Stalin, Attlee *Looked Upon To End Dispute

Delegates At London Conference Await Message Which May End First Crisis

LONDON, Feb. 6, (AP)— Generalissimo Stalin and Prime Minister Attlee are looked upon today as the last resort in effecting a com-promise settlement between Russia and Britain in the dispute over Greece.

The whole question now has been turned over to the highest levels of the London and Moscow governments. United Nations sources are hoping for a satisfactory solution to end the fledgling organization's first ma-

jor crisis.
The Russians have charged Britain with endangering the peace by maintaining British armed forces in Greece. Moscow has demanded that Britain withdraw the troops at once, although the Russians have indicated they would agree to a delay in the withdrawal. Moscow has refused to accede to a British demand that Britain be exonerated of the

The Soviets have threatened to use their veto power should the UNO Security Council drop the charges against Britain.
As a result, the mater has been turned over to the British and Rhusian governments for solution rather than being left with the two delegations at the UNO assembly.

United Nations delegates are awaiting tensely the messages which pull the world peace agency cut of its crisis, some announcement of the separate confer-ences of the British and Russian governments may be made before unnight's session of the UNO

The suit differs in two respects from that brought by Carnegie-lilinois for its Homestead, Pa. plant. This charged the CIO steel union with violating a no-strike contract clause and named CIO leader Philip Murray as de-fendant. A temporary injunction vas granted limiting the Homestead pickets to ten per gate. The court dismissed a similar petition by Carnegie-Illinois at Joliet, Ill.

Democracy In Action

Monday evening about 75 or 100 busy Sanford men met in the Episcopal Parish House to discuss the problems of wilding a lasting and permanent peace. Several of Sanford's best informed citizens spoke on subjects ranging from the moral and spiritual breakdown following the first World War to need for a strong international organization with police powers to preserve the peace in the future. Aprofound feeling was generally expressed among those present-and this feeling was able summarized in an excellent address by Bishop Louttit-that no political machinery for the prevention of wars and no international armies can accomplish much without the wholehearted support of public opinion and without a moral and spiritual revival throughout our own country as well as in every other nation of the world.

The maintenance of world peace is not going to be easy and it cannot be accomplished without considerable cost to our public treasuries and to our national sovereignty, nor probably without some bloodshed. But one has only to recall the million casualties we suffered in the recent war with its appalling economic waste of hundreds of billions of dollars to know that whatever peace may cost it is worth

Most encouraging sign on a national horizon that presents to many disturbing signs is the fact that here in a little town like Sanford, far removed from the great centers of international thought, a group of nearly a hundred men are willing to gather for an evening, laying aside their business and professional cares and their family problems, and discuss the peace of the world; and that in literally hundreds of other places not unlike Sanford similar discussion are being held.
