



#### Homeowners continue to fight after Sanford, Lake Mary OK development

The cities of Sanford and Lake Mary have mended their fences and have reached what both sides feel is a workable compromise in the battle over the proposed land use amendment for 50 acres on County Road 46A., but nearby homeowners say they still plan to fight

The two primary players sat down together in a meeting, with the developers' representative, at Lake Mary City Hall on Tuesday.

The meat of the deal hammered out by Lake Mary Mayor David Mealor and Sanford Mayor Larry Dale includes a concession limiting den-sity on the 50-acre tract to 15 to 16-3/4 dwelling units per acre, down from the proposed 20.

Dale is asking for 15 units in the south half

of the property and 16-3/4 in the north half.

Mealor said this is fine with him especially since the north half of the development will use Rinehart as a service road and the higher density will not have a direct impact on C.R. 46A..

Frances Chandler, acting planning and development director for Seminole County, sent a letter to Dale, dated Sept. 8, stating that we letter to Dale, dated Sept. 8. stating that "we concur with city staff analysis of services and facilities, which identifies that all required facility and services are available," Chandler said that under the Joint Planning Agreement between Sanford and the county "900 multifamily units on 50 acres (a density of 18-20 dwelling units per acre) ...would be consistent with the uses described in the JPA..."

Other concessions discussed in the meeting include a brick wall and enhanced untrance on the north side of 46A, raising the height of the See Develop, Page 4A

# Grants benefit several youth programs

Several Seminole County youth programs will benefit through \$110,000 in grants awarded by the Department of Juvenile Jus-

More than \$556,000 in grant money was given to 16 community organizations in District 7, which includes Seminole, Brevard, Orange, and Oscools counties, according to Calvin Ross, secretary of the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice. Statewide, Ross said, \$4.9 million was distributed in partnership grants.

The grant program is funded through the Mo-tor Vehicle Theft Prevention Trust Fund. Of the 81 license tag fee, the juvenile justice depart-ment receives 42 cents from each tag sold.

Ross said the program funds prevention and intervention programs addressing juvenile See Grants, Page 4A



#### Angler numbers fell in 1996

The number of anglers who bought fishing licenses fell by just over one percent in 1996 while the number of hunters who purchased licenses remained constant, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced.

There were 29.9 million paid flahing license holders in 1996 compared with 30.3 million in 1995. These anglers paid 8447 million for their licenses compared with 6448.6 million in 1995. Meanwhile, 15.2 million hunters bought licenses in 1996, the same as the year before. They spent 8542.8 million on the licenses, 810.2 million more than in 1995.

Revenues raised through license sales support stab-wildlife agencies, their conservation projects, and the hunting and fishing safe and education programs.

Through license sal alone, hunters and angler contribute nearly \$1 billion a year to wildlife conservation," said Service Director Jamie Rappaport Clark. That is money that doesn't come from general tax revenue, yet it benefits every American by promoting both a healthy environment and healthy wildlife.

This money doesn't even count the hundreds of millions of dollars sportsmen and-women contribute through excise taxes on hunting and fishing equipment and through member-ship in and donations to non-profit conservation or-ganization.

License sales figures are compiled annually by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service from information submitted by state fish and wildlife agencies. The figures are part of a formula to deter-mine the amount of funding each state receives through the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration and the Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration programs, both adminiatered by the service. Under these programs.

hunters and anglers pay an excise tax on hunting and fishing equipment such as firearms, ammunition, and tackle. The money is, in turn, distributed to the states in the form of grants to conserve wildlife; teach hunter safety; and provide fishing, hunting, and boating opportunities. opportunities.
The number of hunting li-cense holders has declined

from a record high of 16.7 million in 1982. Meanwhile. the number of flahing license holders has been about the same during that time.



ture of the call. As to their opinion on specific aspects of their jobs at SPD by checking off Very Satisfled, Satisfled, Neutral, Dissatisfied or Very Disantisfied, there were some interesting replies.

Not one member of the SPD was Very Satisfied with his or her salary - 28 were Dissatisfied and 38 Very Disastisfied.

Not one member was Very Satisfied with support to the department by city officials -25 were Dissatisfied and 32

Very Dissatisfied. Only one member was Very Satisfied with SPD facilities 26 Dissatisfied and 42 Very Dissatisfied.

One of the problems identified in the attitude survey and in PAS's observation of the opcrations was a lack of basic supervisory skills and leadership throughout the SPD. Hubler emphasized the "throughout." It was not something that could be attributed to individuals at the top - it was a department wide problem or opportunity for improvement.

Hubler said that there was a strong perception that SPD employees believe their jobs are controlled by politics and that they are far more dissatisfied with city and departmental leadership and relationships than other police departments PAS had studied.

existing brick wall bounding the Hills of Lake Mary to six feet, a 100-foot setback along 46A, restricted access to the lakes and the at-tachment of planned development zoning, instead of residential/office/institutional zoning, to the land.

Dale said this stipulation will allow the Sanford City Commissioners to have more input into various aspects of the development and would be binding in perpetuity. If the land is sold again before it is developed, unlike a developer's agreement, which would not be

transferred with a sale. This is what's critical, said Mealor. With these concessions, he said, "we can reach an agreement that has minimal impact on everyone."

Hills of Lake Mary board member Bob Foley isn't as enthusiastic about the agreement as Mealor. "As far as I'm con-cerned." Foley said, "that's not good enough.

"I don't oppose development on that side. I oppose irresponsible development.

Foley is not convinced that the luxury apartments the developer is promising will ever materialize. He told a meeting of the Hills of Lake Mary Homeowners Association Monday night that in order for the developer to make any money

with what he is proposing, he would have to charge rents in excess of \$1,200. And he said he doesn't see the benefit for the city of Sanford "Apartments (dwellers) are service users, they don't gener ate a tax base.

Foley said that while it appears that the city of Lake Mary has agreed not to oppose the development, the residents will continue with their petition drive and still plan to show up in force at the Sanford City Commission meeting.

Irene Fultz, of Knywood, had not heard about the results of the mayor's meeting until Thursday morning When told of the concessions, she commented. "It's not acceptable to us." She said they will continue their letter writing campaign to the Department of Community Affairs in Tallahassee and have also contacted the St. Johns River Water Management District, in Palatka, because of their concerns about the lakes and the water supply.

Representing the developer at the meeting between Lake Mary and Sanford was Bill Burkett, who is the civil engineer for the project. Burkett said, "It was a very positive meeting." Burkett said details of the plan will be finalized prior to the Sanford meeting. He said Wednesday that most developers want to build some-

# Man's abuse leaves wife bruised

ADVICE

DEAR ABBY: A couple of days ago, my husband and I got into an argument. It led to fussing, yelling and cursing each other in front of our 8-month-old baby. When I thought the worst was over, he pushed me down, grabbed me by the ankles and dragged me over the kitchen floor. Then he left with our son and went to his parents' house. A few hours later, I looked in the bathroom mirror and saw that I had bruises from head to toe.

My husband says it would never have happened if I had kept my mouth shut! He says I nag him until he can't stand it and I drove him to do what he did. Now that the bruises on my legs and face are apparent, he has told his family that our son is ill, and it would be better if they waited a week or so to come over.

Somehow he makes out that I am the one who brings on his violent behavior. I admit I do let too much get to me sometimes, but please, Abby, tell me, am I to blame for his actions? Or is it just an excuse for his violent behavior?

BRUISED AND CONFUSED

DEAR BRUISED: You are not responsible for your husband's physical abuse. If your husband didn't like something you said, he could have left the house to cool off. His insistence that it wouldn't have happened if you'd kept your mouth shut is a classic tactic of a butterer. Unless your husband is willing to get professional help, your marriage is in serious trouble and you, and possibly the baby — are in physical danger.

This problem will not go away by itself. Do not remain silent and out of sight. Your family, his family and your friends should be told about the hattering. You need all the sup-port you can get. Photographic evidence would also be helpful.

When it happens again, the dice should be notified immedistely. And you should waste no time in getting away to famiABIGAIL VAN BUREN

### Don't judge an aspirin by its coating

umn, you touled the effectiveness of aspirin in preventing a second heart attack or struke. Would enteric-coated aspirin be just as good?

DEAR READER: It's the aspirin itself — not so much the form in which it is given -- that reduces arter-ial blood clots. Therefore, you will have identical results from using buffered, enterio coated or regular aspirin. The main reason for the buffering or coating is to reduce gastric Irritation, a common problem with plain aspirin and other anti-inflammatory drugs.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Are you familiar with Monurol? What is it?

DEAR READER: Monurol (for-(omycin) is a new, broad spectrum antibiotic for urinary infections. It is administered as a single dose, which makes it an attractive alternative to other antibiotics that have to be administered in multiple doses over several days.

According to the Medical Letter (July 18, 1997), the "bible" of drug analysis, Monurol is effective, well-tolerated and easy to use. It is, however, expensive (at least \$25 for one dose). Whether or not it will achieve wideapread popularity is unknown, because the medicine is so new that it has yet to be prescribed in quantity. Also, its relative effectiveness (in comparison to standard antibiotic preparations) has not been estab-

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am \$3 and have been prescribed Fosamax for ostenporosis. What are the side effects?

DEAR READER: Fosamax is a relalively new prescription medication that causes calcium to enter the bones. At present, it is the treatment of choice for osteoporosis, an agerelated affliction marked by loss of bone-calcium, with resulting risk of fractures.

The main problem with Fosamax is its inconvenience. The drug should be taken every morning, a half-hour hefore any food - and the patient must not lie down during this period. Except for intestinal upset, flatulence and muscle pain, Fosamas does not have significant side effects. If you experience heartburn or indigestion, check with your doctor.

DEAR READER: An ultrasound exam la a noninvasive, safe, painiesa and relatively inexpensive method of using electromagnetic waves to outline various atructures and organs in the body. The basic equipment consists of an ultrasound machine, a transducer (probe), a TV monitor.

Ultrasound exams are very useful for certain purposes; in particular, for evaluating the size, age and development of fetuses. Also, ultrasound is a great way to diagnose galistones. However, it is not always the most effective method of identifying cancer, for which CT scans (special X-rays) are superior.

An ultrasound exam can usually be completed in a matter of minutes. assuming that no technical difficulties (such as obesity) are present.


