my diary that Buddy Lake and Ed Levy spoke during assembly at Sanford Junior High and then we students asked questions about baseball.

The record shows that the Municipal Stadium was condemned in 1950. Well, I know there were ballgames there in 1951 because I was there. The present stadium had not been completed.

The Giants announced in November, 1951 that they would not continue to operate a Sanford baseball Club. John Krider proposed local operation and it was organized by early 1952. The Giants donated a bus and uniforms.

There was a baseball team in Sanford at least through 1957. According to Julian Stenstrom a "Way Back When" column, television stole the spotlight and minor league teams as we knew them faded away.

Hall of Famers who did play in the present Memorial Stadium were Willie McCovey, Juan Maricel and Orlando Cepeda while at spring training with the Giants farm system. Ken Harrellson played with Sanford's team and later became a major leaguer.

Tim Raines played at the Memorial Stadium with the

Seminole High baseball team and also American Legion Post 53 team. This was in 1974-76.

In 1952, Seminole High began playing football in the stadium. I was a junior at the time and marched on the field with the band for two years.

The 1953 Salmagundi is dedicated to the 1952 football team, coaches and managers, because of their sportsmanship and efforts as winners of the southern district of the East Florida Conference.

The next year, SHS defeated Edgewater, the first time we had beaten an Orlando team in 21 years. Previous to this we had played the huge Orlando High School team and several Celery Feds would be injured each year.

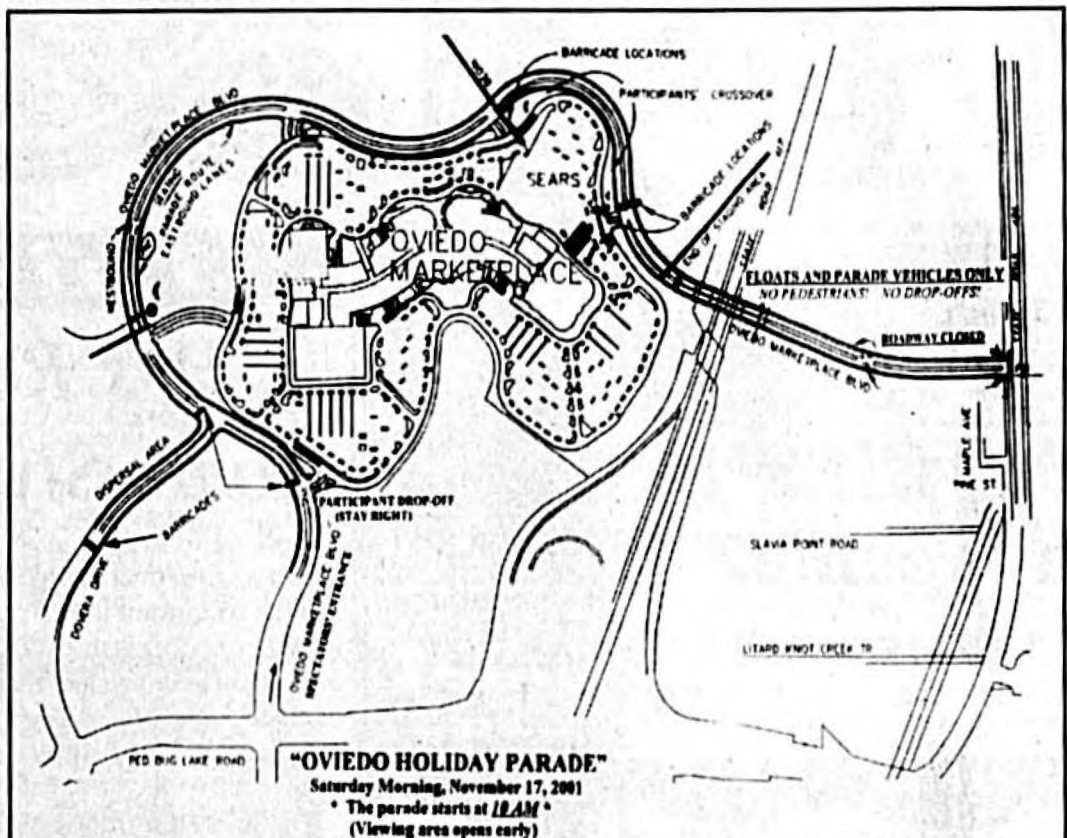
SHS played football there until a stadium was built behind the school in 1973. I recall attending most of the varsity games and several JV games in Memorial Stadium during the 1960's to cheer on my students.

On the site of the old Municipal Stadium, the Giants built a dormitory for their farm team players as the navy base had been reactivated in 1951. They had previously been housed in the barracks.

The Sanford Naval Academy later used this building and its most recent use was for the Seminole County School Board office.

There is much more to the story about the New York Giants presence in Sanford but this article was about the two stadiums.

Biancalana opens with two Winter Tour wins in NFPGA

ORMOND BEACH — Roy Biancalana of Lake Mary earned his second consecutive North Florida PGA Winter Tour title with his victory Friday in the Halifax Open at Halifax Plantation Golf Club.

The first round leader, Biancalana shot 69 for 137, the lowest winning score in the past seven seasons here, to edge Tom Bryant of Holly Hill by a shot. Biancalana birdied three of the first four holes, then made two more birdies and a pair of bogies, the last at the 18th hole.

It was just enough to hold off Bryant, who made four birdies on each nine for 64-138, second among 25 starters. His birdies on the 6,953-yard course were on Nos. 1, 7, 8, 9, 11, 15, 16 and 17.

Biancalana won the Winter Tour's 36th season opener last Friday (Nov. 2), earning his second straight victory at nearby Tomoka Oaks Country Club. He did not play in a one-day tournament Monday (Nov. 5) at Rock Springs Ridge in Apopka.

In the opener at Tomoka Oaks, Biancalana closed with a two under par 70 for 137, earning \$500 from the total purse of \$1,490. Last March, Biancalana shot 67 to win a one-day tournament at Tomoka Oaks. He has four Winter Tour titles since the 1995-96 season.

Next on the NFPGA Winter Tour schedule: Nov. 17-18, Riviera CC, Ormond Beach, and Nov. 20-21, Pine Meadows CC, Eustis.

The North Florida PGA Winter Tour, the nation's oldest golf mini-tour, currently has 28 tournaments scheduled and more may be added, according to Winter Tour Director Rick Hendershot. Included are seven 18-hole events, 20 two-day tourneys and the 54-hole Tour Championship Feb. 13-15 at El Diablo Golf Club in Citrus Springs.

One highlight will be new dates for the Riviera Open at the Riviera Country Club, one of the cornerstone tournaments on which the Winter Tour was founded. A Thanksgiving weekend tradition, the Riviera Open, which began in 1960, will be played a week earlier than in the past, Nov. 17-18.

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — The scores were a little different, but the alignment was the same as Lake Brantley, Lake Mary and Spruce Creek finished 1-2-3 in both the boys and girls team standings of the Class 3A-District 2 Swimming Meet at the Lake Brantley Aquatic Center Saturday.

ORLANDO — Senior guard Lanetra Cooks (Monticello/Tallahassee CC) hit a three-pointer with 10 seconds remaining in the game to give the University of Central Florida women's basketball team a 101-62 victory over the NWBL USA Elite in exhibition play on Saturday afternoon at the UCF Arena.

It was the first time since 1998 that a UCF women's team has eclipsed the 100-point mark in a game.

The Golden Knights trailed 19-10 with 10:58 left in the half before going on a 39-14 run to take a 49-33 advantage at intermission thanks in part to shooting 50-percent from the floor.

UCF continued to gradually build its lead in the second half before going on a 24-2 run over the final 6:46. The Elite would go scoreless for nearly four minutes before

Kim Land nailed a jumper at the 3:05 mark.

Land poured in a game-high 17 points, while freshman Ali Roberts (Pensacola Catholic HS), one of three Golden Knights in double figures, scored a team-high 16 points. Junior Erin Paige (West Palm Beach/The Benjamin School) and sophomore Marvelous Washington (Palm Beach Lakes HS) would also finish in double figures, netting 14 and 11 points, respectively.

UCF shot 54.5-percent from the floor compared to the Elite's 36.8-percent.

Junior Kristy Colligan (Durant, Okla./Frank Phillips JC) led all players with 10 rebounds.

The Golden Knights, which finished last season at 10-18 overall, opens the regular season on Friday (Nov. 16) against the University of Texas-Arlington in the first round of the UCF Golden Knights Classic at 5 p.m.

Watts (23), and two extra points by Young, had given the home-standing Gators a 14-0 halftime lead.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Pensacola team expanded the lead to 20-0 on its first drive of the final period when quarterback John Fuller hit Andrew Fetsko with a 41-yard pass. On the next play, running back John Adams ran 38 yards for a touchdown with 10:05 left in the game.

Winter Springs finally got on the board with 7:13 left when quarterback Jimmy Lanier hit Kyle Hill for a touchdown on fourth and 6 from the Escambia 14.

The inside kick succeeded on the ensuing kicking, as the Bears recovered at the 47. Lanier completed 5-of-7 passes on the drive, the last a 6-yard scoring toss to Hill with 3:59 left.

A key play in the drive was Chauncey Hampton's 3-yard run on fourth down and 3 from the Escambia 4.

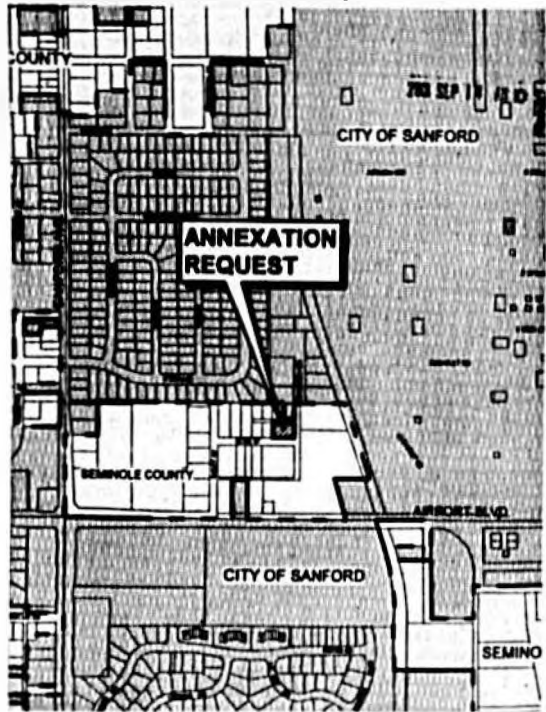

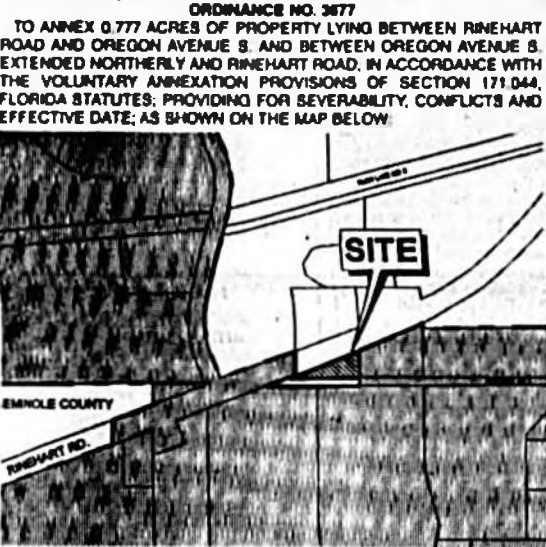
